

In fact, many of us are fearful that the scope of information to be sought will have evolved far beyond the purposes intended when provision for the census was

As now planned, the Census Bureau will use two questionaires - a short form for three-fourths of households, which will contain questions on 21 subjects; and a long form which will contain about 120 questions on 67 subjects. It would take a half hour or more to fill out the latter.

There is alarming evidence that the conservative realistic viewpoint is being neglected by the new administration in several areas. One of the most important of these is the State Department. Candidate Nixon promised to give the Department a real housecleaning But Human Events, a reliable Washington newsletter, reports that "there is no evidence available to suggest that such a housecleaning is in the works." Indeed Human Events reports that the top assistant to the Undersecretary of State "is considered a congenial Liberal in






