Yule Customs Vary From Country To Country, Home To Home, But Family Get-Togethers Universal

CHRISTMAS SHOPPING NOTE

From home to home and from country to country, Yule celebrations abound. The happy traditions of gift giving, home decorating, Carol singing, card sending, candle lighting and tree trimming express the merriment of the season.

The spirit of the season finds expression in numerous ways and it is interesting to observe ways and traditions of other lands as well as the origin of many of our own Christmas traditions.

Straw is a traditional part of Christmas celebrations in Sweden. While "carrying in the straw" is a tradition, for this is a modern custom, Swedish people still make straw and wooden figures to hang on their Christmas trees.

In ancient Germany, the Yule log was known as the "Christkind." One belief held that if the charred log was placed in a corbin, it would act as a charm to ward off mice. If the weather turned stormy, the log was quickly brought back to the fire. While it burned, superstition said, the house was safe from lightning.

"Mummers" is a Yule custom that originated in early England. Mummers, masked and in costume, silently enacted ritual plays about the dead of winter and the old year. The custom still survives in some parts of the world.

Since the Wise Men gave of their treasures to the Christ Child, giving has been part of the tradition of Christmas. Perhaps even more than the giving of gifts, the sending of Christmas greetings symbolizes the season's spirit.

Though greetings and Christmas have long been associated, the printed greeting card is a relative newcomer, introduced little more than a century ago. One of the first Christmas cards ever published, a small greeting printed in London in 1842, features a robin on a snowbank, framed by paper lace.

There are many legends concerning the origin of Christmas trees. One belief is that the first Christmas tree was a palm tree brought from Egypt. The 12 parts of the palm were supposed to represent the 12 apostles.

Ancient followers of the Druid religion regarded the mistletoe as a sacred plant. Each year, at about the time Christmas is celebrated today, Druid priests, in a ceremonial rite, cut the mistletoe from the "sacred oak" and distributed it among the people. It was supposed to ward off everything from witches to disease.

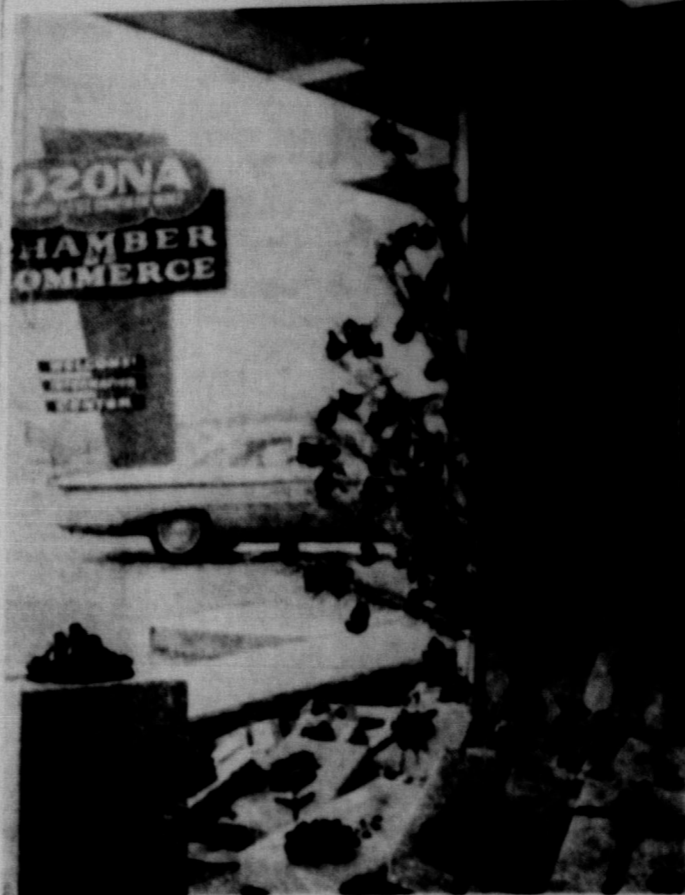

Wildcat Spotted In World Field

Coastal States Gas Producing Co., Midland, will drill the No. 1 Sorg Estate, an 8,500-foot Ellenburger wildcat, in the shallow World field of Crockett County, 21 miles south of Big Lake, 3 1/2 miles east of the World, West (Strawn) field and five miles southeast of the one-well World, North (Ellenburger) field.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 51-BB-TCRR (field GC&SF.) Elevation is 2,760 feet.

The Tippet, West multi-pay field of Crockett County gained its fifth Ellenburger producer and a 3/4-mile north extension to that pay with completion of Shell Oil Co.

Midland, No. 1-18 Amacker-Trust, nine miles south of McCamey.

It was finalized for a daily pumping potential of 148 barrels of 38.4 gravity oil, plus 133 barrels of water. Production was through perforations at 6,657-59 feet, which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons.

While being drilled, it also indicated production in an unidentified zone with the flowing of 41.5 gravity oil at the daily rate of 1,590 barrels on a drillstem test at 5,650-720 feet, while a test at 6,080-139 feet recovered 120 feet of mud and 20 feet of very slightly oil-cut mud. Operator does not plan to dually complete the well at present.

Location is 5,500 feet from the southwest and 467 feet

from the most westerly southwest and 467 feet from the most westerly southeast lines of 18-36-H&TC.

New Gas Pay In Tippet Field Of Crockett Co.

A new gas pay and a confirmation apparently has been assured in the Tippet field of Crockett County with the flowing of gas from one zone and oil from another at Southwestern Natural Gas Inc., Midland, No. 2-39 Tippet, in 39-31-H&TC, one location northeast of its No. 1-39 Tippet, dual Hueco and 4,950-foot Wolfcamp oil producer, 14 miles southeast of McCamey.

Operator acidized through Wolfcamp perforations at 5,136-90 feet with 2,000 gallons and it flowed gas for an unreported time at the estimated rate of 2 million cubic feet daily.

Re-acidized with 4,000 gallons and tested on a 16-64-inch choke, it flowed for an unreported time at the rate of 3 million cubic feet, with tubing pressure of 1,650 pounds.

Operator set a packer at 5,100 feet and perforated opposite the upper Wolfcamp at 4,986-5,015 feet and acidized with 1,500 gallons. It flowed for an unreported time through a 16-64-inch choke, making four barrels of oil per hour, with tubing pressure of 300 pounds.

Operator fractured through perforations with 26,800 gallons and 33,000 pounds of sand. Tested on a 16-64-inch choke for an unreported time, it flowed 180 barrels of oil with tubing pressure of 1,300 pounds.

Slated as a 6,000-foot lower Pennsylvanian detrital wildcat, it was drilled to 5,880 feet.

Try Completion In Tippet Field

Southwestern Natural Gas Inc., Midland, was running 5 1/2-inch casing to an unreported depth at the No. 3-39 Tippet, in 39-31-H&TC, prospective Tubb re-opener, 1/2 mile north of Hueco and 4,950-foot Wolfcamp production in the Tippet field of Crockett County and 3/4 mile south of its No. 2-39 Tippet, assured Wolfcamp gas and oil producer, 12 miles southeast of McCamey.

Drilled to 5,540 feet, it recovered 120 feet of oil and 2,000 feet of gas-cut mud on a drillstem test of the Tubb at 3,570-3,800 feet.

The Tubb opener, Theiss Drilling Co. No. 1 Mayberry, was finished May 24, 1956 to pump 146 barrels of 34 gravity oil, plus 40 per cent water, through perforations at 3,815-70 feet. It became depleted in May, 1961.

The No. 2-39 Tippet, same section, flowed gas at the Maximum rate of 3 million cubic feet daily through a 16-64-inch choke perforations at 5,136-90 feet; and oil at the rate of four barrels per hour through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations

It is the No. 1-157 J. M. Baggett et al.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 157-01GH&SA.

The shut-in project, W. W. Meeker, Midland, No. 1-153 Adams, was drilled to 5,000 feet and reportedly made 200,000 cubic feet of gas per day from an unreported Canyon section.

The re-entry, the King Resources No. 1 Clay Adams Estate, recently was scheduled to plug back to 5,500 feet. Originally drilled by Honolulu Oil Corp. and Herman Brown, as the No. 1 Emma Lou Adams, it was abandoned March 9, 1961, at 12,827 feet.

Shell Oil Co. has requested field designation to Tippet, North (Ellenburger) for its No. 1-18 Amacker Trust, recently completed project, 1/2 mile north of the four-well Ellenburger area of the Tippet, West multipay field of Crockett County, nine miles south of McCamey.

It was finished last week for a daily pumping potential of 148 barrels of 38.4 gravity oil, plus 133 barrels of water, through perforations at 6,057-59 feet which earlier had been identified as John-Ellenburger.

Ozona Water Dept. Asst. Manager Gets Health Citation

Austin — An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to N. Dean Scott, assistant manager of the Crockett County Water Control System. The citation reflects the regard in which Scott is held by state water officials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Scott's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.

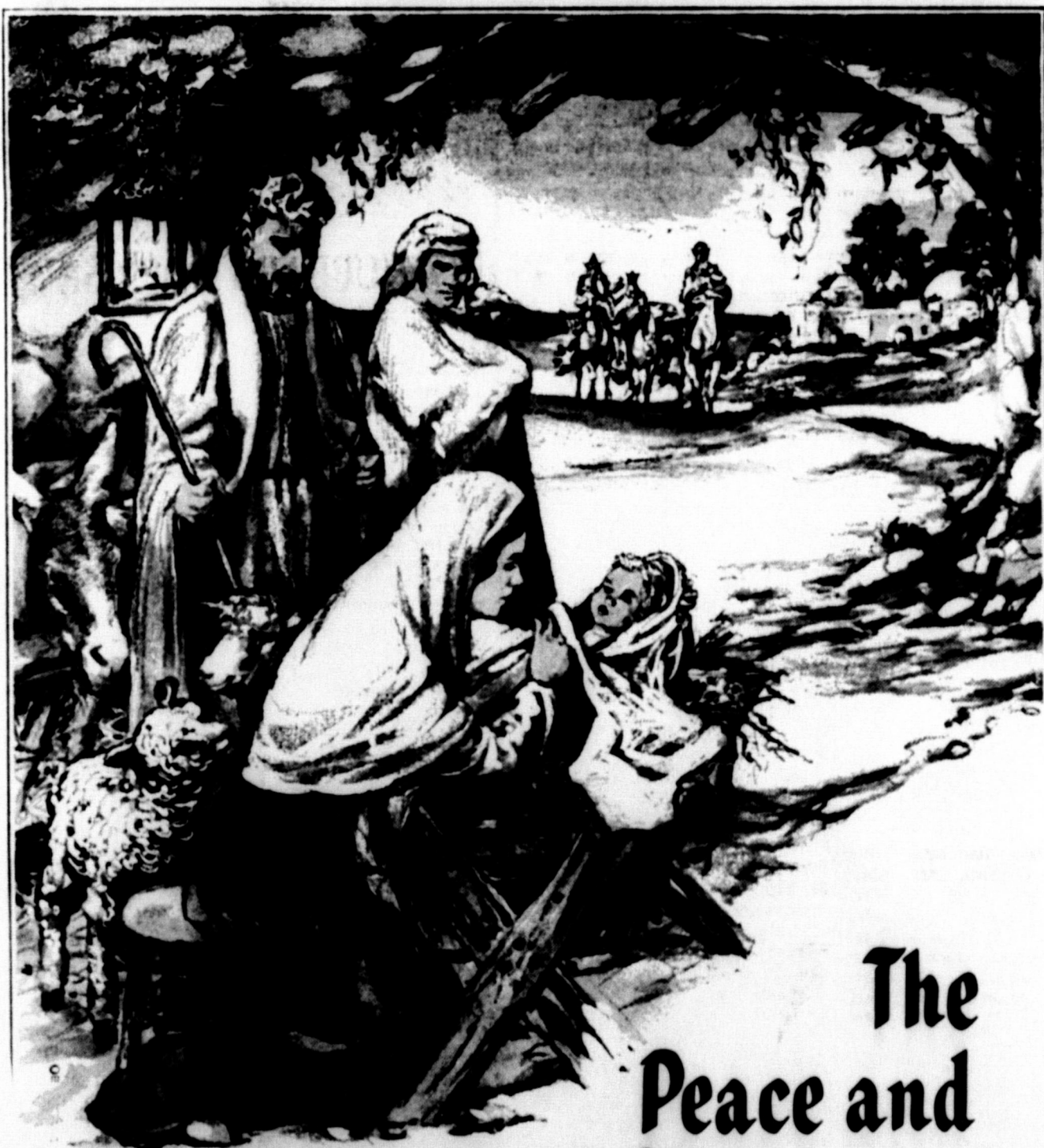

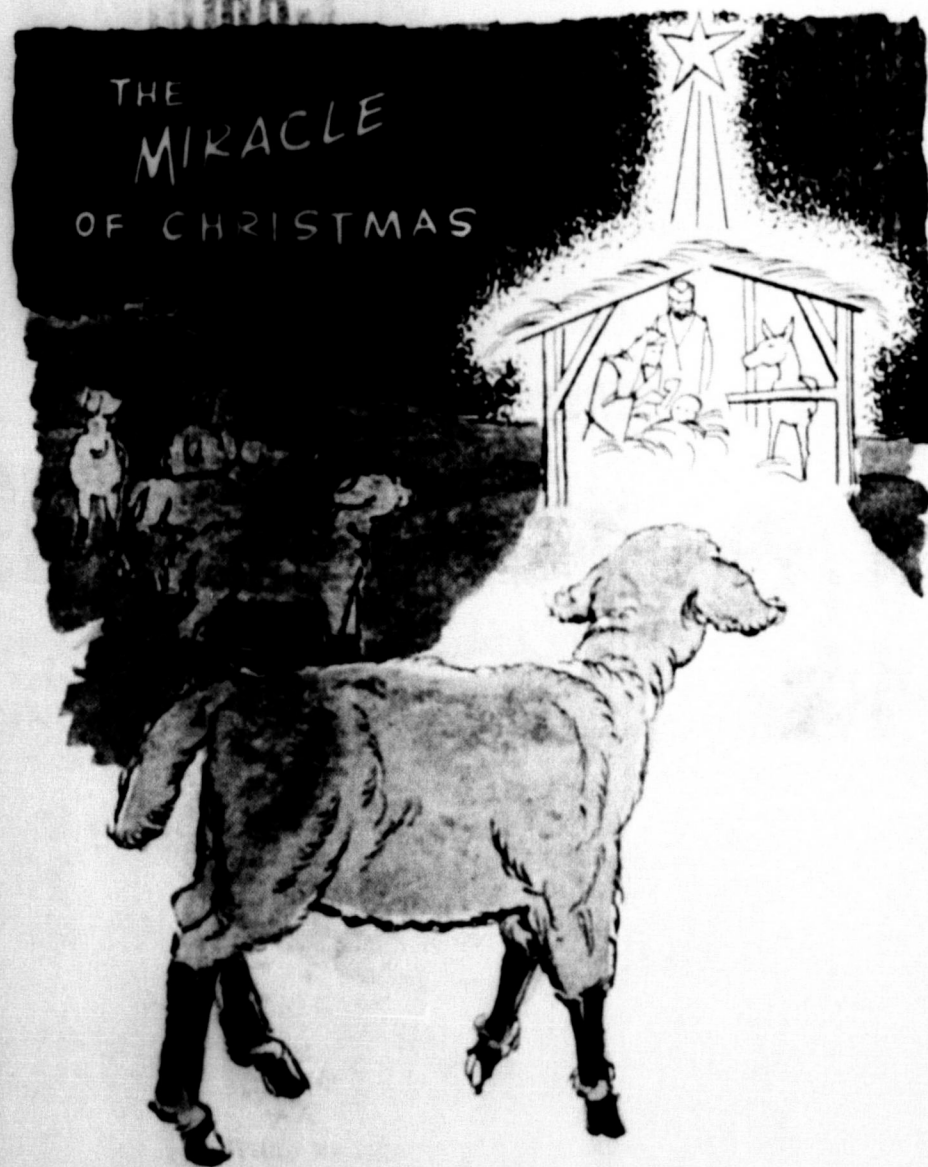

New Texas Travel Handbook Issued By Highway Dept.

Austin — An expanded edition of the popular Texas Travel Handbook has been released by the Texas Highway Department.

First issued last year as an aid to pleasure travel in Texas, the enlarged second edition now lists nearly 400 cities and towns, and includes more than 2,500 individual items of interest. The 208-page handbook also contains 112 photographs which provide travelers with previews of such attractions as the aerial tramway in El Paso, and Presidio La Bahia near Goliad.

Handbook subjects are as varied as the state itself, ranging from the melancholy Empty Saddle Monument in Dalhart to the humorous Popeye statue in Crystal City.

With the Texas Travel Handbook as a guide, travelers may discover dinosaur tracks, Indian pictographs and buried cities. They will learn the locations of little-

known ghost towns, and follow specific directions to the most popular attractions of modern Texas cities.

The book lists attractions in Ozona as the memorial fair park, with playground facilities and rest area for tourists; the Crockett County Museum; Davy Crockett statue, and old Fort Lancaster, together with a short history and description of the town and principal products of the area.

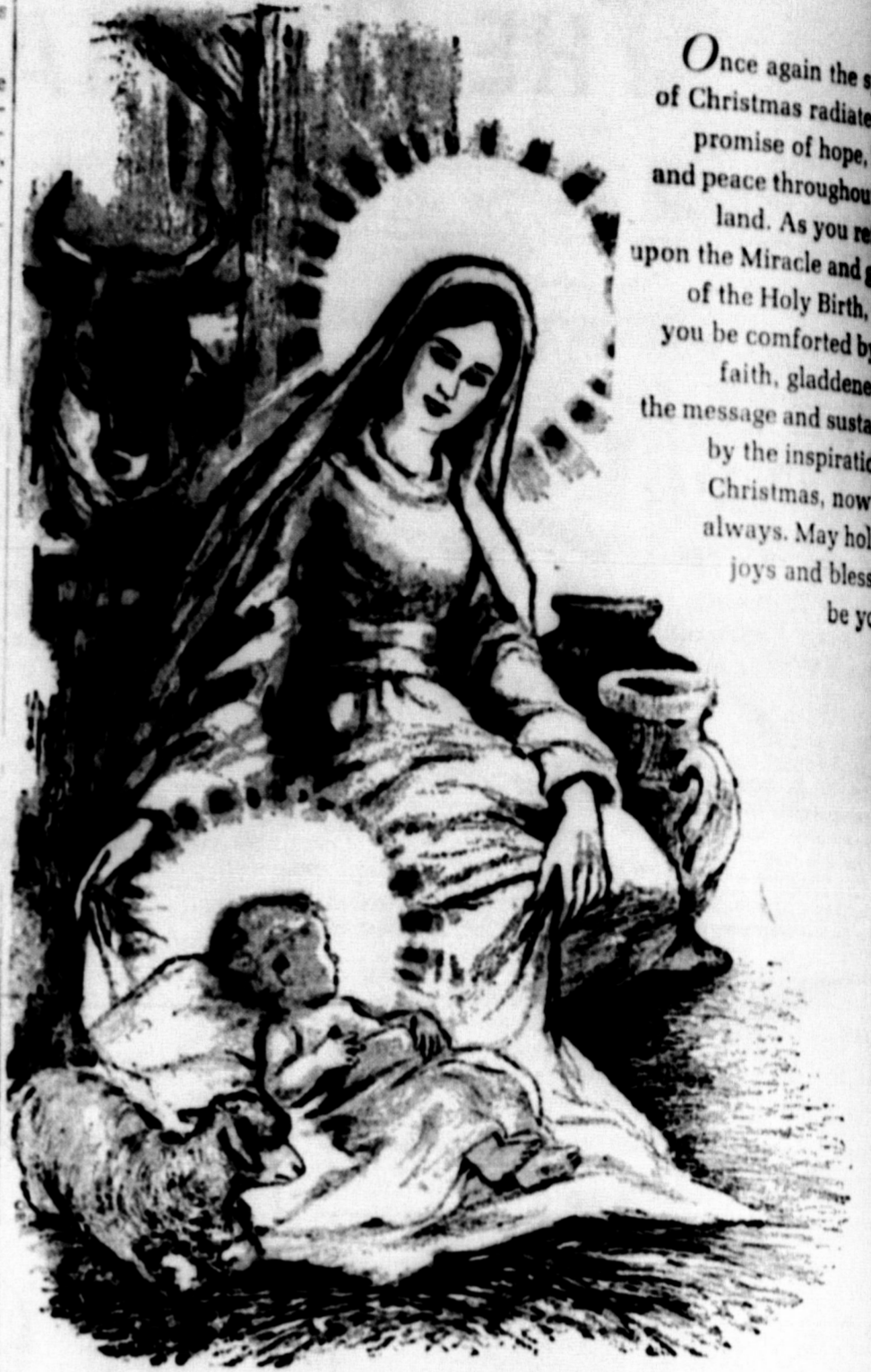

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

I have had so many requests for my Grandfather's egg nog recipe which, I think was in the paper the Christmas before last, that I will reprint it by popular request. Please clip and save.

Grandpa's Egg Nog

1 pint of sugar
1 pint of heavy cream
1 dozen eggs
1 pint bourbon or rum (a half cup will do as well) nutmeg to taste.

Separate eggs. Beat yolks until light and thick and gradually add sugar, beating all the while. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Whip cream until thick. Beat spirits into egg yolk mixture. Carefully fold in the whites, then the cream. Sprinkle with nutmeg.

This is our traditional Christmas breakfast. However, I leave out the spirits and let everyone add them individually.

Cornbread Dressing

1 can biscuits (baked ac-

ording to directions)

1 pan of cornbread (prepared)
1 1/2 cups chopped onions
1 1/2 cups chopped celery
6 eggs
4 cups turkey stock
salt
pepper
poultry seasoning

Crumble biscuits and cornbread in large bowl the night before and season with salt, pepper and poultry seasoning. Next morning saute celery and onions in margarine until tender and add to bread mixture. Mix in turkey stock and slightly beaten eggs. Season to taste. Bake in shallow uncovered pan in 350 degrees oven approximately 1 hour.

DPS Estimates 45 Will Die In Texas Holiday Week-End

Austin — Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that DPS Statistical Services has estimated 55 persons may die in traffic mishaps over the Christmas weekend.

Garrison said that the combined efforts of state and local police agencies and private traffic safety support organizations will be directed toward keeping the traffic toll below the estimate.

"Operation Deathwatch" will be in effect from 6 p. m. Friday, December 22 through 11:59 p. m. Monday, December 25," said Garrison. "During this period we will make every effort to inform each

motorist of the need for attention to safe driving. For the first time in many years the uniformed services of the Department are at almost full strength, and every highway patrolman will be on duty as much as possible. In addition, we will have about 250 men from other uniformed services of the DPS who will supplement the highway patrol force doing patrol duty.

It has also been estimated that 45 persons will be killed in traffic accidents over the New Year's weekend. The "Deathwatch" will resume at 6 p. m. Friday, December 29 and continue through 11:59 p. m. Monday, January 1. Last year 50 persons lost their lives in traffic over the Christmas weekend, and 39 were killed over New Year's weekend.

If those cards are not submitted by January 31, 1968, the checks will be discontinued and not restored until the card has been received. It could possibly take as long as 60 days to have the checks restored.

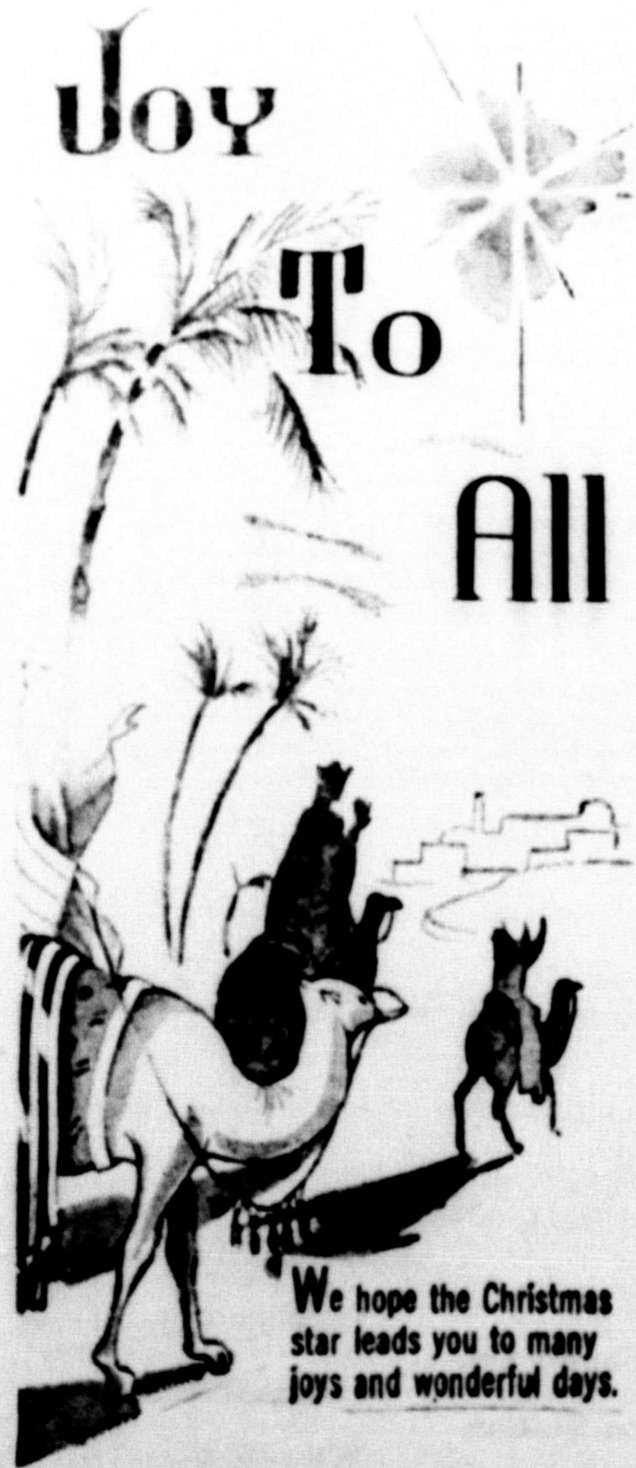

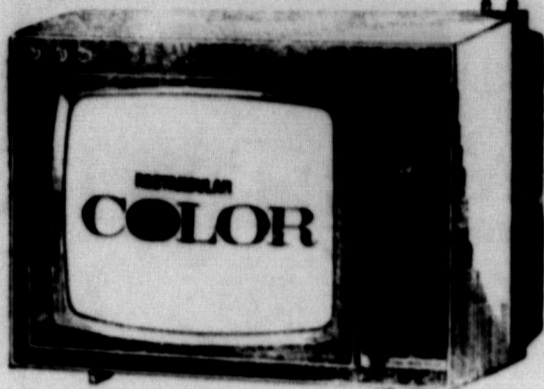
Despite Weather, West Texas Deer Kill Said Good

Despite wind and unseasonably warm temperatures a good number of West Texas hunters are bringing in impressive white-tailed deer, says the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Chilly mornings quickly turn to shirt-sleeve hunting by noon most days, and hunters are quick to note the reduction of deer movement in such weather. Early morning and late afternoon remain the movement times, with just a scattering of kills being reported by hunters who walk-up their game.

While antler size in the whitetail range isn't spectacular this year, the animals are in good physical condition and the 100-pound buck isn't rare at all. Most locker plants are not crowded for space, but are getting enough deer to show that the season is a good one. Some hunters are waiting for colder weather before going a field.

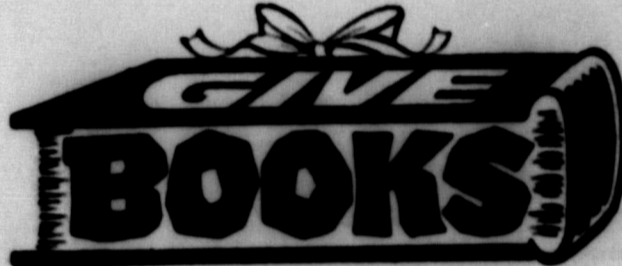
