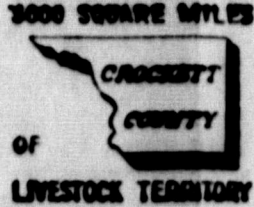

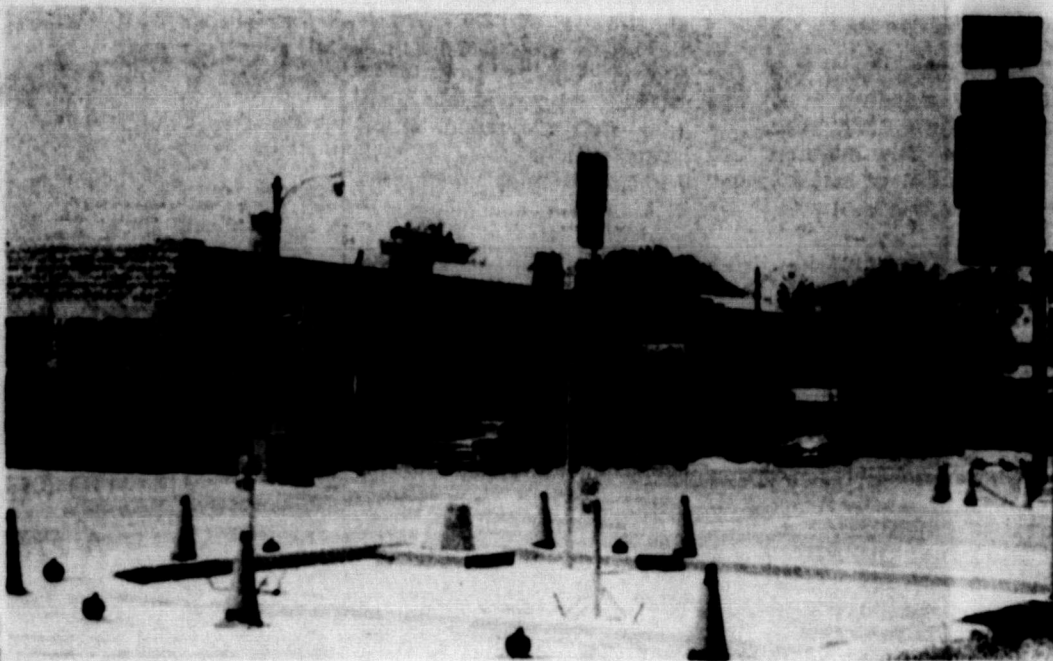

TRAFFIC ISLAND in a sea of asphalt, being built at the downtown intersection of Highways 290 and 163 will make some radical changes in the driving habits of Ozonans. The island was made necessary by the State Highway Department's installation of corner signal lights to replace the center post traffic light which has served for years, albeit with something of a menace to the careless driver who might attempt to spurt around another car on the green signal. The island will eliminate the sharp right turn into traffic from 290 to 163 from the east.

Jurisdictional Conference to Be Methodist Topic

Dr. and Mrs. P. F. Curl, who have been attending Methodist meetings in Oklahoma City and Kerrville, will return tomorrow. Dr. Curl will be teaching the Men's Kitchen Bible Class at 10:00 a. m. and at the 10:55 a. m. service, he will report on happenings at the South Central Jurisdictional Conference of the United Methodist Church.

The Conference has been of unusual significance due to the fact that it marked the merger of the United Brethren Evangelical Church with the Methodists in this section. It also marked the reception of four Negro Annual Conferences and their Bishops into the Regional Conference.

Dr. Curl will tell of these mergers, about the retirement of two bishops, and the election of a new bishop, and the assignment of the ten bishops of the Jurisdiction for the quadrennium.

Local Methodists are happy that Bishop O. Eugene Slater, pastor of the local Methodist Church from 1936 to 1942, has been reassigned as Bishop in the area until 1972. Bishop and Mrs. (Eva B.) Slater, reside in San Antonio and will be supervising the work of the Southwest Texas Conference and the Rio Grande Conference. The local Methodist Church is part of the Southwest Texas Conference. The Rio Grande Conference embraces the Spanish speaking Methodist churches of Texas and New Mexico.

Bishop Slater will also supervise the West Texas Conference, the all Negro conference of this section of Texas, until 1970 when the conference is scheduled to be broken up into the geographical Annual Conferences. There will be some 40 of these Negro churches coming into the Southwest Texas Conference. However, there will be only 3 coming into the San Angelo District. These are at San Angelo, Brady, and Del Rio. The United Methodist Church has no Negro congregations in this immediate section.

Second Round Polio Shots Due Sun. Afternoon

Dr. Lloyd Sherrill, county health officer, reminded Ozona residents this week that Sunday, August 11, is the date set for the second round of polio vaccine and measles inoculations. He urged all residents to return for their second polio vaccine and pointed out that all those who have not had measles, should get the measles shot.

The measles vaccine did not arrive in time for the last countywide drive, but is on hand for Sunday. Inoculation stations will be set up at North and South Elementary schools and the staffs will be on hand from noon until five o'clock to administer the inoculations.

A recent visit from a State Health officer revealed that Texas has had 17 cases of polio this year, accounting for 15 percent of all the confirmed cases in the nation to date. This is all the more reason for every citizen in Crockett County to take advantage of the free vaccine.

Local clubs and civic organizations will again be in charge of publicizing the campaign, with Al Fields as chairman.

Congressman O. C. Fisher, home from Washington between sessions of the Congress, will visit Ozona next Tuesday, speaking at noon to members of the Ozona Rotary Club and their guests and afterwards meeting with constituents for an informal talkfest at the county courthouse.

T. J. Bailey, Rotary Club president, announced that Congressman Fisher had accepted the club's invitation to address the group at the noon hour, relating some of the actions of the Congress at the last session and answering questions.

In order to make it possible for as many people as possible to meet with the Congressman, Rotary Club officials have arranged the informal meeting following the club's luncheon. Everybody is invited to the courthouse, possibly the law library, or the district court room if the crowd is larger, at about 2 p. m. to meet Congressman Fisher.

Band members will practice twice daily until school begins, from 8 until 10 a. m. and from 4 until 6 p. m. Sanders said he expects the band to be from 70 to 75 members strong this year.

Mr. and Mrs. Ron Murdock and daughter, Kellye, will leave next week for their new home in Cameron. Murdock will be head basketball coach and will teach American history in the high school there. He will also serve as assistant football coach. Cameron is a class 2-A school.

Murdock came to Ozona 7 years ago. He taught history in junior high school and coached girls' basketball until two years ago when he took over the junior high boys' basketball team.

Supt. L. B. T. Sikes announced two more teacher resignations this week and two replacements.

M. A. Barber resigned his post as principal of South Elementary and will move with his family to Big Spring. Ron Murdock, junior high social studies and basketball coach, resigned to take a coaching job at Cameron.

Douglas Flisk will replace Murdock. He has his Masters from North Texas State and has taught three years. He comes here from Wilma Hutchins School near Dallas.

Graydon Hicks, Jr., with a B. S. from Sul Ross, will teach high school math and be assistant coach for the junior high Cubs. He has three years experience and comes here from Sierra Blanca, where he taught last year.

A complete list of the school faculty will be announced at a later date.

Fire Destroys Cervantes Home Wednesday Night

Although firemen arrived in record time, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Santos Cervantes on Highway 163 South was completely gutted by fire early Wednesday night. Firemen were in a meeting at the fire station when the alarm came in and immediately rushed to the scene, but the small frame house was totally engulfed in flames when they arrived.

The fire was discovered when a group of people sitting in the yard smelled smoke and looked around to see flames leaping out of the interior of the house. Within minutes the entire house was ablaze.

Fire Chief Jim Marks said as near as could be determined the fire started from faulty electrical wiring in the kitchen of the house.

Ozona's three public swimming pools will close Sunday afternoon, August 26, the day before school begins. Young people have crowded the three pools daily all summer and many have learned to swim through swimming lessons given by pool managers.

At the North Pool, managers Jack Appiewhite and David Lewis taught two classes of swimmers, intermediate and beginners. There were 20 children in the beginner's class and all learned to swim, most jumping off the diving boards now. Ten children took advantage of the intermediate class. The children ranged in age from 6 to 11 years, including a couple of 4-year olds.

Carl Conklin, manager of the South Pool, had a large group of boys and girls in swimming and diving classes and reported the program was a big success.

Selling Course To Be Offered Here Aug. 19-22

"Sales Sharpners," a special sales training course, has been scheduled for Ozona, starting August 19 and continuing through August 22. The announcement was made today by Hubert Baker, manager of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce, sponsoring organization.

Designed for salespeople who sell merchandise in retail stores, this course is ten hours in length. The course emphasizes analysis of selling situations, such as evaluating customer's objectives and needs, determining merchandise to show and developing sales strategy.

The course is made possible by the Distributive Education Program of the University of Texas and the Texas Education Agency and will be presented in workshop form in four two and a half hour sessions Monday through Thursday. A place for the meetings will be announced next week by the C of C. Cost is \$4 for each person.

Mrs. Mary Frances Bowden, Supervisory and Management Training Specialist of the Division of Extension, University of Texas at Austin, will conduct this course. A graduate of Tulsa University, Mrs. Bowden has served as personnel and training director of department stores and specialty shops.

"Because salespeople are not selling as well as they can, they seem indifferent to the customers," explains Mrs. Bowden. Mrs. Bowden's course places emphasis on getting ready for the customer, gaining product knowledge, adding the plus sale, and building clientele.

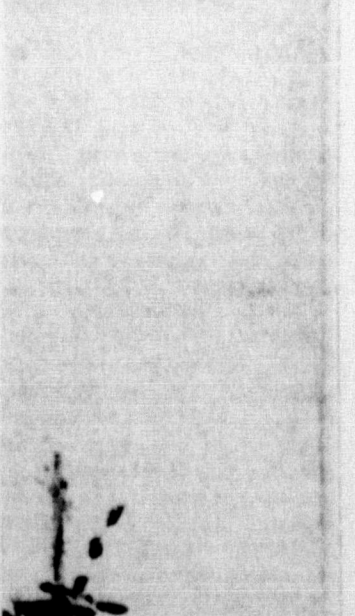

Nuts. Does anyone believe for an instant that the Keystone Cops in the old Mack Sennett comedies were representative of any police force ever found on the face of the earth? Is anyone prepared to insult our intelligence by asking that we accept this celluloid bunch of buffoons as an example of our "Finest"?

Can you think of anyone who accepted Laurel and Hardy as an average pair of citizens? They were escape entertainers and a successful partnership which degraded no other partnership in the world.

When the incomparable Fred Allen toured "Allen's Alley," and talked with Mrs. Sussbaum of Titus Moody or any other of the accented residents, did any one fancy that any race or religion was being degraded?

Dialect jokes, and dialect comedians are part of our heritage. Nobody ever suggested that Weber & Fields or Moran & Mack were malicious. And who ever reached the fame enjoyed by Amos & Andy? When Amos ordered his own tombstone and had it inscribed, "He Left His Wife and Found Peace", a whole nation could laugh and only some kind of nut could suggest that there was anything racial about it.

So what has happened to us?

That Stepin Fetchit was only playing a role is evident from his fighting rejoinder to the TV program. "If it weren't for me there wouldn't be any Sidney Potter or Bill Cosby."

You know, he may be right.

Stepin Fetchit was never a stereotype of the Negro; he was an American folk character along with other comedy greets, and let no young whippersnappers say that we were wrong to laugh at his antics.

Letters to the Editor

Dear Mr. White:

I subscribed to your paper a few years back, after selecting Ozona as the best place in Texas, from studying qualifications as described in the Texas Almanac published by Dallas Morning News. The issue of the Stockman July 18, 1968 is the finest I have read. You covered foreign policy (Viet Nam), foreign aid, internal security measures, and recent Supreme Court appointments. The facts of these issues were presented clearly, and editorial opinion well expressed. As a patriotic citizen I wish to express my thanks for your efforts to improve our society. I feel free to make these observations in good humor, because no one will attach any importance to what I say, at least they never have.

The column in the upper left hand corner is incoherent, carping, or caviling. The recipes are uninspiring. I long for a return to the humorous approach you used to print by Allen Bosworth.

Most of what I have been able to learn about my state legislature has come from your paper.

You regard DeGaulle as unfriendly to the U. S. DeGaulle loves France. He believes in gold as the base of currency. During his long life he has seen his country go through the ravages of

inflation several times I suppose. He understands why U. S. citizens are not allowed to own gold. (It would check the politician's inflationary monetary policy.) He tried to protect the franc by backing it with gold, to prevent the U. S. from blaming off our inflation on France. If you were president of France, you would do the same thing, wouldn't you?

Mixed emotions fight for control inside me. My son is a 1968 highschool graduate, an army paratrooper at home right now with orders to proceed to the Republic of Viet Nam soon, wearing on his head the beret of the Airborne Infantry U. S. Army, genuine wool made in Basque, France. Would you care to take that up with the wool grower's in Crockett County?

He and General of the Army Westmoreland got home about the same time. I heard on the radio that day that Westmoreland made a speech upon arrival in U. S. A. in which he said "Peace with honor." Since when do United States Army generals concern themselves with peace? I thought they went to West Point to learn military actions. In my war when I was young, general (McAuliffe) said "Nuts" (when asked to surrender). And the fight went on till we beat them. Treasonable acts by civilians were punished, and so were armed robbers.

Perhaps I have mentioned too many subjects, but since there is space left and I have time, I would like to ask you if you have ever

PUBLIC NOTICE
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SR 12)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"Section 1-e. "1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974:

On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35c); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30c); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25c); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20c); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15c); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10c); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5c); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied.

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvement, at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution.

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to grant any grant or authorize the making of any grant of moneys to any individual, municipal or other corporation, whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and their widows such regulations and limitations as may be provided by the Legislature as to the amount and to their widows; provided, however, that such regulations and limitations as may be provided by the Legislature as to the amount and to their widows shall not be construed so as to prevent a grant of aid in cases of calamity."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment submitted to a vote of qualified electors of this State at an election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuing reducing State ad valorem property taxes and allowing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except taxes levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning, AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

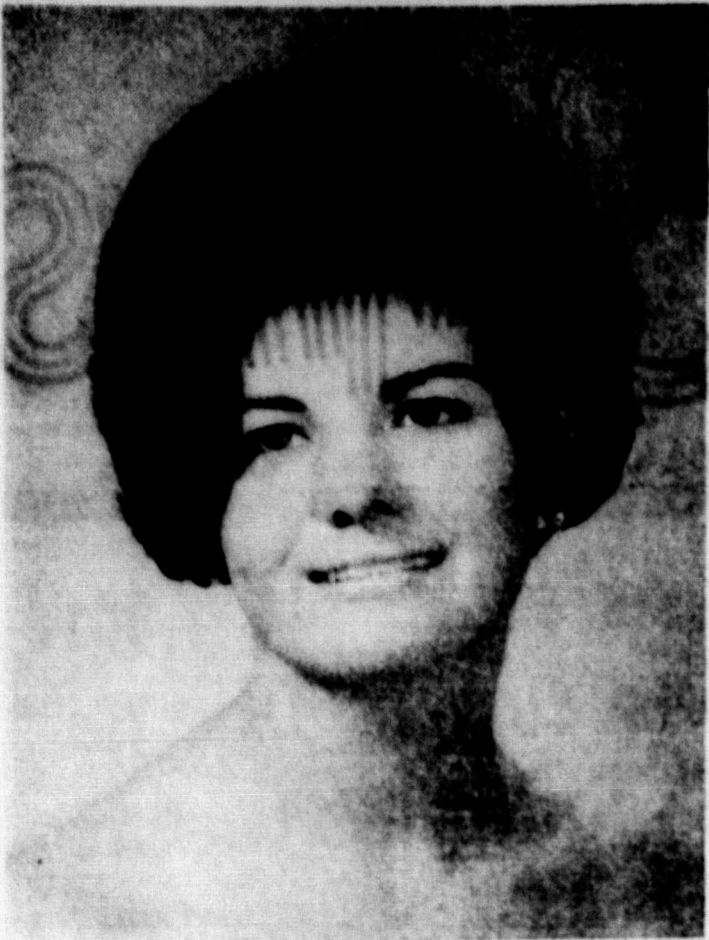

1 tbs. dates
9 slices white bread buttered
Sliced chicken breast
Mayonnaise
Lettuce leaves
Sliced smoked tongue
Combine cheese, pecans, and dates and spread on 3 slices buttered bread. Lay second slice on top and cover with sliced chicken, mayonnaise, lettuce, tongue and more lettuce. Lay a third slice of buttered bread, buttered side down, on top to close the sandwich. Cut sandwiches in triangles or

quarters. Serves 3. Recipe may be doubled.

Baked Ham and Cheese

Butter enough slices of bread to cover the bottom of a shallow casserole, fitted neatly together. Cover bread with fairly thick slices of Cheddar or American cheese, fitting them together. Spread over the cheese a large can of deviled ham. Cover this layer with another layer of bread, buttered side up. For a four-slice layer, beat 3 eggs with 2 cups of milk and a little salt. Pour over the top gently. Sprinkle thickly with grated parmesan and paprika. Let stand an hour or so in the refrigerator if possible, and bake 45-60 minutes in a 350-degree oven, or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Serves four generously.

PUBLIC NOTICE
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NO. 10

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows: "Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

"(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day of each Regular Session and each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government not to exceed one round trip per month during such time as the Legislature is in session, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and

most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

Section 2. "(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;

"(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may define

the residence requirements, if any, for participation in these programs. The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal Statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have authority to levy tax to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state."

an agency of the State of Texas as the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said moneys, securities, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation, bonds, notes, other evidences of debt, and securities, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments, provided that in making such and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, not more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not be a validation of any statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1968 at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices." If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas."

Parks Admission System To Pay \$75 Million Bond Sale

Austin — Steps to provide more outdoor recreation sites in Texas were taken by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission Tuesday when \$5,750,000 in bonds were authorized for sale and a statewide park entrance fee system to begin as soon as feasible after Sept. 1, 1968 was established.

The bonds are the first issue of a \$75 million program first proposed by Governor John Connally, passed by the 60th Legislature, regular session, and approved by referendum on Nov. 11, 1967.

These first bonds will be used to purchase and develop recreation sites in areas of the greatest need. Commission authorities said other bonds would be sold in the future as needed.

To repay these bonds along with the interest in the 10-year period as outlined

in the statutes passed by the Legislature, the Commission set a \$1 per day per carload entrance fee at 30 existing State parks, a 50-cent per carload entrance fee for six existing State Parks, and exempted 13 state parks from entrance fees.

Parks where the \$1 entrance fee will be charged are: Abilene, Atlanta, Bastrop, Blanco, Bonham, Bentzen-Rio Grande, Caddo Lake, Cleburne, Daingerfield, Davis Mountains, Eisenhower, Falcon, Fort Parker, Garner, Goliad, Goose Island, Huntsville, Inks Lake, Kerrville, Lake Brownwood, Lake Corpus Christi, Lake Whitney, Lockhart, Martin Dies, Jr., Meridian, Palmetto, Palo Duro Canyon, Possum Kingdom, Stephen F. Austin and Tyler.

Parks where a 50-cent entrance fee will be charged are: Balmorhea, Big Spring, Governor Hogg Shrine, Monahans Sandhills, Mother Neff and Washington-on-the-Brazos.

Realizing that many individual families use the State parks quite heavily, the Commission authorized an annual \$12 permit which can be used at all State parks where entrance fees are charged, by person or carload, except at San Jose Mission, Varner-Hogg Plantation and Eisenhower Birthplace State Parks.
