Mobil Slates Test For Gas In South Crockett

Mobil Oil Corp. will drill the No. 1 State-Morrison as a 1 1/16-mile east-northeast outcrop to its No. 1 Blakeney-Krueger, opener and lone producer in the Morrison (Wolfcamp gas - distillate) field of southwest Crockett County, 32 miles southwest of Ozona and eight miles east of the JM (Ellenburger gas) field.

Location is 2,377 feet from the north and 2,235 feet from the west lines of 8-Q4-S. Enriquez Original Grant. Contract depth is 4,700 feet.

The discovery was finalized May 2 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.84 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 287,000-1, through perforations at 3,596-4,468 feet. An Ellenburger failure, it was drilled to 15,050 feet.

A freak hunting accident Tuesday night sent John Parker of Andrews to the Crockett County Hospital with bruises and abrasions over his entire body, without a shot being fired.

Hunting with a group on a nearby ranch in a jeep, they started down a steep hill when the driver discovered the brakes had gone out. Gaining momentum, the jeep careened down the hill, clipped the tail-light off a waiting car ran through a barbed wire fence, making a sharp turn to the left and throwing Parker out into the pasture. The jeep finally came to a stop with the driver intact and unhurt except for barbed wire cuts across his back.

San Andres Test Set In Todd Area

Marcum Drilling Co., Midland will drill the No. 1-B J. E. Todd, a 2,300-foot cable tool San Andres test, one location south of the recent 1,640-foot opener and one location west of upper and lower San Andres production in the Todd, Southwest multiphase field of Crockett County, 25 miles northwest of Ozona.

Location is 770 feet from the north and 1,787 feet from the east lines of 8-WX-GC&SF. Elevation is 2,700 feet.

The 1,640-foot opener, the firm's No. 1-5 Todd, was finished Sept. 9 to pump 5.6 barrels of 24 gravity oil, plus 90 per cent water, through perforations at 1,640-47 feet. The field was opened in 1965 to upper and lower San Andres production. It has one upper and two lower San Andres wells still producing.

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

PEANUT BUTTER DIVINITY

3 cups sugar
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup light corn syrup
2 egg whites (stiffly beaten)

1 teas. vanilla
confectioners' sugar
6 tablespoon peanut butter

Combine in saucepan and cook, without stirring, over medium heat sugar, water and corn syrup until small amount forms hard ball in cold water (250 to 265 degrees F. on candy thermometer. Beating constantly, slowly pour part of mixture over stiffly beaten egg whites. When mixture has consistency of icing, add vanilla. Continue adding syrup, beating constantly. When stiff enough to stick in beaters, turn out on bread board sprinkled with generous amount of confectioners' sugar. Fold with spatula until cool enough to work with hands. Pat into square or rectangle. Working rapidly, dot with peanut butter. Roll as for jelly roll, lifting candy with knife. Cut immediately, dipping knife in confectioners' sugar before slicing each piece.

Note: A cheap brand peanut butter works best.

Deviled Nuts

Spread salted nuts in shallow pan. Sprinkle generously with bottled Italian dressing, stirring until nuts are thoroughly covered. Continue stirring, sprinkling lightly with onion salt and cayenne. Bake in low oven (300 degrees 30 to 40 minutes, stirring occasionally.

CHRISTMAS TREE PRESERVATIVE

Mix together 1/4 cup copperas or iron sulphate, 1 gallon hot water, 2 cups corn syrup and 4 teaspoons liquid bleach. Pound trunk of Christmas tree with hammer and soak the tree in the solution one day. After putting tree up, add solution to container in tree stand as needed.

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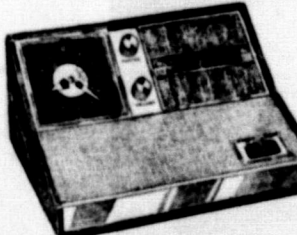
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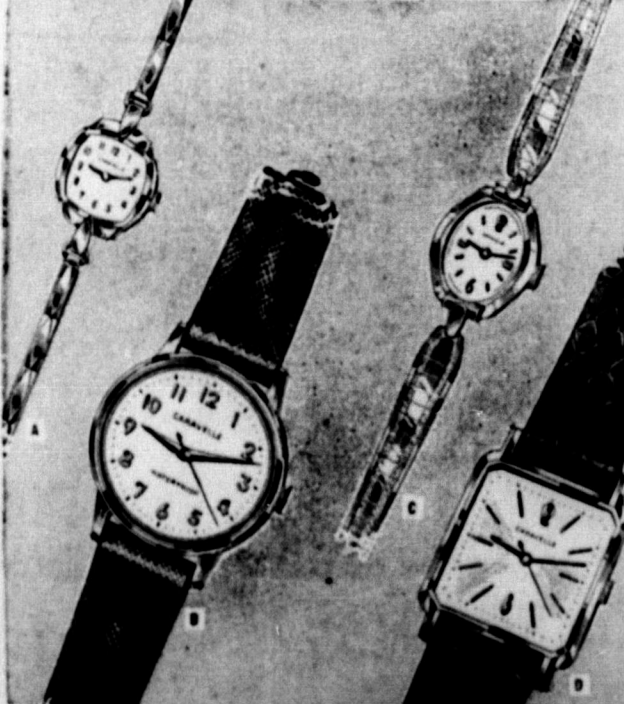

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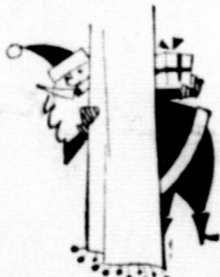

Water Pollution Problems Aired At TSGRA Convention

The increasingly critical water pollution and depletion problems will be a principal topic for action at the 51st annual Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association convention in Fort Worth December 12 to 14. The ranchmen's organization is making a strong push for corrective legislation in the upcoming Texas Legislature session to halt salt-water pollution in oil-producing areas and to forbid use of fresh water in oilfield secondary recovery of water-flooding operations.

So important is the water situation that a special meeting on water problems will be conducted at 3:30 p. m. December 12 at a time when no other convention business is being conducted, so that all interested ranchmen may attend. Among committee speakers will be O. H. Ivy of Big Spring, manager of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, who has had long experience in dealing with saltwater pollution problems.

Ranchmen have noticed an alarming increase in salt content of previously fresh water in some West Texas counties.

"The problem is reaching a stage that we can no longer wait and hope," said G. C. Magruder Jr., of Mertzon, TSGRA president. "Unless we act now, some areas will soon find their fresh water ruined forever. This fresh water is as important to people in the towns and cities as it is to us on the land."

Convention headquarters is the Green Oaks Inn. Committee meetings begin at 1 p. m. December 12 and first general session at 9 a. m. December 13.

Among items of business will be a full report on experiments currently underway at Texas Tech and in at least one commercial cotton textile mill to find practical methods for blending wool and mohair with cotton for an all-natural-fiber fabric that can be given easy-care characteristics of washability and permanent press.

The next neighborhood meeting will be held February 7.



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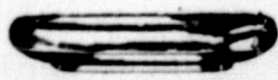
