Hospital Board Cites Medicare Redtape As Reason For Rejecting

We got quite a kick here at Stockman out of a re-editorial in the San Antonio Standard entitled "Let's Make A Profit." The few lines in the last paragraph aroused our curiosity about the I. Q. of the author. Everyone who was on a committee attended meetings, did their jobs and generally worked their heads off. Those who went out of town to promote the Jubilee furnished their own mode of travel. The cast and narrators of "From This Rugged Land" worked hard, did a good job and were well directed.

In my opinion it was just a big undertaking for a small community, financially speaking. The plan of action was designed to cover a much larger territory and a more densely populated area. With small towns in Southwest Texas doing this same thing every year, we could hardly expect anyone who didn't have an interest in Ozona and Crockett County to be on hand.

Extensive regulations laid down by the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare were the principal reasons given by the Crockett County Hospital Board for rejecting Medicare at this time. Board Chairman Nat Read announced this week.

In its monthly report to the Commissioners Court the board listed the following specific regulations.

The hospital would be required to pay a utilization committee composed of two outside doctors to come into our hospital at least once a month to go over any or all Medicare patients' records with the local staff physicians to decide whether or not hospitalization is necessary.

It would be necessary to install a cost accounting system which would entail the employment of another full-time office worker to handle the additional records.

It would be necessary to hire on a full-time, part-time, or consulting basis a qualified dietician and a registered medical record administrator.

In addition to these specific major regulations, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare publication that set out these conditions also indicated that others would be forthcoming as the program progresses.

The board report stated, "Six months or a year from now the Medicare regulations might be changed to the extent that a small hospital such as ours would benefit from participating in the program. At present though, we feel that to meet the Medicare regulations in order to accommodate approximately five per cent of our population would not be in the best interest of our hospital and our county."

An accounting of the results of the recent Crockett County Diamond Jubilee celebration, made in a preliminary financial report, showed the week's show resulted in a net financial loss of \$2,904.54, with some few invoice adjustments yet to be made which might result in a few hundred dollars additional reduction in the loss, according to James Baggett general chairman of the show.

A running account of the planning and development of the Jubilee celebration is made by the Committee in conjunction with the financial statement which is shown in an adjoining column. This statement, submitted by Mr. Baggett, is as follows:

"Six years ago the Ex-students Association voted to postpone their homecoming, scheduled for 1965, for one year so that they could cooperate and participate in the 75th Anniversary of Crockett County.

"The officers of the Student Association, County officials and School officials discussed ways and means of having a celebration where everyone could participate and also take pride.

"A town meeting was called and it was voted to have a celebration. A corporation charter was applied for and accepted January 17, 1966. James Baggett, Bill Seahorn, L. B. T. Sikes and Mrs. Brock Jones were named the Corporation officers.

"The Rogers Company sent a representative to Ozona to meet with the officers and present a plan of action. They would be the producers. The second town meeting was called and each organization in Ozona was asked to send two representatives. The group voted to hire the Rogers Company and a budget of \$9200 was set. This money was to be raised through the sale of the history book, pageant tickets, two dances, the third dance was free, plates, buttons, bonnets, dresses, hats, vests and ties.

IT PAYS TO LOOK BACK

To paraphrase the homely philosopher and baseball player Satchel Paige — don't ever look back, something might be gaining on you. But irrespective of his advice, it might pay to look back instead of spending so much time looking beyond our borders and bemoaning the spread of dictatorships and oppression.

The house organ of the Central Illinois Public Service Company has had the temerity to take a look at a pet project of the socialists in our own country — the TVA. It finds that "The Tennessee Valley Authority, first established to improve navigation and provide flood control and only secondarily to produce hydroelectric power on a 'yardstick' basis, now is providing almost 10 per cent of all electricity produced in the United States. . . . It has long since far outdistanced any pretense of being a 'yardstick' and is a frank competitor to every investor-owned utility in the southeastern United States. . . . If TVA paid

local taxes and federal income taxes on the same basis as investor-owned companies, and paid the cost of the money appropriated to it by the federal government, its rates would have to be raised by about 50 percent, according to Edison Electric Institute."

TVA is about to move into a new phase of growth. It has asked for bids on a giant nuclear power plant. With due credit to Satchel Paige those of us who cannot run fast enough to keep ahead of the tax collector might do well to look over our shoulder occasionally to see where some of the tax money is being spent.

Troy Williams represented Ozona and Crockett County at the Action Forum for Directors of District 8 of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce held in McCamey Wednesday. WTCC vice-president C. W. Brown headed the meeting.

WTCC president John Ben Sheppard outlined the program which covered growth potentials of West Texas.

HO'S THREE ACES

Ho Chi Minh lost a few chips as a result of recent bombings of supply areas near Hanoi and Haiphong. But he still holds at least three aces. They were handed to him by the same "dealers" in Uncle Sam's Potomac River "gambling palace" who have at long last allowed our pilots to hit a few really significant targets in North Vietnam.

Ace number 1: Mo and his cohorts are still assured a personal sanctuary. Defense Secretary McNamara said during his dramatic TV performance explaining the bombings: "Our objectives in South Vietnam are limited. Our objectives are not to destroy the Communist government of North Vietnam."

Ace number 2: In addition to the fact that he had lots of time beforehand to disperse supplies from those areas which were finally attacked, Ho apparently can count on some time for resupply and further dispersal, while the dealers in Washington wait, as they have said that they will, to see he might now want to negotiate. Mr. McNamara said during his TV appearance that he intends to continue the same policy of "military restraint" he has followed in the past and not to interfere with any ships hauling supplies into North Vietnam and allowing no air strikes in the North except when and as approved by the political croupiers in Washington.

Ace number 3: Ho's trump ace: According to present rules of the game, as set by the house (White House) manager himself, should the strikes in the North become more damaging than Ho wishes to bear, he needs only to agree to negotiate in order to get them stopped completely. At the same time, no condition has been set by the house manager that attacks by the Communist forces in South Vietnam must be stopped before Ho can

play that trump ace.

Recent history speaks vividly on the tragic consequences of that kind of game. During the Korean conflict, far more men were killed and wounded — on both sides — after peace negotiations were started than before.

Recent history also indicates that, so long as dealers like McNamara and Rusk are left in charge of the game, Ho Chi Minh can count on all his aces remaining playable.

Crockett Field Named, Production Allowable Fixed

A new Crockett County oil field has been named and assigned production allowable by the Railroad Commission, Oil & Gas Division.

The Tippett (4,950 Wolf-camp) field was opened June 25 with completion of Standard Oil Co. of Texas, Midland, No. 1-40 J. H. Tippett, 14 miles south of McCamey.

It was finaled to flow 80 barrels of 37.6 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 1,103-1, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations between 4,948-5,016 feet, which previously were identified as Rucco.

Location is 7,400 feet from the northeast and 660 feet from the southeast and 660 feet from the southeast lines of 40-31-H&TC.

Daily allowable assigned to the field is 80 barrels.

Outdoor cooking is the main feature of most households this time of year. As a departure from hamburgers and steaks you might try the following two outdoor recipes:

Barbecued Pork Loin
 1 five pound center-cut loin or pork
 1/2 cup light corn syrup
 1/4 cup soy sauce
 1/4 cup lemon juice
 2 tablespoons sugar
 1 teas. dry mustard
 1 teas. ground ginger
 1/2 teas ground cloves
 2 tablespoons bottled steak sauce

Place pork on spit, following manufacturer's directions. Set spit in position over hot coals; start rotisserie Roast 1 1/2 hours.

Mix remaining ingredients in a small saucepan; heat to boiling; brush part of mixture over pork. Continue roasting, brushing often with sauce, 1 hour, or until pork is tender and richly glazed. Remove to a cutting board, take out spit and carve pork into chops; serve with any remaining sauce. Serves 8.

Barbecued Pork Chops

New Boat Ramps Being Built By Highway Dept.

Austin — The Texas Highway Commission today approved the 1966 Boat Ramp Program which will increase the number of State-maintained launching facilities for thousands of Texas pleasure boats by more than one-half.

Thirty-three new ramps were authorized in the program. Another is slated for widening and reconditioning. The work, to cost an estimated \$241,832, will bring to 94 the number of boat ramps built or planned by the Texas Highway Department.

The program is in line with the Highway Department's

efforts to furnish scenic and encourage the use of recreational areas. The department also contemplates the new recreation system in development of State. Twenty of the projects are adjacent to park roads.

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HIGHLIGHTS AND HIGHLIGHTS

Your State Capitol

— Texas, with its why, where, who and use — raised its unpopularity in the Texas capitol this week.

Legislative Committee on State Local Tax Policy presented a report to Gov. John Connally and the Texas Legislature.

Everybody's request for money indicates that the 1967 Legislature will eat up the \$75,000,000 state surplus — and require new money to finance higher education, pay raise for teachers and state employees, water development, park and recreation expenditures, Texas Highway program — all want in on the

tax policy committee headed by Rep. Ben Atkinson of Dallas, who asked the Texas Research League to possible sources for new money.

Proposed were: increase the state sales tax from its present two per cent to two and a half or three per cent, raising \$72,400,000 a year; increase the corporation income tax of 10 per cent (average of those of the 37 states which levy

it), raising from \$18,000,000 to \$106,000,000 a year.

Graduated personal income tax, raising \$75,000,000 a year. (There are 36 states with personal income taxes.)

More Boat Ramps — Thirty three new boat ramps across the state, making a total of 94 such ramps, have been approved by the Texas Highway Commission.

Twenty of the new ones are adjacent to farm-to-market or park roads.

These new ramps will increase launching facilities by more than one-half and will cost \$241,800, or an average of \$7,327 each. Source of money, provided for under the Texas Water Safety Act, comes from Certificate of Number fees collected from Texas boat owners.

And, speaking of boats, new boat inspection fees and unclaimed boat gasoline sales taxes are reaping about \$100,000 a month for the state.

According to the State Parks and Wildlife Department, a new system is being

set up so that fines collected for boat safety law violations will go to a State fund, rather than to county funds where most other law-breakers' fines are deposited.

Big Thicket Endorsed — State Parks and Wildlife Commission endorsed "in principle" the creation of a Big Thicket State Park. It will embrace some 15,000 acres of the 300,000 acres in Liberty, Hardin, Tyler and Livingston Counties known as the "Big Thicket."

Will Odom of Austin, commission chairman, said endorsement would be made "specific" after the Parks and Wildlife staff has studied the proposal. Then all the Commission needs is legislative approval.

Writer Analyzes
Graduation Speech

Dear Editor:

I wrote to you once before expressing my concern for those who are not as proud of America and all that it stands for as I am. Now, once again, I am distressed by something much closer to home. At the 1966 Commencement of OHS a speech was given by one of the graduates which should be considered further and questioned greatly.

The speech was entitled "A New Deal for A New Age." The phrase "A New Deal" was used by Franklin D. Roosevelt in his presidential campaign. Roosevelt didn't think of this phrase by himself. It was taken from the title of a book, "A New Deal", by Stewart Chase. This means very little unless you investigate the background of Stewart Chase. Mr. Chase is a Fabian Socialist and to define the difference between a Fabian Socialist and a Bolshevik (Communist) is like stepping on a merry-go-round. Both stem from original ideas of Carl Marx in 1848. The Fabian Socialists first formed their group in a church in England, and adopted their emblem of a wolf in sheep's clothing which corresponds to their theories of undercover deceit. The Bolsheviks are violent and outward; the Fabian Socialists are non-violent and undercover workers. Don't let the idea that they congregated in a church deceive you, because they are by no means Christian people. A church was used because it offered protection from suspicion.

Another phrase I found in the speech was "The Great Society" which is President Johnson's slogan. Again, this slogan comes from a book, "The Great Society," by Graham Wallace, another well-known Fabian Socialist.

To look more into the contents of this Commencement speech, my estimation shows two major themes: Compromise, and the idea of "I'd rather be Red, than Dead." One particular sentence in my opinion shows this idea clearly. "An age-old American diplomatic tool the compromise, must be used to perhaps its greatest and fullest extent by tomorrow's leaders..." In my way of thinking, there can be no compromise with the communists, because there is no such thing as a Christian atheist or a Republic dictatorship. Pour water into acid and you'll have an explosion.

The speech suggested compromise... not because of a lack of faith in our way of life, but, because there exists in today's world nuclear forces which could destroy, not only our way of life, but the whole existence of the human race.

I do not believe this will ever happen, because it wouldn't attain what they have set out to get. If a thief tries to steal my car, he will first have to get rid of me. He is not going to burn my car to get me out, because then he will have nothing to steal. Instead, he would probably wait until I am not looking and then drive it away. This is the basic tactic of communists infiltration. They froth at the mouth for all the wealth in America, and to devastate the country would put them back in the bread lines.

The plea for peace rings throughout the world and yet the definition of peace differs considerably. The Americans want freedom from the responsibility of fight-

ing communism, and the communist definition of peace is "world communism". To compromise is to give in to the "comrate", and give up our American heritage, freedom, and honor. I am wondering how many Americans would be willing to work for 39 hours and be paid \$10, when you can work under the American system for 6 and 2-3 hours and receive the same pay.

The only peace Communism can offer is the peace after the firing squad has fired, the peace of a prison cell, or the peace of a mass grave. There can be no room for compromise.

As reported in the Chicago Tribune, May 7, 1966, a Romanian clergyman stripped to the waist before a Senate hearing and bared the scars of torture he received under 14 years of communist imprisonment. He and many others were kept in windowless cells for as long as two years, only to be removed for questioning periods of 17 hours during which they were beaten with whips, slashed with knives, and hit with iron rods. This is peace?

They were required to chant endlessly that "communism is good" or "Christianity is dead". In his testimony, the Reverend Wurmbrand stated "I received these scars from the communist oppressors you are defending. I have seen many men die under torture rather than turn against God and yield to atheism and communism. There can be no compromise with communism."

The prison commandant in the Bucharest prison addressed the men frequently, saying, "You fools! You expect the Americans to come some day and release you. They are coming now to do business with us! If you beg Americans to help you, they ignore you. If you insult them they help you."

There are more people un-

der communism and yet it just does not provide the life of equality it says it can give. There is no such thing as classlessness because there must always be the middle man that is strong enough to take from one man and give to another. There always has to be a dictator.

No empire, nation of kingdom had ever ruled for more than 200 years and our time is coming in 1976 — the same year the Communists predict, we will fall into their hands like ripe apples. The downfall of every nation resulted from placid self-satisfaction. They were so content with their castles that they didn't notice the termites destroying the foundation.

Willard Wilson, Pelham, New York, said this: "If you feel you are too busy to take an interest in government... feel that getting mixed up in politics is beneath your dignity or bad for business — then, at least take time for one thing:

Teach your children to count in rubles — they'll

need to with the inheritance you're leaving them."

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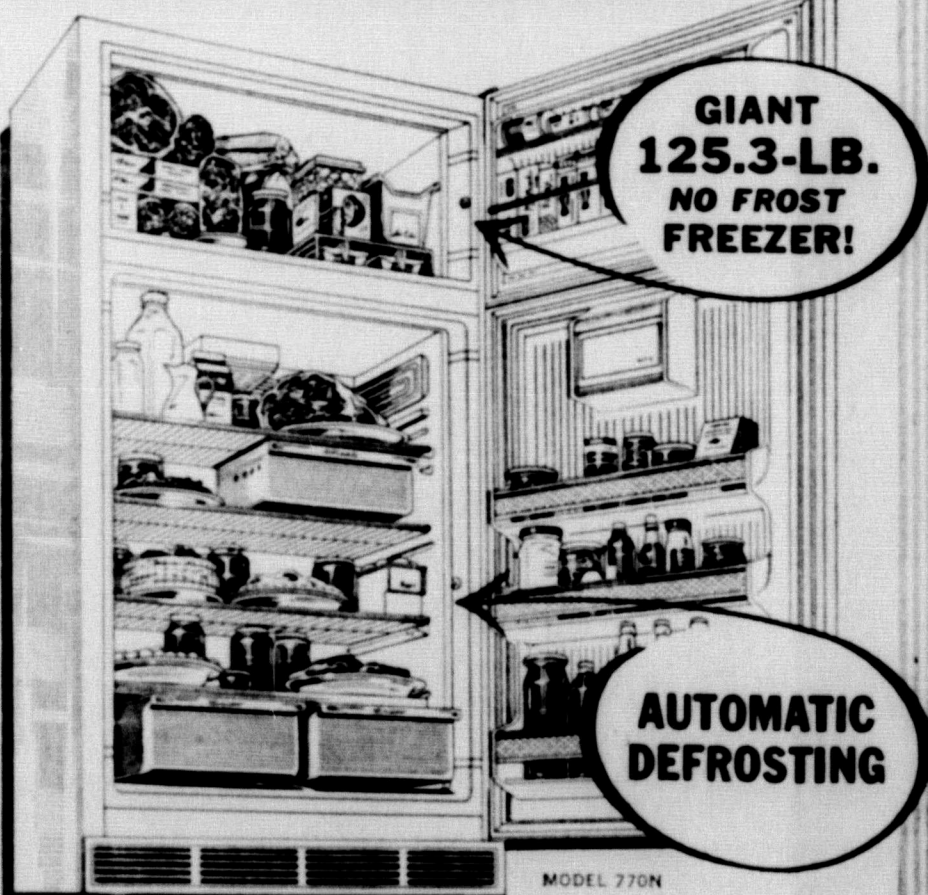

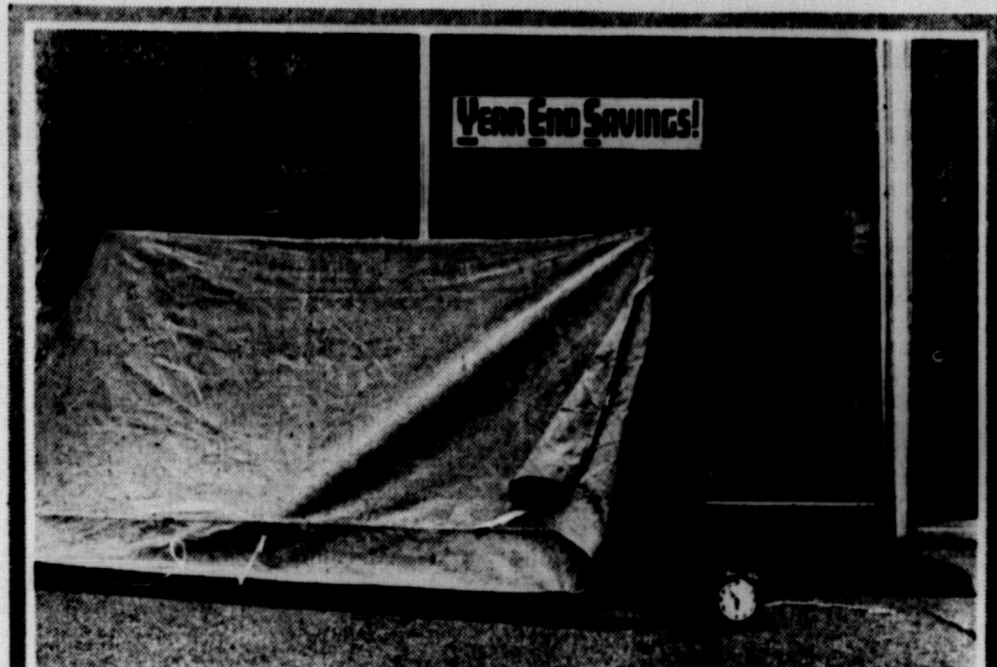

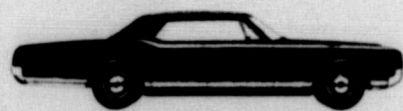

"The Odessa Chuck Wagon Gang served a barbecue dinner in the park which was followed by the parade. "More than 500 Ozona citizens worked to make all of this possible. True, we do
