Thanks to the local nut of the American Cancer Society in general and the publicity chairman, Martha Henderson, in particular, the Ozona has become overly aware of the hazards of smoking. Smokers are feeling guilty. Smokers are smug and those who have never smoked don't know what all the commotion is about. Nobody wants to quit cold turkey, so there has been a run on mentholated lozenges. Smokers who have tried the lozenges and found that they didn't work have ordered cigarette holders that gradually cut down on the smoke flow until finally the smoker is only sucking on the holder and has indeed quit for all practical purposes. The holders may be ordered from the ACS. They have a regulator on them with positions from nine down to zero. ## Ozona High School Continues In AA Classification Another Two Years; Coahoma Joins Dist. 5-AA

Superintendent L. B. T. Sikes received official confirmation late last week that the Ozona School District has again been classified double A. The classification is for 1970 and 1971 and the district will be the same, Class 5-AA.

The state committee of the Interscholastic League meeting in Austin notified Sikes of the decision. Class AA takes in schools with an average membership of from 229 to 500 students for a two year period. Ozona high school has maintained an average of 243 students for the past two years.

Coahoma has been added to Class 5-AA, otherwise the schools are the same. Ozona, Big Lake, McCamey, Stanton and Crane. Ozona has one of the lowest student averages in the district.

When Ozona moved into Class AA two years ago it was the general opinion that the school would return to its Class A classification this year. The oilfield boom was responsible for the increased student average at that time and the average did drop this year, but not enough to fall below the 229 average for the 2-year period.

### Lions Drop 28-0 District Opener To Golden Cranes

After dropping their district opener to Crane 28-0, the Ozona Lions will have an open date this Friday to prepare for the invasion of the Big Lake Owls next week.

The Lions have improved their defensive game, but have been unable to move their offense the last three games. The Golden Cranes had a big, tough defensive line and their middle guard, Billy Burton, was in the Ozona backfield almost before the ball was snapped. The Ozona quarterbacks had to choose between getting tackled with the ball, trying to run or getting off a rushed pass.

On defense the Lions managed to hold the beefy Cranes to four touchdowns. They also held their passing game to 83 yards. Considering the fact that the Golden Cranes had the ball two-thirds of the game, the Lions did a good job of holding the score down.

David Pagan and Tom Davidson headed up the Lion defense with 19 tackles each, followed by Tony Wheeler with 15, Tommy Jenkins with 14 and Quatro Davidson with 11.

The Lions are still slowed down with injuries, but expect to hold their own with the highly touted Big Lake

Producers should notify the ASC office of the number of head of adult sheep, goats, and/or lambs and kids shorn, the month of shearing with the total pounds of hair or wool shorn. This information should be furnished the office when the product is delivered to the warehouse.

The Crockett-Sutton ASCS Committees will begin their terms Oct. 1. The Crockett Committee is made up of Sam Perner, Nat Read and Frank McMullan. Committees for Sutton County are W. L. Whitehead, W. B. McMillan and Bill Wade.

The committees will determine policies and maximum limitations for the 1970 program as soon as information is received.

Producers are urged to notify the local office of any change in ranching units, purchase or sale of land, leases, or any changes or divisions of estates in order that the ASCS may keep records current and be able to advise of eligibility for ASCS participation. Producers will be notified of provisions and sign-up dates as soon as possible.

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**Ozona Delegate Reports On Cancer Society Meeting**

The American Cancer Society has 41 research grants totaling \$1,181,376 at 11 Texas research institutions according to Mrs. Milton Nicholas, Campaign Chairman for Crockett County. Nationally, the Society's research grants total over 21 million dollars. Mrs. Nicholas was the Crockett County unit's delegate to the Society's twenty-fourth annual meeting held in Houston last week.

Mrs. Nicholas reported that the Society made progress in all program areas, some of which were: serving

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8,443 cancer patients with cancer dressings, hospital equipment, gift items and other services; supporting 21 tumor clinics with a total of 105,247 cancer cases reported in registries as of September 1, 1969; presenting educational programs to over 1,530,000 people in clubs, schools, colleges and where they work; granting 15 clinical fellowships totaling \$54,000 and raising \$2,200,000 in the April Crusade. "We are proud of these accomplishments," Mrs. Nicholas stated. "But we are concerned about the fact that cancer will kill an estimated 326,000 Americans in 1970 when earlier and better treatment could save about 103,000 of these deaths," Mrs. Nicholas said.

Of local interest was the election by the Board of Directors, of Dr. Charles F. Browne, of Sonora, to serve on the State Board of Directors for 1969-70.

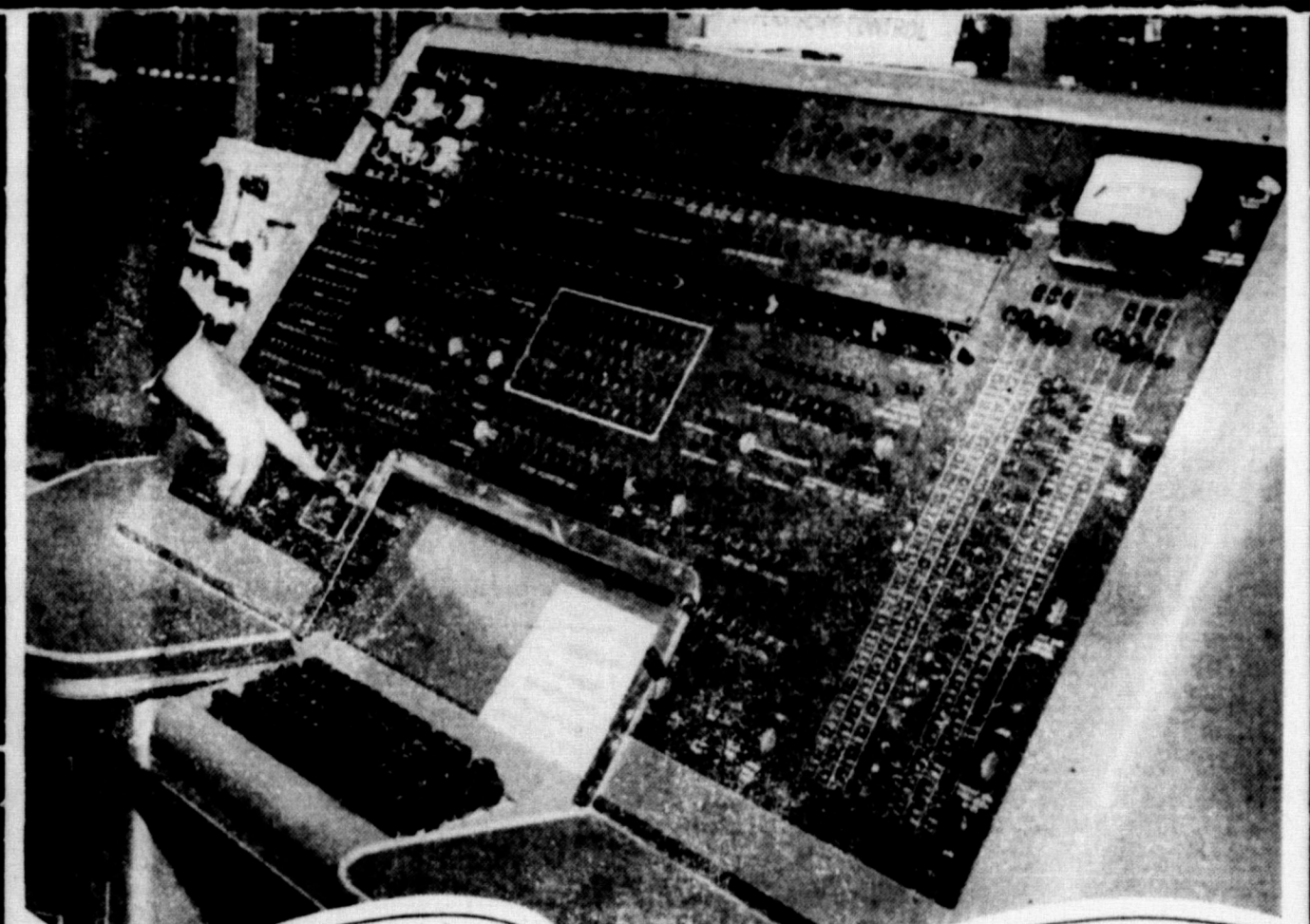
Special Observance Planned By WCS

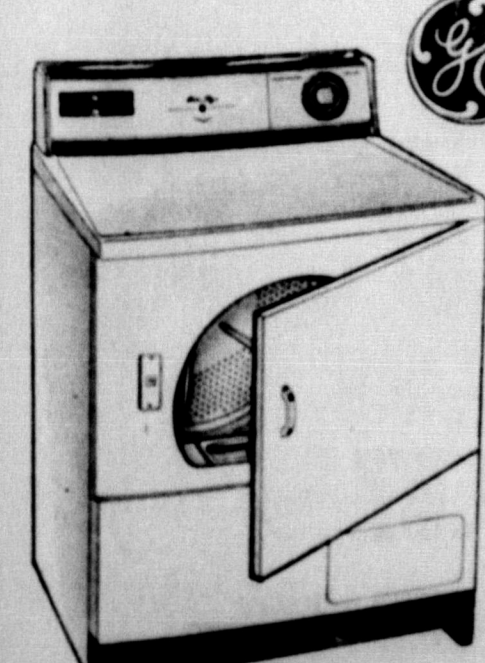
