

Mr. Owens was born Dec. 9 1896, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clint Owens who came to Texas in 1853. They came from Illinois and first settled in Ellis County. The family then moved to Crockett County where Clint Owens operated extensive ranching interests.



All over the United States, wherever there is enough water to put a boat in within a hundred miles, the water sport craze is mushrooming. Boating, swimming, skin-diving, water skiing are just a few of the recreational uses that dried-out Americans have discovered, some of them for the first time. Water recreation is by no means new. Yachting, for instance, has been popular for many years. The name "yacht" is from the Dutch word "jagt", meaning a swift vessel. The first yacht was given to Charles II of England in 1660 by the Dutch. This gift gave rise to the fabulous sport of yacht racing which is becoming more and more popular as more and more people become water-conscious.

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
