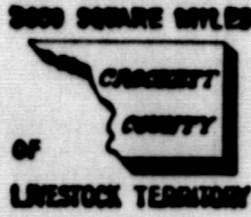

Blasting Opens Big Cave Under Hiway Project

Blasting operations incidental to construction work under way on Interstate 10, about 15 miles east of Ozona opened a small fissure in the ground which revealed a huge cavern under the construction site and under present U. S. Highway 290 last week.

Workmen for the M. C. Winters Construction Co. discovered the small opening, about two feet across, and upon examination discovered the huge cavern beneath.

Kent Johnston, county geologist, later explored and mapped the underground cavern and made geological study of the formations. The cave had already been badly looted when Johnston entered it, he said, but his conclusion was that the cave was for the most part dead, the only living formations being near the surface when temperature changes caused more condensation.

It was about 22 feet from the surface to the bottom of the cave at the point of the opening. A room about 100 feet in diameter and about 50 feet in height opened out, mostly under present U. S. 290, Johnston said. A small room at lower level is about 50 by 70 feet and the ceiling (Continued on Last Page)

Gary Sutton To Play For Baylor University

One of the most sought after football players in the State, Ozona's Gary Sutton, signed a pre-enrollment agreement with Baylor University Tuesday morning as coaches from colleges and universities throughout the state harvest this year's crop of high school football material.

John Bridgers, Baylor's head coach and athletic director, was on hand to sign young Sutton. The signing took place in the Sutton home, with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Sutton, and Chick Womack, Ozona High School track coach and junior high football coach, looking on.

Sutton was among the first players to sign and the first for Baylor.

"We are very fortunate to have Gary," coach Bridgers said. "He was one of the top prospects in the state and in a poll of Southwest Conference coaches, received the second most votes of any player in the state." Bridgers was referring to the blue chip team selections of Southwest Conference coaches, consisting of the 20 top football players in the state available for recruitment this year.

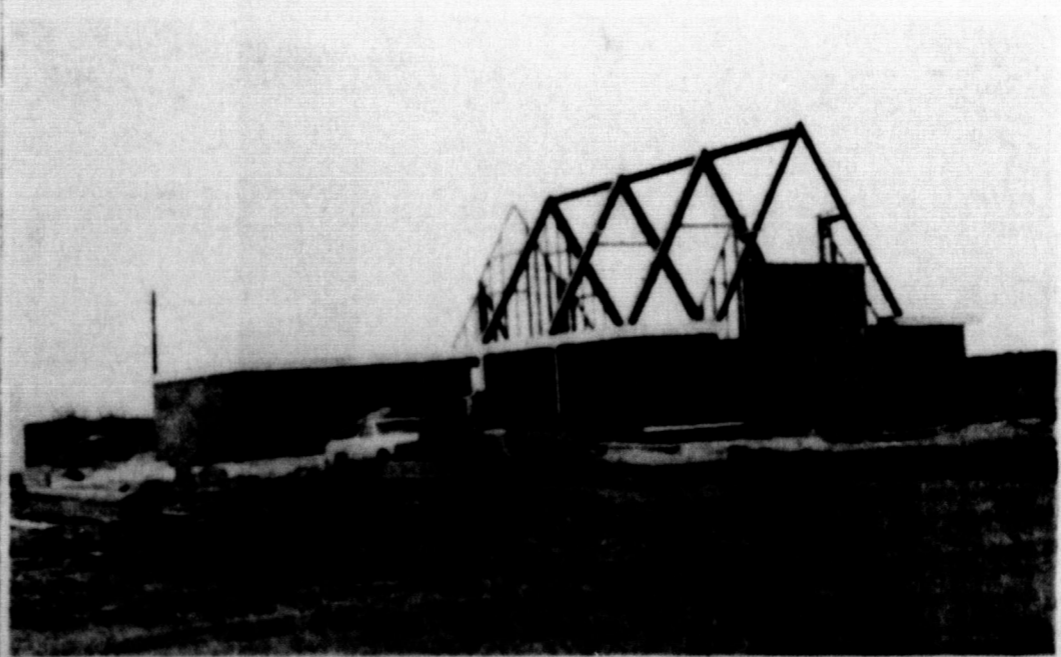
23 Lettermen Form Nucleus Of OHS Tracksters

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Pompushkes

(apple-cheese fritters)
1 cup tart apple, peeled and grated

1 cup crumbled creamed cottage cheese
2 eggs, beaten
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1 1/2 teas. baking powder
1 teas. granulated sugar
1/4 teas. each salt, ground cardamon, nutmeg, and cinnamon

Dash mace
Dairy sour cream
Crisco Oil for frying
Confectioners' sugar

Mix apple and cheese. Add eggs and mix well. Sift dry ingredients and add alternately to first mixture with 1/4 cup sour cream. Beat until light. Put oil to depth of 1 1/2 inch in skillet. Heat to 375 degrees. Drop batter from teaspoon into hot oil and fry until golden brown on one side. Turn and brown other side. Drain on absorbent paper. Dust with confectioners' sugar serve with sour cream.

Ellenburger Test Spotted On Bailey Ranch In Crockett

Southern Minerals Corp., Midland, will drill a 10,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 14 miles northeast of Ozona, one mile east of production in the south portion of the five-well Ozona, Northeast (Canyon gas) field and seven miles southeast of the Buckhorn (Ellenburger as) field. It is the No. 1 John R. Bailey.

Location, on a 1,991.2-acre lease, is 660 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of 4-EF-C&MRR. Texas American Oil Corp., Midland, will drill the No. 4 Pierce-Sunray as a location west offset to its No. 1-E V. I. Pierce, middle Clearfork opener and lone producer from that pay in the V.I.P. (lower Clearfork oil and Clearfork oil and Clearfork gas) field of Crockett County, 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 2,173 feet from the east lines of 3-BBB-TCRR. Contract depth is 2-800 feet; ground elevation 2,315 feet.

The No. 1-E Pierce was finished Dec. 22, 1967, for 360 barrels of 36 gravity oil, plus 44 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 167-1, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforation at 2,578 to 2,655 feet. Slated a 13,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat, it was drilled to 12,390 feet and plugged back to 2,790 feet.

Lions Finish 2nd In Championship Iraan Is First

The Ozona Lions dropped their final West Zone Basketball game last Friday night to the Iraan Braves 61-77 as All-District David Wilson hit 35 points. The Braves finished zone competition with a 6-0 record with the Lions in second place with a 4-2, followed by Rankin and Sanderson. Iraan will face Sonora in the playoff game for the district title tomorrow night in San Angelo.

Leading the scoring for the Lions, who finished the season with a 16-11 record, was Beto Vargas with 21 points, followed by Don Huff with 14 and Marlin Farris with 10. David Huff, Larry Kilgore and Fleet Coates added 5 points each. The first quarter was close with the Braves holding a 15-13 edge, but the Zone Champs added 9 points to their lead for a 40 to 29 halftime advantage. The Lions played out even terms with Iraan in the 3rd stanza, but were outscored in the final quarter 20-16.

The Ozona B-Team, who edged 55-54 despite a tremendous comeback. At one point early in the game, the B-Teamers were behind 5-20, but came roaring back, led by David Pagan and Tommy Jenkins, with 17 and 15 points respectively. The lead changed hands several times in the final stanza before Iraan squeaked out the 1 point victory. The Lion B-Team closed out the season with a 11-4 record, with two of their losses being by only one point.

Vargas and Farris paced the Lions in scoring in the 27 game schedule, both averaging in double figures. Vargas had 401 points for a 14.9 average, and Farris had 334 points for a 12.4 average. Season scoring for the rest of the varsity squad include David Huff, 185 points; Kilgore, 162 points; Don Huff, 155 points; Randal Clepper, 103 points; Coates, 78 points; Rodney Pagan, 22 points; David Pagan, 21 points; James Appel, 16 points; Duane Childress, 13 points; Johnny Barbee, 12 points; and Kirk Boyd, 3 points.

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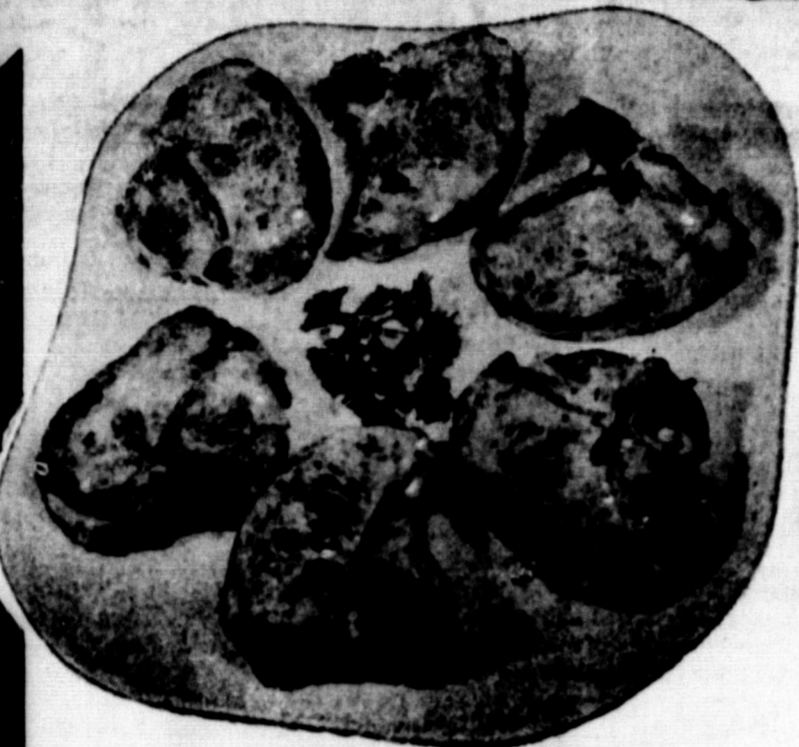

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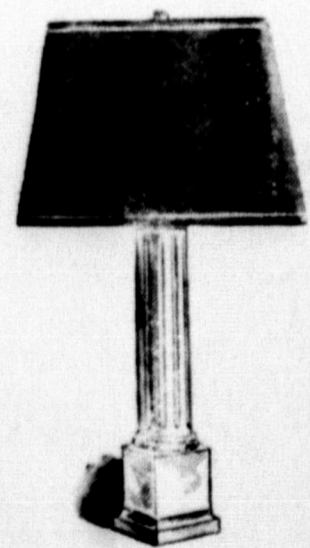
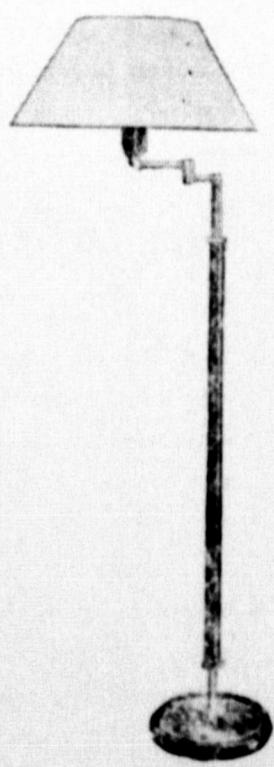

Confirmer Set In VIP Field; Completion Try

Sunray DX Oil Co., Midland, will drill the No. 2 V. I. Pierce 1/2 mile southeast of the lower Clearfork oil opener and 3/4 mile north and slightly west of the middle Clearfork opener and lone producers from these pays in the V.I.P. (Clearfork oil and gas) field of southwest Crockett County, 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 467 feet from the north and west lines of the northeast quarter of 3-BBB-TCRR. Contract depth is 2,900 feet with rotary, derrick floor elevation, 400 feet. The lower Clearfork opener, Rodman Corp., Odessa, No. 1 Victor Pierce, was finished Oct. 9, 1967, to pump 14 barrels of oil, no water through perforations at 2,245-2,331 feet and 2,869-2,882 feet.

Tippett Field Test Shows Oil

Shell Oil Co. No. 4-B Forrestall, in 41-31-H&TC, Crockett County project slated as a 3/4-mile northwest outpost to the lone upper one-mile northeast outpost to the lone lower Leonard producer in the Tippett, South field of Pecos County, 10 miles southeast of McCamey, recovered 372 feet of oil, 90 feet of oil and gas-cut mud and 1,038 feet of slightly gas-cut salt water on a drillstem tests in the Wolfcamp.

Tool was open one hour and 20 minutes on the test at 5,248-5,340 feet. Flow-in pressure was 272-754 pounds; one-hour initial shut-in pressure was 2,417 pounds; and three-hour final shut-in pressure, 2,036 pounds.

Drilling continued below 5,900 feet on a 7,000-foot contract.

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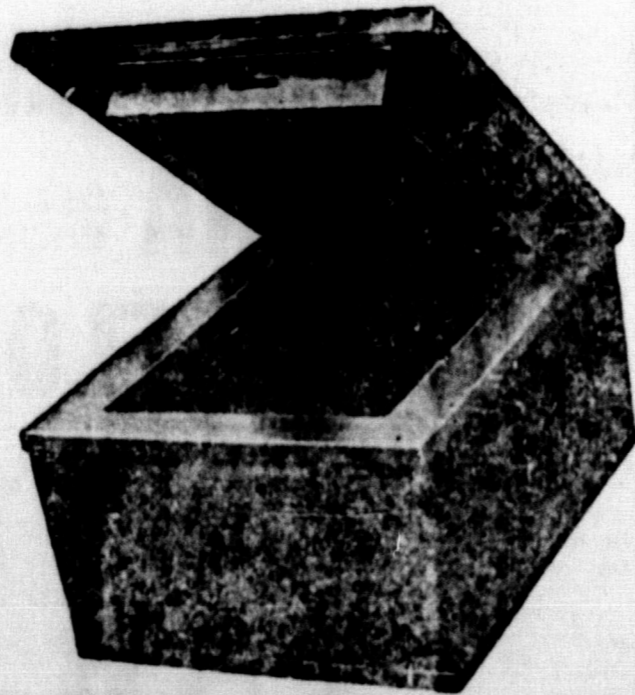

ing is only about 7 to 8 feet high.

The cave under the highway presents no hazard to the highway in the future, W. F. Dixon, resident highway engineer, said. The cave depth is about 57 feet below Interstate 10 and 17 feet of solid rock, well arched for additional strength, is below US 290.

A number of persons entered the newly opened cave and much of the cave formations were removed. The cave had no other opening and the oxygen was almost exhausted by the dozen or so persons who were in the cave about an hour and a half, Johnston said. There was no indication of any further extensions to the cave and it apparently presented no possibilities of use as a scenic attraction.

The cave opening will be

sealed and mostly likely will not be entered again, highway authorities said. Core drilling by highway department contractors revealed very little of the cave under new IS 10, Mr. Dixon said. Most of the cave area is under US 290 but barely extends beyond the right of way.
