A San Andres gas discovery was assured in Crockett County with the flowing of gas natural at the daily rate Bill J. Graham, Midland, No. 1-12 University, in 12-31-University, re-entry operarecent undesignated San Andres gas discovery.

Flow was from the open hole at 900-1,425 feet, the cleaned out depth. Operator was preparing to take absolute open flow potential.

Originally drilled by Ralph Pembrook, Midland, it was abandoned Sept. 10, 1962, at 1.616 feet.

The discovery, McGrath & Smith, Inc. No. 1-A Todd Ranch, was finaled Jan. 6, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 26.5 million cubic feet of per day through perforations at 1,165 - 1,222
