JERUSALEM, July 23 (AP)-A police spokesman announced today the detention of about 20 Jews in connection with the terroristic bombing yesterday of the King David hotel which left 98 persons dead or missing.

Truman Must Side With Either Ickes Or Pauley On Issue

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP) — Congress appeared ready today to dump the politically explosive tidelands bill on President Truman's desk.

But even legislators who think they sometimes know the White House attitude in advance admit they are puzzled about its fate.

Granting the states clear title to oil-rich tidelands extending three miles or more into the ocean, the bill involves a long-standing controversy between Edwin W. Pauley and former Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes.

Despite the vigorous opposition of Democratic Leader Barkley (Ky), the senate passed the measure by a 44 to 34 vote yesterday and sent it back to the house for expected early agreement on its final form. Barkley said he hopes the president will veto it.

But any such action would be a slap at Pauley, California oil man who favors state ownership. And it would be a feather in the cap of Ickes, who has been critical of the president since he resigned from the cabinet. Ickes quit in a huff over Mr.

We hasten to keep the record straight. By no means all prices have rocketed like these. Good old stick-to-your-ribs potatoes were absolutely steady. Coffee, in spite of an announced three cent increase, was still the same. Scaps were comparatively steady, and a variety of canned goods showed no heavy fluctuation.

But notice the character of the items which showed the pronounced rise-bread, butter, milk, meat. These are the fundamen-

You can't blame your grocer, for generally he's caught in the pinch of having to pay more and therefore get more. Sure, his per centage on higher prices nets him more money, but with prices going up, more money is actually worth less. In other words, he's getting no where.

And neither is anyone else, and a lot of people are getting caught in the middle. They can't stand the pressure. Pretty soon they have no alternative but to cry out for relief in higher pay.

Now this does not mean that the situation has completely deteriorated or that runaway inflation is rampant. It does mean, however, that the next month may well prove a mighty crucial one.

We observed at the end of price control that business and the people were on the spot. Here was an opportunity to voluntarily hold-the-line as nearly as possible and thus to lend substance to the contention that business functions best without control. That opportunity still exists, but it can't indefinitely flutter around under the heat of such pres-
