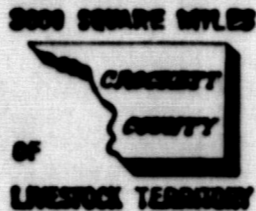

Lion Track Team Chalk Up Second Straight Victory

With 22 of 28 team members scoring points, Coach Chick Womack's Lion track team scored their second straight victory last Saturday at the Sonora Relays, racking up a winning total of 140 points. Sonora finished in 2nd place with 110 points, and the Eldorado Eagles grabbed the 3rd spot with 84 points.

This Saturday the Lions will be out to win their 3rd championship trophy as they are entered in the meet in Eldorado. The meet in Eldorado is set for two divisions, with AA schools in one group and A and B schools tabbed for the other division. Most of the 8A schools are scheduled to be on hand as district coaches are beginning to round their squads into shape for the district meet to be held later in Eldorado.

Lions got only 3 first places at the Sonora meet, but squad members picked many vital points with 2nd's, 3rd's, 4th's 5th's and 6th's. Weightman Gary Sutton set a record in the discus with a toss of 160'1" and placed 2nd behind 260 pound John Mayo of Eldorado in the shot, but it took a tremendous heave of 59'1" by Mayo to beat Sutton, who continued to improve as he hit a (Continued on Last Page)

SAIGON, DETROIT, NEWARK, WAITS

There are well over two million people in Saigon. Yet it took only a few thousand enemy soldiers to disrupt the life of that city, terrorize its inhabitants, kill hundreds, destroy property worth millions.

It is clear that the appearance of the invaders did not set off the popular uprising expected. But even if one-half of one percent of the residents of the city had supported the communist forces — ten thousand residents, let us say — that number was sufficient to cache major stores of arms and ammunition, to provide shelter and food, to guide the invaders to choice targets within the city.

After the riots in Detroit, Newark and Waits and other American cities last summer it was estimated that something like one-half of one percent of the residents took an active part in the riots. But that number was sufficient to do great property damage, and to destroy the morale of city residents. Confidence in government failed.

The lesson of Saigon is the same as the lesson of Detroit, Newark and Waits. The outpouring of money into Vietnam, or into American cities, through programs designed to "relieve poverty" or to further "pacification" will not make a difference. That path has been followed consistently both in Vietnam and in the United States, without providing any relief. Still, we hear voices urging ever more aid to our country.

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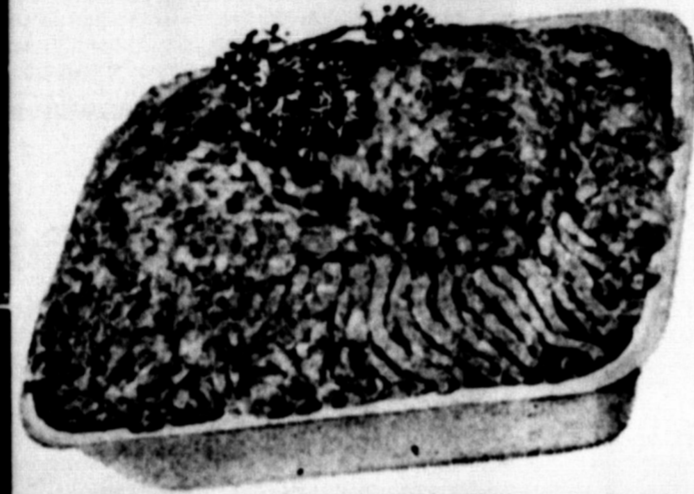

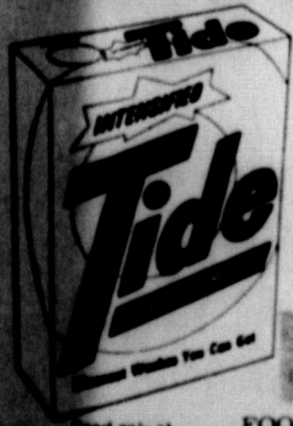

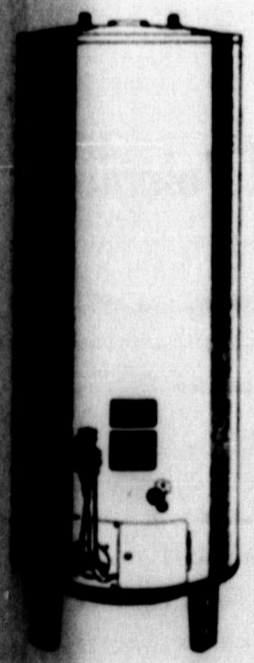

Bacon scalloped potatoes
6 cups thinly sliced peeled
potato
1/2 pound of bacon, cooked
and crumbled
3/4 cup minced celery
1/2 cup chopped shallots or
onion
3 tbs. minced parsley
3 cloves garlic, minced
2 cups grated Gruyere
cheese
Salt, Pepper and Papprika
1/4 cup olive oil
2/3 cup undiluted evapor-
ated milk
Butter a 13x9x2 baking
pan and make a layer in
bottom with two cups potato
slices. Cover with half the

bacon, half the vegetables
and half the cheese. Season
with salt, pepper and papri-
ka and sprinkle with 2 ta-
blespoons oil. Repeat layers.
Add a third layer of 2 cups
potato, season and sprinkle
with 2 tablespoons oil. Pour
milk over top. Bake in hot

Wise and Otherwise
Rambling Reflections
By Dr. R. F. Curl

One of the things that surprised me when we moved to Ozona nine months ago was the number and beauty of the pecan trees. Were Ozona not such an apt name for the salubrious climate we enjoy, our town might well be called "Pecan Paradise".

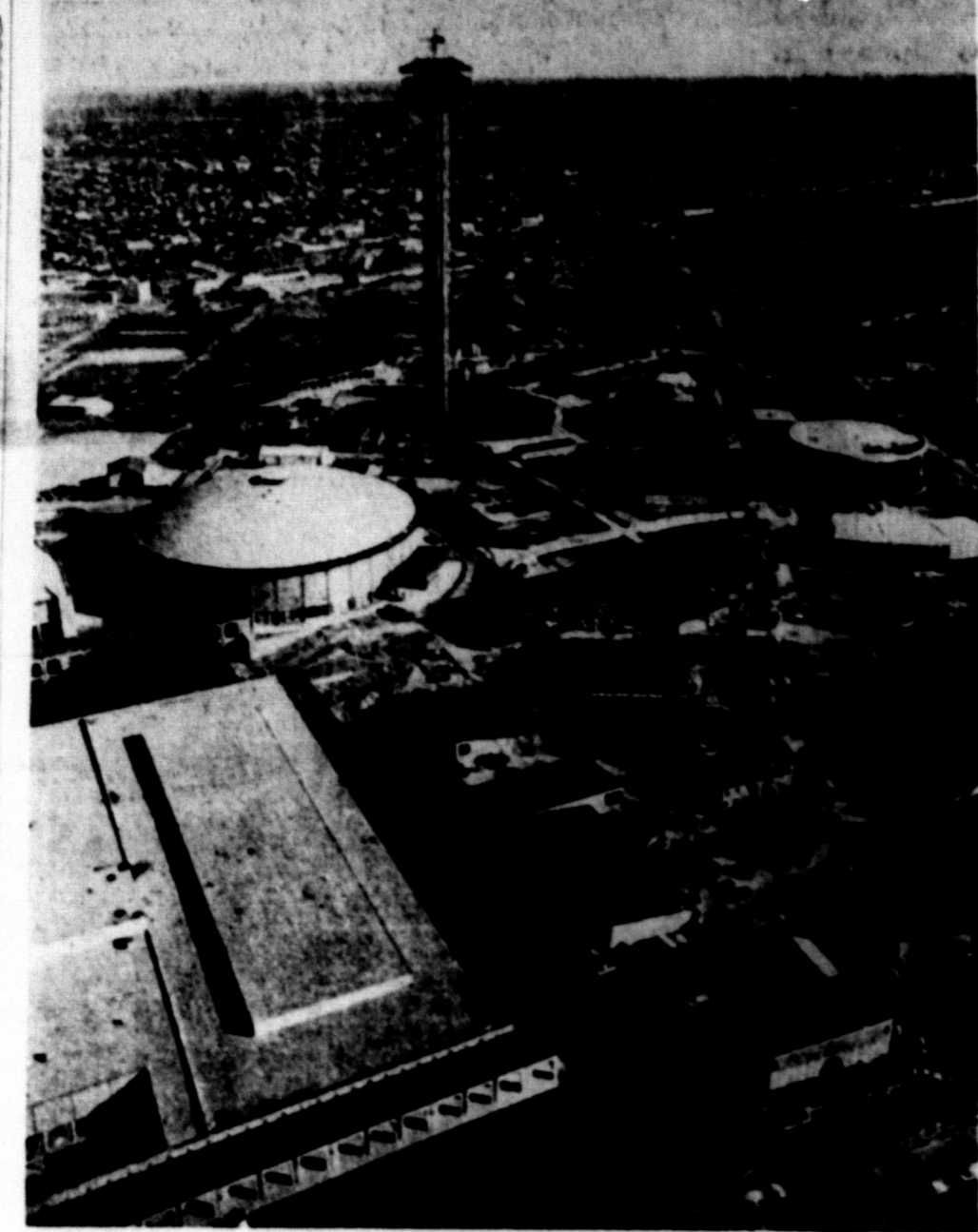
Yet I understand that few of our trees in town were planted by nature. Nearly, if not all, were put out by hand by far-seeing pioneers who dreamed of the soft shade, the sparkling green, and the luscious fruits the tree would afford. It took bold and daring faith to plant a pecan tree in the hard and rocky soil native to our town. But the marvelous trees that dot our entire community are but symbols of the pioneering faith that wrought out of a hard rebellious soil an earthly paradise of good things.

I am told that Mr. B. B. Ingham, Sr. in the early days when pecans were being planted, claimed that the pecan would grow even in solid rock if the planter would blast the hole to open fissures for the roots to creep through and then keep the trees well-watered. His judgment was vindicated by some of the beautiful trees we now enjoy in our park.

The pecan is native to North America and belongs to the sturdy hickory family. It grows from southern Illinois southward and westward through Texas and even down into Mexico.

San Saba County seems to be the center for pecan production which in 1965 in Texas amounted to some 65,000,000 pounds valued at \$11,000,000. A Texas Pecan Association has been formed with headquarters at A&M and constant research goes on for the improvement and care of the trees and for best marketing procedures.

All the nation is indebted to the South for two remark-

able American delicacies, the pecan pie and pralines.

The one fly in the pecan story is the fact that this most popular American nut grown above ground (It is exceeded in use and popularity by the humble peanut) is also the richest of almost any food, containing 70% or more pure fat.

New machinery for mass shelling and processing is adding to the profit in pecan production. And even for those of us who crack and sell for ourselves a new cracker has been developed.

When Mr. Tom Harris, Sr. put them on the market last fall, the machines became immediately popular and while I have heard many a word of praise for them I have yet to hear a criticism.

But what I started out to say was that now nearly all the abundant crop of last year has fallen from the trees, we can begin to anticipate the leafing which will make our town again pleasing and charming not only to us, but to visitors and strangers who pass through.

Not many of us have planted a tree in our life. But we enjoy the fruits of those planted by our fathers. "Others have labored and we are entered into their labors." Reminding us that mankind is an endless, never-breaking procession down the centuries.

We all might plant a tree this Spring; or make a garden, or clean a weed patch to add to the beauty of our city. The pecans planted and grafted long ago stand silent reminders of what one man can do. For everyone of them was finally the product of

Gulf Completes Pay Opener In Tippet Field

Gulf Oil Corp. No. 7-E J. H. Tippet, recently completed 5,050-foot Wolfcamp oil opener in the Tippet, West multipay field of Crockett County, which is dually completed from the lower Leonard in the Tippet field, nine miles southeast of McCamey, has been triply completed as a lower Clearfork gas pay opener in the Tippet, West field.

It was finished from the lower Clearfork for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.48 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 184,200-1. Gravity of the liquid was unreported. Production was through perforations at 3,502-04 feet, which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons.

Completion from the 5,050 foot Wolfcamp oil was Feb. 26, for 169.08 barrels of 39.6 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 3,061-1, through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,106-108; 5,117-119 and 5,245-247 feet.

It was finished Feb. 1 from the lower Leonard for 107.76 barrels of 43.8 gravity oil, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,692-694 feet.

Completed still earlier from the lower Wolfcamp, this zone at 5,552-554 feet has been plugged off.

Location is 3,840 feet from the northeast and 660 feet from the southeast lines of 30-31-H&TC

and the bridegroom is an employee of M. C. Winters Construction Co. They will make their home in Ozona.

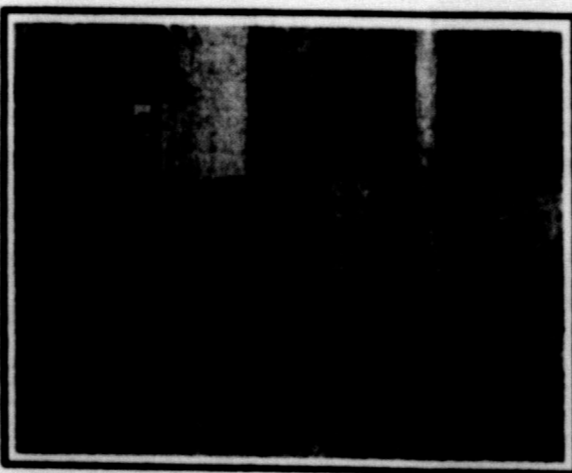

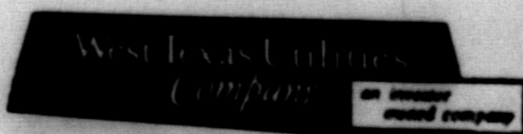
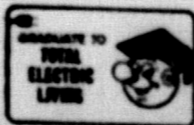
