An official from the State Health Department arrived in Ozona yesterday to consult with Dr. Carlisle at the latter's invitation. So far there has been no indication of where the contamination is coming from if the disease

So far shots have been given only to the families of those having positive blood tests and those in close contact with them.

The disease is of shorter duration than typhoid fever and is usually not as severe, but can be, Dr. Carlisle said. It is spread by contaminated food, feces and vomit. In its pneumonia-like state, it can enter the respiratory system. The disease comes on slowly with nausea and Marine Capt.
