W. T. Lawmen Gather Here For Law Conference

Lawmen from West Texas counties composing the West Texas Central Law Enforcement Association are gathered in Ozona today for a conference at the civic center, with Crockett County Sheriff Billy Mills the host officer.

Attorney Joe Burkett, Jr., of Kerrville, former State Representative, addressed the group at the morning session on the topic, "Respect for Law Enforcement?" Rev. Max Brown, pastor of the First Baptist Church, gave the invocation.

Victor Calderon, Chief of Police at Ciudad Acuna, Mexico, will address the conference in the afternoon. His subject will be "Cooperation With U. S. Officials."

Lewis E. Berry, Executive Secretary of the Sheriff's Association of Texas, will close the program with an explanation of the proposed Constitutional Amendments to be voted on in the November General Election.

Registration for the conference got under way at the civic center at 9:15, the morning session opening at 10 a. m.

Billy Joe Haney of Menard county is president of the Association. Sheriff Marvin Peek of Concho County is vice president and Peggy Decker of Menard is secretary.

Regulars Back, Lions Overpower Junction 27 To 7

With all regulars back for the first time in three weeks, Coach Sam Mosley's Lions displayed an awesome ground attack as they pounded out a 27-7 win over the Junction Eagles last Friday night in Lion's Stadium. The Lion victory gave the Ozona club a 4-2 season record.

Receiving the ball on the opening kickoff, Ozona began an eleven play sustained drive from their own 35 yard line. Three Ozona backfieldmen took part in the 65 yard drive, guided by Randal Clepper. George Cox got 27 yards in 4 carries; Ramos added 12 yard in three tries; and fullback Thomas DeHoyos picked up 23 yards. DeHoyos made the first score almost 7 minutes deep into the initial quarter with a drive from the 5 yard line. Ramos converted, making it 7-0 Ozona.

The second Ozona score came on a 68-yard drive by the Lions. Using ball control, the Lions drove steadily to the Eagle 20, where Cox, on a reverse, hit the right sidelines to the 13 and cut back across the field for the TD. Ramos again converted.

The third Lion score was set up by Ramos' 30-yard sprint to the Junction 10. DeHoyos carried to the 3 on the next play, and Ramos hit the middle for the score. The try for the extra point missed. The third touchdown came with only 5 minutes gone in the third quarter.

The final Ozona tally came deep in the third stanza when Cox, following his downfield blocking, squirmed his way 52 yards to the Junction 9 yard line. Fleet Coates powered his way to the 2 where Cox went up the middle for the final 6 points. Ramos added his third extra point.

Entering the final quarter enjoying a 27-point lead, the Lions relaxed enough in the final three minutes to allow the Eagles to get on the score board. With quarterback (Continued on Last Page)

Last Thursday night, the Cubs picked up a 30-14 win over the Iraan Junior High and the Lions B cut down the Iraan B by a score of 19-0.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced that antlerless deer doe permits will be issued for Crockett County on November 1 and 2, from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. at the courthouse in Ozona.

New Border Patrol Officer Stationed With Ozona Force

Ed Collett, new senior officer for the Ozona Border Patrol Station, moved here with his family over the weekend. Collett replaces Max Morris who was promoted and transferred to Houlton, Maine, last month.

Collett was station senior at a small Montana border town for three years before moving to Del Rio a few months ago. Before moving to Montana he saw duty in El Paso, Arizona, Florida and Georgia.

His family consists of his wife, Alice; a son, Will, who is a student in junior high; a daughter, Dana, who is in the sixth grade at North Elementary and an eleven-year-old Basset hound named Cleo. They rented the house at 708 Third St. formerly occupied by the Morris family.

Two Extensions Finaled In Gas Production Area

Frio-Tex Oil Gas Co., San Antonio, completed two extensions to the Ozona (Canyon sand) gas field of Crockett County, 12 miles southwest of Ozona.

The No. 16 Suburban Propane Gas Corp., 3/4 mile southeast, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 9 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 28,300-1, through perforations at 6,363 to 6,569 feet. Gravity of the liquid was 65.6 degrees.

Total depth is 6,705 feet, with 4 1/2-inch casing set at 6,705 feet.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and west lines of 2-AAA-TCRR.

The No. 4 W. C. Montgomery, 3/4 mile southeast, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.3 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 32,000-1, through perforations at 6,394 to 6,620 feet. Gravity of the liquid was 66.4 degrees.

Total depth is 6,800 feet, with 4 1/2-inch casing set at 6,798 feet.

Location is 330 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 4-1-GC&SF.

A CALL TO PRAYER AND SELF-DENIAL

The women of the Methodist Church will observe the 1966 Week of Prayer and Self-Denial with a special program at the church Wednesday October 26th at 4 p. m.

Landowners or their agents are urged to be present to obtain their permits during the period scheduled for permit issuance. A map of the county showing division and rate of issuance will be posted in the courthouse.

One doe permit will be issued per 100 acres in roughly all of the south part of the county. No permits will be issued in the extreme northwest portion of the county and a large portion of the northeast. Other than these two areas permits will be issued at the rate of 1 doe to 300 acres.

Everyone who hunts must have a license, according to R. H. Davee, game warden. Hunters up to 17 years of age and over 60 years of age may purchase their licenses for a fee of 25 cents. Those between 17 and 65 years of age must pay the regular license fee of \$3.15. A license allows tags for 2 bucks and one doe if accompanied by the landowner's permit or for 3 does with a landowner's permit for each.

Davee reminded hunters that dove season is over October 30. The season for deer, turkey and quail will open November 12, with deer and turkey season closing December 31 and quail season ending January 31. Deer hunting should be exceptionally good this fall due to the lush range conditions, Warden Davee said.

NOT REQUIRED OVER 60 —

Law Clarified On Registration Of Over Age Voters

A correction was made by the county tax office this week about voter registration requirements announced in the paper several weeks ago. The announcement stated that everyone would be required to register in order to vote. However, word was received this week by Mrs. Gertrude Perry, Deputy Tax Assessor-Collector, that persons over 60 years of age are not required to register in Crockett County.

Formerly, under the poll tax system, a person had to be 60 years old on the first day of January of the year for which the tax was levied in order to be exempt from registration. Under the new law, age on the day of the election is determinative, and he may vote without registration if he has reached the age of 60 years by that date.

All other voters must register as under the old law, by January 31, 1967 to be eligible to vote in any election held after February 1, 1967. Voter registration applications are on hand now at the tax office.
