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PERMANENTLY TEMPORARY

Bureaucrats, like the Communists, have a dictionary all their own. And like the Communists, they believe in co-existence — meaning, in the bureaucratic dictionary, that taxpayers must coexist with bureaucrats.

It was a mere 20 years ago that Secretary of State Geo. C. Marshall proposed, in a talk at Harvard, that the United States should furnish economic aid to the nations of Europe, to help them get on their feet. It was a "temporary" aid plan. The Congress authorized the distribution of \$12 billion during the next three-and-a-half years.

From this modest beginning, the idea grew with an alacrity that made Jack's beard seem a rotting vine. The "Marshall Plan" buriyeoned all over the globe, meanwhile going through such a kaleidoscopic variety of name changes that few members of Congress knew what was what. By the end of the first 10 years, it was known as the International Cooperation Administration. It was at that point that The Shield, house organ for I. C. A., announced that the agency would join other federal agencies in a length-of-service awards program. A bronze emblem would be made available at the end of ten years, and after the agency had been temporarily around for 50 years, the faithful would be eligible for a gold emblem with a three-point diamond. That is not to say that the I. C. A. would close down at the end of 50 years. After all, three-and-a-half years in the bureaucrat's dictionary means permanently temporary.

The Chairman of the Foreign Operations Subcommittee on Appropriations, Otto E. Passman, reported recently that total net foreign aid costs, 1946-1967 inclusive, were \$114.7 billion. The interest on what we have borrowed to give away this sum amounts to \$37.8 billion.

Billions have gone to Communist and other Socialist countries. And the taxpayer has got exactly what he paid for: strengthened Communist and socialist governments around the globe.

And some pretty length-of-service pins for the faithful grateful.

Crockett Gains Canyon Wildcat, Small Producer

B. W. Wiseman, Jr., et al, Midland, will drill a 7,500-foot Canyon sand wildcat in southwest Crockett County, 40 miles southwest of Ozona 3 1/2 miles south of the proposed Canyon opener of the V.I.P. field, seven miles east-northeast of the one-well Morrison (Wolfcamp gas) field, and 3/4 mile north-northwest of a 7,100-foot failure. It is the No. 1 Ellen-Kincaid.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 37 - ATCRR. Estimated ground elevation is 2,150 feet. The Canyon opener, Rod-

man Corp. No. 1-47 Harvick, was finalized Nov. 12, 1967, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.8 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 33,292 - 1, through perforations at 5-446-6,140 feet. Drilled to 7-200 feet, it was plugged back to 6,250 feet.

Texas American Oil Corp., Midland, will drill the No. 2 Pierce-Sunray as a 1/4-mile south offset to its No. 1 1-E Pierce, undesignated Clearfork oil producer, 20 miles southwest of Ozona and one mile southeast of the Clearfork oil opener and lone producer from that pay in the V.I.P. (Clearfork oil and gas) field.

Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of 3-BBB-TCRR. Contract depth is 2,800 feet. The No. 1-E Pierce was

finalized Dec. 22, 1967, for 44 barrels of water, with oil ratio of 167-1, through perforations at 2,578 to 18 feet.

Tenneco Oil Co. No. 4 University, Crockett County San Andres oil discovery, 10 miles north of Ozona and 1/2 miles northeast of the Marway Lane multipay field, was finalized to pump 10 barrels of 32 gravity oil, plus 10 barrels of water.

Production was three perforations at 1,522-29 feet and 1,535-39 feet, which has been acidized with 4,250 gallons. Top of pay was produced at 1,522 feet, on elevation 2,644 feet.

Drilled to 1,700 feet, a 4 1/2-inch casing set at 1,633 feet, it is plugged back 1,633 feet.

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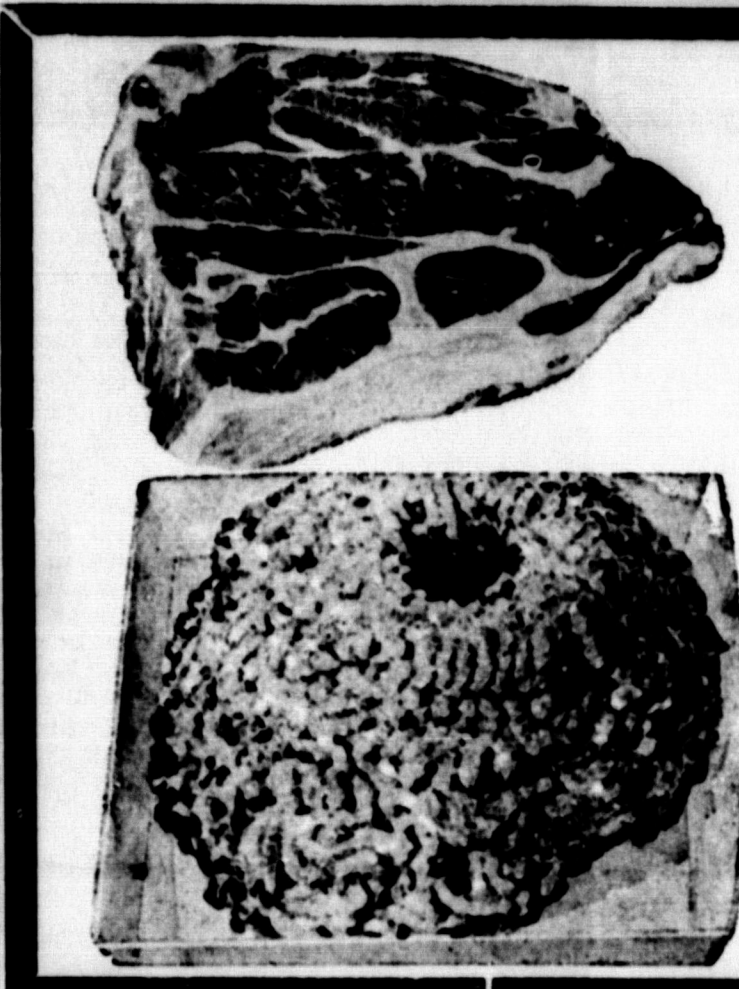

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Tunnel of Fudge Cake
1 1/2 cups of sugar
2 cups flour
1 pkg. Double Dutch Icing Mix
6 eggs
3 sticks margarine
1 cups pecans

Cream sugar and butter in electric mixer until fluffy; add eggs one at a time, beating after each addition. Gradually add flour (batter will become very thick). Beat in icing mix, then fold in pecans.

Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees. Makes one tube cake or two loaf cakes. Bake in greased and floured pans. Cool at least 2 hours before removing from pan. The last step is very important.

Apple Pudding
1/2 cup Crisco
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 1/2 cups chopped apples
1 cup flour
1 teas. soda
1 teas. cinnamon

1/4 teas. salt
1/4 teas. nutmeg
1/2 cup chopped nuts
Cream shortening and sugar and add egg, beat well. Mix in apples. Sift together flour, soda, salt and spices and add to apple mixture. Mix well and fold nuts. Batter will be spread in 8 or 9 inch square cake pan and bake 35 minutes at 350 degrees. Warm with hard sauce whipped or cl-cream.

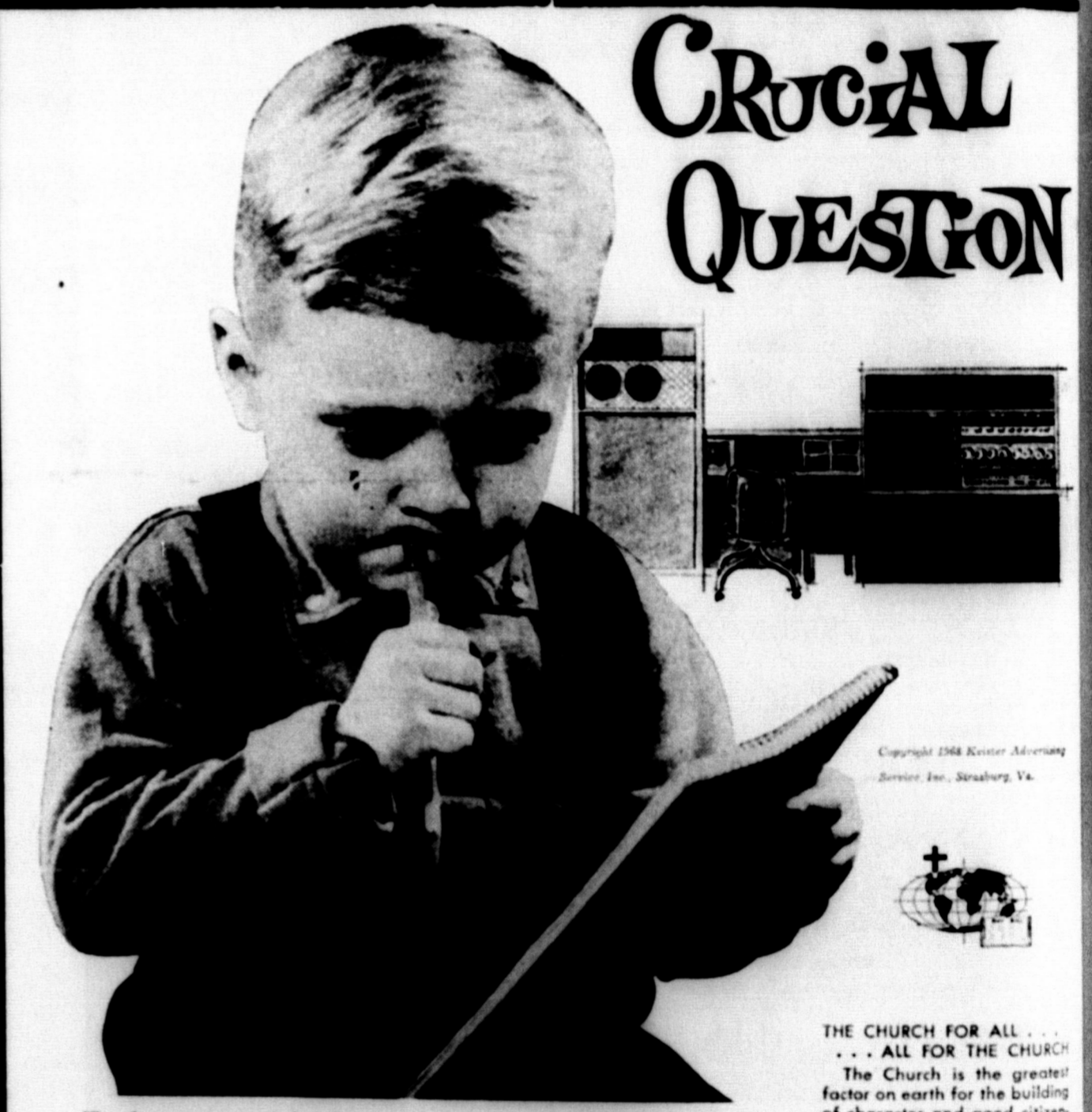
Hard Sauce

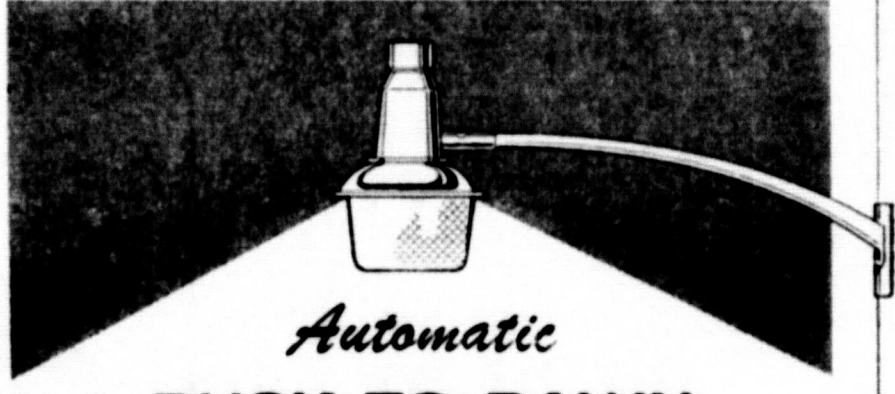

Wise and Otherwise
 Rambling Reflections
 By Dr. R. F. Curl

WISE AND OTHERWISE:

As is the case with all ministers I am often around sickness and in the presence of death I think I am sensitive and sympathetic in such circumstances. But always when the reality comes directly home to you, you have greater insight into the meaning of these universal events.

A week ago last Monday I went down to Austin to attend a meeting and go on to see a seriously ill brother at Pleasanton knowing that my only other brother was gravely ill in Amarillo.

On Tuesday I saw my Pleasanton brother who is in a Nursing Home and was greatly shaken to observe the deterioration he had suffered in the two months since last I saw him. I now feel most keenly the gnawing anxiety and concern one carries when helpless and hopeless sickness, that offers no hope for relief from the sufferer's agonizing pain save in a death that may be long delayed, comes to one near you.

I can testify more assuredly to the truth of what I have often said to those grieving in the presence of death: that living troubles can be worse than death.

The desire to help, the utter helplessness to do so, and the never-quite-out-of-the-mind undercurrent of anxiety all combine to bring a constant ache of cloudy worry.

But in the midst of such a state of mind I rejoice to be able to say that I find what I have often told others to be true: "And as thy days, so shall thy strength be."

On my return to San Antonio I found a message that my brother in Amarillo had died. But for him I have no grief, only great rejoicing and thanks for the long and full life which came to him.

He was next to oldest in our family of eleven children and I was third youngest. So there were many years between him and me. In fact I have no memory of his ever having lived in our home. We were a family of poor people. And I mean by this that our poverty was such that we had to worry about the roof over our heads, food for the table, and clothes for our backs. This meant that each left home early to work.

This brother, like two others, became a telegraph operator. When he had saved money he went back to school and graduated from the University of Alabama in 1906.

He chose dentistry for his profession and was active in practice for almost sixty years before his final heart attack two weeks ago. On the day before that occurred he

had worked on dentures in his Lab all day and after supper had watched the wrestling matches on TV until after 10:30 p. m.

His life had not only been long but also useful. He had been active in the Church, the Masonic Lodge, in golf until he was past seventy-five, Scouting, and many other civic activities.

He had in his years of semi-retirement led in paying the debt off the building of his Masonic Lodge and was until the last working in leading an effort to retire the debt on the sanctuary of the Church where he became a charter member in 1923.

To live long, to live well, to come peacefully and almost painlessly to the end, to have all children and grandchildren (save two) gathered from far and near to join in final tributes at the altar of his Church with hundreds of his friends present, left little to be desired from life.

We can all be grateful that there have been and are thousands and thousands of such lives and that some of them are near to us.

I sure hated to miss the basketball tournament but a late Friday afternoon return home and all the work that can accumulate when a preacher is gone and much of which had to be done before Sunday made it impossible. We can be proud of our Ozona teams. I understand there was real good community support for the events. That's fine: there's more value in our youth than in our

gas and oil and sheep and cattle.

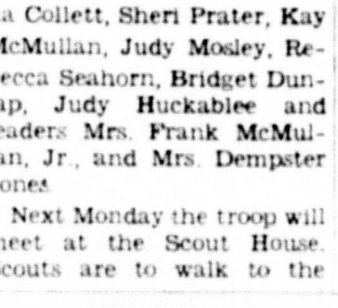

Two offsets have been scheduled to Texas American Oil Corp. No. 1-E V. I. Pierce, undesignated Clearfork oil producer 1½ miles southeast of the Clearfork oil opener and lone producer from that pay in the V.I.P. (Clearfork oil and gas) field of Crockett County, 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

Sunray DX Oil Co., Midland, will drill the No. 1 V. I. Pierce, a 2,900-foot test, as a location north offset.

Location, on a 480-acre lease, is 2,300 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 3-BBB-TCRR. Derrick floor elevation is 2,400 feet.

Gulf Oil Corp., will drill the No. 2-B V. I. Pierce, a 3,500-foot test, as a location east offset.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of 4-BBB-TCRR.

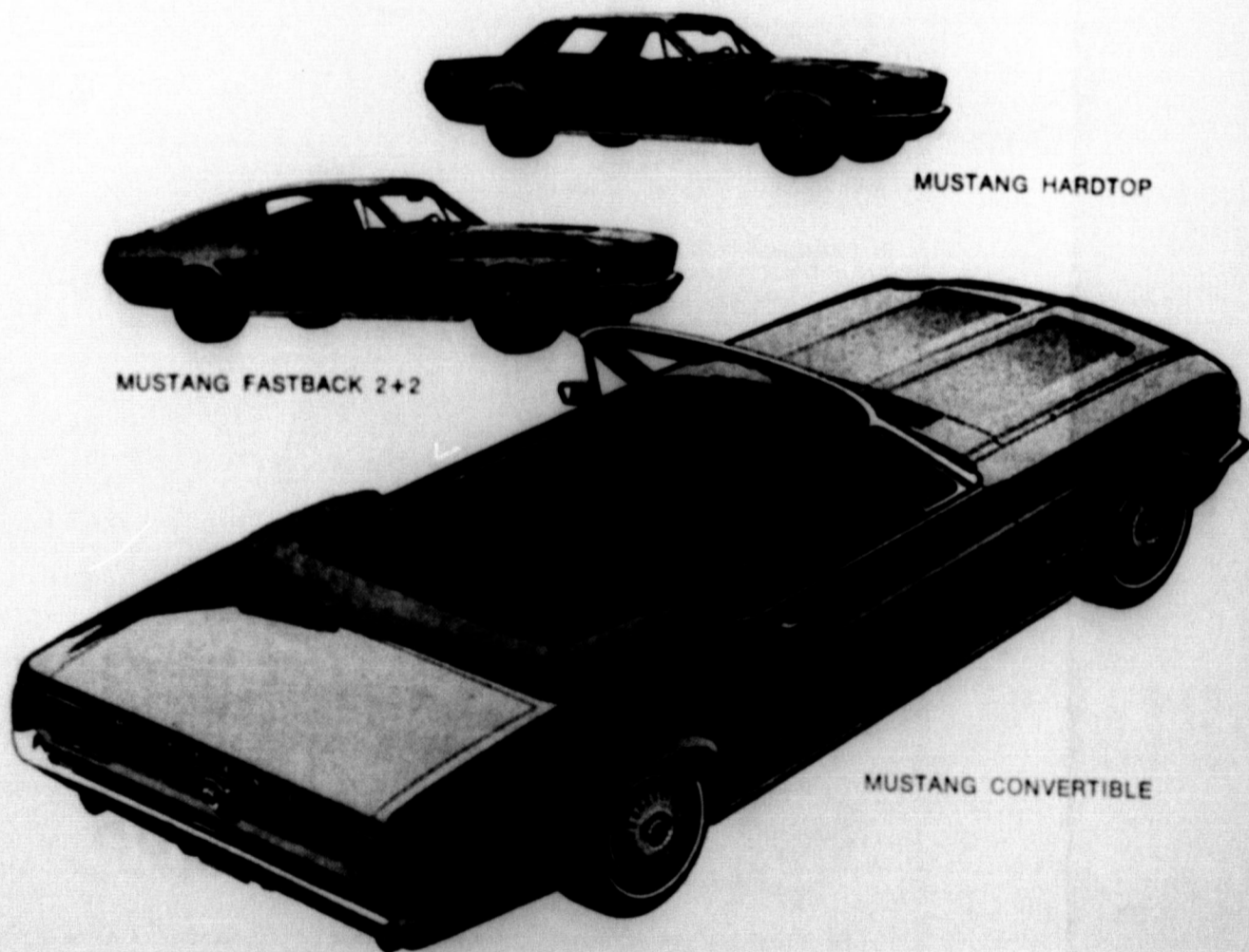
The No. 1-Pierce was finished Dec. 22, 1967, for 360 barrels of 36 gravity oil, plus 44 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 167-1, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations at 2,578 to 2,655 feet.

The V.I.P. opener, The Rodman Corp. No. 1 Victor Pierce was finished Oct. 11, 1967, to pump 14 barrels of 33 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 100-1, through perforations at 2,345-331 feet and 2,869-882 feet.
