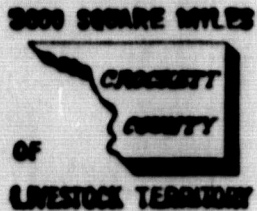

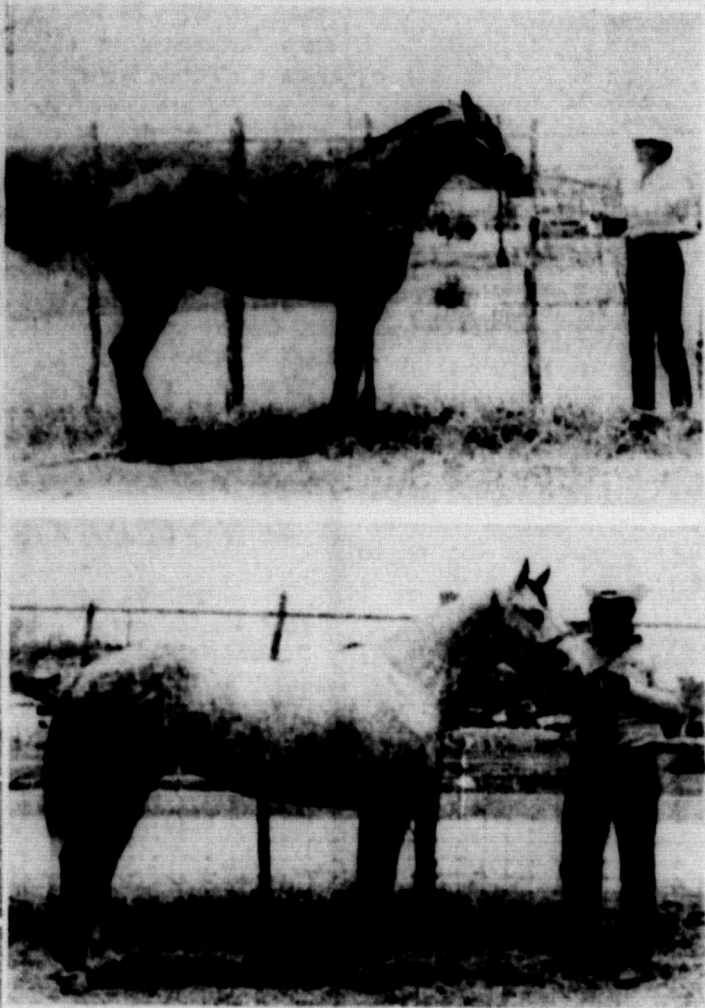

Ranchers Urged To Keep Lookout For Screwworms

Ranchers in Crockett and area counties were warned this week by County Agent Pete W. Jacoby to keep a sharp lookout for possible screwworm cases among their livestock.

The outbreaks are getting closer, according to a news release from the Mission screwworm control center this week. With all the wet weather this winter and spring, Jacoby said, there is real danger of widespread outbreak of worms. Careful watch to catch every case and report it so that sterile fly treatment can be applied immediately may prevent a recurrence of last year's widespread infestation, Ja- coby said.

Screwworm cases were reported early this week in Terrell, Kimble and Edwards counties, according to the Mission news release.

For the second consecu- tive day, Texas chalked up 19 new screwworm cases on Tuesday, says the Mission report.

The new outbreaks boost the state's total cases for the year to 188. This week's (Continued on Page Five)

Court Continues U.S. Suit Against Water District

All polling places will be open, although precinct 4 voters will vote only in the governor's race. Polling places will be the courthouse for precinct 1 voters, the high school and Powell Field for precinct 2, the Civic Cen- ter and the power plant for precinct 3, and South Ele- mentary school for precinct 4.

Absentee voting has been heavy for a run-off election, according to County Clerk Leta Powell. This indicates a possible large turn-out of voters for a second primary.

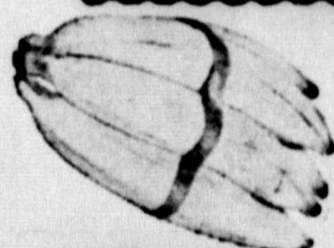

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Whipped Cream Cake

3 egg whites beaten stiff
1 cup cream, whipped stiff
1/2 cup cold water
1 teas. vanilla
2 level cups cake flour
1 1/2 level cups sugar
3 level teas. baking powder
1/2 teas. salt

Whip cream and fold in beaten egg whites, and cold water slowly, folding all the while. Mix dry ingredients and add to this. Fold, don't stir. Bake in tube or bundt pan 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Bakeless Cake

Cream 1/2 cup butter and 1 cup sugar. Add 4 beaten eggs and two cups chopped pecans. Drain 1 large can crushed pineapple and add to mixture. Fold in one pint of whipped cream.

Make layers of vanilla wafers, filling and whipped cream and allow to stay in refrigerator 24 hours. Serve with whipped cream and halves of cherries.

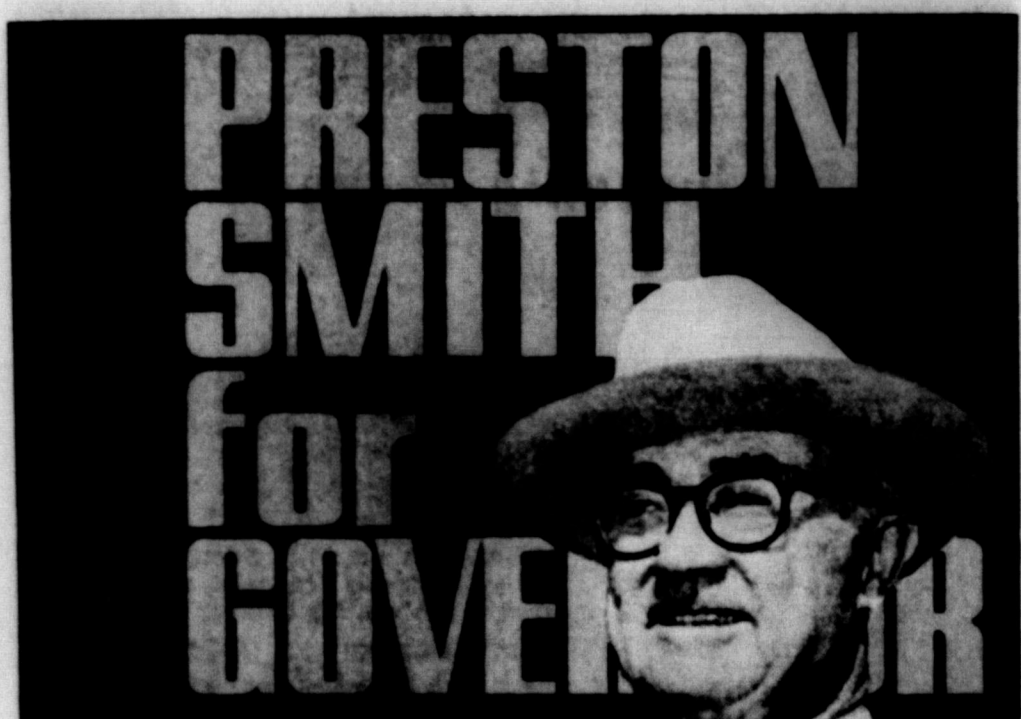

Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

Prospects for the enactment of an effective crime bill at this session were advanced last week when the Senate okayed a measure approved in the House. As passed by the Senate, the bill will help law enforcement unless the Supreme Court later knocks them out.

The Senate version reverses key Supreme Court decisions restricting the use as evidence in court of confessions and police interrogations? One, a 5-to-4 decision by the Court, held that a confession is invalid unless a series of notices prior to questioning and unless he understands that the police will make available to him a lawyer to sit by his side and advise him during an interrogation. This absurd ruling served as a barrier to any effective questioning of criminal suspects.

The Senate amendment allows the trial judge, taking into account all the surrounding circumstances, to decide if the confession is voluntary.

The bill also allows six hours for questioning of a suspect in federal cases before there is actual arraignment before a magistrate. The Supreme Court had turned loose on society some desperate criminals solely because they were not rushed before a magistrate following arrest.

The Senate version also allows wiretapping in certain investigations, where approved by a Judge in advance. And it restricts the mail order purchases of pistols.

Another provision authorizes \$100 million the first year and \$300 million the second year, of federal grants to the States, for use in towns of under 25,000, designed to help cope with organized crime, riots, and other violent civil disturbances.

These are the chief provisions in the much-debated bill as it now stands. The House must approve the Senate version or a conference

committee must resolve the differences, before the measure can be sent to the White House.

The bill still must face some rough sailing in the House, but many of us are determined to get a good bill enacted if humanly possible particularly the provisions which correct some of the pro-crime bloopers committed by the Supreme Court which have successfully tilted some procedures in favor of the criminal and against society.

Ellenburger Strike Assured In Crockett World Field Area

An Ellenburger discovery was assured in Crockett County with the flowing of 64.81 barrels of oil in six hours, plus gas at the rate of 1,212,000 cubic feet daily at Mallard Petroleum Inc., Midland, No. 1 Conoco-Enco, in 2-BB2-Narisso A. Miller, multipay prospect, surrounded by Grayburg production, 1 1/2 miles south of the Ellenburger oil opener, but separated by a recent Ellenburger failure, in the World field, 14 miles southwest of Big Lake.

Flow was through an 18-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,100-182 feet, with tubing pressure of 750-800 pounds.

Operator was installing high pressure test equipment.

Strawn production was indicated while being drilled with the recovery of four barrels of heavily oil and gas-cut mud, 12 1/2 barrels of 41.7 gravity oil, and 130 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud on a test at 8,055-83 feet.

Tyra & Tyra, Midland, will drill the No. 1-5 University, a 2,400-foot Grayburg-San Andres wildcat, in Crockett County, 14 miles south of Big Lake, 1 1/2 miles northwest of the depleted Block 51 (Fusselman and San Andres) field and 2 1/2 miles south of the Farmer (San Andres) field.

Location is 1,810 feet from the north and 560 feet from the west lines of 5-51-University.

It is approximately 100 feet west of a 10,358-foot Ellenburger failure, Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1-E CCC-University, which was abandoned Nov. 17, 1948.

Atlantic Richfield Co., Midland, will plug back to wildcat depth of 2,000 feet for completion attempt in the Queen at its No. 2 J. M. Shannon, former Ellenburger producer in the Todd Deep (Cinoidal and Ellenburger) field of Crockett County, 20 miles northwest of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 65-UV-GC&SF.
