Harold "Red' Grange is one of the most fabulous members of Football's Hall of Fame. His feats on the football field were fantastic. In 20 college games, he gained over two miles of ground. In one game against Michigan, he handled the ball 5 times in the first 12 minutes and made 4 touchdowns. In 1925, Sports promotes Charley Pyle, got him to turn pro. He was paid by the game and the first year earned \$12,000. Next, he went on tour and earned \$100,000. In December, he played in New York to a crowd of 75,000, which at that time was a record, and earned \$35,000 for that day's game. So, in his first year of professional play he earned a fortune of \$150,000 plus \$150,000 from movie and advertising endorsements
