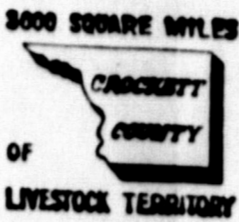

## Holiday Dress Up Installed In Business Areas

Ozona began taking on its holiday face Thursday afternoon when employees of the Water District and West Texas Utilities commenced the annual chore of decorating the town for Christmas. Working all week to complete the job, the decorations were officially lighted last night.

Pole decorations, consisting of green foil wrapping entwined with tinsel, topped by a red Christmas bow and a lighted red bell have been installed on most of the light poles in town, giving a beautiful uncluttered look to the area.

The park will feature twelve 6-foot lighted halo candles this year, grouped in arrangements of three on each of the four corners. The Chamber of Commerce purchased the new decorations and the West Texas Utilities Co. installed the lighting and will furnish the electricity. Lighted trees and the traditional star are again used in the area.

Age and deterioration necessitated the removal of Christmas lights which had been strung around business houses in the downtown area for years. The only lights to be used this year are those strung overhead from West Texas Utilities to the court-house corner. Next year these will be replaced with pole decorations.

Many of the business houses have completed decorating windows for Christmas and others are in the planning stage. Generally the decorations in various stores are more lavish than in the past.

Decorations in the Village Shopping Center were completed yesterday also. Tinsel and lights decorated the center parking light poles and Santa and his reindeer along with a sleigh full of goodies race across the canopy. All buildings in the center are outlined with Christmas lights.

## Voters Slow In Registering For 1968 Election

With approximately two months remaining to register, 480 voters have registered in Crockett County for the 1968 election year. Mrs. Gertrude Perry, deputy tax assessor-collector, reported Tuesday.

Mrs. Perry estimated that around 1,500 people in the county should be eligible to vote this year and reminded voters that everyone who votes must register this year, regardless of age, in order to vote in the presidential elections of 1968 or any other election held in the coming year.

Voters have until January 31, 1968, to register. Mrs. Perry said applications would be mailed from her office to anyone who calls and requests one. An application must be filled out before a voter registration certificate can be issued.

### Drivers License Examiner To Be Here Every Tues.

A change in procedure for obtaining driver's licenses in Ozona was announced this week by Highway Patrolman James Cumby, DPS. Rather than the twice a month schedule used in the past, driver's tests will be given here every Tuesday and every second and fourth Monday in each month. Ray Garnett, DPS drivers license examiner, stationed in Sonora, will be on hand to give both the written and the driving test.

Requirements for new drivers are a birth certificate and they must be 16 years of age if they have successfully completed a drivers' education course. Eighteen years is the age limit for those who have not had drivers' education.

A clerk will be on duty in Patrolman Garnett's office in Sonora and will be available to give the written tests there at any time, Monday through Fridays of each week.

### Lions Pick Up Pair Of Wins In Mertzson Fracas

The Ozona Lions scored their second win of the 1967 Basketball Campaign when they downed Mertzson 67-43, Tuesday night hitting on 41% of their shots from the field. Big Marlin Farris paced the Lion attack with 20 points, 18 coming in the first half. The Lion B-Team smothered the Mertzson B-Team 66-37.

Despite the scoring spree of Farris in the first half, the Lions held only a 32-28 lead at halftime. But early in the third quarter, the Lions began to pull away, outscoring Mertzson 18-6 in the quarter, for a 16 point lead as the fourth quarter got underway. Guard Randal Clepper hit for 6 straight points in the third stanza to spark the Lion attack. Clepper finished the game with a 12 point total.

Seven other Lions broke into the scoring column to help the Lions reach their 68 point total. Larry Kilgroe, Donald Huff, and Beto Vargas got 8 apiece; David Huff made 4; Rodney Pagan had 3; while Fleet Coates and Duane Childress had 2 each. The Lions hit 44% in the second half.

Leading scorers in the Lion B-Team rout were David Pagan, 12; Tommy Jenkins, 10; Carlos Sanchez, 10; Greg Stuart, 9; and Arturo Torres, 8.

The Crockett County Commissioners Court, at its November meeting, voted unanimously to set up a retirement system for officers and employees of the county, the cost to be borne by the county and its employees.

The Junior high teams will host the Edoardo junior high tonight at the high school gym. The first game begins at 5:30 with the junior high girls playing first. The boys' games will follow.

### .15 Of An Inch Moisture Added In Monday Fall

Ozona recorded .15 of an inch of moisture Monday from rain showers which fell intermittently during the morning and early afternoon. Up to 5 of an inch was recorded in the northwest part of the county, with the southern part receiving less than was recorded in town.

"The enclosed photographs are given as a token of our appreciation. They were taken on October 18, 1967, by an RF-C4 Phantom reconnaissance jet at 600 miles per hour, 10,000 feet above the city."

The photograph was an aerial shot of Ozona, one a blow-up of the original to show details of the town as seen from 10,000 feet up, and is remarkably clear for a picture from such height and at such speed.

Postmaster Urges Use Of Zip Code On Holiday Mail

Postmaster Floyd Hokit urged Ozona residents to use zip code on every piece of Christmas mail this year. Zip codes must be used on all packages. Zip directories have been placed in the patron lobby for reference. Hokit also reminded patrons to use the local zip code in all return addresses.

In order to avoid last minute congestion all Christmas mail should be mailed as soon as possible. Suggested deadlines before the holiday are Dec. 11, air mail gifts and greeting cards overseas; Dec. 10, surface cards and gifts to distant states; Dec. 13, surface mail to nearby places; Dec. 15, local mail, and Dec. 19 for domestic air mail.

First class postage on greeting cards will assure that mail is forwarded if the recipient has moved.

Again Hokit mentioned the need for proper packing of gifts. Use good sturdy boxes with lots of cushioning material. Address clearly and securely. Place the address on one side only and enclose another address. Mail packages as early in the day as possible.

First class postage of 5c per ounce may be sealed, forwarded and returned. Third class may be sealed if it is marked "third class". However it will not be forwarded or returned and may not contain written message.

Sacks have been placed in the lobby and mail should be deposited according to destination, local, Texas and out-of-state. Hokit asks residents to mail inside, rather than in collection boxes outside through the holidays.

Two Wildcat Tests Slated In Crockett

Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, will drill the No. 1 Clara Couch, a 6,300-foot Strawn reef wildcat, surrounded by shallow production and 1 1/4 miles southeast of 5,800-foot Clisco reef gas production in the Clara Couch field of Crockett County, 7 1/2 miles northeast of Sheffield and four miles northwest of Strawn gas production in the Lancaster Hill multipay field.

Location is 1,651 feet from the north and 617 feet from the west lines of W. Brewer No. 100. Ground elevation is 2,406 feet.

Albritton & Meyer and Huff, Midland, will drill the No. 1 Todd Ranch, an 1,800-foot cable tool San Andres wildcat, in Crockett County, 2 1/2 miles southeast of the Todd, Southwest (San Andres) field and 3 1/2 miles northwest of the Howard Draw (San Andres) field, but separated from both by failure.

Location is 860 feet from the north and 833 feet from the west lines of 17-WX-GC&SF. Ground elevation is 2,544 feet.

Crockett Gains Wildcat, New Pay Opener, Confirmer

Crockett County gained a pay opener and locations for a wildcat and a confirmer during the week.

Shell Oil Co. recompleted as a pay opener, probably Fusselman, its No. 1-111 Mitchell, former Ellenburger gas producer in the Crockett County portion in the Brown-Bassett multipay field 3 1/2 miles southeast of Ozona and 6 1/2 miles southeast of the three-well Silurian area of the Terrell portion of the field.

It was finalized natural for a calculated, absolute open flow of 11 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations at 12,707 - 722 feet.

Coastal States Gas Production Co., Midland, will drill the No. 2

7,500-foot Ellenburger cat in Crockett County, 2 1/2 miles northwest of and 2 1/2 miles north-slightly west of Ellenburger tipay field. It is the Shannon Estate.

The Rodman Corp., sa, will drill the No. 2 Pierce as a location, east offset to its No. 10 for Pierce, recent Clearfork oil opener and producer from that field. (Clearfork is lower Clearfork oil) in Crockett County, 2 1/2 miles southwest of Ozona.

### Two Crockett Co. Projects Yield Oil And Gas On Tests

Two Crockett County confirmers yielded oil and gas on drillstem tests last week. Shell Oil Co., Midland, No. 1-18 Amacker Trust, in 18-36-H&TC, 3/8-mile north of dual McKee and Ellenburger production in the Tippet, West multipay field, nine miles south of McCamey, has recovered oil on a third consecutive drillstem test.

Tool was open two hours and 10 minutes on the test taken between 6,634-700 feet in the Joins and Ellenburger, which recovered 1,170 feet of gas and 4,990 feet of oil. Additionally, recovery from the sample chamber was 33 cubic feet of gas and 2,200 cubic centimeters of oil, no water. Flowing pressure was 420 1,865 pounds, one-hour initial and 2 1/2-hour final shut-in pressures were 3,040 and 2,712 pounds, respectively.

The project is bottomed at 6,700 feet, and operator was running 5 1/2-inch casing for completion attempt.

Earlier, a drillstem test between 6,080-139 feet, recovered 120 feet of mud and 20 feet of very slightly oil-cut mud. Still earlier, a drillstem test in an unidentified formation at 5,650-720 feet flowed 41.5 gravity oil at the daily rate of 1,590 barrels and reversed out an additional 125 barrels of oil on a three-hour test.

If completed from the Joins it would be a new field pay.

Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, No. 1-25A Cowden, in 25-36-H&TC, 1/2 miles east of Ellenburger and McKee production and the same distance north of 5,000-foot detrital production in the Tippet, West field and 1/2 mile north of lower Leonard production in the Tippet field, eight miles south of McCamey, flowed gas and oil on a drillstem test in an unidentified zone.

Tool was open 30 minutes on the test taken between 5,790-858 feet, on which gas and oil surfaced in two minutes, no gauge on the gas. Oil flowed at the hourly rate of 10 barrels during the test. Flowing pressure was 982-1,465 pounds; one-hour initial and 1 1/2-hour final shut-in pressures were 2,074 and 2,049 pounds, respectively.

Slated for 6,700 feet, drilling continued below 5,858 feet.

Earlier, a drillstem test at 5,530-92 feet in an unidentified zone recovered five feet of oil and 115 feet of mud.

Spoon mixture into 3 greased No. 303 cans or one No. 303 can and one 9-inch loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven (325 to 350 degrees) for 1 hour for cans or 1 hour and 10 minutes for loaf pan. Remove from oven. Let cool 5 minutes before removing from can or pan.

1 cup chopped pecans


