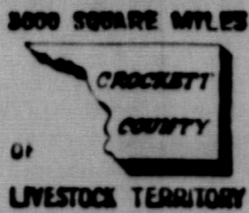

## Dr. Coker Plans To Leave Ozona After January 1

Dr. Randle Coker informed County Judge Bernice Jones during the monthly meeting of the commissioners court Monday that he will close his medical office January 1, and leave Ozona.

In an interview with the Stockman Tuesday afternoon, Dr. Coker said that he and Mrs. Coker will move to Indio, Calif. where he will have a general medical practice. He said that he made his decision to leave Ozona Monday after considerable thought.

"It was a hard decision to make," he declared.

Doctor Coker said he decided to make the move for a variety of reasons. Indio has two hospitals, one an 80-bed and the other a 40-bed institution. It is a town of around 50,000 population with several smaller towns nearby.

Doctor and Mrs. Coker came here in April and he opened his medical office in May. Mrs. Coker helped him in the office until her appointment as hospital administrator, a post she resigned last week.

Mrs. Ray Chamness of Ozona was in Levelland Monday to attend funeral services for her nephew, Sp-5 Danny Richard Latham, who was killed in Vietnam Dec. 7.

## Lions 68-46 Win Over Eldorado In Sixth Straight

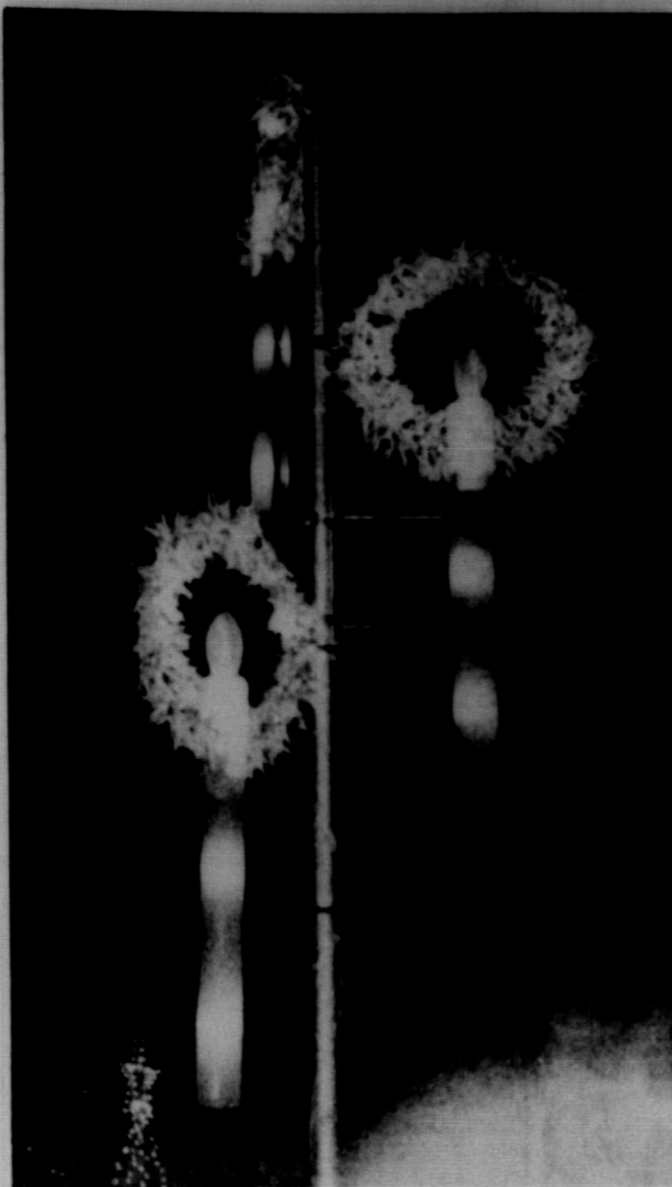
The Ozona Lions remained undefeated Friday night by winning their sixth ballgame of the season against Eldorado by a score of 68-46. The B team beat the Eldorado squad by the lopsided score of 73-20. Games scheduled with Sonora for Dec. 8 have been cancelled and the Lions will not see action again until Jan. 2 when they travel to San Angelo for three games with Lakeview high school, freshman, B team, and varsity.

Mickey McBroom was high point man for the Lions Friday night against Eldorado with 18 points, followed by Will Collett with 17. Tommy Jenkins and Arturo Torres had 9 points each.

The Lions' percentage from the free-throw line was somewhat improved with 59 percent, but Coach Spieker says it must be improved. They shot 47 percent from the field and Spieker said this percentage was enough to win ballgames.

Coach Jim Williams B team has improved by leaps and bounds since the season opener and had no trouble subduing the Eldorado five. High point man was Chuck Womack with 18, followed by Mike Jenkins with 11. Randy Crawford and Gary Whitley had 10 points each.

### South Side Lions To Give Away Bike

Tickets are being sold by the Southside Lions Club for a chance on a \$59.95 bicycle. The drawing will be held Dec. 27 and the winner announced then.

The tickets are 50 cents and may be purchased from any member of the club.

Under the agreement, Pan Ocean will acquire from The Canyon Company of Ozona and Midland, all working interest in at least 44 gas wells a gas transmission line and gathering system and a gasoline plant, all now nearing completion.

The property involved is about 30 miles southwest of Ozona, an area of about 10 square miles of proven production area being developed by The Canyon Company, and ranch lands owned by Ira Carson, Austin Mills-paugh, Joe Pierce and others.

The gasoline plant with a daily capacity of 50 million cubic feet of gas, is in the last stages of construction, according to Pete Clingman, production and drilling field foreman for Canyon in the area. Operators plan to be passing gas through the system in the next few days. The gathering system is about complete from existing wells to the plant which will separate liquids from the gas and send the dry gas into pipelines of Coastal States Pipeline Co. for delivery to the Texas coast. Liquids will be stored and trucked from the site to delivery points.

The field is still being developed with drilling rigs now completing four new wells a week. Production depth averages about 7,000 feet.

Stanley R. Rawn, Jr., Pan Ocean chairman, in announcements to news media, said that the company expects to be selling gas early in 1970 to a subsidiary of Coastal States Gas Producing Co. with liquids to be sold locally by truck delivery.

Pan Ocean is said to have substantial interests in exploratory programs in the U. S. and 13 foreign countries and recently offered its stock in the over-the-counter market.

A LAW AGAINST VULTURISM

Although not grammatically correct, we are all familiar with the phrase "There oughta be a law". And we heard it often during the November "moratorium". As you may recall, the "peace" marchers in Washington, D. C., as well as in some other cities, carried placards bearing the names of men who have given their lives for freedom in South Vietnam.

Many wives, parents and close relatives of these war heroes sought court injunctions to prevent the unauthorized use of their loved one's names. These next-of-kin protested that their men would not have supported the assorted "peaceniks", hippies, yuppies, and collaborators in life, and therefore their names were being used against what their wishes would have been. We agree. There is no way to justify this sort of act. The best way to describe it might be call it vulturism.

In Philadelphia the judge

responded to the next-of-kin request, and granted the ban. But a "liberal" judge in the Nation's Capital did not.

We are unable to explain, or to even guess, by what guideline the District of Columbia judge allowed the unauthorized use of these soldiers' names, but we do believe that for the future protection of the rights to privacy of the families, as well as the rights of the dead, there ought to be a law that will end such practice for all time without the slightest legal loophole. Such a piece of legislation has been introduced by Rep. Albert Watson (R-S.C.). The proposed law would ban the exploitation of the names of war dead without the express consent of the next-of-kin. This, it appears to us, makes sense.

We hope that those of our readers who believe as we do will write to their congressmen and U. S. senators and urge that this bill be enacted before the names of our war dead are once more used in these displays of extremely poor taste.

Lynching America

The global publicity given to the massacre at Song My, South Vietnam — or Pinkville, as it has been dubbed — proved effective counter to the communists to America's second extraordinary space voyage to the moon. While the people of the world should have had their attention focused on the remarkable feat of the United States in sending a second team of astronauts to the moon, much of the attention was directed to a story of atrocities allegedly committed at "Pinkville".

Now, unquestionably, the American people deeply disapprove of cruel treatment of civilians in warfare. The United States Army, in the conduct of the war in Vietnam, has bent over backwards to prevent harsh treatment of the civilian population — even in areas where "civilians" almost certainly serve as auxiliaries to the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese regular units. This remarkable record of U. S. restraint has not been respected or even noted by the leftwing commentators around the world who have sought to use the alleged incidents at "Pinkville" as a means of destroying the reputation of the United States.

It may be that certain individuals at Song My are responsible for atrocities. Under the American system, however, a man is presumed innocent until proved guilty. The television networks, however, have done everything possible to prejudge the case the Army has been developing against individuals allegedly responsible for civilian deaths at "Pinkville". The power of publicity has been used to undermine the cause of justice. It is very questionable, therefore, whether a fair trial can be obtained for the accused.

If individuals are guilty, the American people will

want them punished to the full extent of the law. However, the American people certainly do not want any special "war crime tribunal," as has been suggested. Such a tribunal would constitute ex post facto law, which is contrary to everything in the constitution of the United States.

Distinguished students of the law, such as the late Senator Robert A. Taft, years ago exposed the extralegal character of the Nuremberg trials. It would be shocking and outrageous beyond words for the United States to create — because of worldwide publicity — a synthetic court aimed at punishing a small number of selected defendants. Such a creation would be a violation of every tradition of Anglo-Saxon jurisprudence.

It should be recognized, however, that the leftwingers regard the "Pinkville" accusations as a marvelous opportunity to attack and downgrade the United States for its defense of freedom in Southeast Asia. Though the allegations of atrocities in Song My really pertain to the reported actions of individual soldiers in Vietnam, the leftists have worked hard to link the alleged killings to the overall American policy and involvement in Vietnam.

Left-oriented newspapers in Great Britain, for instance, have said that the United States is duty bound to reexamine its commitment in Vietnam because of the "Pinkville" incidents. That's an absurd argument. It atrocities took place at Song My, or "Pinkville" as the hamlet is referred to, these are the work of individual wrong-doers, not the United States or the U. S. Army.

The U. S. public has to recognize that leftists are using the Song My "atrocity" story as an excuse for a lynching party. The leftists aren't interested in bringing individuals to justice. Their real interest is in "stringing up" the reputation of the United States. And they are finding plenty of propagandists who are

eager to describe Americans as "fascists" and "Nazis" and who are ready to cultivate hatred of the United States by the promotion of charges that have not been proved in court. The leftists aren't interested in the trial of accused individuals. They want a political trial of the United States or, better yet — from their viewpoint — a "necktie party" in which the U. S. is the victim.

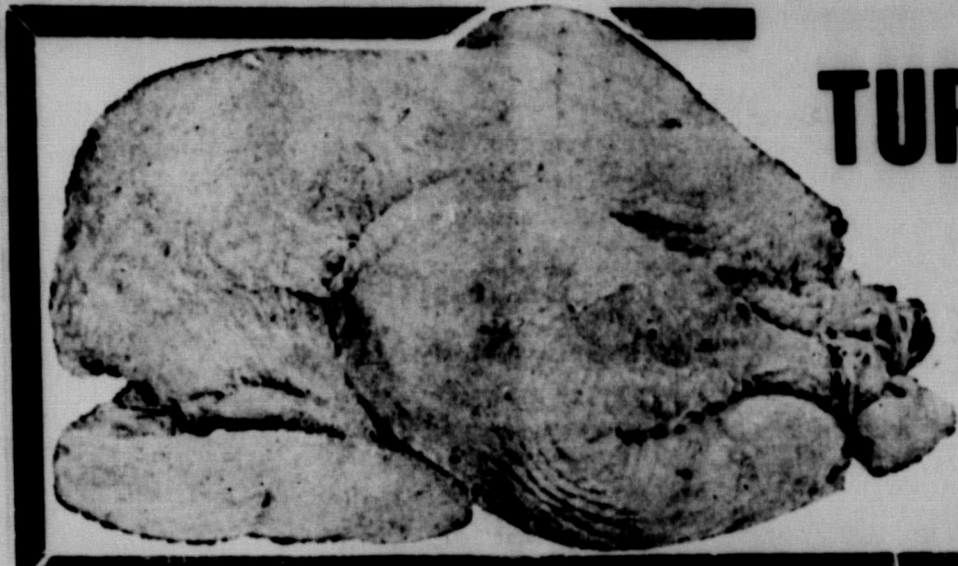

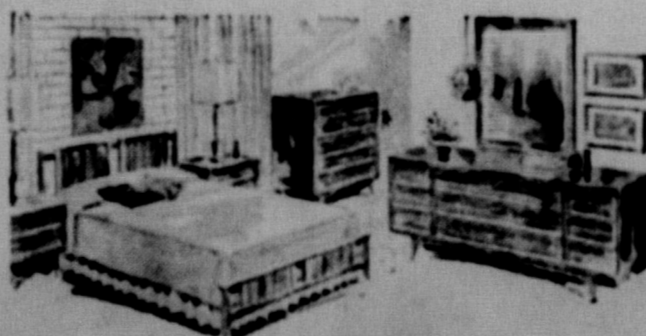

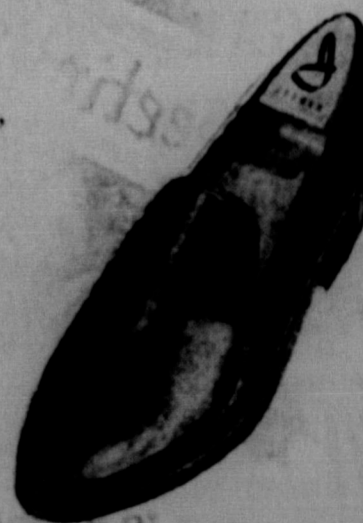

### MAJOR DAMAGE IN WASHINGTON D. C. BY MORATORIUM MARCHERS

Following is an excerpt from the weekly letter to constituents by Congressman Ed Foreman of the New Mexico District, Texas district which Congressman from a Crockett County.

Counting the moral damage given to our country by our Communist adversaries by their march on the Nation's Capitol on the November 15th moratorium demonstrators the taxpayers over one half million dollars, private business income an estimated \$240,000.

In addition to these costs, the Justice Department reports that 606 persons were arrested during the moratorium and it was necessary to treat 361 individuals. Treatment was administered to 200 individuals at six hospitals and various medical stations. Twenty-five police officers were arrested those receiving treatment.

"In the aftermath of the demonstrations, 503 area firms placed orders for replacements of broken glass. . . 25 of which were downtown financial institutions. Obscenities of various descriptions were painted on walks, walls and buildings.

"In Government buildings, 111 windows were smashed. Greatest damage was to the Justice Department and Internal Revenue Buildings where repairs will cost an estimated \$10,000. Damage of about \$12,000 was done to U. S. Park Service property, \$6,000 damage to 76 law-enforcement vehicles . . . and get this, \$8,500 was the cost just to clean up the mess and debris they left behind."

"Total estimated cost of the moratorium is placed at \$1,816,622 on the basis of reliable estimates made by the Federal Government, the District of Columbia Metropolitan Police Department, and knowledgeable business firms."

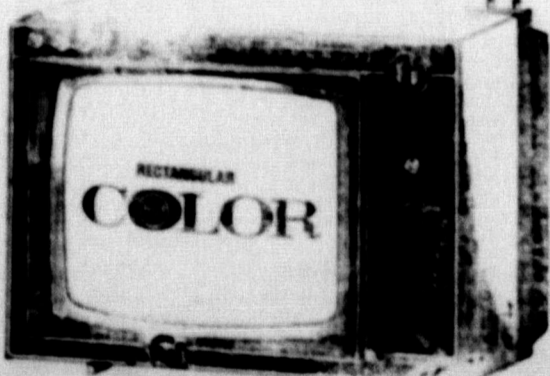
