Despite Weather, West Texas Deer Kill Said Good

Despite wind and unseasonably warm temperatures a good number of West Texas hunters are bringing in impressive white-tailed deer, says the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Chilly mornings quickly turn to shirt-sleeve hunting by noon most days, and hunters are quick to note the reduction of deer movement in such weather. Early morning and late afternoon remain the movement times, with just a scattering of kills being reported by hunters who walk-up their game.

While antier size in the whitetail range isn't spectacular this year, the animals are in good physical condition and the 100-pound buck isn't rare at all. Most locker plants are not crowded for space, but are getting enough deer to show that the season is a good one. Some hunters are waiting for colder weather before going afield.
