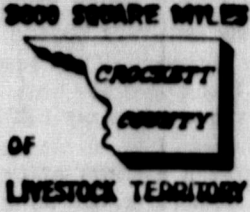

## J. Marks Named 1969 Outstanding Citizen of Ozona

Jim Marks, manager of the Foodway Store in Ozona, was named Ozona's outstanding citizen for 1969 at the Sixth Annual Ozona Chamber of Commerce banquet Thursday night at the civic center.

This is the first year such an award has been presented and Marks, the retiring Chamber president, was the first to be honored with the designation. He was presented a suitably engraved plaque in recognition of the honor.

Mr. Marks has served as president of the Ozona Lions Club, as chief of the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department and is Crockett County representative on the tri-county Selective Service Board for Crockett, Sutton and Schleicher counties.

Lawrence Jones, Ozona funeral director, was installed as the new Chamber president to succeed Marks. He presided as master of ceremonies at the banquet program, which was attended by nearly 200 persons.

Guest speaker was Reagan V. Brown, sociologist, with the A&M University system. Mr. Brown was introduced by County Agent Pete Jacoby, who described him as one of the state's leading community builders. Mr. Brown is in ever increasing demand as speaker and community development consultant and told his hearers that his Ozona's appearance was the tenth Chamber banquet he had attended as speaker in the last month.

In a talk illustrated with colored slides, Brown challenged his hearers to work together as a town unit to save their town from the (Continued on Last Page)

## Ozona High School Track Team Tops All Classes In 18th Annual Track Meet Held Here Saturday



In spite of bad weather, the 18th Annual Ozona Track Meet ran off smoothly Saturday and the Lions topped all classes with 101 points, the Lions' high point man was Mike Haire with 31 points.

Eldorado was second high team over-all with 96 points. In Class AA, Crane was runner-up after the Lions with 64 points. Mason followed Eldorado in Class A

Division with 49 points. Rocksprings won the class B Division with 47 points followed by Christoval with 32. Ozona J. V. came in fourth in Class B with 20 points.

Many records were broken this year. The overall 440-yd. relay record of 44.7 set in 1967 by Eldorado was broken by Eldorado with a new record of 44.5. Since this is the first year for divisions, the record in Class AA is 45.9 set by Ozona (Gerald Huff, Robert Maldonado, Mark Tillman and Ruben Tambunga) and Class B, Rocksprings with 48.1.

Wayne Doyle of Eldorado set a new record for the 220-yd. dash with 23.1 and broke the 23.2 record set last year by Jim Bangston of Junction.

Mike Haire set a new record in the 330 intermediate hurdles with a time of 41.6, breaking the 42.1 record set last year by Holmes of Iraan.

Buddy Ward of Crane set a new record in the high jump of 6-3, breaking the 6-1 1/2 set by Ernest Rios of Ozona last year.

Records set at the meet for the mile relay by divisions were Class B, Rocksprings 3:47.6; Class A, Eldorado, 3:38.5; Class AA, Crane 3:38.2.

Haire was high point man for the meet with a first in the 120 high hurdles, first in the 330 intermediate hurdles, a second in the high jump, along with a fine leg on the third place Mile Relay team. Haire was followed by Wayne Doyle of Eldorado with 25 points.

Other Ozona winners were Wellman, Evans, Sewell and Allen of the junior varsity with a third in the 440-yd. relay; Ernest Rios got a second in the 120 yd. high hurdles; Robert Maldonado 8th in 440 dash; Ruben Tambunga, fifth in 220 dash; Bill Edgerton, fifth in the mile (Continued on Last Page)

## Canyon Finals Three Extenders To Ozona Field

The Canyon Co., Midland, completed three extensions to the Ozona (Canyon and gas) field of Crockett County, approximately 33 miles southwest of Ozona.

The No. 1-7 Childress, 1 1/2 mile southwest, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2,245 million cubic feet of gas daily, with a gas-liquid ratio of 23,241-1. Gravity of the liquid was 71.6 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 5,704-6,239 feet which had been acidized with 4,000 gallons and fractured with 30,000 gallons and 78,800 pounds of sand.

Location is 2,200 feet from the north and east lines of 7-A-TCRR.

The No. 2-A Austin Mills-paugh, 1/2-mile north extension on the southwest side, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 7 million cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 53,769-1. Gravity of the liquid is 65.8 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 6,650-7,082 feet, which had been acidized with 2,800 gallons and fractured with 42,000 gallons and 66,800 pounds of sand.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of 4 John H. Gibson.

The No. 2-1 Austin Mills-paugh, a link well 1/2 mile east and west, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 600,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 88,793-1. Gravity of the liquid was 61.1 degrees.

## Grand Jury Will Probe Shooting Incident In Feb.

A 112th District Court Grand Jury will be asked to investigate a shooting incident Feb. 18 in which G. W. (Bill) Snively was wounded and later died. The grand jury session is slated for April 6.

Snively was wounded on the Ralph Jones Ranch near here. He was a brother-in-law of Mrs. Jones and he and his wife were visiting here when the mishap occurred. He was rushed to Hudspeith Memorial Hospital in Sonora after suffering a wound, apparently from a 38 or 45 caliber pistol, in his abdomen. He was later transferred to a San Angelo hospital where his condition improved somewhat after surgery, but pneumonia developed and he died Saturday night after being in critical condition for several days.

At the time of the shooting Snively told Crockett County Sheriff Billy Mills that it was an accident. However, later Snively made a statement of an accusatory nature. The statement did not involve anyone locally.

Snively was a former San Angelo resident and at the time of his death was chief loan officer for Southwestern Life in Dallas. He was a resident of Dallas since 1955.

Funeral services were held Monday in Dublin. Snively's wife is the only survivor.

**Washington News Letter**

**Congressman O. C. Fisher**

An Anti-strike bill, along with final action on a revised HEW appropriation measure, marked the legislative program on Capitol Hill last week.

The strike issue arose when a relatively small group of workers refused to honor a major management-labor agreement last December, under which 48,000 shopcraft workers were given wage increases of 18.8% over a two-year period. But under a unit-ratification rule, the agreement was disapproved by the Sheet Metal Workers, although okayed by the rank-and-file of the other three labor organizations involved.

The Congress voted to block a strike that was called, which would have stopped practically all rail traffic in the nation. This is interim legislation and will expire in 37 days. If no agreement is reached in that time, the Congress must act again.

Permanent-type legislation is needed, providing means of preventing nation-

wide strikes which would be clearly contrary to the public interest. The President has asked for this, and the request has my full support.

After 8 months of delays and wrangling, the Congress last week finally approved the annual HEW appropriation — covering the fiscal year which began last July. The affected agencies have operated under stop-gap resolutions, from month to month.

As finally enacted, forced busing of school children was not disturbed. Anti-busing provisions in the House version were made ineffective in the Senate by a 42 to 32 margin, when Senator Case of New Jersey announced President Nixon opposed the House anti-busing language. Then, when the amended bill came back to the House a coalition of Republicans and liberal Democrats okayed the Senate action. Hence, the House move to stop forced busing and protect neighborhood schools was in vain.

Included in the \$19-billion bill was an item of \$520-million for federally impacted school districts. The first HEW measure contained \$600-million for that purpose, and that was the chief reason for the President's veto. Prior to the veto Mr. Nixon had favored \$200-million for impacted schools, although the federal government was committed to pay a much larger amount.

A week following the veto, however, the President reversed his veto position, recognizing the validity of the federal commitment, and asked Congress to provide

\$440-million for this purpose. The total was raised to \$520-million, an amount reported to now be acceptable to the White House.

The Congress voted, with my support, to trim the total amount in the HEW bill down to the figure previously recommended by President Nixon.

**Marking, Branding Of Livestock, Texas Legislative Study**

Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes today announced the appointment of three senators to the Committee on Marking and Branding of Livestock.

Named by Barnes were Senators Jack Hightower of Vernon; W. E. (Pete) Snelson of Midland; and, Murray Watson of Mart.

Created by Senate Concurrent Resolution 74, the Committee will study laws regarding the marking and branding of livestock, with the view of modifying and updating the present law in Texas to give the state a more modern and uniform branding and marketing system.

"Because Texas has almost 11 percent of all beef cattle in the United States, our farmers and ranchers must work under the most up-to-date laws possible. I consider this a very important committee and I know the appointees will do an expert job," said Barnes.

The three members to be appointed by the Speaker and the Governor have not yet been announced.

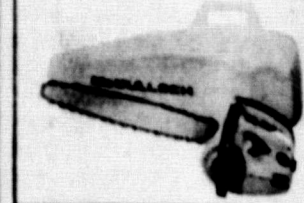

#### Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

##### Tuna-Broccoli Casserole

- 7 oz. can tuna fish drained and flaked
- 2 pounds frozen broccoli
- 4 tbs. butter
- 4 tbs. flour
- 1 cup light cream
- 1 cup chicken broth
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 tbs. chopped parsley
- 2 hard cooked eggs sliced
- 1/4 cup grated permesan cheese

Cook broccoli in boiling salted water until barely tender and arrange in a single layer in a shallow greased casserole. Melt butter, blend in flour, and stir in cream and broth to make a smooth sauce. Season to taste. Stir in gently the parsley, tuna fish, and eggs.

Pour carefully over the broccoli and top with the cheese. Bake 15-20 minutes in moderate oven, 350 degrees, and then put under the broiler a minute or two to brown well.

Serve with spaghetti cooked barely tender and mixed well with butter and grated Parmesan or Romano cheese, or a mixture of the two. A large tossed salad and warm garlic bread go well, too.

Tippett Field Gains Prolific Oil Producer

The Tippett, North multipay field of Crockett County gained its second 5,850 Wolfcamp producer and a 3/4 mile north extension to that pay with completion of Shell Oil Co., No. 2 Cowden and State, seven miles southeast of McCamey, for a calculated, daily flowing potential of 242 barrels of 39.2 gravity oil, plus 72 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1.364-1.

Potential was based on an actual flowing of 121 barrels of oil, plus 36 barrels of water, in 12 hours through a 1-inch choke and perforations at 6,044-052 feet, which had been acidized with 1,500 gallons.

Drilled to 6,085 feet, where 4 1/2-inch casing was set, the project was plugged back to 6,606 feet.

Location is 2,173 feet from the northwest and 467 feet

from the southwest lines of 24-36-H&TC.

The discovery, Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, No. 1-25 Lynch, was completed Jan. 28 for 210 barrels of water, through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,857-861 feet.

Earlier, it was finaled from the lower Leonard for 120 barrels of 40.8 gravity oil, plus three barrels of water, through an 18-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,206-854 feet.

Shell Oil Co. has recompleted as a fifth 5,050-foot Wolfcamp oil producer and a 3/4 mile northeast extension to that pay in the Tippett, West multipay field its No. 2-18 Amacker Trust, former Ellenburger oil producer in the Tippett, North multipay field, of Crockett County, nine miles south of McCamey.

It was finaled for 71 barrels of 39 gravity oil, plus 100 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1.831-1. Production was through a 12-64-inch choke and perfora-

tions at 5,159-163 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons.

Original completion was Jan. 17, 1968, to pump 154 barrels of 41.8 gravity oil through perforations at 6,619-31 feet.

Location is 467 feet from the southeast and 3,400 feet from the southwest lines of 18-36-H&TC.

Potential Test Filed On West Crockett Gasser

H. L. Hurst, Fredericksburg, filed potential test of 1,700,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day for his No. 1 Half, 1,400-foot gas opener and lone producer from that pay in the Noelke multipay field of Crockett County, four miles southeast of Iraan.

Production was natural through perforations at 1-335-345 feet. Plugged back depth is 1,400 feet.

A re-entry operation it originally was drilled by Moore & Olsen as the No. 2-C Half

to 6,800 feet and abandoned Feb. 14, 1942.

It was re-opened in April 1962 by Alamo Fuel & Transport Co., Abilene, as the No. 1 H. M. Half Estate. A well record was filed July 5, 1962 and Field designation was

granted at that time.

Location is 467 feet from the south and 1,638 feet from the east lines of 68-1-I&GN.

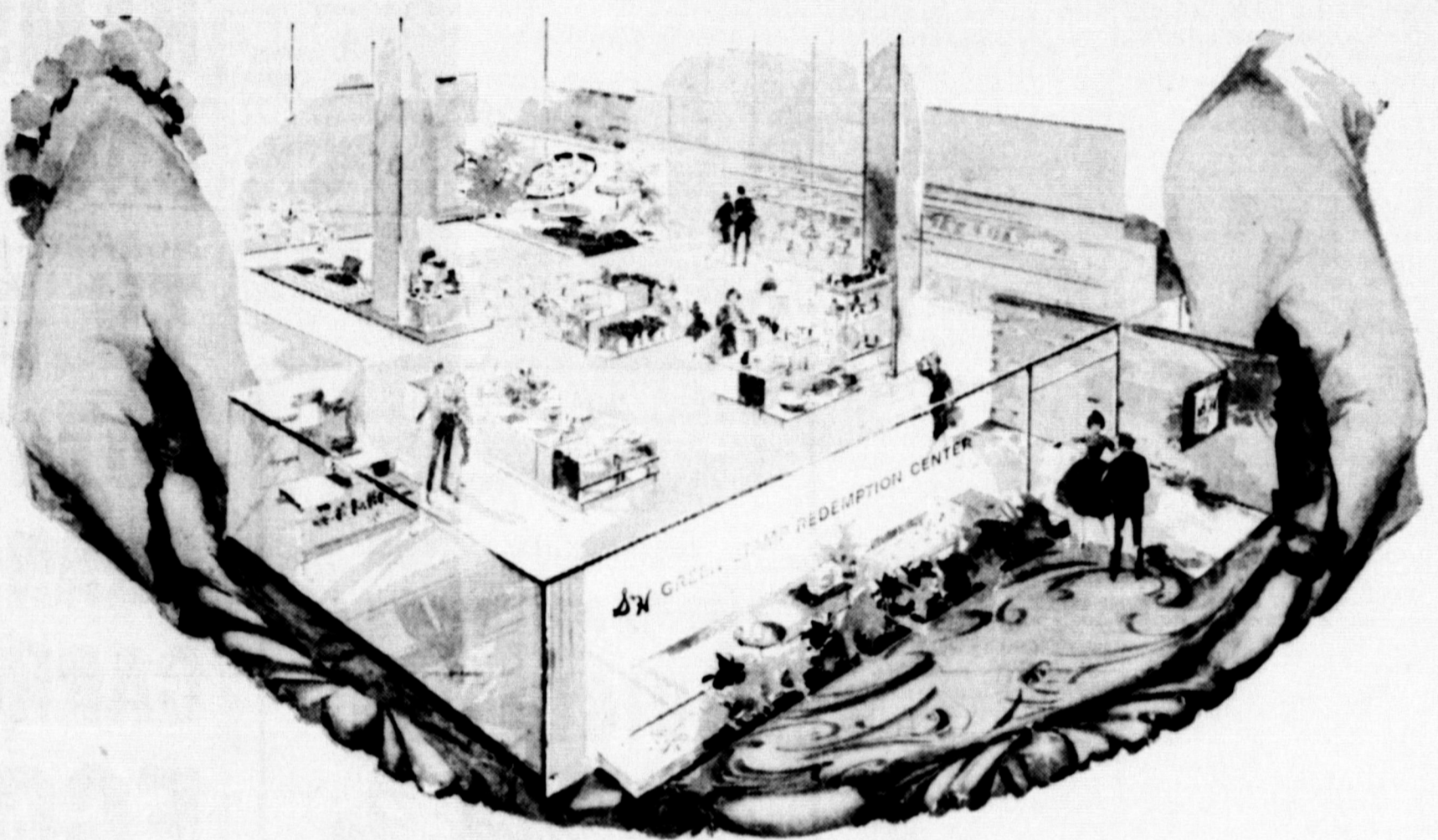
