## Ozona Group Presents Request to Commission For Work On Hiway 163

Attention of the Texas Highway Commission was strongly focused on State Highway 163 south of Ozona to Del Rio and the Amistad lake area Monday morning when a delegation of more than 20 Ozonans, supported by other delegations from Del Rio, Big Lake, Big Spring, Lamesa and supporting letters from other towns to the north, appeared before the Commission at its April public hearing in San



Angelo Monday. The Commission granted the audience to the Crockett county group to hear its request and supporting data for earliest possible extension of present rebuilding program on the highway in Crockett county and for straightening many of the large number of dangerous curves on the road in Val Verde county through the maintenance division of the Highway Department.

The imminent jump in traffic on the route, occasioned by the possible early closing on the Amistad dam was cited by Byron Williams spokesman for the Crockett delegation.

The Commission members promised to give the request earnest consideration and Herb Petry, member of the Commission and former chairman, told the group that the Commission had no argument with the merits of the request and even ventured a hint that there could be a possible use of Maintenance to eliminate the more dangerous curves as a means of cutting down on accidents on the route.

The delegation had supporting letters from Chambers of Commerce in Midland, Odessa, Stanton, Lamesa, Amarillo and other towns in an area which would be interested in the road improvement as a more direct route to the Amistad lake. The area embraces a population of approximately a million persons, Williams told the Commission.

County Judge Bernice Jones, who headed the Ozona delegation, added a word from the Crockett County Commissioners Court. She assured the Commission that Crockett County is ready to do its part in the further development of the highway.

The Ozona delegation, which occupied about three fourths of the meeting chamber in the San Angelo city hall when its time came to present the Hiway 163 request, was composed of Judge Jones, Byron Williams, Oscar Kost, Bill Cooper, Ewart White, L. B. T. Sikes, Pete Jacoby, Mrs. S. M. Harvick, Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Baker, Charlie Applewhite, A. R. Rutherford, O. D. West, Leonard Boyd, Wayne Loury, Carl Montgomery, Bill Watson, Jimmy Evans, Dorris Haire, James Baggett, Joe Williams, L. D. Kirby and Rusty Smith, and Chester Kenley of San Angelo, with a ranch in Crockett county, also registered with the Ozona delegation.

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The drive was conducted Sunday for the remainder of the town. Collections have not been totaled yet, with donations still coming in through the mail. Total collections will be announced by Mrs. Hunnicutt next week.

## County Ranchers Pocket Million In Incentive Pay

Crockett county producers of wool and mohair pocketed almost a "cool million" the first of this week when checks were distributed from the local ASCS office representing the 1967 incentive payments on wool and mohair sold in the county in 1967. Cliff Elder, ASCS office manager, announced.

Incentive payments for the 1967 marketing year on both wool and mohair reached a total of \$994,596 to Crockett county producers.

Wool and lamb producers numbering 163 received \$627,740 in incentive payments on sales of 2,119,601 pounds of shorn wool and 7,827,666 pounds of unshorn lambs.

From this amount, a promotion fund of \$37,485 at 1 1/2 cents per pound of shorn wool and 7 1/2 cents per hundredweight of lambs, was deducted. This fund will be turned over to the National Wool Council for use in advertising and promotion of use of wool. This deduction was authorized by a vote of producers in referendums in 1966 and 1967.

A total of 116 producers of mohair in the county received incentive payments totalling \$366,856 on sale of 985,686 pounds of mohair during the year. From this amount a promotion fund of \$14,785 was deducted, at the rate of 1 1/2 cents per pound of shorn mohair. The total promotion fund deductions in the county was \$52,270, which will be used in promoting use of wool and mohair in competition with man-made fibers.

This year's rate of incentive payment is the highest since 1958. Mr. Elder pointed out. The 1967 incentive payments rate on wool was 65.8 percent and 86.8 percent on mohair.

The national average price for which wool sold in 1967 was 39.8 cents per pound and for mohair 40.9 cents. Crockett county's average price was 42 cents for wool and 44.6 cents for mohair.

The Red Cross fund drive, after the house-to-house canvass conducted this year is \$1,200 and so far the county is over \$800 shy of meeting its goal.

### Man Shot After Altercation On Street Here Sun.

An argument in front of a grocery store on the south side of town resulted in the death by gunshot of Robert C. Sanchez, 22, and the hospitalization of Alejos Lara, 70, with fractures and bruises Sunday night about 8 o'clock. Lara was subsequently charged with murder without malice by the Crockett County grand jury.

Following the argument between the two men an altercation ensued in which Lara fell, or was knocked to the ground, suffering a fractured pelvis. He returned to his home and when young Sanchez followed, he allegedly shot him with a small caliber rifle in the front yard of the residence.

Lara is free on bond and is in satisfactory condition at Crockett County Hospital. He will be tried at a future session of 112th District Court.

### Six Indicted By Grand Jury; Four Sentenced

A Crockett County grand jury, convened Monday in 112th District Court by Judge Charles Sherrill of Ft. Stockton, returned six indictments. The grand jury's deliberations were guided by District Attorney Dixon Mahon.

Bill Brown was indicted on a charge of theft of pipe from the Gulf Oil Co. lease in Shannon field of Crockett county in June 1966.

Driving while intoxicated, subsequent offense, was the charge in an indictment against Simon Longoria of Ozona.

Humberto Cervantez is charged with burglary in another indictment. The indictment charge Cervantez with burglary at the home of Bella Rodriguez.

An unusual charge is contained in an indictment against Robert Hutcheson of Big Lake. Hutcheson is charged with the slaughter of two cows in a pasture on the Vic Montgomery ranch in northwest Crockett county. Hutcheson is alleged to have killed one cow by striking her with a car and the other by gunshot. The offense is alleged to have occurred in October of 1967.

Juan Hernandez, one of three Mexican nationals arrested on the Boyd Baker ranch north of Ozona, was indicted for burglary and theft at the Bill Hoover Holcomb ranch in south Crockett county. The other two Mexicans, both juveniles, were turned over to the Borden.

The Ozona High School golf team won first place in the Robert Lee tournament Friday after a sudden death play-off with Sonora, bringing home the first championship trophy in the history of the school. At the district tournament, Iraan won the championship and Ozona again tied with Sonora with scores of 333. In the 9-hole play-off Ozona won by one stroke and took second place with a 164.

Duane Childress beat Pat Gladden of Iraan for medalist in a nine-hole play-off. Childress shot a 34, 2 under par, while Gladden had a 39. Both boys were tied at 77 before the play-off.

Other individual scores included Larry Don Webb, 79; David Williams, 87; Johnny Barbee, 90 and Sooner Williams, 90.

The team will travel to Lubbock for the regional tournament Friday, April, 19.

Iraan meet. Rankins Red Devils finished second with 93 points and Sonora was third with 87.

The Lions copped the title in their own annual meet to tap off the season and in succession dominated meets at Sonora, Eldorado, San Angelo and Iraan.

With this impressive record behind them, Coaches Chick Womack and Grosse Moehler will take their charges to the District Meet in Eldorado this weekend. The Lions will rank as favorite to win the District and their sixth meet title.

Ozona's Wesley West, who won the pole vault event at Iraan Saturday, has shown improvement in his vaulting and should be a factor in the coming District meet at Eldorado. 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## THE PROBLEM-MAKERS

One of the most commonly heard questions these days is, "How in the world did the United States ever get into its present mess?"

Many attempts have been made to answer this question but it is obvious that the answers — and the reasons that should be drawn — don't sink in. We keep making the same mistakes, or more precisely we keep putting into office the same types who made the present mess for us.

Since it seems to do little good to try to explain why things are in such a muddle at home and abroad, maybe we ought to ask ourselves who got us into our present precarious position. With this information we may be able to cast more intelligent votes in the weeks and months ahead.

The list of those who put this nation behind the 8-ball is a long one. Going back to the Red Decade, the 1930's, it would include those who promoted recognition of Soviet Russia, when that country was on the verge of collapse, and it would include those who plugged the Communist cause up to and throughout World War II, at the expense of the United States of America.

It would, of course, include such worthies as Alger Hiss, Harry Dexter White, the Rosenbergs and others who did so much to change the map of the world and upset the balance of power, to the detriment of the U.S. And the "honor roll" would include a horde of highly influential people in and out of government who, for various reasons, supported these characters even after they were exposed for their

actions. And don't let anyone say to you that this seems like ancient history. Actually it was only two decades ago that our messengers connived in allowing Eastern Europe and much of Asia, including China, to fall to Communism. The Korean "police action" followed.

One might think that we learned something from that lesson, particularly about the kind of people who consistently back Communist causes to the detriment of the U.S. But apparently we have learned nothing. The same mentality responsible for those earlier disasters became evident in more recent debacles and fiascos — the Bay of Pigs, the Berlin Wall, the forming of a coalition government in Laos, our disastrous disarmament policy, and so on ad nauseum. And where are the people who made such calamitous blunders? Are they in jail, in hiding, or shamed into silence?

No. Some of the worst offenders are sounding off stridently even today — and being listened to respectfully. Which probably proves that P. T. Barnum was right.

Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson will head a group of dignitaries including Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall, who will preside over opening ceremonies April 6.

Courts Speak — In a landmark case, the State Supreme Court found Methodist Church's Hilltop Village non-profit retirement home, which has some residents who pay up to \$215 a month but cares for others on a charity basis, does not meet the test for tax exemption as a purely public charity.

Constitutional Revision — Judicial sub-committee of the State Constitutional Revision Commission has recommended that judges of the Texas Supreme Court of Criminal Appeals be appointed rather than elected.

Recommendations call for appointment by the governor or of top court judges from a panel submitted by a special nominating commission. Judges occasionally would "run against their records" on a public ballot, with voters marking their preference

for continued service or judicial retirement. Where judges are rejected, new appointment would follow.

Norman Register, director of revenue and finance for the City of Dallas, says Texas' \$250 home-furnishings exemption from ad valorem taxes should be either increased or done away with. Register told the local-governments committee that in 1876 when the \$250 figure was written into the constitution it was enough money to furnish a house. Now, however, that's ridiculous, he said.

Another witness before the committee said that Lubbock and Dallas are the only two cities in the state which effectively collect their ad valorem taxes on cars.

Revision commission heard strong recommendation from former Gov. Allan Shivers for four-year-terms for governors and advice from Municipal Advisory Council that cities are losing "tens of millions" of dollars in bond interest rates because of antiquated provisions in Texas law.

"American Party" Name Free — Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has ruled

that the "American Party" label may be used by George Wallace for President supporters in Texas.

Opinion, requested by Secretary of State Roy R. Barera, noted that the American Party name has not been certified on a Texas general election ballot since 1920, therefore it is a "pre-existing" party whose name is protected from use today.

Martin also held that county clerks must accept for filing American Party required notice for its conventions and registrars must furnish the party registered voter lists for not more \$5 a set in counties where it holds conventions.

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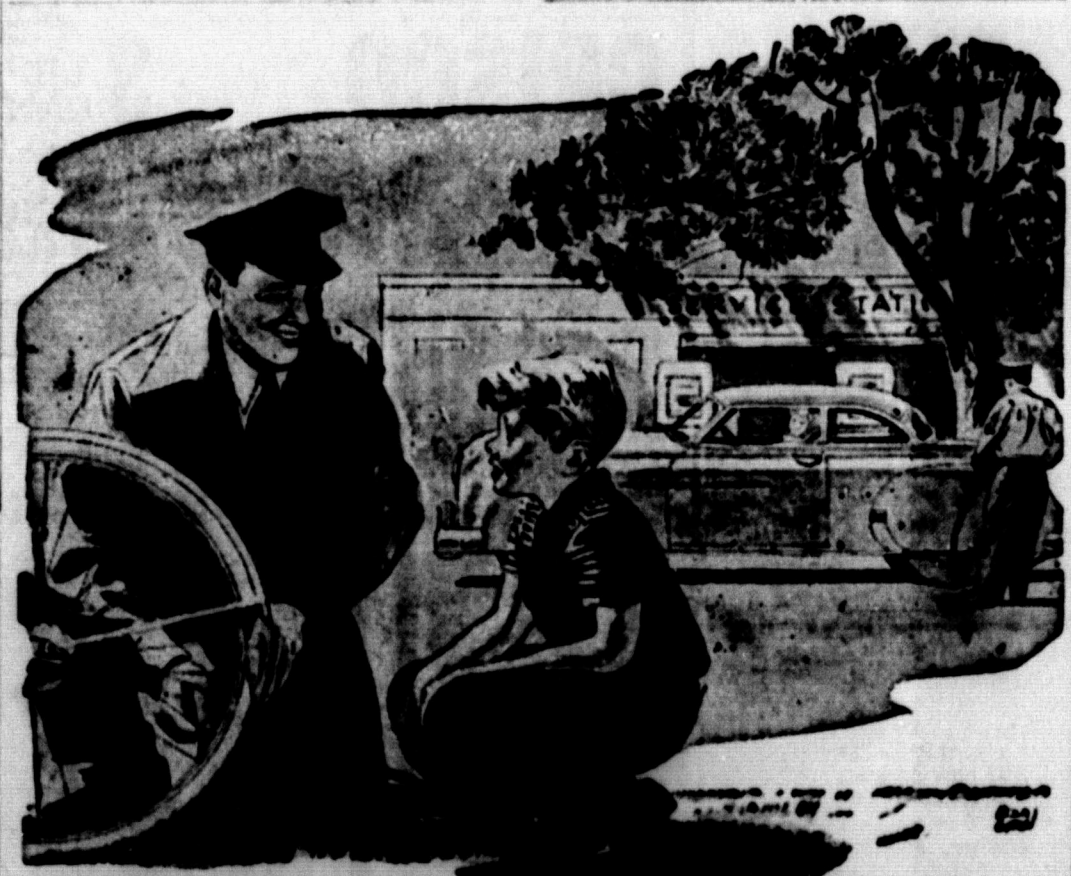
