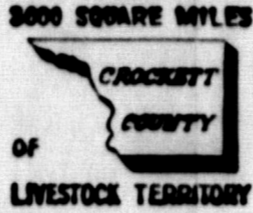

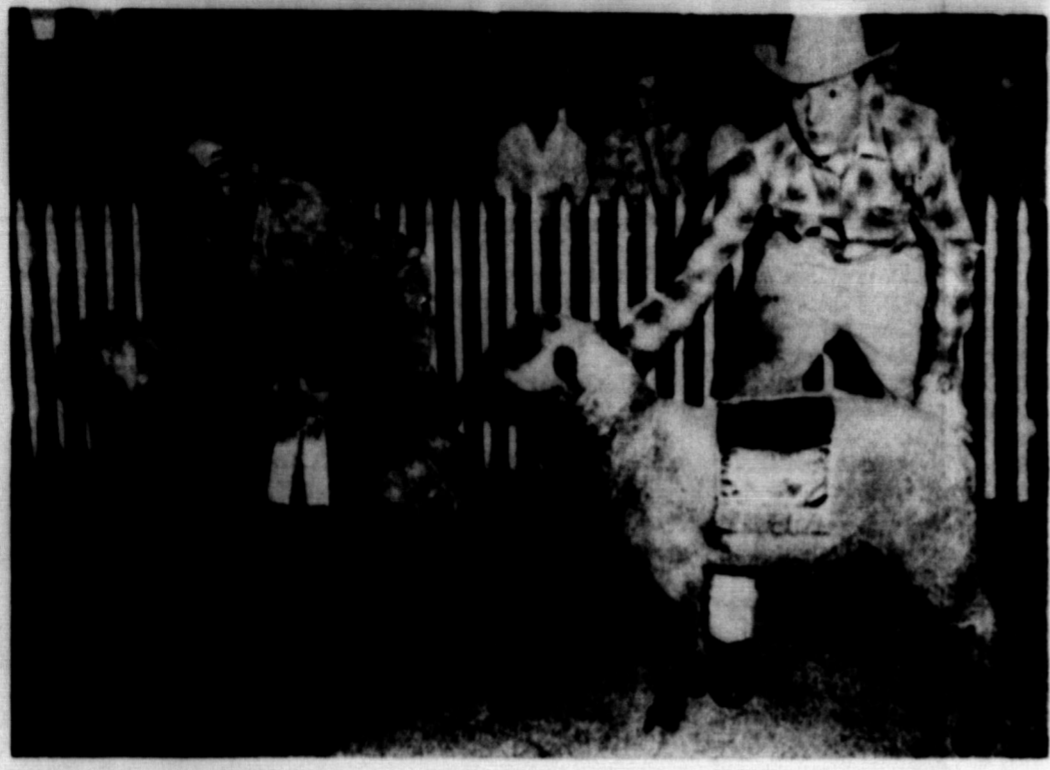

Frio-Tex Finals Top Performing Canyon Gas Well

Frio-Tex Oil and Gas Company, wholly-owned Texas-based subsidiary of Suburban Propane Gas Corp. has completed a 6,500 foot canyon sand well, which has potential 11,000 MCF of gas per day from perforations between 6472 and 6676 feet. This completion, the Marshall Montgomery et al well No. 1, is located in Section 2, Block AAA, Crockett County — approximately four miles from Frio-Tex's Hunt Ranch compressor facilities and eighteen miles southwest of Ozona.

Officials of Frio-Tex stated that this well exhibits the best performance characteristics of any canyon sand producer completed by the company to date in this prolific gas producing area. During the potential test it flowed approximately 2,000 MCF of gas and 112 barrels of condensate per day. In this particular drilling activity, Frio-Tex is acting as operator for Suburban Propane Gas Corporation, Ozona Gas Company, R. M. Bergstein and Alvin H. Parker.

Aggressive, continuing development of its Ozona properties is a major Frio-Tex policy. During 1967 the company participated in a drilling program which resulted in the successful completion of 12 producing gas wells, and acquired an additional 34,308 gross acres in the Ozona area, as well as a 37 1/2% interest in the Ozona Gas Processing Plant.

Gary Boyd Is Hurt in Vietnam

Word was received here earlier this week that Sp-4 Gary Boyd, son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Boyd, was hospitalized in Dang Ha, Viet Nam with burns on his face and hands. No other details were available at press time.

Young Boyd has been in Viet Nam almost seven months.

Fred Chandler Seeks New Term As Co. Attorney

Fred Chandler, Sr., county attorney, has announced that he will seek a new four-year term in that office which he has held for the past three and a half years.

He was appointed to the office shortly after Bob Owens resigned after serving a fraction of his four year term. Mr. Chandler was elected to serve out the remaining two years in the general election in 1966 and this will be his first time to ask for a full four-year term.

Mr. Chandler came here with his wife from Ft. Stockton where he had a law practice. He also conducts a law practice here when he is not attending to county business.

In announcing his candidacy, he expressed his appreciation for the cooperation and assistance he has received from his many Crockett County friends since taking office here and said their continued support would be greatly appreciated. He remarked that although he had only been here 3 1/2 years, it seemed more like 20, as far as feeling at home in Ozona.

The camp is free to eligible blind, deaf, mute or crippled children. Transportation to and from the camp is supplied by the local Lions. All requests for summer camp are handled locally by the Lions.

In the past years, Lions have sent over 10,000 youngsters to camp.

Forum Plans Adult Education Classes Soon

Adult education classes will be sponsored again this year by the Ozona Woman's Forum in cooperation with the Ozona public schools. Supt. L. B. T. Sikes has offered the use of the school rooms and equipment.

This will mark the third year the club has sponsored the courses, which are offered free of charge to the adult public. Eighty-one adults attended the various courses offered last year.

Number and kind of courses offered will depend on available instructors. Instructors receive no pay for their time and effort.

Classes will probably start no later than the first of March and be held weekly for six weeks. A definite schedule and instructions for signing up will appear in the paper as they become available.

Officers arrested Joseph Cosentino, 18, Tuesday in connection with the theft of several billfolds from rooms of guests in the Hotel Ozona. Four billfolds containing around \$150 were recovered and the man is in Crockett County jail under a \$2,500 bond pending grand jury action.



Dorsey B. Hardeman State Senator 25th Dist.

Sen. Hardeman Asks Re-Election To Texas Senate

State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, whose four-year elective term won in 1966 was shrunk to two years by statewide legislative redistricting, expected to announce today his candidacy in the 25th Senatorial District for a full four-year term.

"I am deeply grateful to the people of the 21-county district for electing me in 1966 to a four year term and respectfully ask their continued support," Hardeman said. He was one of 15 senators who drew a two-year term following senatorial redistricting which was done in state compliance with the "one man, one vote" decision of the United States Supreme Court. Election this year will give Senator Hardeman a full four-year term.

Hardeman said he will counsel, as he is accustomed to do, with the people throughout the district before the Democratic Primary May 4. "It has been my purpose, at all times, to help maintain a sound, responsible and responsive state government and to handle all legislation of local interest with dispatch," the senator said. "This I will continue to do."

A practicing attorney highly respected as an authority on constitutional law Hardeman is married to the former Geneva Moore, daughter of the late Lawrence Moore and Mrs. Moore of Schleicher County. The Hardemans are members of the Church of Christ. Their sons, Mark and Bryan are students at The University of Texas and Angelo State College, respectively.

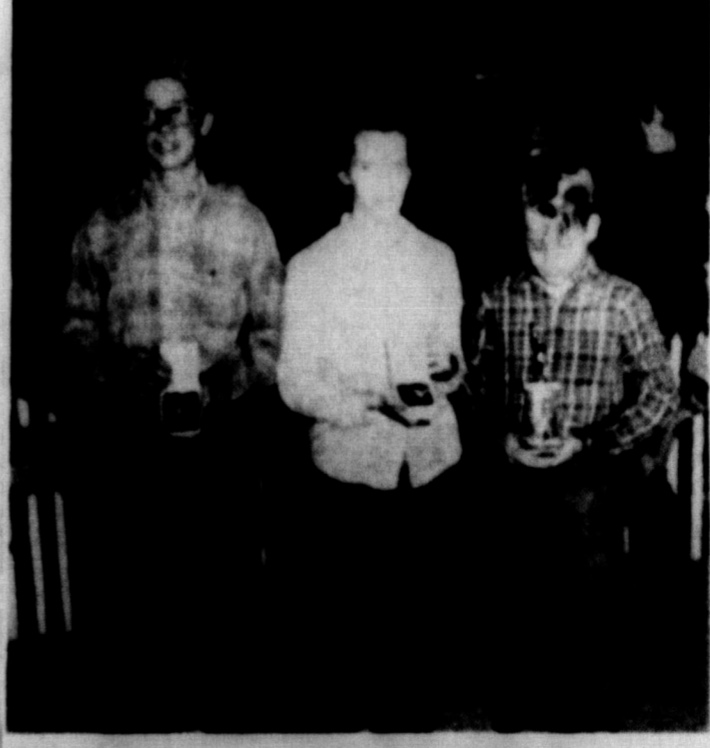

Shell Completes Fourth Producer In Tippet Field

The Tippet, West pay field of Crockett County gained its fourth producer with completion of Shell Oil Co. No. 1-27 Canyon, nine miles south of Camey, for a calculated solute open flow of 6,800 cubic feet of gas per acre with gas-liquid ratio of 333-1. Gravity of the gas was 67 degrees.

Production was 120 perforations at 5,078-87, 5,197-201 feet and 5,200 feet, which had been added with 3,420 gallons.

Drilled to 5,680 feet, a 5 1/2-inch casing was set, plugged back to 5,300 feet.

Location is 467 feet from the northwest and 772 from the northeast line of the southwest quarter of 31-H&TC.

Shell Oil Co., Midland 1-103 Mitchell, in 102-GN, 1 1/4-mile northwest post to the JM (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County, miles southwest of Camey, flowed gas rated at 20 cubic feet daily, for 10 1/2 hours when drilling reached 11,420 feet.

Drilling continued to 11,470 feet on a 15,500-contract.

Earlier, a strong gas volume unreported, was decreased to 500,000 cubic feet daily in one hour, encountered when drilling reached 11,288 feet.

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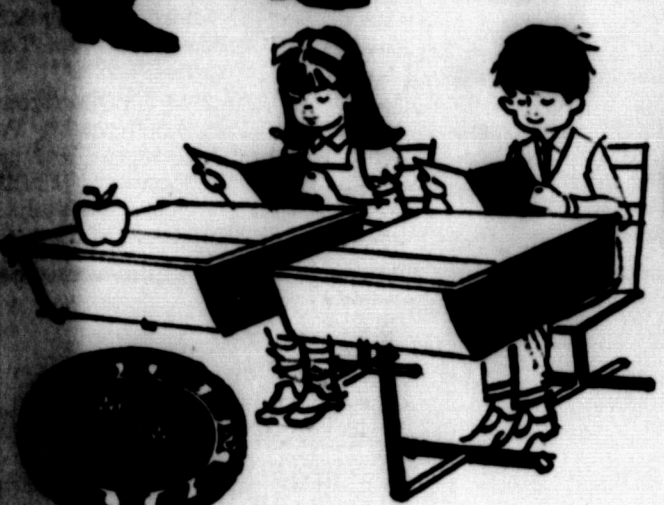

Hardeman is presently vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee which provides funds for state-supported institutions and educational facilities; is chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee which reviews all revenue measures, and is serving as a senior member of the Budget Board the vital legislative research arm on finances to fulfill state needs. During 11 regular and 11 special sessions of the Legislature, Hardeman has served as chairman or as a member of all major Standing Committees of the Senate, giving him experience and seniority valuable to the people of the 25th District in particular.

Hardeman's interest in constructive legislation for the district, for West Texas and the state is well known. He sponsored legislation providing that landowners, acting as agents for the state, shall share in bonuses, delay rentals and royalties from the leasing of mineral classified land for sulphur. 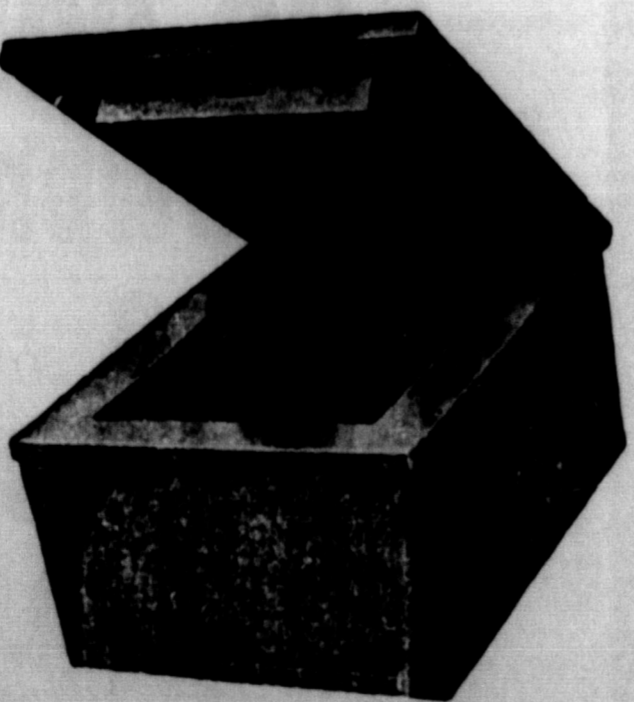

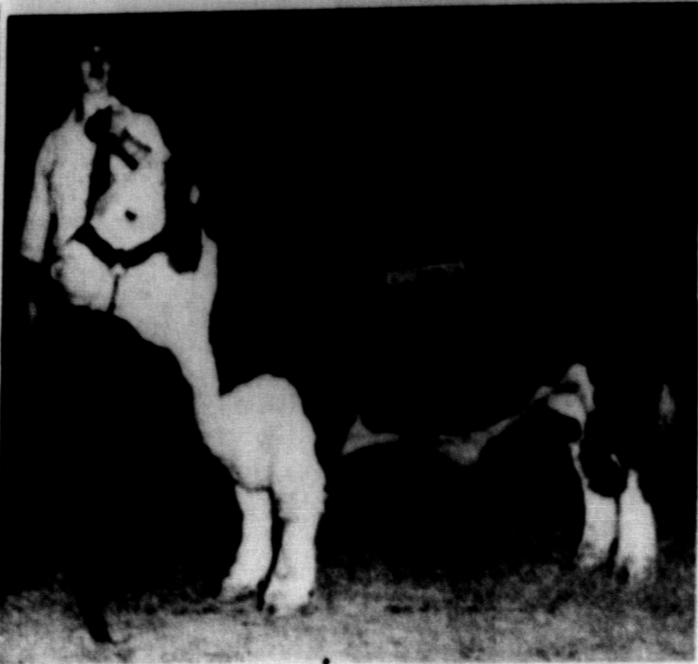

Early Settlers Recall Pioneer Days In County

Thirty-eight members and guests were present Monday evening when the Crockett County Historical Society met in the Civic Center with Dr. W. B. Robertson, president, presiding.

Following a brief business meeting program chairman Ted M. White and Mrs. Stephen Perner presented a panel of early Ozona settlers whose reminiscing delighted all.

Members of the panel included Paul Perner, Stephen Perner, Mrs. Will Baggett and Mr. and Mrs. Max Schneemann, all members of the pioneer Perner family, and Mrs. B. B. Ingham, member of the Dudley family.

The Perner family speakers told of coming to Crockett County in 1893 and establishing a business which covered many things, a mercantile store selling both groceries and dry goods (there were no ready-mades, Mrs. Baggett reminded). The businesses included a wagon yard, a blacksmith shop, windmill outfits and a post office. They told many amusing and interesting de-

tails of their early lives here. Mrs. Paul Perner was a member of the Odom family, who lived across the street from the Perners.

Schneemann told of his difficulties in learning the English language and how his father brought the family to this country, working his way as a laborer and taking most of his wages in sheep, the beginning of the large holdings he later accumulated.

Mrs. Ingham, who came to Ozona at the age of 12 years, told of walking, riding horseback and driving a buggy to school and of how the Perner girls were the first to speak to the new student and give her candy, a rare treat in those days.

Mr. Paul Perner told of trips made to numerous ranches on horseback to carry urgent messages and of driving Dr. Clayton on many calls to the country.

Following the program a question and answer period was held Mrs. Ted White told some interesting incidents of early days in this area.

Dr. Joe Logan recorded the program on tape for the Museum Library.
