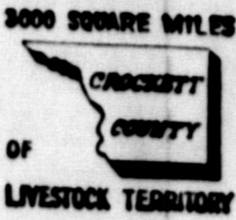

The Lions had a 7 point lead at halftime, but the Eagles shaved the margin to four points by the end of the 3rd quarter. The Lions maintained their lead throughout the final quarter as both teams hit 10 points.

Leading the B teamers in their 20 point victory was Tommy Jenkins and Charles Childress with 15 and 12 points respectively. Also scoring were Arturo Torres (9), David Pagan (8), Carlos Sanchez (7) and Jim Montgomery (2).

Tomorrow night both the A&B basketball squads will visit Sonora. Next week the Lions will play two home games, playing the powerful McCamey Badgers on Monday night and then a return match with Eldorado on Thursday night.

While the entire scholastic program is set against the background of living abroad and observing customs of another country, the school follows the same academic system as American colleges and universities.

Students at the University of the Americas quickly acquire a knowledge of Spanish, not only in their classrooms, but also through their association with their Spanish-speaking classmates and in daily living in Mexican homes where they are housed by the University.

Southeast Area Crockett Gets Two Wildcats

King Resources Co., Denver, Colo., will drill two more Canyon wildcats in southeast Crockett County, 22 miles southeast of Ozona, and in the vicinity of its re-entry operation and a shut-in Canyon prospect.

Both projects are scheduled for 5,500 feet with rotary.

The No. 1-124 J. M. Baggett, et al, 1 1/2 mile east and slightly south of the prospect and 1 1/4 miles east and slightly north of the re-entry is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 124-O-GH&SA.

The No. 2-156 J. M. Baggett, et al, 1 1/4 miles northeast of the re-entry and three miles east of the prospect, is 1,320 feet from the south and east lines of 156-O GH&SARR.

The shut-in prospect, W. W. Meeker, Midland, No. 1-53 Adams, was drilled to 5,000 feet and reportedly made 200,000 cubic feet of gas per day from an unreported Canyon section.

The re-entry, the firm's No. 1 Clay Adams Estate, was scheduled to plug back from 12,827 feet to 5,500 feet and test the Canyon. Originally drilled by Honolulu Oil Corp. and Herman Brown as the No. 1 Emma Lou Adams, it was abandoned March 9, 1961.

Three wildcats were slated previously. The same firm will drill the No. 2 J. W. Henderson as a 3/4-mile southwest outcrop to the Ozona (Canyon sand) field, 12 1/2 miles southwest of Ozona.

Public Hearing Paves Way For IS 10 Project

Twenty-three persons attended the hearing on the schematics of Interstate 10 from 7.2 miles west of Ozona to the Pecos River held in the courthouse Thursday afternoon. Bill Dixon, resident engineer for the Highway Department, conducted the hearing.

Approximately 22 miles of highway was under discussion and the hearing marked the last of such public hearings for IS 10 in Crockett County.

Most of the land involved in the hearing is University land. The majority of individual property owners were mainly concerned in how their holdings would be separated and very few objections were voiced.

Dixon stressed it will be at least two years before the department begins payment of damages.

The first public hearing was held in 1965 on the section of IS 10 which is now under construction between Ozona and the Sutton County line.

Ozona Rifle Club Wins Citation For Sighting-In Day

Washington, D. C. — Ozona Rifle Club, Ozona, Texas, has received a National Rifle Association Public Service Award for conducting a "Sighting-In Day" to prepare area hunters and their equipment for the 1967 hunting season.

More than 35 hunters checked their firearms for safety, "sighted them in" for accuracy, and reviewed the fundamental principles of hunters safety to reduce the possibility of accidents and improve chances of hunting success in the field.

The club is one of hundreds throughout the country conducting a Sighting-In Day program each year. The NRA-affiliated clubs open their ranges to sportsmen prior to the hunting season as part of the overall Hunter Safety Program that has continually reduced the hunting accident toll and increased hunting skill.

With more than 21 million licensed hunters taking to the fields this year, the program has assumed major importance.

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Tippett Multipay Field Gets Oiler; Outpost Spotted

Shell Oil Co., Midland, No. 1-18 Amacker Trust, in 18-36-H&TC, location north offset to dual McKee and Ellenburger production on the northwest side of the Tippett, West multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County, nine miles south of McCamey, has secured production from the John Ellenburger, with the swabbing of 104 barrels of new oil and 104 barrels of load water in 12 hours.

Recovery was through perforations at 6,657-69 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons. Testing continued.

While being drilled, it also indicated production in an unidentified well with the flowing of 41.5 gravity oil at the well rate of 1,590 barrels on a drillstem test at 5,650-5,720 feet. A test at 6,989-139 feet recovered 120 feet of mud, and 20 feet of very slightly acid mud.

A drillstem test on the John and Ellenburger at 6,634-700 feet recovered 4,960 feet of oil and 1,170 feet of gas.

There is no joint production in the county.

Shell will drill the No. 2-18 Amacker Trust, 2,190 feet southwest of the No. 1-18 Amacker Trust.

It was contracted to 7,990 feet as a location west-northwest offset to dual McKee and Ellenburger production, one-mile north outpost to the two-well 5,950-foot Wolfcamp gas area and as a 1/2-mile northwest outpost to 5,000-foot detrital oil production in the Tippett, West field, and as a 1/2-mile north outpost to lower Leopard and two-miles north-

Crockett Fields Gain Confirmers; Another Testing

Two Crockett County fields gained confirmers and tests continued at another.

The Tippett, West multipay field of Crockett County gained its fourth lower Wolfcamp producer and a 1/2-mile northeast extension to that pay with completion of Standard Oil Co. of Texas No. 5-38 J. H. Tippett, nine miles southeast of McCamey.

It was finished for a calculated daily flowing potential of 500 barrels of 35.2 gravity oil, plus four barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 625-1. Potential was based on a six-hour flow of 125 barrels through various sized chokes and perforations at 5,403-409 feet and 5,498-5,512 feet, which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons.

Drilled to 5,650 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, it is plugged back to 5,575 feet.

Location is 467 feet from the northwest and southwest lines of the northwest quarter of 38-31-H&TC.

Shell Oil Co., No. 1-4 Mitchell, fifth producer and a one-mile northwest and the same distance east-southeast extension to production in the Crockett County Ellenburger gas area of the Brown-Bassett multipay field, 39 miles southwest of Ozona, was finished for a calculated, absolute open flow of 80 million cubic feet of dry gas per day.

Production was through perforations at 12,827-14,278 feet, which had been acidized with 30,000 gallons.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and 1,175 feet from the east lines of 4-Q5-TCRR, Chambers & Kennedy and R. H. Fulton, Midland, No. 1 Perner Ranch, in 40-2-1&GN, second producer and a 1 1/2-mile southeast extension to the Cox, North (Strawn and detrital) field of Crockett County, 21 miles west-southwest of Ozona, was continuing to flow gas at the rate of 5.6 million cubic feet daily, plus four to six barrels

west outpost to Hueco production in the Tippett field. Location is 467 feet from the southeast and 3,400 feet from the southwest lines of 18-36-H&TC. Estimated derick floor elevation of 2,333 feet.

Southwestern Natural Gas Inc., Midland, will drill the No. 1 Powell as a 1/2-mile north outpost to the Ozona (Canyon sand gas) field of Crockett County, 1 1/2 miles northeast of Ozona.

Location, exception to Rule No. 37, is 1,980 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the west lines of 30-OP-GC&SF. Contract depth is 6,700 feet.

No. 1-AA University) was finished Oct. 3, 1961, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.6 million cubic feet of gas daily through detrital perforations at 8,526-564 feet and Strawn perforations at 9,470-95 feet.

east of Ellenburger and McKee production and the same distance north of 5,000-foot detrital production in the Tippett, West field and 1/2 mile north of lower Leonard production in the Tippett field, eight miles south of McCamey, flowed gas and oil and reversed out oil on a drillstem test in a second unidentified formation.

Tool was open an unreported time on the test taken between 6,670-710 feet. Gas surfaced in 42 minutes and oil in 51 minutes, no gauges. It reversed out an unreported amount of oil, no water, plus 60 feet of mud below the circulating sub. Flowing pressure was 523 - 2,180 pounds; one-hour initial and two-hour final shut-in pressures were 3,066 and 3,104 pounds, respectively.

The project is bottomed at 6,710 feet, and operator was waiting on cement after running 7-inch casing to total depth.

Production was indicated earlier, with the flowing of oil at the hourly rate of 10 barrels and gas, no gauges, on a drillstem test from 5,790-856 feet.

Still earlier, a drillstem test in an unidentified zone at 5,530-92 feet recovered five feet of oil and 115 feet of mud.

When the 57 years old noted social anthropologist of England, Dr. Edmund Lurch of Cambridge University, pontificated last week that old people past 55 years were no longer competent for this brave new world in which we live, I almost became alarmed. For remember I passed that milestone many years ago.

But on second thought I realized that a doddering old man of 57 really was not competent to pass judgment on a brisk man like I who has traveled hundreds of thousands of miles, worked 12 to 15 hours a day, attended hundreds of meetings, counseled and taught and preached to many thousands of people, and enjoyed only one two weeks vacation since I passed into the post 55 period of senility.

Sure men are going to be compelled to retire at increasingly earlier ages as automated technology eases the work load of humanity. But religion, education, and politics must discover ways in which these early retirees can find a meaningful life that is also useful to society. For even as technology compels earlier retirement, medical science constantly lengthens life expectancy.

While it is a big order, I'll guarantee that if Dr. Lurch will leave us doddering old folks past 55 alone, we'll work out a scheme by which we all can find useful fulfillment for that 80 year life expectancy that is just around the corner.

I had a real fine experience this morning (Tuesday) in hearing John Kenna's choral group singing at the High School. The beautiful music of Christmas time always warms the heart and lifts the soul but those fifty and more voices so well trained gave me a thrill for

what awaits the years to be as they make music for life. Thanks, John and young folks.

Not recently have I read so interesting and stimulating a novel as the one Miss North lent me out of the Crockett County Library: A Night of Watching, by Elliott Arnold. It is a story of the German occupation of Denmark during World War II. The many frightful cruelties curdle your blood but the entrancing style and well-told story depict not only the horrors but also the heroism of a free people — Danes and Jews — as they sought even to death to thwart the enslaving oppressions of the bestial conquerors. Take a few hours away from television and read it.

Next week I am going hunting; not that I can shoot a gun. I could more likely run my deer down

than hit him with a rifle shot. But I am keyed up to be out with a congenial brother ministers under the group of various and sundry skilled tutelage of Charles Williams and Cap West somewhere off down in the wilds of the southwestern part of the county. I promise you, however, that these crafty men of the open spaces will not be able to get even such a city slicker as I off on any snipe hunt.

After Christmas, maybe I can get some Rambling Reflections on this glad season of the year. In the meantime I hope for you a Christian Christmas!

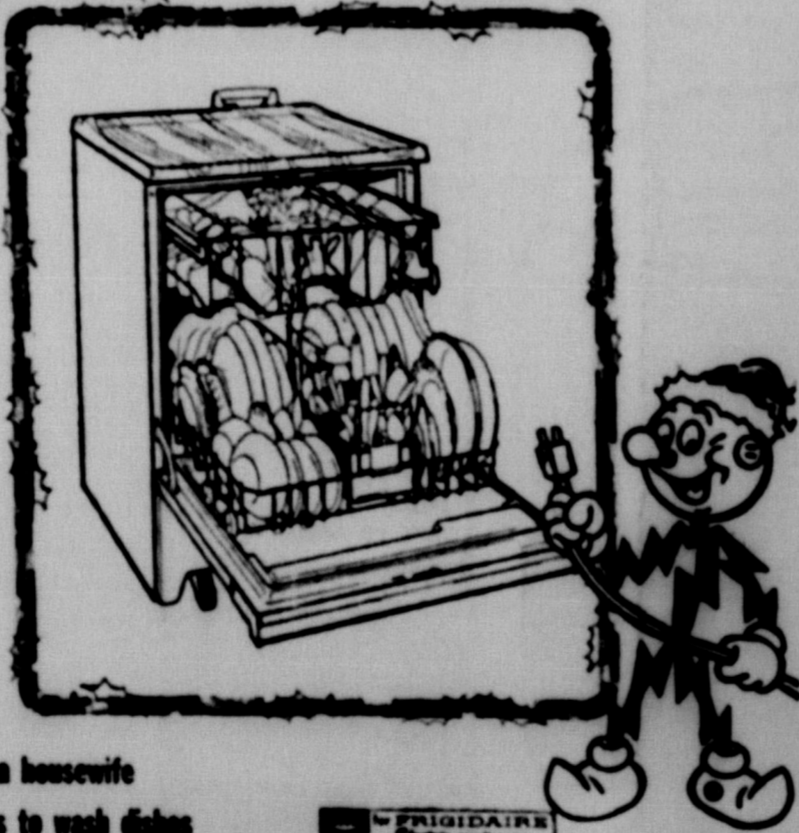
