So the FCC is going to try a new approach: the bureaucratic edict. Clearly bureaucrats can issue more edicts than Congress can ever find time to pass into law. Already the proposals tossed into the legislative hopper of the Congress far exceed the capacity of Congressmen to give intelligent consideration to more than a fraction of the measures upon which hey must pass judgment. The bureaucratic edict will by-pass Congress and speed things up. Whether or not such edicts are discriminatory, or even constitutionalwhy that determination can be stalled for years in the courts through appeals, retrinis and delaying tactics.
