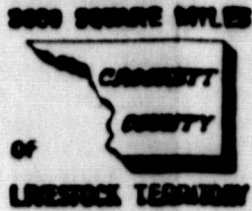

Crockett County 4-H Members Win Rutherford Award As Outstanding 4-H Clubbers In 25-County Dist.

Two Crockett County 4-H club members have been named outstanding 4-H club girl and boy in the 24-county extension District-6 of West Texas when both were named winners of the J. T. Rutherford Achievement Trophies, by a district 4-H record book judging committee. Selected for this honor were Mary Jane Martinez, daughter of Mrs. Elvira Martinez, and Don Edgerton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles B. Edgerton.

Mary Jane and Don will each receive a gold medal and have their names inscribed on the two large revolving trophies, which remain in the county for one year.

Crockett County will retain permanent possession of the boy's J. T. Rutherford Trophy, which under district rules allows a county to retain a trophy when it has won it three times. Two former Crockett County 4-H members have won the boy's trophy, David Jacoby in 1963 and Larry Williams in 1964. This trophy will join the first J. T. Rutherford trophy for 4-H boys in the 4-H trophy case in the County Agent's office. Crockett County retired the first trophy in 1960, won that year by Bill Jacoby, Pierce Miller, who was the winner in 1959 and Carl Conklin in 1956.

This is the first time that a 4-H club girl from the county has been named winner of the J. T. Rutherford Achievement trophy, which is the original trophy, having never been won three times by one county in the district.

Another "first" for the J. T. Rutherford trophies since they were first awarded in 1955, is that Crockett County now has all three trophies in its possession—the only county to hold this distinction.

Garden Club Sponsors Fall Cleanup Drive

The annual fall clean-up, sponsored by the Ozona Garden Club will be held the first week in November.

Trucks will be available daily Monday through Friday, Nov. 3-7, to pick up trash and unwanted items. There is no charge and residents do not need to call for a truck. All refuse must be stacked near the curb or where it may easily loaded on truck.

Residents are urged to take this opportunity to clean up vacant lots, rent property and yards. The Garden Club sponsors the clean-up each year to aid residents and keep the town clean and uncluttered.

Crockett Field Gains Extension

The Encotrado (Strawn and Pennsylvanian detrital) field of Crockett County gained its second Strawn producer and a location northeast extension with completion of King Resources Co., Midland, No. 2-A Continental Harris, Ellenburger failure, 32 miles northwest of Ozona.

It was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 190 barrels of 44 gravity oil, plus 30 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,000-1. Production was through a 24-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,444-447 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons.

Drilled to 9,040 feet, with 5 1/2-inch casing set at 9,015 feet, it is plugged back to 8,506 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of 11-3-WCRR.

The Strawn opener, the firm's No. 1 Harathon-Harris, was finalized Sept. 17 to pump 82 barrels of oil, plus 590 barrels of water, through perforations at 8,437-439 feet.

The field has two Pennsylvanian detrital wells.

Junior Varsity Trims Sonora 6-0

Ozona's junior varsity broke into the win column Thursday night with a 6-0 win over the Sonora eleven. Tonight they travel to Big Lake for their first encounter with the junior Owls. The game starts at 6 o'clock.

The junior Lions, who suffered their first defeat at the hands of Sonora earlier in the season, played a fine defensive game. Their score came after a drive put the ball on the Sonora 7-yd. line and quarterback Gerald Huff hit halfback Tim Evans in the end zone. The PAT was no good, but the lone score was all the Lions needed to pick up their first win of the season.

The junior high Cubs will host the Big Lake seventh and eighth graders tonight in a double header at Lion Stadium. Game time is 5 o'clock.

Public Education Week Proclaimed By Cancer Society

Members of the local chapter of the American Cancer Society have proclaimed next week "Public Education Week." The chapter will endeavor to educate the public on the perils of cigarette smoking.

Mrs. John Lee Henderson, publicity chairman, said the week would close with a ceremony for presentation of "IQ" pins to smokers who have kicked the habit. The presentation will take place in the Villager Shopping Center Friday afternoon Oct. 24. A local band will furnish music for the occasion and the Mobil Unit will be stationed nearby.

The Mobil Unit, featuring color slide programs connecting smoking with cancer, will be in Ozona all next week at various locations. School children as well as the public in general are urged to visit the unit while it is in town.

Minor Accident On City Street

Local highway patrolmen investigated only one accident in the county this week and it was minor.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Ave. D and 8th St. Tuesday morning. Kathy Lynn Russell was attempting to turn her 1965 Ford in the intersection when she was struck by a 1964 Chevrolet driven by Mrs. Alton Reed. There were no injuries and damage to both cars was estimated at around \$225.

Commissioners Order Trucks For Use In Cleanup

Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday in the commissioners court room in regular monthly session.

Routine quarterly reports were received and read.

A request from the Ozona Garden Club for the use of county trucks in the annual fall clean-up was submitted. The court agreed to put the trucks in use November 3-7 for the purpose of picking up refuse and trash from residences and vacant lots.

The annual state conference of county judges and commissioners to be held in Dallas next week was discussed. Judge Bernice Bailey Jones will leave Wednesday to attend the meeting.

Chandler Ranch Angus Herd To Be Dispersed Oct. 20

In one of the largest registered cattle sales ever held, the E. H. Chandler Ranch Angus herd will be dispersed Oct. 20, 21 and 22 at the ranch at Sutherland Springs, Tex., 24 miles southeast of San Antonio. More than 1,800 lots of cattle will sell.

Practically all born and raised on the Chandler ranch, these are strictly grass cattle, bred to utilize grass and live on pasture.

The Chandler ranch, 2,000 acres of irrigated Coastal Bermuda, has been sold with possession date Nov. 1, so the herd must be dispersed before that time. Tom & Associates, San Antonio, will be sale managers.

E. H. "Early" Chandler, lifelong West Texas rancher who still has a large commercial cattle operation near Ozona, came east near the end of the drought of the 1950's and bought a tract of land in Wilson County. A good supply of irrigation water was available but the property was heavily infested with brush and practically worthless. Out of this he created one of the most efficient grass production ranches in the state. He purchased registered Angus and went into large volume production of quality cattle bred to gain on grass alone. Keeping his best heifers and increasing his numbers up to the present time, he has sold

Lions Invade Crane For First District Contest

The Ozona Lions will invade the territory of the Golden Cranes tomorrow night hoping to knock the Cranes out of their nest and pick up a win in their first district game of the season.

Crane sports 13 returning lettermen and their offense is sparked by the hot passing of Ricky Anderegg, and All-district fullback L. V. Tension, who weighs in at 190 pounds. Billy Burton, All-District linebacker and 3-year letterman, heads up the Crane defense.

The Lions will be out to avoid the bad breaks that have plagued them all year long. They feel that if they can contain the Cranes' passing attack, they will be able to hold them on the ground.

Fullback Moose Coates and end David Pagan will be at full strength and ready for the Golden Cranes, both boys playing the last two games with knee injuries.

Statistics showed the Lions were about even with the Iran Braves last Friday night in spite of the fact that they lost the game 19-0. Both teams had 10 first downs. The Braves had a total offense of 239 yards and the Lions 209 yards. The Braves had 225 yards rushing and 14 passing. Long runs after breaking through the middle of the Lions' defensive line accounted for the three touchdowns.

The Lions had 104 yards rushing and 105 yards passing. Jim Montgomery was 5 out of 12 in the passing department for 58 yards. David Williams was 2 out of 3 for 47 yards. Montgomery was the leading rusher with 33 yards on 13 carries, followed by Coates with 33 yards on 14 carries.

David Pagan was the leading pass receiver, catching 5 for 88 yards. Torres caught 1 pass for 12 yards and Coates 1 for 5 yards.

Pagan led the defense with 24 tackles, followed by Tom Davidson with 21 and Cuatro Davidson with 11.

PO Gives Hints For Christmas Overseas Mail

Postmaster Floyd Hokit reminded residents of mailing requirements for Christmas packages overseas this week. To assure Christmas delivery packages should be mailed early.

Gift items should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong faced fiberboard. The box should be securely wrapped in heavy paper and well tied with cord. It should be packed with plenty of cushioning material.

It is important that those mailing packages overseas insert a slip, listing the contents of the box, name and address of sender and addressee. All addresses should be legible and APO or FPO numbers should be the same as the zip code. Zip code must be used in the address.

If in doubt, mailers may check with the post office about custom regulations and prohibitions.

Domestic rates apply to APOs. Packages for surface transportation should be mailed not later than Nov. 8 for Christmas delivery. Space available packages should be mailed before Nov. 22 and parcel airlift not later than Nov. 29. Airmail packages may be mailed between Dec. 1 and Dec. 13.

A kick-off supper will be held Monday night to launch the annual Concho Valley Council of the Boy Scouts of America Fund Drive, it was announced this week by local Scout leaders. Time and place for the supper had not been determined at press time.

Proceeds of the coming drive will assist local Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorer Post in furthering their respective programs through leadership provided through the Concho Valley Council. Principal administrative records for training of leaders, advancement records, membership and rechartering are handled in the Council offices. The Council makes available to local leadership supplies for literature, certificates and badges and the Council maintains Scout camps at Sol Mayer and Camp Fawcett where local Scouts may attend through the summer for a small charge.

Local leaders are aiming this year's drive toward increasing sustaining memberships. There are a number of such supporters here who have contributed a stated amount monthly for many years, thus relieving the committee of the necessity of calling on them at drive time and spreading the Council's revenue through the year for more orderly operation.

We'd scarcely be in position to convincingly argue with a smoker since we puffed them with relish for more than forty years. True, our puffing came to a screeching halt nine years ago next month. True, we encountered no difficulty in breaking the habit.

We have traveled the road of all smokers — I'm going to quit! I've thought the resolve firm, only to find the overpowering grip of desire wip'ing away all thought of resolve. We've impatiently awaited the end of a show or meeting to meet the call of the cigarette. We've felt the sting of conscience as a song-suffering non-smoking

wife endured the stench as she emptied full ashtrays, day after day, after day.

Knowing the pull of the habit, we could hardly expect to be believed when we say we broke off with the weed one night, have never touched one since, never felt a bit of uneasiness, never felt a pang of appetite for a smoke.

But we had an advantage. We came back — back from an examining doctor's verdict of "three to six months." Then, the towering agony of a chest operation which persists for many days, made a cigarette a most trivial thing. So, being convinced of the culprit's identity, it was little trouble to leave them alone — we'd a little rather pick up the business end of a rattlesnake, anyway.
