Twelve boys and two adults from Boys Ranch arrived two days ahead of schedule for the planned weekend deer hunt at the James Baggett ranch south of town.

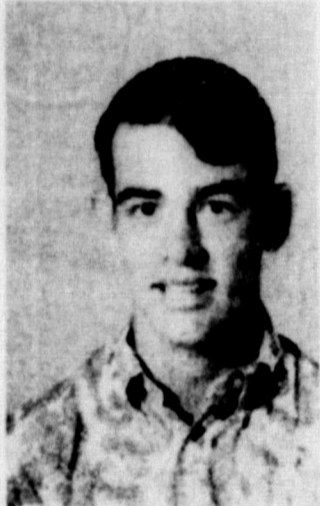
Due to some extra activities at Boys Ranch planned for the weekend, the group telephoned the Baggetts of their change in plans and were invited to come on Wednesday night.

Ozona Business Men Report Best Christmas Sales

Ozonans did a lot of gift buying in Ozona this year, according to local merchants. Most every business place contacted had record Christmas sales or at least did as well this year as last, in spite of losing a day due to the fact that Christmas Eve fell on Sunday.

Ray Boyd at the Village Drug was very pleased with the store's business this year and said sales topped last year's record high for the same period.

Jim Evans reported that business at his Gent Shop was slightly over last year and the best since he purchased the shop from Bill Bradbury a few years ago.

Brisk Christmas business was reported at Ozona Boot and Saddlery by Oscar Kost. He had not compared this year's sales with last, but said he felt sure business was as good this year if not better than last.

Mrs. Lloyd Loudamy at Loudamy's Fashion Shoppe said Saturday before Christmas broke all store records for sales in a single day. She also said business was better than last year.

Christmas sales at Small Fashions were about the same as last year, according to Beth Boyd, owner of the children's clothing store.

Bill Watson said over-all business at Watson's Department Store for December about matched last year, but that Saturday broke all store records for sales.

Nick Nicholas at Baker Jewelers said Christmas business was approximately the same as last year. Brown Furniture reported sales near that of reported sales last year, but he had not compared this year's sales with last, but as near as he could tell business was recorded in the ensuing

Increased Postal Rates To Go Into Effect January 7

An increase in postal rates for all classes of mail, with the exception of parcel post and international mail, will go into effect Jan. 7, 1968, Postmaster Floyd Hokit announced Tuesday.

First class rates will go from 5 cents to 6 cents per ounce up to 13 ounces. The new rates for airmail will be 10 cents per ounce for up to 7 ounces. All first-class mail over 13 ounces and all air mail over 7 ounces will be merged into a single category. These heavier pieces of mail under the single rate schedule will be delivered by the fastest available means of transportation. A flat rate of 80 cents will be charged for all mail in this category up to one pound.

For mail weighing in excess of one pound, the present air parcel post rates will continue to apply. The rates will change at half-pound intervals under the new structure rather than one pound intervals as in the past.

Another rate change that will affect the general public is the increase from 4 to 6 cents for the first 2 ounces of individual pieces of third-class mail. Unsealed greeting cards may be sent at this rate.

Also on Jan. 7, special handling will be available on third class parcels weighing between 8 and 16 ounces.

There will be no changes in charges for special delivery, C. O. D., insurance or certified mail.

Higher rates will also go into effect Jan. 7 for all categories of second-class mail, bulk rate third-class mail, controlled circulation mail and the educational materials category of fourth-class mail. Mailers using these should contact the post office.

Hokit said some of the new stamps and envelopes would be in short supply for a few days after the changes go into effect. However, he said the post office will have enough 1 cent stamps on hand to make up the postage until a steady supply of regular stamps can be obtained.

Last Half Rainfall Picks Up But 1967 Was 4 Inches Below Average

After a very dry first half, 1967 has recorded 13.70 inches of moisture to date, approximately 4 inches below average for the year.

However, the south part of the county, which had received almost no moisture the first half of the year, has received above average falls for the last half and most of the surrounding ranch country has received more moisture than Ozona has recorded, with the exception of land directly west of town.

No rain was recorded in January of 1967 and amounts of from .56 to .87 of an inch were recorded in the ensuing

Rusty Smith Is First To Announce For Re-Election

U. S. (Rusty) Smith, who is serving his fourteenth year as County Commissioner from precinct 3, this week announced that he will be a candidate for re-election in the 1968 Democratic primary. He thus becomes the first candidate to announce for office in Crockett county.

Under the staggered term system developed in a legislative act revising the election laws, two County Commissioners are up for election every two years, serving four-year terms when elected. Precincts 3 and 1 are to be elected this year.

Smith was elected Commissioner in 1954 and has served without interruption since.

Ozona To Host All-Dist. Grid Teams Jan. 13th

The annual all-district football banquet has been set for Saturday night, January 13. Sponsored by the Lions Club, the affair will be held at the Civic Center. Honor guests will be players selected for the all-district team.

Dean Scott, president of the Lions Club, said tickets would be \$150 and could be purchased from any member of the club. He said the guest speaker had not yet been selected, but would be announced shortly.

Coaches and players from all over District 8-A will be on hand for the annual banquet.

Only One-Third Crockett Voters Have Registered

With voter registration deadline coming up January 31, a check on the tax office this week showed around 500 Crockett county voters registered so far. This number accounts for about one-third of the eligible voters in the county.

Pay Opener In West Crockett Field Indicated

An unidentified discovery, probably Wolfcamp, was indicated in Crockett County with the recovery of 5,575 feet of oil and 60 feet of gas-cut drilling mud on a drill-stem test at Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, No. 1 Clara Couch, in W. Brewer No. 100, Strawn reef wildcat, surrounded by shallow production and 3 1/2 miles southeast of the lone Wolfcamp oil producer in the Clara Couch field, 7 1/2 miles northeast of Sheffield.

Gas surfaced in four minutes, no gauges, on the one-hour test at 5,690-760 feet. Flowing pressure was 670-1,103 pounds; one-hour initial and final shut-in pressures were 2,130 and 1,902 pounds.

The project, slated for 6,300 feet, was bottomed at 5,896 feet, preparing to take a test at 5,796-5,896 feet.

James L. Lamb, Jr., Midland, will drill the No. 1 Half-Bivens, a Crockett County project, as a 1/2-mile south-southeast outpost to the five-well Millard, North (Queen) field, seven miles southeast of Iran.

Location is 1,200 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of 62-1-I&GN. Contract depth is 1,550 feet with cable tools.

Prolific Oiler Finaled On V. I. Pierce Acreage

Texas American Oil Corp., Midland, completed as a Clearfork oil discovery its No. 1-E V. I. Pierce, Crockett County Ellenburger failure, 20 miles southwest of Ozona, and one mile southeast of the lower Clearfork oil opener and 2 1/2 miles north and slightly west of the Clearfork gas producer in the two-well V.I.P. field.

It was finaled for a calculated, daily flowing potential of 360 barrels of 36 gravity oil, plus 44 barrels of water with gas-oil ratio of 167-1. Potential was based on an actual 12-hour flow of 180 barrels of oil and 22 barrels of water through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations at 2,578; 2,582; 2,589; 2,593; 2,602; 2,607; 2,616; 2,626; 2,637; 2,642; 2,647; 2,651 and 2,655 feet which had been acidized with 1500 gallons and fractured with 60,000 pounds of sand and 40,000 gallons.

Top of pay was picked at 2,378 feet on elevation of 2,375 feet. The following tops were reported: Clearfork, 1,283 feet Canyon 'A' 5,350 feet; Strawn lime, 10,614 feet; Hontoya, 11,090 feet; and Ellenburger, 11,627 feet.

Drilled to 12,390 feet, with 8 1/2 inch casing set at 3,250 feet, it is plugged back to 2,790 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of 3-BBB-TC RR.

The V.I.P. oil opener, The Rodman Corp., No. 1 Victor Pierce, was finaled Oct. 11 to pump 14 barrels of 33 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 100-1, through perforations at 2,245-331 feet and 2,869-882 feet.

END OF RELATIVITY?

Most everyone is familiar with the famous scene in HMS Pinafore which treats of the indomitable ruler of the Queen's na-vee, and how he was aided by his "sisters and his cousins and his aunts," reckoned by the dozens.

Many of England's fine old traditions were transplanted to this country, and one which took root and flourished was the idea of getting sisters, cousins and aunts on the public payroll. Nor did it stop there. Wives, uncles, sons, daughters, nieces, nephews and in-laws also were sometimes hired.

It was this glorious tradition that made Washington, D. C., the great and populous city it is — probably the greatest in the world, relatively speaking. But now, because of the machinations of a Congressman from Iowa, Rep. Neal Smith, Democrat, all this is to be changed. This sportsport has had a fixation about federal employees putting relatives on the public payroll. He says it's nepotism, and wicked. For six years he has been trying to stop it, but fellow Congressmen a-

others who love their kinfolk and like to see them prosper, managed to fight off the I-owan, until a few weeks ago.

Congressman Smith attached a rider to the bill that hiked the pay of federal workers and upped the postal rates. Since most members felt it was their patriotic duty to vote for both increases, the measure was passed. But the sneaky rider which the Congressman hooked to the bill will prohibit any government official with authority to hire or promote employees from putting relatives on the payroll.

One reason it got passed was that only about 80 members of the House were on the floor when it went through. Those absentees are probably getting what-for from relatives in need of congenial jobs.

The law won't disturb those already on the public payroll. And one wonders what the Supreme Court will have to say about Congressman Smith's rider. Clearly it is a violation of a relative's right to work. And it does fly in the face of tradition. Think, for example, what would have happened if this

were the law during the Kennedy Administration. There'd have been no Bobby Kennedy to help out as Assistant President, and no Sargeant Shriver to end poverty.

Clearly some nepotism is imperative.

REDS IN DEFENSE PLANTS

And now our men in Vietnam know why they are there. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court told them on Monday, December 11, in announcing a 6-2 decision of the court. Our men are in Vietnam to defend the right of Communists to work in defense plants in the United States. And that should make them very joyous this Christmas season, and rekindle their determination.

In a short span of ten years, the Supreme Court has:

Invalidated Sedition laws passed by 42 of our States.

Ruled that a citizen may not be prosecuted for advocating the overthrow of the United States Government by force, unless that citizen advocates action to effect the overthrow.

Ruled that the department of State may not withhold passports from suspected Communists because of their "beliefs or associations."

Ordered that Communist Party members not be compelled to register with the Subversive Activities Control Board.

Handed down a decision that no American can lose his citizenship, even if he

deserts from the armed forces in time of war, or even if he votes in a foreign country.

Those are just the decisions bearing on subversion in our country at a time in history when it is face to face with the most powerful and openly hostile enemy it has ever faced. Some of the decisions on the handling of criminals, religion and politics are equally revolting.

Somehow, it must be that we have failed to see the announcement of an important decision of the Supreme Court at some time in the past.

Was it decided at some point that members of the Communist Party should sit on the Supreme Court? Otherwise, how can it be that every decision seems to be in favor of the Communists?

The security ramparts of our nation are being dismantled at a furious pace by the Supreme Court. Another ten years like the last ten can be disastrous.

The legislative branch must act before the Court interprets the First Amendment as ground for voiding all subsequent amendments. That does seem to be the Court's intent.

Wise and Otherwise
 Rambling Reflections
 By Dr. R. F. Curl

Yes, I have been hunting—a new, almost unique experience for me. And, yes I had the time of my life.

More gracious and thoughtful hosts than Charles Williams and Cap West are not to be found anywhere. Both are veterans of the elusive deer trail and know how to meet every anticipation of their guests.

Charles is a chef par excellence. Whether it be venison, cabrito, pork chops, biscuits, salad, or brown beans he turns a deft hand to produce tasty and substantial food, giving zest and vigor for the chase.

Cap furnishes a hunting lodge to match a Hilton Hotel in the lovely family ranch home. I have always liked to rough it and when I can do it in such luxury, it whets my appetite for a repeat experience.

About the only evidence of roughing it I brought home however, was a little stubble on my face since I didn't shave, thereby missing one of half a dozen times I have failed in this daily chore in more than forty years since I went as pastor to the aristocratic old town of Bastrop and discovered the people expected their pastor to shave every day.

Both hosts know how to manipulate a jeep whether an old-timer like Cap's or a new Japanese Toyota Land Cruiser like Charles' Nor rock nor bush nor ravine nor grade nor brush nor cactus thorns stayed either driver. It did seem to me, however, that Cap took an unusual delight in twisting, turning, and resting Charles' new Toyota over the roughest spots of the wide stretches of the

forty sections open to the hunt.

The company was congenial with three avid, meat-hungry hunters, Leonard Garret of Mission, Jim Hancock, and Louis Mueller, plus the royal hosts. This lone non-shooting hunter furnished such gibes and wisecracks as he could to spur the gun carriers on.

Greatly missed were three preachers of former hunts Dan Baker of San Antonio, Bill Fleming of Corpus Christi, and Max Brown of Hamlin.

Yes, all three of the ministerial nimrods brought down their deer. Ministerial courtesy forbids my mentioning how many boxes of shells were fired. Ask Louis or Jim. They are honest and truthful; but remember they are also hunters, who like fishermen, always have magnifying memories of the fruits of the chase and the cast.

Yes, I am going in 1968, D. V., provided I get an invitation. And likely I'll even shoot, since the excitement of the hunt finally got a gun in my hands as I tried unsuccessfully to take aim on a drove of javelinas.

The warmth and love of Ozona people have given us new life. With Tiny Tim we came through Yule days saying, "God bless us one and all!" We pray that this may have been your experience as Jesus, Saviour and Lord, came afresh to you.

And now for 1968. Happy New Year! This should be a year in which we all join in prayer and life that all men everywhere, beginning with each of us, may grow in that understanding and love which can bring an end to war in Vietnam and everywhere. 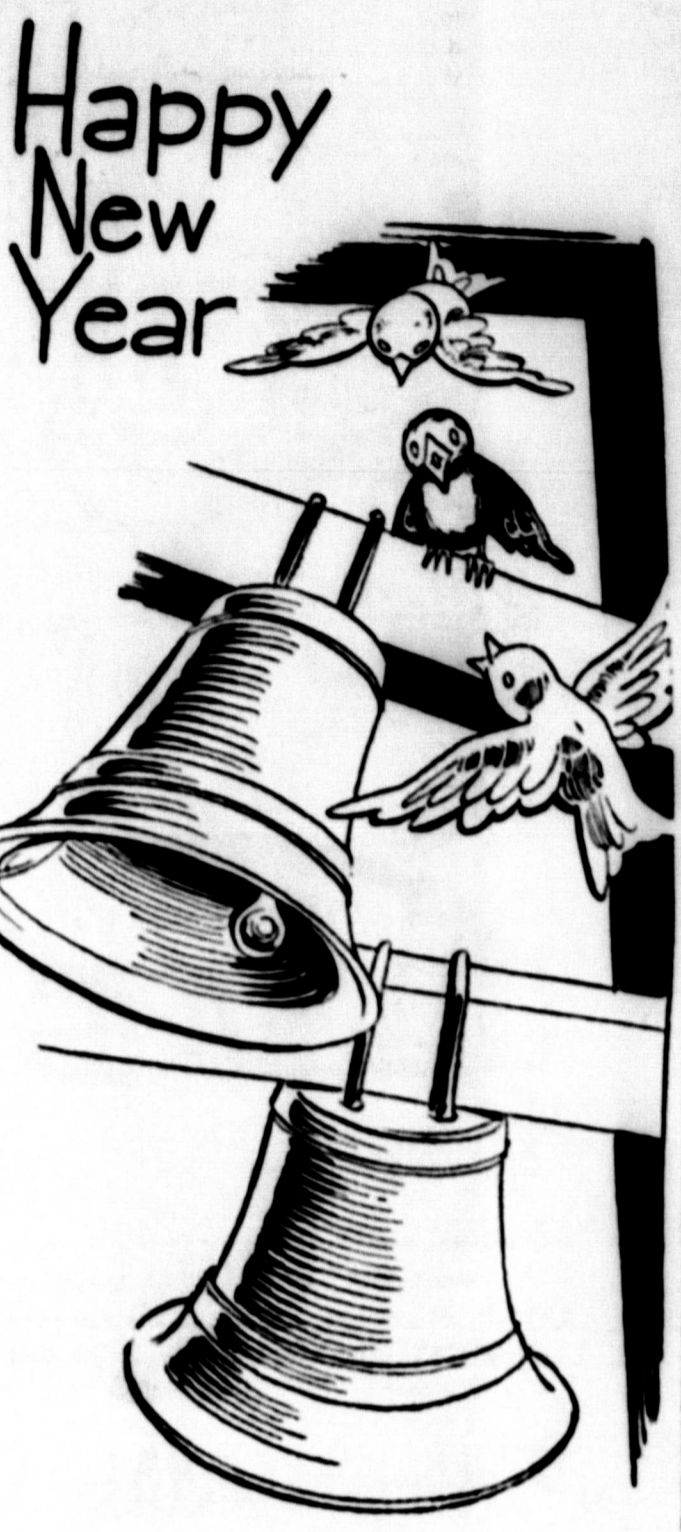

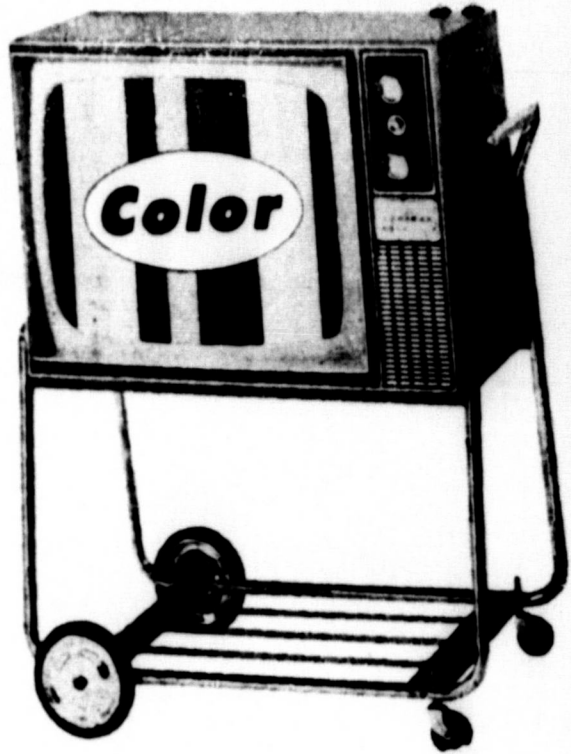

A 10-year blood-alcohol study by the Bexar County Medical Examiner's Office

shows 48 per cent of the persons killed in San Antonio traffic accidents had .15 per cent or more alcohol present in their blood.

That means that theoretically, each of them had consumed more than three highballs or more than six beers in his final hour. A driver with an alcohol content of .10 per cent is consid-

ered by most experts to be too intoxicated to drive safely.

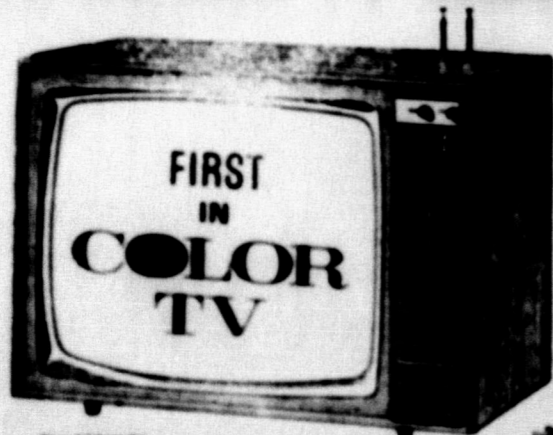

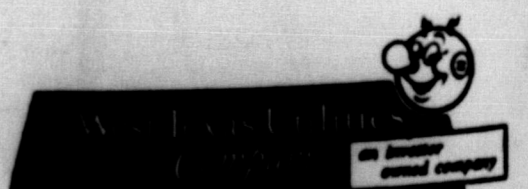

Ozona Stockman

Dear Sirs:

How terribly thrilling it was to have read Dr. R. F. Curl's thought provoking column in the November 30 issue of the Stockman. Dr. Curl observes quite correctly that we live and work in one of the world's newest nations—Chad. However in looking at some of the archaeological ruins in this part of the world, one is struck by the fact that the civilizations here represented surely must go back for thousands of years. Indeed, carbon 14 tests are now being used to determine the exact age of many of the civilization on this fascinating continent.

Chad may well be described as being in the wilds of Africa. However, I would question the remoteness of this or any other area to Africa. We live near the Ft. Lamy International Airport. Into this airport come all types of aircraft, including jets. There are approximately 38 flights in and out of the airport each week and the overwhelming majority are international in nature. Then, too, this airport handles more air freight than any other airport in the whole of sub-Saharan Africa.

Americans and Ozonians should be particularly commended for trying to understand the emerging nations. This understanding is really a fascinating voyage of discovery and is not unlike the awakening of the newly emerged areas themselves. To take the areas of Africa, which I know best, Africans have reaffirmed their own personality, they have re-emphasized their own history

and traditions; and they have discovered a richness and vitality in African life that has for so long been a bit obscured by colonialism. As Africans have articulated their demands for freedom, I think we Americans have seen more clearly the identity of their aspirations with our own. As Africa has been transformed into a continent of living nations, so has the American knowledge of that continent gained new life, new insight, and new perspective.

One of the things which helps us understand Africa (or any other area which has emerging nations) has been communications. Contrary to my experiences during my first visit to Africa, it is now possible to telephone from most of the remote areas (so-called) to the United States. It is also possible to travel the length and breadth of the continent, although the one flaw here is that airlines tend to be less frequent than those in either Europe or the United States. Thus, those of us who live on the continent do not feel so remote. Rather we feel a continent's struggle for independence, its drama of modernizations, and its success and disappointments in seeking to better the lot of its inhabitants. No greater task has ever been demanded of any people in any age. The one difference with the newly emerged nations of the twentieth century is — put very simply — that they are being asked to accomplish this process with greater speed than other nations. They must do this if they are to be a part of the highly-technological age in which we are living.

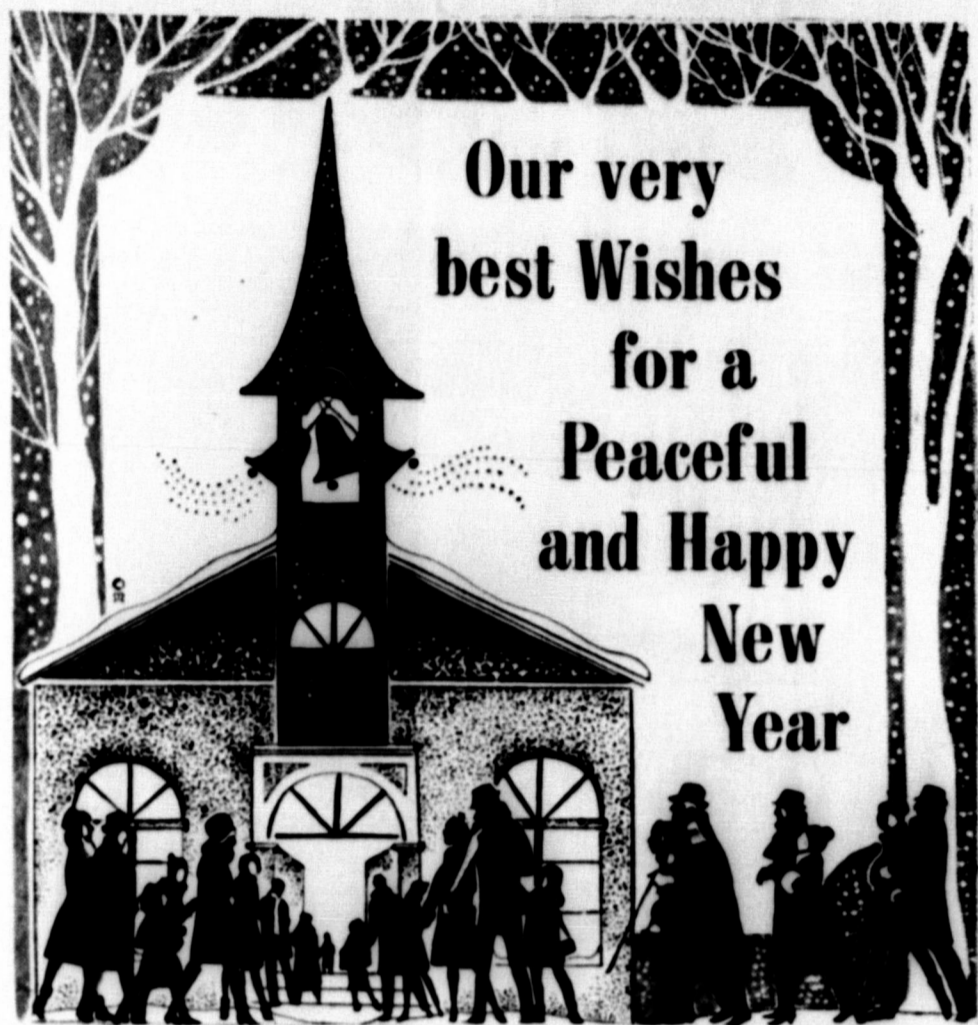

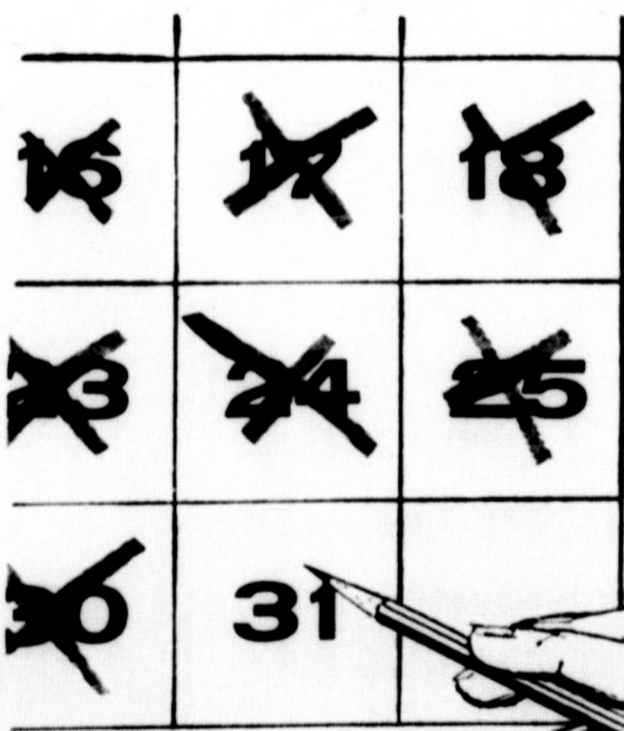

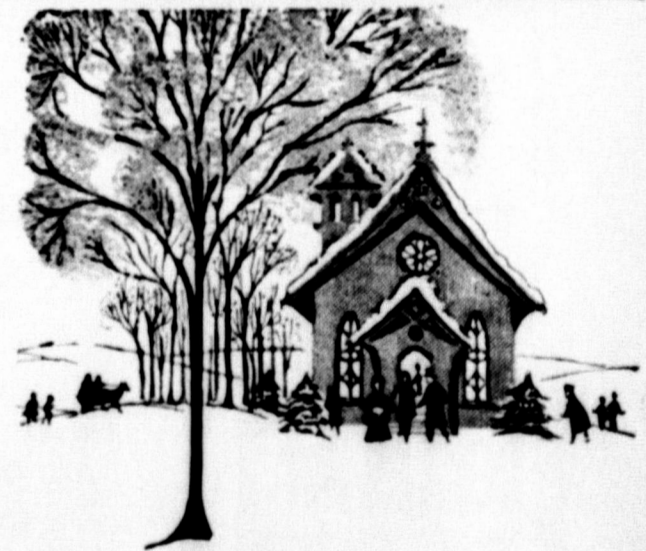
