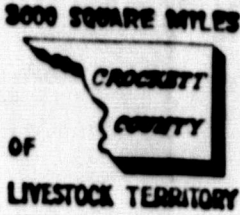

Crockett Oil Field Thefts Thought Solved

Some Crockett County oilfield thefts which occurred earlier in the year were apparently cleared up last week with the arrest of Bill Brown of San Angelo by officers in Wichita Falls and the subsequent statement given to Texas Ranger Rehatch of San Angelo by Brown.

Brown admitted taking several thousand dollars worth of pipe from Gulf Oil Co. in January and again in April from H. L. Hunt in Vaughn field, officers said. Brown was arrested in Wichita Falls on another charge and later connected with a large oilfield theft ring which has been operating in Texas and Oklahoma for over a year.

Charges of theft against Brown have been filed here pending grand jury action, according to Sheriff Billy Mills.

Bobby Britton of Idabel, Okla., is in Crockett County jail charged with forgery in connection with a check given to Watson's Department Store in July. Britton admitted forging the signature of Grover Lee Burns.

Britton was arrested in Idabel and returned to Big Lake where he was charged with burglary. He is presently in Crockett County jail awaiting trial, as he was indicted by a previous grand jury.

Crockett Voters Nix Amendments State Approves

Obvious lack of interest in the six proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution was evidenced Saturday when only 53 residents of Crockett County went to the polls.

Although a majority of the voters in the state voted for all six proposals, Crockett voters voted against all six. The Crockett County vote was as follows: Number 1, 24 for, 26 against; Number 2, 25 for, 27 against; Number 3, 18 for, 33 against; Number 4, 21 for, 31 against; Number 5, 20 for, 32 against; Number 6, 24 for, 27 against.

Odessan Dead Of Heart Attack On Nearby Oil Rig

James E. Taylor of Odessa was dead on arrival at Crockett County Hospital at 2:00 p. m. Sunday afternoon after being stricken with a heart attack while working on an oilfield location south of town.

Mrs. Taylor and their two children were spending the weekend here at the time.

Win At Eldorado Gives Lions 3rd Place In Dist.

The Ozona Lions closed out their 1967 gridiron campaign with a 42-0 shellacking of the Eldorado Eagles last Friday night. Led by Fleet Coates' 4 TD scoring spree in the first half of play, the Lions held a 28-0 lead at intermission and added 14 third quarter points for the easy win.

The victory gave the Lions a 5-4-1 season record and a five and two district record, good enough for a third place finish behind Sonora and Iraan. While the Lions were pasting Eldorado, Sonora wrapped up the 8A Title by waxing the Braves 42-12. The 8A Champs are hosts tomorrow night to Canutillo in a bi-district tussle.

An awesome ground game by the Lions, with Coates doing the majority of the running, was too much for Eldorado, and OHS put a stopper on the Eagle offense.

The first OHS score came after a 49 yard drive with Coates sprinting 20 yards for the score. The PAT was missed.

The Lions widened the 1st quarter lead of 6-0 by adding 22 points in the second stanza. Eagle fullback John Mayo, a 250 pounder, was stopped in his own end zone for a safety. Coates had put the Eagles in a hole by kicking out of bounds at the Eagle 1 yard line. Coates' second score came on a 6 yard scamper as the Lions moved in from the Eagle 38. A fake kick by the Lions was good, and Coates raced in for the two extra points.

Coates scored twice more in the second quarter. One TD was on a 42 yard dash for paydirt following a pass interception by Tom Davidson, freshman linebacker. The other TD was from the 6 yard line. On the drive the Lions covered 58 yards in 6 plays with a pass from David Huff to Donald Huff and a lateral to Beto Diaz making (Continued on Page Five)

She has been a member of judging teams in grass, range, wool and mohair, and livestock the past five years, winning many high individual and team awards, including the Junior High Individual Award at the State Range Judging Contest this year. Kathy has been active in junior leadership and has carried 4-H projects in range management, rifle, foods & nutrition and clothing. 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SOME SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES

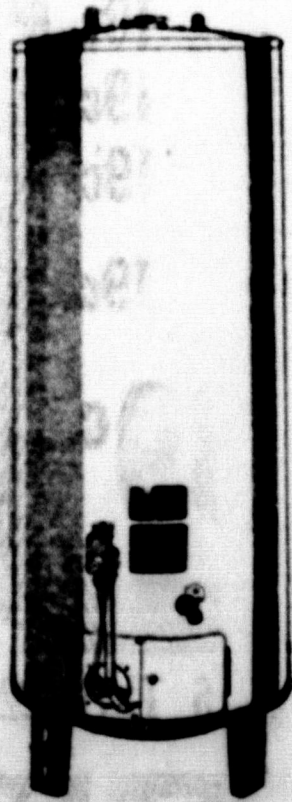
In January of this year, the Secretary of the Treasury, Henry Fowler, stated that "unless Congress raises the debt limit the government can cover only about half the Social Security checks due to go out in March."

Congress raised the debt limit, and the checks were covered. All of them. But the problem remains. And Congress is going to have to respond, probably by raising the debt ceiling.

All the money that millions of Americans have paid into the fund has been paid out to cover current expenses. And for the retirement benefits law there are some fine-prints that we entitled to under the IOUs which attest that in 20 or 30 years, when we are retirement age, our children and grandchildren will ante up the funds necessary. 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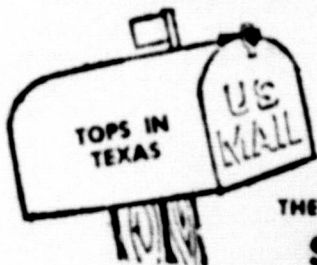
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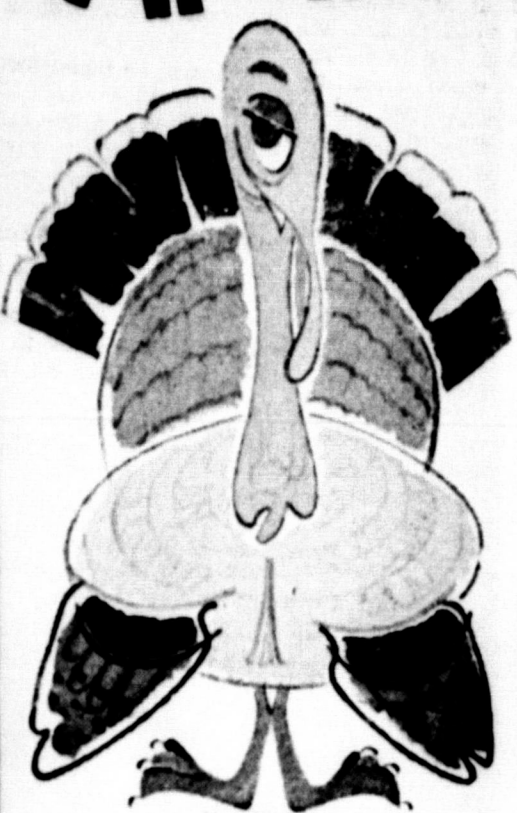

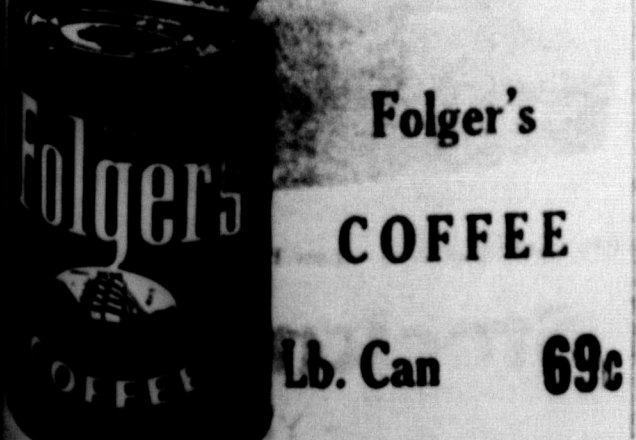

GIRLS BASKETBALL RULES AS COMPARED TO BOYS

Football is over and basketball has begun. As the season progresses, it may interest you to know some of the differences between boys and girls basketball.

In girls basketball there are six players, three offensive, called forwards; and three defensive, called guards. The guards of one team and the forwards of the other team must stay on one end of the court, which is divided by a center line. If anyone crosses this line, the ball is taken out of bounds by the opposite team. However, in boys competition it is quite different. Instead of six players on a team,

there are five and no center line keeps the offense from the defense. Boys play full court and both forwards and guards shoot.

If a guard in girls' basketball is fouled by an opposing forward, the ball is taken to the other end of the court and a forward takes the free shot for the guard. This shows that only those playing the forward positions are allowed to shoot. In boys basketball, the person fouled takes his own free shots.

Boys and girls do play under many of the same rules, however, and girls basketball is changing. Some of the rules followed by both types are those concerning walking, double dribbling, tie balls, out of bounds, and technical fouls. For walking, double dribbling, and out of bound balls, the opponent get the ball out of bounds. For tie balls, the players who tied the ball will jump in the closest circle. In boys basketball, all players not

jumping, which would be eight, will gather around the outside of the circle, and in girls, the only time all players would be included is when the jump will take place in the center circle.

In the case of a technical foul, the opposing team gets one free shot with no one in the rebound positions and then the ball out of bounds on the side.

As you can tell, boys and girls basketball is quite different, but also they play under the same basic set of rules. Since there are more boys together at one time, boys basketball does tend to be the toughest, except of course when the Ozona girls play Iraan; then the tables turn!

Ozona High School students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1968 can register now to participate in the 1968-69 National Merit Program. Principal J. A. Peltó announced today.

Recipe of the Week

From Kitty's Kitchen

Barbecued Beef Strips

2 pounds top round 1/2 inch thick, cut in strips 1 1/2 by 3 inches
3 tbs. prepared mustard
Flour
4 tbs. cooking oil
1 teas. minced garlic
1/2 cup minced onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/4 cup chopped celery leaves
1/4 cup minced parsley
8-oz. can tomato sauce
1/4 cup cider vinegar
1 1/2 cups water
2 tbs. brown sugar
1/2 teas. salt
1/4 teas. cayenne pepper

Put mustard in large bowl, add the strips of beef and stir until they are well coated. Roll lightly in flour and brown well in a heavy skillet in hot oil. Spread them in a 1 1/2-qt. casserole. Add all the remaining ingredients to oil remaining in skillet, stir well and let simmer about 10 minutes, stirring frequently. Pour this mixture over the steak strips, cover tightly and bake 2 to 2 1/2 hours in a 300 degree oven. Stir two or three times while baking and if it seems dry add a bit more water. Serves 5-6.

Serve with buttered noodles and cut green beans. This is a spicy and flavorful dish, especially welcome on a cold night.

 Rambling Reflections
 By Dr. R. F. Curl

For several weeks I have been absent from the columns of The Stockman due to: 1. A very busy schedule on my part; 2. and the fact that our excellent football team, of whom we are all very proud, needed space more than I. My hat is off to them for a season well-played. While we did not capture district, we played a most creditable game.

Naturally I have been flattered to have many people say they missed these wandering musings of mine. Mr. Lee Wilson, former "Mayor of Crockett County," and now resident in Truth or Consequences, N. M., sets me off again by his remark to me at Rotary Club this week that my profound(?) ponderings were the second thing he read each week in The Stockman, which, by the way, he said was a happy tie to a community he will always consider home. And I wasn't the least abashed by his statement that Kitty's Column came ahead of mine. It does with me as I read its fresh breezlike insights and judgments each week. That girl handles a typewriter in a most adroit fashion.

Mrs. Curl and I left Ozona a week ago last Monday for a jog of 900 miles that took us to Austin, Alice, and San Antonio for meetings. It was missing when we left Ozona and the rain grew heavier all the way until we got back to Kerrville on Friday. Five days of steady rain, and some of it heavy, made us glad for our semiarid Ozona skies, although we were real happy to know we had had some rain in these parts.

Our first stop was at Fredericksburg where I made up Rotary attendance. When I became a Rotarian many years ago I knew the strong emphasis laid on regular attendance. Always having believed that when you hire on, you should expect to put in all hours required. I try to

maintain as nearly 100% attendance. Then, too, I love Rotary both in its local manifestations in the many individual clubs around the world and also its principles, programs, and efforts as Rotary International, a global organization.

The last reports I heard from a director of the Baptist group indicated that they were holding and handling a good deal more than fifty million dollars for numerous and varied agencies of the church in Texas.

Governor John Connally was the dinner speaker for this meeting. He was suffering from "flu" and bronchial involvement so that when Bishop Kenneth Pope of Dallas presented him he stated that the Governor would not make a speech but simply say "Hello" and go home to bed where he properly belonged. But the Governor, abandoning any prepared speech he might have brought, talked some fifteen or twenty minutes about his religious faith and his desire to fulfill his vocation as a Christian in his daily life and work. It was the best speech I ever heard him make. I don't know whether that is because I like religion better than politics or whether the Governor is actually better when he makes his own speeches instead of delivering "ghosted" ones.

Second producer and a 1 1/2 mile southeast extension to the Cox, North (Strawn and detrital gas) was assured with the flowing of gas for 2 1/2 hours to separator at the estimated rate of 3,250,000 cubic feet daily at Chambers & Kennedy and R. H. Fulton, Midland, No. 1 Perner Ranch, in 40-2-I&GN, 21 miles west-southwest of Ozona.

Flow was through a 24-64-inch choke and perforations at 9,398-9,414 feet, which had been acidized with 1,500 gallons and swabbed to pits. Testing continued.

The discovery, Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1-AA-TG University (formerly Texas Gulf Producing Co. No. 1-AA University) was finished Oct. 3, 1961, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.6 million cubic feet daily through detrital perforations at 8,526-864 feet and Strawn per-

forations at 9,470-95 feet. Shell Oil Co. has resumed tests at its No. 4 Mitchell, in 10-Q3-TCRR, shut-in producer in JM (Ellenburger gas) field, 34 miles southwest of Ozona.

It flowed 24 hours through a 36-64-inch choke and perforations at 13,658-14,193 feet making at 452 barrels of load water, plus gas at the rate of 3,360,000 cubic feet daily with tubing pressure of 1,100 pounds. Testing continued.

It originally had been completed as a shut-in gas well Aug. 26, 1967, for 1,300,000 cubic feet daily through a 26-64-inch choke and open hole at 13,719-15,040 feet.

A one-mile northwest and the same distance east-southeast extension to Ellenburger gas production was assured in the Crockett portion of the Brown-Bassett multipay field with the flowing of gas for 22 hours at the rate of 6,470,000 cubic feet daily, plus 189 barrels of load water, at Shell Oil Co. No. 1-4 Mitchell, in 4-Q5-TCRR, 39 miles southwest of Ozona.

Flow was through 24 and 17-64-inch chokes and perforations at 12,827 - 14,278 feet, which had been acidized with 4,000 gallons of acetic acidized with 26,000 gallons. Tubing pressure was 3,800-3,900 pounds.

Testing continued with 611 barrels of load water remaining to recover.

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
