



Machinery For Registration Set For July 1

All Men Reaching 21 Since Oct. 16 Must **Be Registered**

Next Tuesday, July 1, has been designated by proclamation of President Roosevelt as America's second "R Day"

Every man in the nation who has attained the 21st anniversary of the day of his birth subsequent to October 16, 1940, and before midnight July 1, 1941-with a few specific exceptions made by Congress-must register with his locounty's organization and made cal Selective Service board on

Aliens as well as American citizens, who are 21 years old on July 1, must be registered, Selective Service officials have pointed out. Aliens between the ages of 21 and 36 years, who have come to the United States since the first registration on October 16, 1940. and have not ben registered, must ppear before local boards on July 1 to register.

Exceptions to the registration order apply to men in the armed forces, officers reserve corps, cadets and midshipmen in the military and naval academies, etc.




A WARNING to Ranchmen!!

After Bean and his followers were clapped in irons at Nacogoches by the Spanish in 1801. they were taken to San Antonio, to San Luis Potosi, and finally to Chihuahua, in the Mexican interior. Years passed, and Bean's life alternated between comparative freedom and close confinement, punishment for his repeated attempts to escape. Then at last came a royal decree that one of every five of the surviving Nolan prisoners be hanged.

By then-November, 1807-only only nine of the company remained alive. It was decided that only one must die, that one to be determined by the throwing of dice. Bean threw a five; the low man had a four. After the execution three of the men were released, but Bean and the other four were carried off to Mexico City in



HE labor unions have made their demands upon the railways of the United States - and through the railways upon the PUBLIC. These demands are vastly larger in proportion than any they have ever made. The labor unions representing engineers, firemen, conductors, brakemen and switchmen are demanding a 30 per cent increase in wages, amounting to 190 million dollars a yearalthough their present rates of pay are the highest in history.

Other unions representing a greater number of railway employees are demanding wage increases ranging as high as 95 per centaveraging 47 per cent - and amounting to 580 million dollars a year - although their present rates of pay also are the highest in history.

Thus the wage increases being demanded by the labor unions amount to 770 million dollars a year, an average increase in excess of 41 per cent.

In addition, certain of these labor unions have demanded advances in their pay not included in the above figures, and more rules for the creation of unnecessary jobs.

The situation, then, is this: The total cost of complying with all the demands made would be approximately 900 million dollars a year!

The average weekly earnings of railway employees are now 15 per cent higher than in the peak year 1929, while the cost of living is 12 per cent less.

The demands of the railway labor unions are being made when the entire nation has just been asked to make a supreme effort for National Defense.

The railways cannot meet these demands without a great increase in the cost of transportation. They exceed by more than 700 million dollars the income that the railways had left after paying their annual expenses, taxes and charges in 1940.

The railways have a vitally important job before them. They need all their resources to continue adequately to serve you and contribute effectively toward the National Defense Program.

Residence Listed **To Determine Board Of New Registrants**

A selective Service registrant, who, on the registration day of July 1, has more than one place of residence may choose the one which he wants recorded on his registration card as his place of residence to determine the local board that will always have jurisdiction over him, General J. Watt Page, State Selective Service Director, said today.

On the first registration day, October 16, 1940, such registrants were often confused as to which place to list, General Page point ed out. This was especially true in instances where men had legal residences in one community but ad a temporary dwelling place in another. As the residence listed on the registration card determins what local board has permanent jurisdiction over the registrant. some of the men later wished to change the address they had given. but were denied the privilege because Selective Service Regulations prohibit such changes. In the second registration on July 1, General Page said, the registration cards will contain a space for the registrant to list his place of residence. In the vent that he had more than one place, he may list his choice as his residence without interference or dictation from a registrar, General Page added. In addition, the registration card will have space for recording of a mail address.
