## Kitty's Korner

With officials taking a "no nonsense" attitude toward campus insurrection and the country up in arms crying "Shoot the bums", things seem to be cooling off here at week's end. It is a sad day for America when the vast majority of people favor silencing dissent, but the dissenters did it themselves and the majority can hardly be blamed for taking this attitude, albeit dangerous. Viewing the mindless mob rioting and burning has gotten the dander up in the mildest of us and if the younger generation wants change or even freedom to express opinion, they had better take heed.

The following letter came to my desk this week and expresses the feelings of the troops in Vietnam, rather than the idiocy of the campus rebel. It was written by noted entertainer, Johnny Grant of Los Angeles Station KTLA and mailed to a White House friend of his on May 7 concerning the morale of American troops in Vietnam. The letter is especially significant because Grant has made some 33 trips to meet with and entertain troops all over the world. This is his 11th trip to Vietnam.

"A short note from a touring gypsy in Vietnam.

"In view of the bitter attacks on the President in recent days by the public and the press, I thought you might pass on a few words of support and encouragement.

"The young men who are fighting the war and stand to lose the most — their lives — are solidly behind the President's decision to go into the Vietcong sanctuary in Cambodia. Morale here was good but went to an all time high when the announcement was made.

"They feel they now have an even chance at fighting Charlie at his own game.

"They also feel that in the end lives will be saved and a quicker victory will be achieved on the battlefield at the peace talks. They honestly feel they can win this thing and now have the support to do it.

"They are greatly disappointed in the reaction of the back-home press, public and some of the politicians. One young GI put it, 'The bright must be worth divisions to the enemy,' it is really hard for a young soldier to understand this kind of reaction to a White House announcement of more support for him and his buddies. They are out there young men and they deserve all the help and encouragement we can give them.

"This letter was prompted by a young GI at the 3rd Field Hospital this morning when he said, 'For God's sake let the President know nobody's behind him —'

"As I have toured the area in the past few days many others have expressed the same feelings. I have not met one man against the Cambodian move.

"I promised the troops I would pass their support on to the President and figured it would be the fastest way to do it.

"I will be back in the states on the 16th or 17th and will let you know how the situation stands.

The Crockett County Youth Center will open officially Tuesday at the Civic Center. Young people have spent most of this week decorating the two rooms in the center which have been set aside for the youth center.

Opening of the youth center is the result of almost a year's work on the part of the Youth Council, various civic clubs and the Commissioners Court along with the Civic Center Board.

Memberships for both high school age students and junior high students are on sale at the Civic Center and may be purchased from the director Richard Armistead. The center opens officially Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Armistead, who will also manage the Civic Center building, said about the only change in the new rules will be the booking hours. Bookings must be made between 2 and 5 p. m. daily with the exception of Sunday and Monday. The entire building will be closed these two days and will not be rented unless there is some exception.

Summer hours for the youth center are from 2 until 6 p. m. daily Tuesday through Saturday with Thursday set aside for junior high students. The evening schedule has the center opening each day at 7 o'clock, except for Wednesday when the center will be closed during the evening hours. Closing times Tuesday and Thursday nights is 10 o'clock with Thursday night designated junior high night. The center will close at midnight Fridays and at 11:00 p. m. give an account of what is being done by the hospital board and the commissioners court in that direction.

At this time, there is nothing definite to report, except that the hospital will be open with a limited staff, the hospital board told chamber members. Rumor that the hospital is to be closed is in complete error, according to Joe Couch, chairman of the hospital board.

In order to cut expenses while negotiations are being made with various medical groups and men, much of the staff has been placed on leave of absence. However, ample staff has been retained to give patients proper hospital care and visiting doctors will continue to make rounds at the hospital.

Chamber members were assured that the hospital board and the court are doing everything possible to secure a doctor or possibly doctors for Crockett County Hospital. Members of the commissioners court are presently investigating a group of medical men who have manifest an interest in the local hospital and the board is talking to at least two doctors, who have shown an interest in practicing in Ozona. However, it was emphasized that no definite arrangements had been made at this time to supply Ozona with a doctor.

The hospital board and the commissioners court assured the community through chamber members that the hospital would not be closed at this time nor in the near future. They feel it is of the utmost importance to keep the facility open while the search for a doctor continues and they are confident that given time, things will be worked out to benefit the community. Closing the hospital, they said, would create an almost impossible situation as far as getting proper medical personnel.

### June 1 Set For Annual 4-H Horse Show

The annual Crockett Co. 4-H Horse Show will be held at the Fair Park Arena on Monday, June 1. Buck Owens of Barnhart, well known horse judge, will judge all classes beginning at 9:00 a. m.

Halter classes will consist of 1969 Mares, 1968 Mares, other Mares, 1969 Stallions, Geldings and Showmanship at Halter. Performance classes will consist of Western Pleasure, Reining, Pole Bending, Barrel Racing, Western Riding, Flag Race, Hair Pulling, Breakaway Roping and possibly others.

Contestants will be divided into junior and senior divisions. There also will be a novice division for Pee-Wees who will compete in some halter and performance classes.

### Severe Electric Storm Blacks Out Ozona Five Hours

A severe electrical storm which hit Ozona last Wednesday night knocked out electricity throughout the city and service was not restored in some sections until Thursday morning with the local crew and a group from San Angelo working all night long to repair lightning damaged wires and equipment.

The storm descended on Ozona with high winds and blinding electrical displays. Rain fell in sheets briefly, but amounted to only 33 of an inch of moisture in town.

Shortly after 9 o'clock lightning hit the transformer behind the J. B. Miller & Co. and another transformer in the east part of town, burning down primary wires and shutting off electricity to a large section of town. One Ozona resident was in the east hill when the lightning struck and he described it as "blinding bolts" with balls of fire running down the wires to almost every house in town. Around eleven the main transformer at the substation here in town shorted out, leaving the city completely without electrical service.

Wayne Lowry, manager of West Texas Utilities Co., said when the final transformer burned, he knew he needed help and picked up the telephone at his office to call San Angelo only to find it out of order. He rushed home and managed to get a line through to San Angelo. The San Angelo crew arrived in Ozona in minimum time and with local employees and the help of residents managed to restore service all over by 8 o'clock Tuesday morning. Many electrical lines in town were down, Lowry said, and 6 transformers were burned. He said

results of the storm were the most severe in the history of the town.

Lowry expressed his appreciation to all residents who helped in locating and reporting the trouble. He also expressed concern about so many people being out and near live wires which were down and very dangerous. He warned Ozonans to treat any utility wire on the ground as if it were live and stay away until workers arrive.

There was some question about what caused the final electrical explosion at the sub station. It was not clear whether the breakers tripped from an overload or whether a skunk, which was found burned but alive, had been in the equipment and tripped the breaker.
