





BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article VIII. Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:
"Section 1-e.
"1. From and after December 31, 1976. At any time federate soldiers at a trust fund solely for the legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widous authorized by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.
