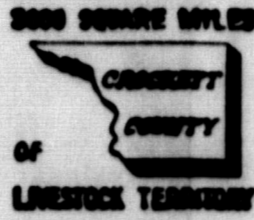

Gary Sutton Picked For N-S All-Star Game

Coach Sam Mosley received word here this week that his big all-state tackle, Gary Sutton, has been chosen to participate in the annual North-South all star football game to be held the final night of the annual coaching school. The school will be held in Fort Worth this year July 27 through August 1.

Young Sutton, who lettered all four of his high school years in football and track, began his football career when he made the varsity team as a freshman. He made all-district and second team all West Texas his sophomore year, and was named to the all-district and the all West Texas teams his junior and senior year.

Among other honors heaped on Gary his senior year was that of being selected captain of his team by his team mates, selected for the all-state team and the all West Texas scholastic team.

Gary finished his four years in high school with an 88 grade average and has signed a letter of intent with Baylor University. One of the first high school players to be signed after the 1967 season came to an end, he was selected by Southwest Conference coaches to the Blue Chip team. He was one of the most sought after football players in the state.

Sutton, who stands 6'1" and weighs 215 pounds, also lettered four years in track and led his team to the district 8-A championship four years in a row. He was the state champion in class A discus last year and placed third in state in the shot put. He won the discus event in every meet entered by the Lions this year except one, and placed second in that one. He was named to the all-state track team last year.

He will participate in the regional and state track meets again this year.

State Parks Department Takes Title To Fort Lancaster Site

Three years of persistent effort to bring about the preservation of the ruins of old Fort Lancaster, pre-Civil War military outpost in extreme west Crockett county, paid off Tuesday afternoon when in a brief ceremony in the district courtroom here, the 39-acre site donated by the Meadows family to Crockett county, was passed to the State Parks and Wildlife Department under agreement by the state to create a state park and to restore and preserve the site of the historic fort.

Eleventh Annual Garden Club Flower Show Set April 25

Intersection Crash Results In Property Damage

The signal light controlled highway intersection in the center of town claimed another accident Friday when a small compact car crashed into a 1963 Dodge truck owned by South Texas Lumber Co.

The accident occurred around 8:45 p. m. when Baron J. Whitson of Renton, Washington, driving a 1959 Hillman sedan and accompanied by his wife hit the truck as he was traveling east on Hwy 290. The truck was traveling north and was driven by Jesus Arredondo.

The crash came just as the truck entered the intersection on a green light. Whitson said he did not see the red light.

There were no personal injuries and only minor damage to the truck. Damage to the automobile amounted to \$200, according to investigating officer Del Copeland.

2166 Vehicles Registered In Crockett County

The final tally at the Crockett County tax office early this week counted 1400 passenger cars registered and 766 trucks, pick-ups, farm trucks, etc.

The total registration was around 100 below last year's total.

Ozona residents are urged to return property renditions in order that work may be started on this year's tax rolls.

Title to the acreage around the fort ruins was acquired by Crockett County as a gift from Henry and Claude Meadows and Mrs. Clara Lee Benckenstein, heirs of the late Mr. and Mrs. Howard Cox, original owners of the ranch land on which the fort is located. The deed to the land specified that it was for public use and enjoyment.

Authority to acquire the site, create a state park and preserve and restore the fort ruins was granted by the provisions of Senate Bill 15, enacted by the 60th legislature, largely through the efforts of State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman. Senator Hardeman and Representative Gene Hendryx of Alpine, another backer of the acquisition program, and George Cook of the Parks and Wildlife Department, were here to represent the state in receiving the deed to the property.

Jubilant members of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee and its chairman, Mrs. P. A. Harrell, a tireless worker on behalf of the fort's preservation, members of the Commission's Court and representatives of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce, were present for the deed signing.

The deed to the site, signed by Claude W. Meadows, Jr., Henry E. Meadows, Mrs. Clara Lee Benckenstein, County Judge Bernice Jones and members of the Commissioners Court, was passed to the State Parks and Wildlife Department "without reimbursement inasmuch as said land is to be used to preserve the site and remains of Fort Lancaster." The State, under terms of the deed "agrees to undertake the restoration of some of the building for public use, benefit and enjoyment, build stock-proof fences around the site and pave and fence the road into the site, preserve and maintain the remnants of the fort from

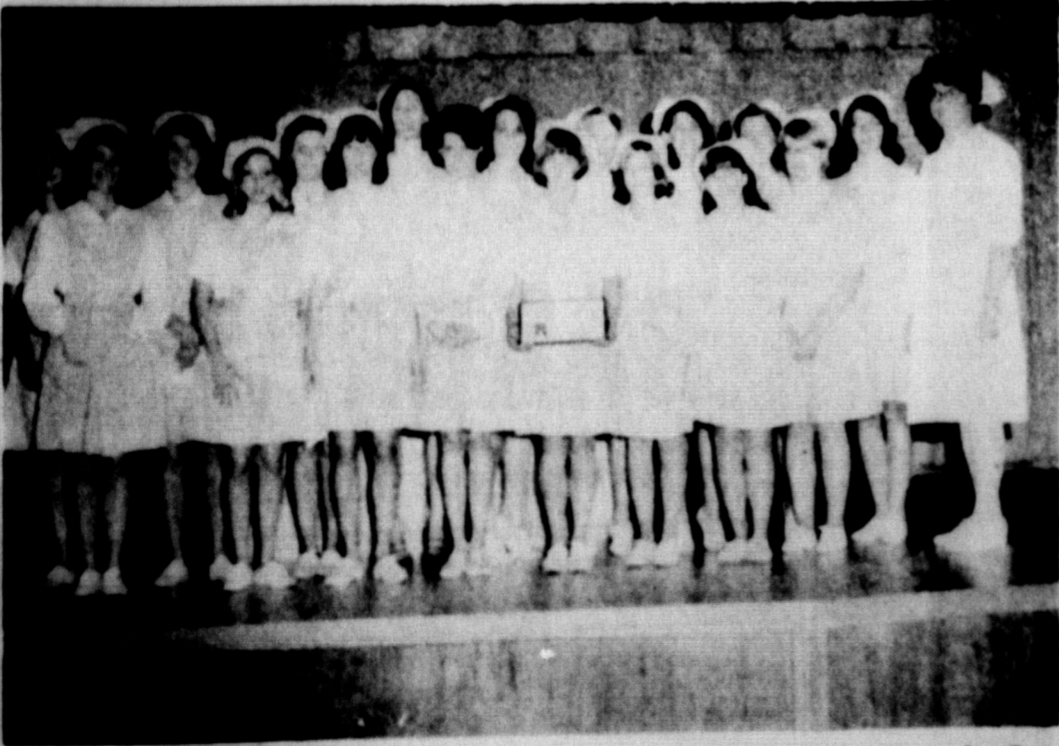
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Law Clarifies Vote Privileges of New Residents

Voters in the May primary who moved to the county on or after November 4, 1967, must vote an absentee ballot between April 15 and April 30 in the office of the county clerk in the county of their present residence, according to information received earlier this week from Miss Leta Powell, County Clerk of Crockett County.

A new law enacted last year permits registered voters with less than six months' residence in the county to vote on all statewide offices and issues if they have lived in the state longer than one year, but they must vote in the county clerk's office under procedures similar to absentee voting. The new law puts into effect a constitutional amendment adopted in November, 1966.

1st Anniversary Public Library To Be Observed

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WHEN THEY COME HOME

When Johnny comes home again, from Vietnam, he is going to have to learn a new way of life. Over there, our GI's found out that a Communist is an enemy and, if he wasn't killed, he'd kill you. They learned, the hard way, how Communists make it a practice to disguise themselves to work their way into strategic places, and they became well aware of the damage and atrocities Communists commit, given the least opportunity.

But these horrible lessons have taught Americans at home precious little concerning the real nature of Communism. It is overdue that we learn, and lesson number one is that a Communist in this country is just as treacherous, just as venomous, and just as deadly as a Communist in Vietnam.

Despite this obvious fact, these enemy agents are not only tolerated and listened to, they enjoy all the rights and privileges of citizenship, reinforced through a succession of decisions of the United States Supreme Court. They are allowed to operate freely, conspire without hindrance, agitate, hold jobs in industries where our national security is involved, and even to teach in our schools. Anyone who expresses alarm at this incredible state of affairs is denounced as a "McCarthyite", the ultimate epithet in the Communist lexicon — prized particularly by the Communists because they invented it.

Our returning GI's may have trouble understanding this weird state of affairs. To them a Communist is a Communist, whether he is butchering innocent peasants in a village in South Vietnam, directing a riot in a large American city, singing folk songs with a political message, or teaching political science on some college campus.

It will take some doing to make our GI's change their ideas about Communists being the enemy. It may be that they'll have to be given a special brainwashing course, and paraded through the streets in various cities across the country with yokes about their necks labelled "extremist."

An alternative would be to have the members of the US Supreme Court spend a few months in South Vietnam learning some elemental things about Communist tactics first hand. So far, the Court has specialized in granting liberties to the enemy, while denying the rest of us the right to defend our own intelligently.

Calico Charity Ball For Therapy Center Set May 10

The First Annual Calico Charity Ball, for the benefit of the West Texas Therapy Center, will be held May 10 at the San Angelo Coliseum. The event will be sponsored by the Center's board of directors and the Women's Auxiliary.

Residents of 14 counties, including Crockett, use the services of the center. Over 2,500 outpatient physical therapy treatments are provided by the center annually, for both young and old at no cost to taxpayers.

The charge for each treatment is \$3.00 though an average of only \$2.00 is collected or is collectable. The cost per treatment has been figured at \$4.62 each. The resulting \$2.62 deficit per treatment must be covered if center is to continue to perform the services needed so badly.

Inasmuch as the center is no longer associated with the Easter Seal drives, preferring to retain the money donated for use in West Texas, the Calico Charity Ball is the vehicle chosen to keep the therapy center vigorous and growing. There will be no further solicitations this year. A festive ball with an excellent orchestra, a floor show and other entertainment will be the center's way of thanking you for the support you give.

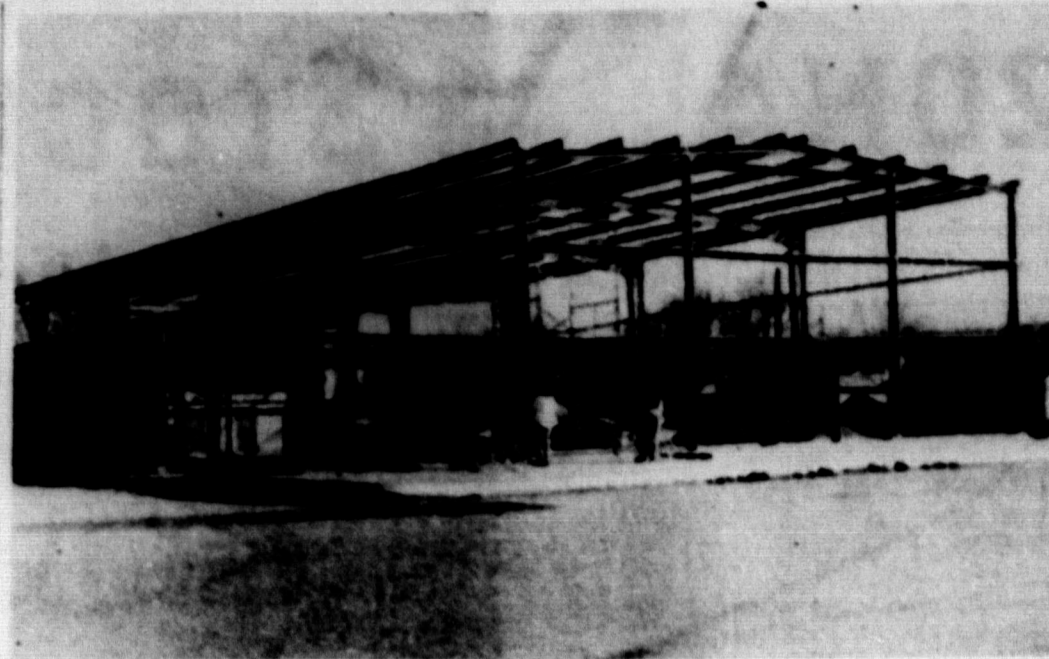

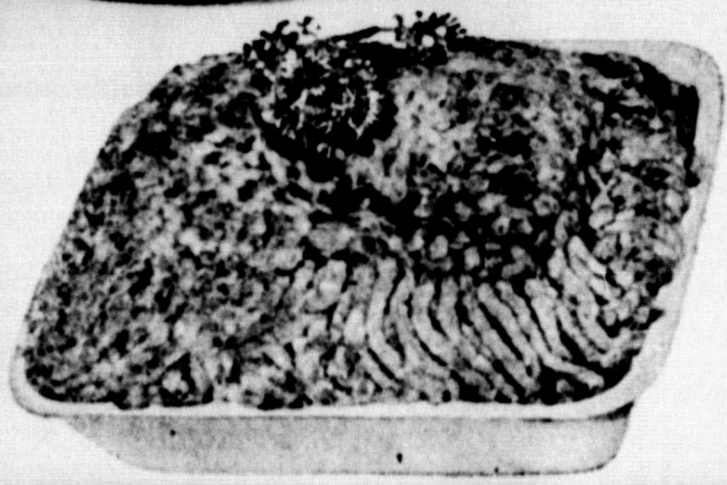
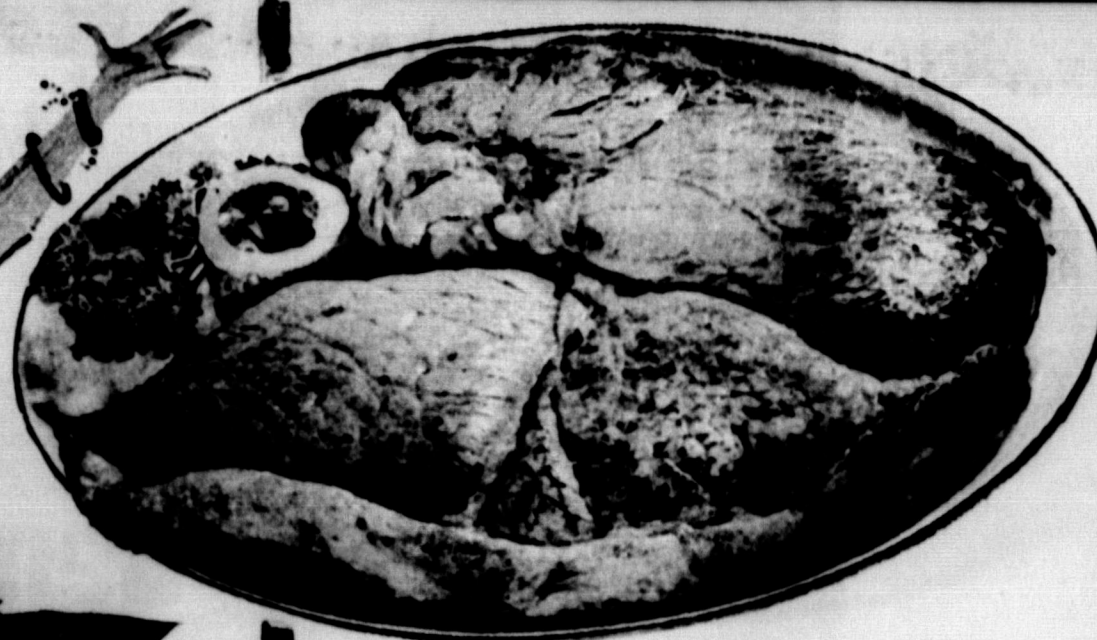

Law Clarifies

(Continued from Page One)

Formerly, a person who moved from one county to another within the state was completely disfranchised for the first six months after he moved, unless one or more of the various types of districts included both the county of his former residence and the county of his new residence. If he had lived in a district for six months before the election, he could vote on statewide offices and issues and on the offices for districts in which he had six months' residence, but he could not vote on local offices and issues within the county.

The new law preserves the voting rights which existed under the old law, but the procedure for voting has been changed. Heretofore, a person entitled to vote on the basis of six months' residence in a district voted on election day at the regular polling place for the voting precinct of his new residence. Under the new law, no one who has resided in the county less than six months may vote at a regular polling place, and all voting by such persons must be done through the county clerk's office. The voter must appear in person at the clerk's office between the 20th and the 4th day preceding the election unless he is unable to appear because of sickness or physical disability or unless he is absent from the county during that period. Sick or disabled voters and those temporarily absent from the county may obtain a ballot by mail.

Under the new law, those living in a town six months or more may vote on local offices and issues. Those moving from one precinct to another in the county should have the precinct number changed on their

registration certificate at the county tax assessor's office in order to vote in the precinct of their new residence. If a voter has moved to a new precinct ten days before the election, he is not eligible to vote in his former precinct.

The Crockett county clerk's office hours are 8 p. m. until 5 p. m. Monday through Friday.

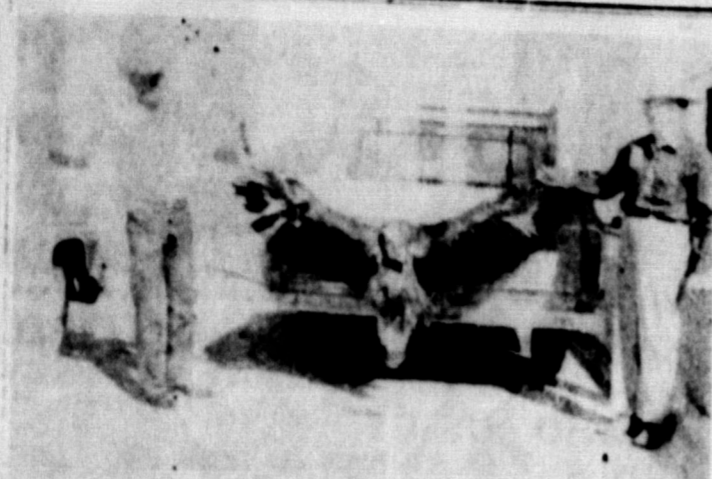

Crockett Picked For A&M Study Of Animal Species

Mr. and Mrs. James Baggett were hosts over the Easter holidays to a group of graduate students and their professor from Texas A&M University. The students were on a required field trip in a graduate course in mammalogy for the purpose of collecting species of mammals in Crockett County.

Dr. and Mrs. Dillard C. Carter were in charge of the group and had as their guest Col. Vernon Head USAF, Deputy Commandant of Texas A&M University.

Dr. Carter explained to county agent Pete W. Jacoby, that Crockett County was selected for their field trip because they had little knowledge of existing mammals in the county. Purpose of the field trip was to find out what species occur in the county and where the species were located.

Dr. Carter reported that of the 87 species of mammals which could be expected in the county, only 7 had been reported previously. The group collected about 50 specimens of 16 species while in the county according to Dr. Carter.

Dr. Carter reported a very enjoyable visit while in the county and said his students learned quite a bit while here. When asked if any unexpected events occurred during their stay, Dr. Carter reported trapping a rattlesnake and a copperhead, which were not on their list and said several of his students got too close to a skunk once or twice.

vandalism, wilful destruction, removal of relics and materials, desecration of and damage to graves and markers; to undertake the restoration of selected buildings of the fort insofar as it is able through funds donated by individuals, foundations, the state and federal governments and from its own funds, and to use such funds as are designated for Fort Lancaster as expeditiously and prudently as possible for the improvements to the site, and encourage the enjoyment of the site by the public.

Funds are now available from an appropriation of around \$250,000 for use on five selected fort sites, to take over the operation of the site. Mr. Cook told the group. Mrs. K. R. Stanton, who has been employed by the county as caretaker and hostess at the fort, will be asked to remain at her post for the present. Further details of the Park Board's immediate plans for the site have not been announced.

Henry Meadows, one of the donors of the land around the site, expressed the satisfaction of the Meadows family that through the effort of so many individuals creation of the state park at the fort site has been brought about.

Judge Jones and Mrs. Harrell expressed the deep gratitude of the people of Crockett county to the Meadows for their generous gift of the land and to all whose efforts were so effective in support of the project. Especially thanked were Senator Hardeman, whose membership on key committees in the State Senate by virtue of his seniority made him a potent factor in passage of the enabling bill, and Representative Hendryx, another veteran legislator who is retiring at the end of his present term.

Mr. Cook from the State Parks and Wildlife Department has enthusiastic in his acceptance of the site on behalf of the state and expressed his personal satisfaction at prospects of developing the site.

Senator Hardeman lauded the efforts of local citizens to preserve the Fort Lancaster ruins.

"In today's mad rush, we are prone to forget the sacrifices of our forefathers," the Senator said. "The only way future generations can know of their great heritage is through study of the past. To quote one of the sages of old 'no man who is ignorant of the past is fit for the future.' This is a great occasion, this fulfillment of so many peoples' dreams, the culmination of efforts that began three years ago when we first broke bread at the site."

Said Mrs. Harrell after the meeting. "I am so grateful to so many people who helped so much, I wouldn't undertake to start to name them all."

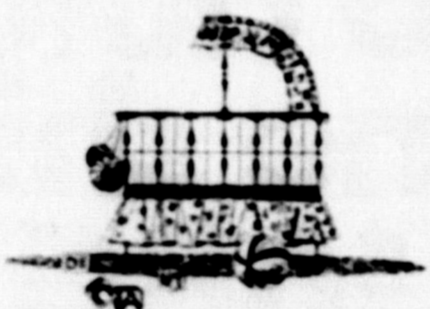
