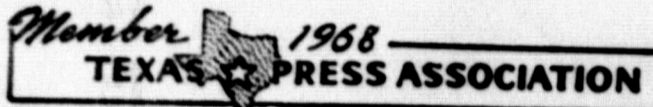

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SILENT TRIBUTE

It has been so long since any official of prominence in the United States government uttered the words "Cuba" and "Castro" in public that one might suppose that neither exists in our troubled world. Perhaps the image of the late John F. Kennedy sobbing out his dismay over the Bay of Pigs with his face buried in his wife's lap keeps them silent.

But Lyndon Johnson did make his farewell State of the Union address without even passing mention of Cuba. He similarly failed to mention the Communist bastion only minutes away the previous year.

The incoming Richard Nixon couldn't bring himself to utter the word, either.

Still, there are 87 newly arrived refugees from that island jail who should be able to tell us a great deal about life there. And what they could tell just might be very interesting to the dissident and disruptive elements which have troubled us so much in our cities and colleges. The dots who hold

up Castro and his henchman Che Guevara as heroes might find it sobering, for example, to know that half of those 87 escapees were Negroes. And one-fourth of them were students.

It would seem unimportant how lucid or literate those escapees are. They cannot be incapable of less than the four-letter words which are the bedrock of dissident catcalls; and even in translation, what they can report if presented to the militants in our society, should sober some Castro cheerleaders into silence.

Those who seek most feverishly to destroy our institutions have never specified what they propose to replace them with. But the fact that Castro and the departed Che are heroes to them strongly suggests that a Castro-brand society is a goal.

The forty-odd Negroes who risked life, limb and bullets to reach the Guantanamo Bay base, and sanctuary in the United States, surely could tell our belly-achers a thing or two.

TAKE OUT THE PHONES

None of the newspaper accounts which we read were very precise on the events at the White House on January 20, and so we still do not know if Lyndon Johnson turned out all the lights before going up to the Capitol to turn over the reins of government to Richard Nixon. But it seems clear that one thing he did do was to call the telephone company and tell them to take out the phones at the ranch. And that set in motion what is surely the biggest demolition team in the history of the State.

Don't misunderstand. This demolition team is not going to break up the 6,300-foot airstrip that was built on Lyndon's ranch; it is not going to tear down the several buildings and trailers that have been used to house guests, staff and newsmen. These buildings will be needed to quarter the dozen or so Secret Service men who will guard Mr. and Mrs. Johnson, as well as the two Air Force sergeants who are on detail at the ranch. Nor are all those "wild flowers" which the Bergstorm Air Force men planted at the ranch last summer and fall going to be dug up.

The demolition team is concerning itself only with the telephone equipment. And would you believe that they'll be taking out 330 telephone lines which ran out of the ranch to Washington, to neighbors and to the Lord only knows where. It's revealed that ten of those lines — yes, ten — were directed to the office and home of Lyndon's business partner, Judge Albert W. Moursund. And one of those ten lines was connected into the Judge's bathroom.

Not many business partnerships are carried that far. Poor Commander Bucher couldn't rate a phone reliable enough for him to call

the engine room on the USS Pueblo. But somehow we feel equally sorry for Judge Moursund who couldn't escape one anywhere, even in his own bathroom.

But, that's the way things are when you're government. Economy is a relative thing. You save a penny here on the light bill, and spend it there on the telephone bill.

Sometimes you have to spend money to save it. The University of Texas is spending \$6 million for a Johnson museum and library. Atop it will be a helicopter landing pad for a government-provided helicopter, and an oval office that is a copy of the one in which Lyndon worked in the White House. As soon as the building is completed, it will be permanently leased to the General Services Administration in Washington and maintained by the Government. That's when the saving will begin.

How can you duplicate the White House Oval Room any cheaper than that?

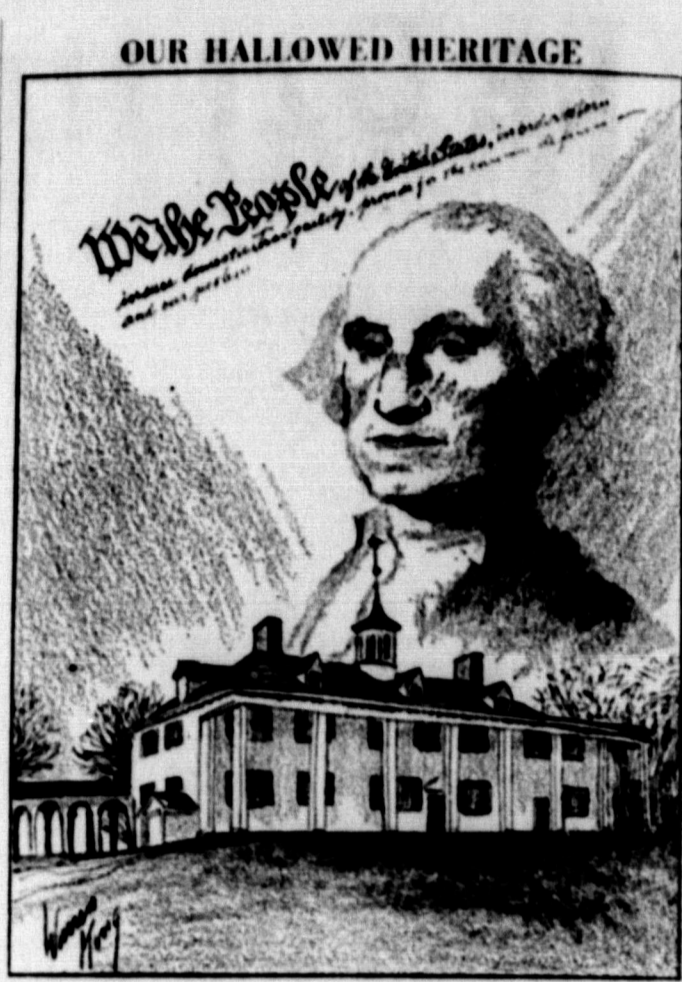
WHACKING INFLATION

You have to hand it to the Members of Congress. They are a breed apart. Something special.

What patriots! Do you think that they observe Lincoln's birthday by a moment of silence, or a token reading of his Gettysburg Address. Indeed not. Congress recesses for 10 whole days and each member retires to reflect on Abe's qualities. Endless intonations of Abe's admonitions are rendered, particularly that gem, "It is true that you may fool all the people some of the time; you can even fool some of the people all the time; but you can't fool all of the people all the time."

Spirit rekindled, Congress reconvened after 10 days of reflection in honor of Abe and tackled again the monumental problem of inflation.

As recently as 1964 the Members of the House of



Representatives were paid a mere \$22,500 for their labors. But they recognized that inflation was a growing menace even 5 years ago, and in concert with Lyndon Johnson, himself a one-time Member of the House, they attacked the problem head-on. They raised their salaries to \$30,000 a year.

But alas, inflation did not succumb easily. President Johnson recognized this, and before he departed Washington he hurled a mighty shaft in its direction. Pay Congressmen \$42,500 he said. And just to protect these valiant corpsmen from any twinge of self-pity, he said that this effort would go forward unless Congress, itself, went against the Commander-in-Chief.

The House Rules Committee met to consider the mat-

ter and by a 12 to 3 vote rejected a temporarily unbalanced Member's motion that the pay raise should go to the floor for a vote. The consensus was that inflation would be given no quarter. That select Committee was 4 to 1 for no compromise. The \$42,500 salary should prevail, without vote. And prevail it did.

That is the resolute solution of the Congress. Raise all salaries 88 percent every five years. That will drain taxpayer's pockets of the money that is creating inflationary pressures. From \$22,500 to \$42,500 is 88 percent. Quite an anti-inflation formula, that!

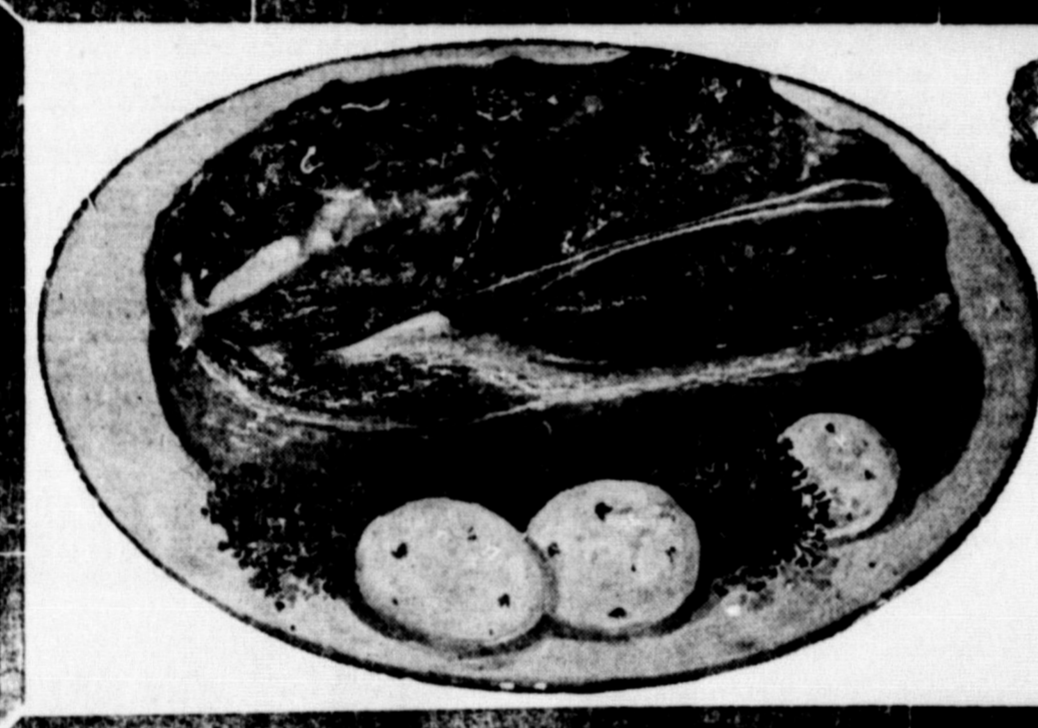

1931 bi-district football team. He lettered three years each in football, basketball, and track.

Dr. Armes then attended Texas Christian University two years where he played Freshman and varsity football. He graduated with a B. A. from Baylor University. While at Baylor he was elected to the "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities." He served as President of Texas B. S. U. from 1936-37. He received the Th. M. degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1940. He received the Honorary Doctor's Degree from Baylor University in 1957.

Dr. Armes was a teacher of Bible at Baylor University from 1938 to 1943. He served as Pastor of Seventh and James Baptist church, Waco, 1943-1949; Polytechnic Baptist Church, Fort Worth, 1949-1963; and First Baptist Church, El Paso, 1964-1968. He is a trustee of Baylor University, a Director of T. A. N. E. and has preached in Hawaii, Europe, Egypt, England, and Japan. Dr. Armes was elected to preach the Annual Sermon for the Texas Baptist General Convention in 1953 and 1963.
