Record Moisture For Fall Season In Week's Rain

West Texas ranchmen have a saying, "I'd like to see it rain for a week and then drizzle until it dries up" and that seems to be the case at this writing. The total rainfall for the two-day period here in Ozona was 2.30 inches at 4 o'clock yesterday and it was still raining.

The heaviest rainfall recorded was on ranchlands west toward Sheffield, where the total was 3 inches or better yesterday morning. The highway from Sheffield to Sanderson was closed to traffic Tuesday shortly after noon.

Reports from south of Ozona placed rainfall at 2:50 inches to 3 inches yesterday afternoon. East of town the fall was general at about 2 inches.

At 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon North of Ozona rainfall total had reached 3.6 and there was a light drizzle falling.

Total rainfall for August was 3.54, for September 5.15 a record for a usually dry month and with 2.50 inches or better so far in October, many ranchmen and oldtimers say the country looks better than in many years. It is a record for fall moisture in this part of West Texas.

Stuart plowed in for the touchdown from around the 10 yd. line. The try for extra points failed and the Cubs went ahead 6-0. Sonora gave up the ball on downs, and the Cubs drove downfield for another touchdown after a series of first downs put the ball on the 8 yd. line. Perner carried for the touchdown, and Montgomery ran the ball over for the 2 extra points and it was 14-0 in favor of the Cubs in the third quarter.

The Lions hope to get back on the victory trail tomorrow night when they trek to the nest of the Menard Yellowjackets. A win over the Yellow jackets would even the Lion district record at 1-1 following a loss last Friday night to Sonora. Game time is 7:30 p. m.

With two backfield starters on the sidelines, Ozona dropped the first district ballgame and Menard was beaten by the Eldorado Eagles 43-6.

Tomorrow night Coach Sam Mosley will again be without halfbacks Beto Ramos and George Cox. Both Cox and Ramos are important cogs in the Ozona defense as well as offense. Cox normally performs at defensive safety, and Ramos holds down a linebacking position.

The Yellowjackets are reported to be improved over last year despite their inexperience and size. In last week's loss to Eldorado, Menard fumbles and pass interceptions led to four Eldorado touchdowns.

Other starters for Ozona are linemen Larry Kilgore, Oscar Flores, Gary Sutton, Wesley West, Rex Bland, John DeHoyos and Marlin Farris. Filling out the backfield are Randal Clepper and Thomas DeHoyos.

More Screwworm Cases Show Up In Crockett Co.

Screwworm cases have continued to break out over the county this past week as five new cases have been confirmed since the three cases reported last week on the R. A. Harrell Ranches and Ralph Jones Ranch. New cases reported were found on the following ranches; T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Dempster Jones, Joe Bean, Roy Coates and R. L. Vaughan, bringing a total of eight screwworm cases reported since September 23.

Screwworm officials are urging ranchmen to be especially watchful for possible screwworm cases and collect specimen worm samples an dmail to the Screwworm Eradication Laboratory in Mission, Texas. Vials for mailing worm samples have been placed at both wool warehouses in Ozona should anyone need one for collecting and mailing in samples.

Ranchmen who have confirmed cases will receive drops of sterile flies over a period of three weeks. Three drops will be made, each a week apart, according to information received by county agent Pete W. Jacoby.

Voter Registration Certificates Now Available at Tax Office

Voter registration certificates are now available at the tax office, Mrs. Gertrude Perry announced earlier this week. Mrs. Perry, Deputy tax - assessor & collector, stressed the fact that everyone must have a certificate in order to vote this year.

Under the old poll tax system, those over 60 were allowed to vote without an exemption, however, under the new voter registration law, everyone must have a certificate to be eligible to vote.

There is no cost to register, although an application for the certificate must be made giving name, address, age, birthplace, information about citizenship, occupation and residency status. The application must then be turned in at the tax office and a voter registration certificate will be issued if applicant is eligible.

If applicant has resided in state for more than one year, or the county or city for more than six months, a statement of the year in which such residency began shall be sufficient. In lieu of the dates on which residency began, applicant may show the length of residency in the state, county or city; the month, day and year on which residency began must be shown if the period required for voting has not been fulfilled at the time of registration.

If applicant is under twenty-one years of age at the time of registration, the date of birth must be shown by month, day and year; if applicant is over twenty-one years of age, a statement of the year of birth is sufficient; if applicant is twenty-one years of age or over at the time of registration, age of applicant may be shown in lieu of date of birth.

Deadline for applying for a voter registration certificate is January 31, 1967.

Crockett Test Flowing Gas At High Daily Rate

Shell Oil Co. was loading hole with mud after gas volume increased from 19.6 million cubic feet daily to 47.6 million cubic feet daily while drilling at 13,003 feet in the Ellenburger at its 60.8 Mitchell, in 49-GC&SF, 1 1/2 mile southeast outpost to the four - well J.M. (Ellenburger gas) field of extreme southwest Crockett County, 34 miles southwest of Ozona.

Casing pressure also increased from 58 pounds to 170 pounds.

The project is not out of control.

Earlier while drilling at 12,905 feet it flowed gas at the daily rate of 376,000 cubic feet.

Casing (7 - inch) earlier was set at 12,905 feet. Contract depth is 17,000 feet.

Several projects in the field have flowed gas while drilling.

Tom Brown Drilling Co. Inc., Midland, No. 1 Clayton, in 1-A2-GC&SF, Crockett County Canyon sand prospect, 25 miles northeast of Ozona, two miles northeast of a 13-mile northeast extension area of the Ozona (Canyon sand field, and 2 3/4 miles northeast of the recently opened Ozona, North-east (Canyon sand gas) field, flowed 24 hours, making 23 barrels of distillate and 10 barrels of water, plus gas at the daily rate of 630,000 cubic feet.

Flow was through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations at 7,424-642 feet. Tubing casing pressure was 950 pounds; casing pressure, 1,000 pounds. Slated as an 8,200-foot Strawn test; it was drilled to 8,015 feet.
