J. Cleo Thompson Drilling Wildcat Test Ellenburger

J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, has rescheduled to wildcat depth of 8,500 feet, sufficient to test the Ellenburger, his No. 9 Thompson Fee, previously scheduled 6,800-foot Canyon test in the Ozona, Northwest (Canyon gas and Spraberry oil) field of Crockett County, 2 1/2 miles northwest of Ozona, five miles northwest of depleted Ellenburger gas production in the Ozona, East multipay field and 6 1/2 miles south of Ellenburger oil production in the Holt Ranch multipay field. Location, on a 341.4-acre lease, is 1,320 feet from the south and east lines of the northwest quarter of 46-OP-GC&SF.

The Canyon Co., Midland, will drill two outposts to the Ozona (Canyon sand) field of southwest Crockett County, 29 miles southwest of Ozona.

Both projects, in 4-2-I&GN, are scheduled for 7,000 feet with rotary.

The No. 1-4 J. S. Pierce, 1/2 mile southwest is 1,414.7 feet from the north and 2,624.2 feet from the east lines.

The No. 2-4 J. S. Pierce, 1 1/2 miles southwest, is 1,320 feet from the south and 1,552 feet from the west lines.

Graveside Rites Friday Afternoon For Fred Fletcher

Graveside services for Fred Fletcher, Jr., 57, will be held Friday afternoon at 3 p. m. in Lima Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home. Mr. Fletcher died at his home here late Monday night after an illness. He had been a resident of Ozona for the past 20 years, working as a plumbing contractor. He was born Dec. 7, 1911 in Carrizo Springs. He was married to Vivian Holliday and Oct. 8, 1958 in Brackettville. Surviving are his wife, a brother, Ralph White of Del Rio; 2 sisters, Ida Mae Hill of Del Rio and Kathy Dickson of California, and several nieces and nephews.

Early Morning Showers Add To Nov. Moisture

LIONS FINISH 3rd IN DISTRICT, WIN OVER McCAMEY IN FINALE

A fired up bunch of Ozona Lions trounced the McCamey Badgers here Friday night to the tune of 19-6, taking third place in District 5-AA play and ending the season with the same district record as the Lions had last year. After a scoreless first quarter, the Lions' Ruben Tambunga hit paydirt on a 2-yd. sweep. The conversion failed, but the next time the Lions got the ball David Pagan caught a 35-yd. touchdown pass from Jim Montgomery to give the Lions another tally. Just before the half Tambunga broke loose for 15 yards and another Lion score. Pagan kicked the point after and the Lions took a 19-0 lead with them to the dressing room.

Following the half, the hapless Badgers who outweighed the Lions about 20 pounds per man, decided to use fisticuffs. This also failed, and two Badgers were thrown off the field by the field by the officials. After the smoked cleared, the quarter ended with neither side mustering a score. The Badgers were forced to take to the air, however reluctantly, as they had four of their five passes intercepted in the first half. Kyle Bolen hit Randy Brooks late in the fourth quarter for the lone Badger score. The conversion failed and the game ended 19-6 in favor of the Lions.

A much improved Lion defense held the Badgers scoreless on the ground, even though they racked up a total of 214 yards rushing and 11 first downs. The Lions intercepted 5 Badger passes and recovered 2 fumbles, while the Badgers passed for 52 yards and were 4 out of 19 in the passing department.

The Lions had 193 yards rushing and 133 passing for a total yardage of 326 and 18 first downs. They completed 5 passes out of 9 attempts fumbled 1 time and got one pass picked off.

Ruben Tambunga was the leading rusher for the Lions with 112 yards in 23 carries and 2 touchdowns. Tommy Conner at fullback carried 13 times for 30 yards, Pete Perez carried 5 times for 17 yards and Mike Schneider carried once for 19 yards.

David Williams and Jim Montgomery passed for 133 yards and one touchdown.

Heading up the defense was Tom Davidson with 14 tackles, followed by Chuck Womack and Sooner Williams with 10 each. Quatro Davidson and David Pagan had 10 tackles each.

Intercepting Badger passes were Tambunga 2, Montgomery 2, and Arturo Torres 1. Pagan and Schneider each recovered a Badger fumble.

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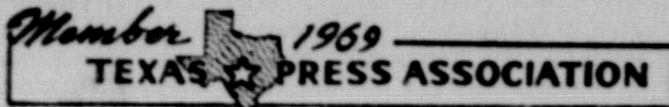

NATIONAL FAMILY HEALTH WEEK

In November National Family Health Week was proclaimed by President Nixon. The proclamation came as a result of House Joint Resolution No. 712 introduced by Representative Carter (R-Ky.) and Senate Joint Resolution No. 46 presented for passage by the late Senator Everett Dirksen (R-Ill.).

The designation is somewhat misleading as to the purpose of this special week. Perhaps a better name would be National Family Doctor Week, for the proposal was made in honor of these medical specialists. Rep. Car-

ter said: "The passage of this legislation focuses national attention on one of the most meaningful developments to take place within our health care structure in recent years, the recognition of the role played by the family doctor in the delivery of health care services to the American public."

The American Academy of General Practice is the second largest medical organization in the United States with over 31,000 members in its 52 chapters, encompassing all of the 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. The Academy, organized in 1947, is keyed to providing the public with medical care by a primary-contact physician. They stress a program based on preventive, as well as curative, medicine. They believe, as we do, that the American family should have access to a personal, family doctor, one who knows the entire family and can provide for its total health needs.

For decades American medicine had been primarily the field of the family doctors. He was the family friend in times of need during sickness, in times of anticipation such as pregnancy, in times of joy such as births. He was the close ally against pain and disease. The specialists have come along and over the years the family doctor seemed to be fading from the scene. Now he is making a long overdue come back with new specialized training. We hope that his week will become an annual event. We hope that his specialty — the entire family — will never be without him again.
