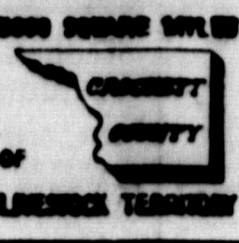

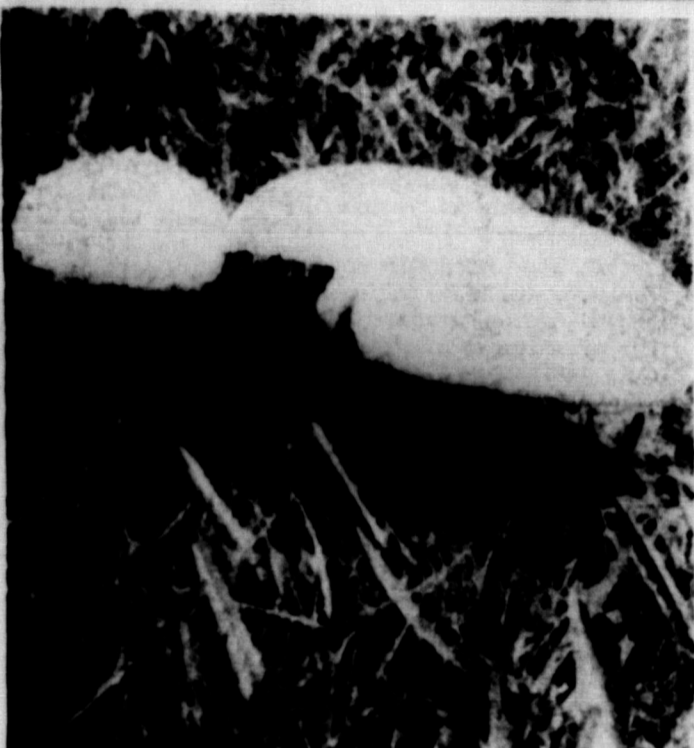
"Not I," said the Cow. "Not I," said the Duck. "Not I," said the Pig. "Equal rights," said the Goose.

Voter Registration Off To Slow Start; All Must Register By January 31 To Vote In 1970

Around 50 Crockett county residents have registered to vote since the registration period opened October 1. Registration ends on January 31, 1970. The 1970 voting year begins on March 1, 1970 and ends on February 28, 1971. This is the period for which the registration is effective.

Several changes have been made in the regulations this year. One of the significant changes under new election laws eliminates the need for the voter to state the exact year and date of birth unless it is the first year for voting. Otherwise the voter may state age as "over 21".

This is not recommended by the local tax office, since many people use their voter registration to prove the age for various reasons, one for social security benefits. If the age does not appear on the voter registration

Spotted Rains Up To 3½ Inches Over Most of Co.

Although Crockett County missed the torrential rainfall received in the Hill Country to the east and in the Del Rio area when the first cold front arrived last weekend, rainfall was general throughout the county, with the heaviest fall in the east and southeast parts of the county.

The official gauge at the water district office recorded 1.29 inches for the two-day period in the city. Most of that total fell late Sunday night an electrical storm that wreaked havoc with electrical transformers on the west side of town. An inch of rain fell in the space of 30 minutes. Water was curbed high in the Village shopping center and in some residential areas at midnight Sunday.

Up to 3½ inches of rainfall was reported on the Charlie Davidson ranch east and southeast of town. Around two inches fell in the northeast section with lesser amounts reported elsewhere.

Temperatures dropped several degrees after the front arrived, bringing the high for the day to around 70 degrees and the low around 50 degrees.

247,000 Pounds Fall Wools Sold In Bid Sale Here

Buyers took approximately 247,000 pounds of fall wool in a sealed bid sale at the Ozona Wool & Mohair Co. here Tuesday.

Ewe wool prices ranged from 37 cents to 48½ cents a pound, with the bulk averaging 44 cents, Randle Brice, manager, reported. Lamb wool averaged 40 cents, with some clips going at a top of 45½ cents down to a low of 30 cents.

Russell Wool Co. of Boston bought 106,000 pounds Forte, Dupree and Sawyer took 104,000 pounds Ballinger Baling Co. 28,000 pounds and Son Drake bought 12,500 pounds for Standard Felt Co.

Funeral Sat. In McCamey For J. Bert Kincaid, 73

Masonic graveside rites were held at 10 a. m. Saturday in McCamey Cemetery for J. Bert Kincaid, 73, McCamey rancher, and former Ozonian, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Kincaid, Sr., pioneer Crockett county ranching couple.

Mr. Kincaid died Thursday afternoon in a San Angelo hospital after a long illness. He was born Oct. 23, 1895, and was reared for the most part in Crockett county where he began ranching on his own in 1916, running sheep and cattle on acreage southwest of Ozona.

He sold his Crockett County land in 1928 and bought the headquarters ranch of the Scharbauer Cattle Co., an oldtime cattle empire which was breaking up then, southeast of Fort Stockton. He started raising Rambouillet and Hereford cattle there and later ranched in Rankin and McCamey.

He was manager of the horse show at the Crockett County Fair for many years and in earlier days raised cavalry mounts for the Army. He served in the Army in both world wars. He was a member of the American Legion post in McCamey and Masonic Lodge 747 in Ozona. He belonged to the Shrine of the Suez Temple in San Angelo and of the San Antonio Masonic Consistory.

His father came to West Texas when he was 19, in the 1890s. He started as a horse wrangler in San Angelo. He also unloaded wool at a local warehouse during his first years there. Later he was one of the organizers of Wool Growers Central Storage Co. He started ranching with cattle and later turned to sheep. By the late 1920s, he held about 72 sections of land.

He retired in 1938 and died in 1953. He was a long-time president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

Bert Kincaid's brother, T. A. Kincaid, Jr., also was a president of the TS&GRA. He lives in the La Vernia area, having moved there from Ozona, to raise cattle and sheep on Coastal Bermuda grass. He and his wife were instrumental in establishment of the Miss Wool of America Pageant.

Other survivors include three sons, Bert Kincaid, Jr., and Carson Kincaid, both of Fort Stockton and Gaines Kincaid of Austin; a daughter, Mrs. Sandra Eton of Ft. Worth; five sisters, Mrs. Lee Childress, Mrs. Victor Pierce, Mrs. S. M. Harvick and Mrs. W. E. Friend, Jr., all of Ozona and Mrs. R. P. Lynn of San Angelo and eight grandchildren.

Crockett Gas Confirmation Is Completed

The Fergus (multipay Grayburg gas) field of Crockett County gained its second lower Grayburg producer and a location south extension of Burk Gas Co., Wichita Falls, No. 1 H. M. Half Estate, four miles southeast of Iraan and one location northeast of an unidentified Permian was discovered.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.5 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations at 1,858-898 feet, which had been fractured with 12,000 pounds of sand and 8,000 gallons of oil.

Original application was filed July 25, 1965 by H. L. Durst, Abilene, as the No. 1-D H. M. Half Estate as a 6,700-foot Ellenburger wildcat. It was drilled to 2,300 feet, where 5½-inch casing was set, and reportedly taken over by Gulf Central Jan. 24, 1967.

Location is 467 feet from the north and 7,355 feet from the east lines of 68-1-1&GN.

The unidentified strike, Harding Brothers Oil & Gas Co., Abilene, No. 1 H. M. Half Estate, was finalized Feb. 15 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,450,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day from open hole at 540-1,170 feet.

The Fergus opener, John H. Chalmers, Abilene, No. 1-69 Half Estate, was finalized Nov. 27, 1967, from the upper Grayburg for a calculated, absolute open flow of 25 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 1,684-719 feet; and from the lower Grayburg for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3.8 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 1,806-850 feet.

Soil Conservation District To Elect Director Oct. 14

Residents of Sub-division 1 of the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District have an election date to keep on October 14. Pete W. Jacoby, County Agricultural Agent, says the election is very important and he urges all eligible voters to cast their ballot.

Voters in Sub-division 1, will elect a rancher to serve as their director and representative on the Soil and Water Conservation District Board for the next year. Time and place for the October 14 balloting is 7:30 p. m. at the SOCS Office, Bill Baggett is the present supervisor of Sub-division 1.

A qualified voter is a landowner in Sub-division 1 who is 21 years of age or older. Wives of eligible landowners can vote and should do so since they have an interest in their soil and water conservation district.

The agent points out that Soil and Water Conservation Districts are sub-divisions of the State of Texas and by law are charged with the responsibility of carrying out a soil and water conservation program in their district. Through them such items as technical service, equipment, leadership in small watershed projects and many other services are provided to cooperating landowners.

DIRKSEN'S LEGACY

With the death of Senator Dirksen, the body politic lost one of the last great orators. No one remains to fill the void he left. Whether you liked him or not, the Illinois Republican was a true newsmaker and no reporter could ignore him, even if he wanted to.

Dirksen was a showman and many who knew him believed the senator would have been as much at home on the stage as he was in the halls of Congress. It has even been said that his trademark — the ruffled hair — was a put-on. One report tells of the senator's purposely mussing his hair prior to a news conference.

The senator was no clown, though. He may have played to the cameras and the microphones when he discussed his garden or his pet project of having the marigold named the national flower but he was firmly dedicated to many worthy proposals that would affect our nation in a more substantial way.

One was on the question of reapportionment of voting districts in the state legislatures, which had been upset by the Warren Court. The man from Illinois was dedicated to returning to the states the power to decide their own form of government. He believed that the founders of this nation intended no interference by the federal government into the internal affairs of the

individual states and their chosen forms of representation.

Another important measure the late senator stressed was the constitutional amendment to reverse the 1962 Supreme Court ruling that outlawed prayers in public schools. Recent actions by school boards and civil governments show that this issue is still prominent in many quarters. He hoped that the Senate will stop sitting on this legislation and bring it to the floor for open debate. We hope, too, that Mr. Dirksen's amendment is brought forth and passed. It would be a fitting legacy for the nation from one who served it long and well.

TIPS
For Gardeners

From
The Ozona Garden Club
By Mrs. Bailey Post

October and November are
my favorite months of the
year. The countryside is a-
glow with the beautiful fall
colors and very few sand
storms to mar the fall
blooms. They are the months
to plan and start planting
for next year's gardens.

Bulbs are on the market
now and should be selected
this month. Check over your
garden now and note the
places where you will need
new plants.

Plants should be watered
sufficiently to help store up
food for next springs growth.
If you intend to have pans-
ies, calendulas and other
cool weather plants in bloom
around Christmas, they
should be planted now.

Before frost time, move
your indoors plants outside
for two or three weeks. Ap-
ply liquid fertilizer and wa-
ter to encourage growth.
Place where the hot after-
noon sun won't burn the fol-
iage. A choice place would
be beneath trees or large
shrubs. Be sure to bring
them inside when frost is
predicted.

Plants that have been out-
side during the summer, but
need to be brought in for
the winter, should be burn-
ed and sprayed with insecti-
cide to avoid bringing bugs
and worms inside the house.
Flowering house plants
bloom more profusely if

their roots are slightly
crowded. Re-pot in larger
size pots only the plants that
were pot bound last winter.

Pecan tree problems

Sanitation practices will
keep down insect and disease
problems of pecan trees next
year. Prune all dead wood
and broken branches. Pick
up from under tree and rake
thoroughly. Leaves, when
packed down, harbor insects
and disease. Paint damaged
or pruned areas if over 1 1/2".
Dormant oil sprays used af-
ter leaves fall and before
buds swell will control scale.

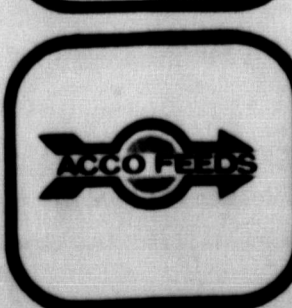

gistered for 30 days before they can vote.
Crockett county residents must make application for registration to the county tax assessor - collector. Application may be made either by mail, on a voter registration application form which can be obtained from the assessor-collector's office, or a personal appearance in his office or before a deputy who has been authorized to serve at some other location. There is no charge for registration.

The husband, wife, father, mother, son, or daughter of a voter may act as the voter's agent in applying for registration if the relative is a qualified voter in the same county. Except for these listed relatives, which do not include persons related by marriage, no one may act as agent for the voter in applying for registration.
