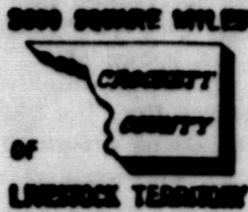

## Dr. Carlisle Resigns; State Investigation, Local Rumors Blamed

Dr. Don L. Carlisle, who has practiced medicine and surgery in Ozona since last June, Friday submitted his resignation from the active staff of Crockett County Hospital, effective Friday, May 1. The resignation was submitted to the Crockett County Hospital Board in the form of a letter in which Dr. Carlisle outlined some of the reasons for his decision.

Dr. Carlisle told the board that he planned to close his office as of April 25 "except for winding up some details" and will vacate the office on or before May 7.

"Since the investigation instituted by the State Board of Medical Examiners, it has become increasingly apparent that I have lost the confidence of a large majority of my former patients," Dr. Carlisle wrote in his letter, addressed to the President, Crockett County Hospital Board. Joe Couch is presently the board president.

Other veterans whose graves will be marked are Joseph L. Casbeer, father of the late Tom Casbeer, a Confederate soldier; William Mathias Miller, father of the late Mrs. Jim Chapman, also a Confederate soldier; Pharis Hurst, a federal soldier and a relative of Hurst Meinecke, and Henry Street Hudspeth, a Confederate soldier and the father of the late Claude Hudspeth.

In the Democratic Primary which will be of more interest to local voters because of local races, Precinct No. 1 voters will cast their ballots at the courthouse. Those living in Precinct No. 2 will vote at the high school and Powell Field Precinct No. 3 at the Civic Center and the power plant and those in Precinct No. 4 at South Elementary School.

The Republican Primary will be held at 301 Ave. G. Local voter interest is centered on the two local races, that for county judge and for commissioner of precinct 4. Judge Bernice Jones, the incumbent, is opposed by Troy Williams in the race for county judge and Glenn Sutton, the incumbent, is opposed by Erby Chandler for commissioner, precinct 4. These names will appear on the Democratic Primary ballot and the winners are automatically elected, since they will have no Republican opposition in the general election in November.

Running in the Democratic Primary without opposition are Leta Powell, county clerk; Jim Dudley, county treasurer, and A. O. Fields, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, also Bill Black is seeking his first full four-year term as commissioner of precinct No. 2. In district and state offices about the only contest of interest to Crockett County voters is that for United States Senator Ralph Yarborough, the liberal incumbent, will be in a close race with Lloyd Bentsen, and it is doubtful that the senator will retain his job. At any rate, the winner will be opposed by George Bush, Republican, in the November election.

C. C. Fisher, U. S. Rep., Judge Charles Sherrill, District Judge, and Hilary B. Doran, Jr., State Rep. have no opposition in the Democratic Primary, but Fisher will face young Republican Dick Gill in the general election.

On the Republican ballot, George Bush is opposed by Robert Morris for United States Senator, and Paul Eggers is opposed by Roger Martin for Governor. Winner will oppose Democrat Preston Smith in the general election. Other state offices in the Republican Primary have no opposition.

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**A TRAVESTY OF HISTORY**

Concerned citizens were shocked when the United Nations Education Committee (known as UNESCO) said it would commemorate the centenary of Vladimir I. Lenin. The UN committee voted to portray Lenin to the world as a "humanitarian."

The UNESCO resolution is a disgusting travesty of history.

After the forced dissolution of the elected Russian Constituent Assembly — carried out at bayonet point by the Bolsheviks — Lenin described his own dictatorship as "power, based upon force, unrestricted by any laws." Lenin prided himself as a brutal terrorist who executed a systematic program of extermination against ethnic groups, races, religions, classes — any and all who opposed him. Adolf Hitler considered the Communist

totalitarian dictatorship a ready-made model for his own despotism.

The government of Lenin drowned the independence of Ukraine and Georgia in blood. Although they survived the initial invasion of Soviet troops in 1918-1920, the Baltic States of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania were occupied by the Red Army in 1940. German forces swept over the Baltic States in 1941. At the close of World II, suffering unspeakable horrors, these captive nations were again occupied by Leninist Russia. Survivors have testified that although the Nazi occupation was horrible, the Communist oppression is worse.

For over fifty years, Soviet imperialist plundering and exploitation, genocide, confiscation of all kinds of private property, terror, murder, the liquidation of mil-

lions of peasants, mass deportations of more millions, slave labor, pauperization, persecution of religion, and suppression of all human rights have followed in profusion. The oppressed people know the Soviet Union, built by Lenin's plans, to be one vast prison of nations.

While other once-colonial peoples of the world, such as in Africa and Asia, have been gaining independence, the colonial empire of Lenin has extended its tentacles over one-third of the earth, enslaving nearly one billion people. On every front, the followers of Lenin's law of force are today waging death and destruction.

There was a time when many people held high hopes that the United Nations would contribute to world freedom. Some still do. But we fear that the distinguished Professor of History, Dr. Alexander V. Berkis was right when he said recently: "The oppressed peoples will never forget or forgive the UN for memorializing Lenin, the architect of Soviet oppression and aggression." Many will share the same feeling of revulsion toward this latest UN posture.

### Todd Discovery Swabs 10 Bbls. Hourly On Test

An unidentified discovery was indicated in Crockett County with the swabbing of new oil at the hourly rate of 10 barrels and water at the hourly rate of four barrels at J. S. Abercrombie Mineral Co., Inc., Houston, No. 1 J. S. Todd, in 17-YZ-EL&RR, 18 miles east-southeast

of Iran and the same distance west-northwest of Ozona, 2 1/2 miles west-northwest of the Todd, Southwest (Grayburg and San Andres) field and eight miles west of the Todd Deep (Crinoidal and Eilenburger) field.

Recovery was through perforations at 6,808-20 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons, and swabbed to pits to clean.

Operator was preparing to install a pump.

Earlier it tested the Fuselman unsuccessfully through perforations at 7,1

17-40 feet. It was drilled to 7,230 feet to test the Eilenburger and Crinoidal. It was drilled to 7,912 feet, with 5 1/2-inch casing set at 7,232 feet.

Texaco Inc. No. 2-D A. R. Kincaid Trust, third 7,890 Pennsylvania producer and a 3/4-mile west-southwest extension to that pay in the Davidson Ranch field of Crockett County, four miles southeast of Ozona, has been completed for a calculated, absolute open flow potential of 5,809,000 cubic feet of gas per day.

Production was through perforations at 7,879-951 feet which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 146,000 pounds of sand.

The following tops were picked on a ground elevation of 2,485 feet: Canyon sand, 6,205 feet; and Pennsylvanian sand, 7,875 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,515 feet from the west lines of 6-KL-GC&SF.

The field has one 3,606-foot detrital gas and two 6,200-foot Canyon gas producers.

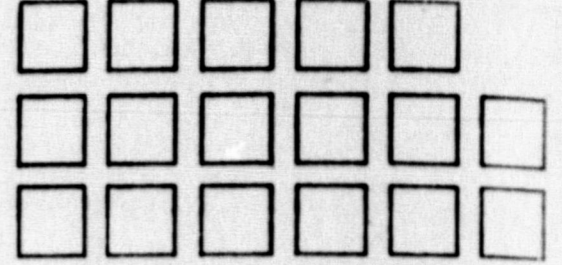

**Wife Of Ft. Lancaster Park Supt. Opens Gift Shop In Sheffield**

The small west Texas town of Sheffield has a new business. Mrs. Faye Nell Johnston, wife of Bill Johnston, Fort Lancaster State Park Superintendent, is owner and proprietor of "El Gato", a gift shop specializing in objects from south of the border. The grand opening of the shop is scheduled for Friday, May 1.

Mrs. Johnston, the former Faye Chapman, comes from Sulphur Springs in East Texas. She met her husband while attending the University of Texas at Austin and received a degree in mathematics from that institution in 1967. She travelled extensively throughout Mexico before and during her school years, spending a month in Bolivia in the summer of 1964.

In an exclusive interview, Mrs. Johnston talked about her plans for El Gato. "The purpose of our shop is to offer to the people of this area and to coast-to-coast travellers, who have not had the opportunity to venture further than the border towns into Mexico, some of the beautiful things made in the interior. In southern Mexico, whole towns will specialize in one craft. For example, Puebla to the east of Mexico City was the first pottery town in this hemisphere and prides itself today on the execution and quality of its wares."

"We will be selling cotton goods from the famous embroidery town of Aguascalientes. We have heavy copper ware from Santa Clara, a mining town high in the rain forests between Mexico City and Guadalajara. It was a family affair: the littlest children would throw pine chips on the fire, the small boys would pump the bellows, the young men would pound the glowing

lump of copper into a disk, and after this was reheated the elders would pound it into shape and return it to the children for polishing.

"We have finegrained polychromed pottery in two styles from two places. We have wool from Patzcuaro. Also from Patzcuaro comes lacquerware, which is my favorite of the lot because it experses most completely the basic elements of classical Mexican art, color and complexity of details. The craftsman in this case is Gilardo Horta, who is incidentally a cousin of an old dorm mate. We watched him paint a plate — he had already laid out the design in pencil on the wood — with the finest of brushes at the fantastic rate of about a square inch an hour."
