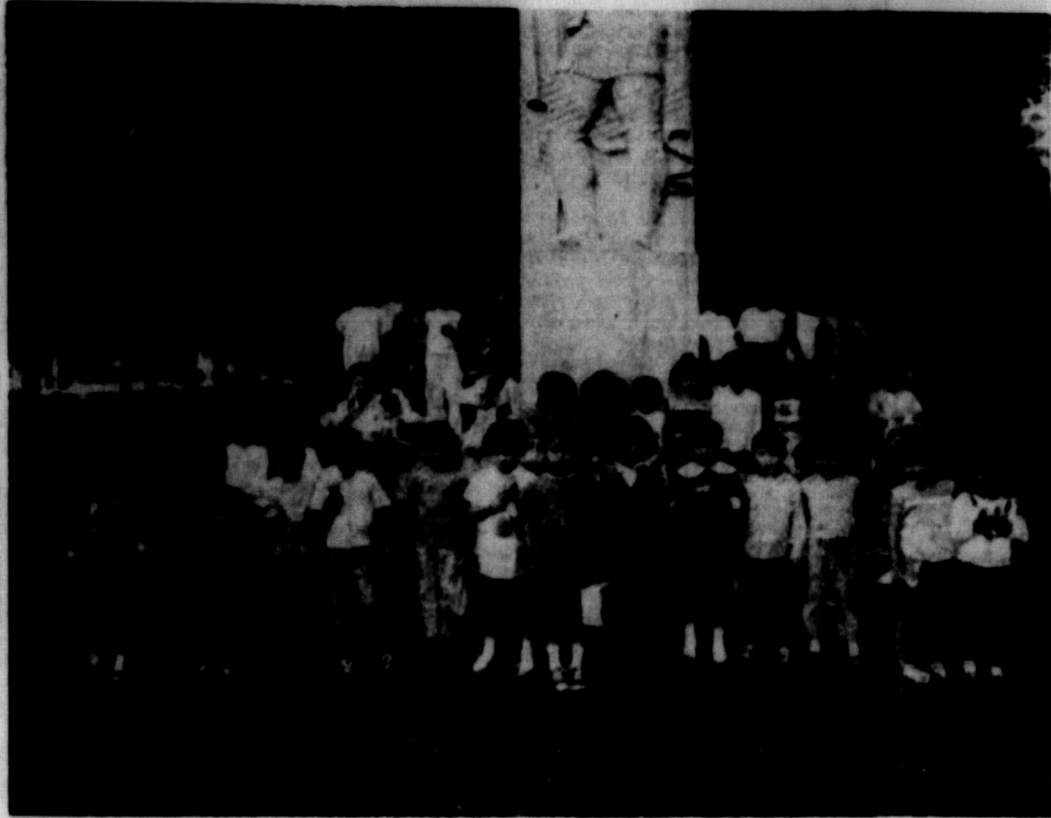

Elmer D. Graves Seriously Hurt In Road Mishap

Bay City Man Dies Of Heart Attack in Motel

Sherman Bullington, 62, of Bay City died early Saturday morning at a local motel, apparently of a heart attack. His wife notified authorities and James Funeral Home handled local arrangements. They had checked into the motel the night before and were traveling.

A son flew in to return home with his mother and the body was flown to Texas City for services and burial.

Mr. Bullington was a retired Superintendent with Union Carbide Co. He was born in West Virginia.

Details were being worked out at midweek looking toward a lease agreement whereby Medica Diversified, a corporation devoted to hospital management, would take over management and operation of the Crockett County Hospital, provide doctor service for Ozona and operate a nursing home of suitable capacity to serve the community, to be built by the county.

An interim agreement was near completion at midweek for Medica Diversified to assume the management of the hospital from the county and the county hospital board. Under the terms of this agreement, with paper work still incomplete, the county would in effect, employ the corporation to operate the hospital, the county assuming all expenses of the corporation and receiving all hospital revenues. This arrangement, under the terms of the proposed contract, would be in effect for a maximum of 15 months and would be cancellable by either party.

The long range plan, on which negotiations are now under way between the county and its hospital board and officials of the corporation, envisions a lease agreement whereby the Medica Diversified corporation would lease the entire medical facilities for a nominal fee, provide adequate medical service for the community, operate the hospital and a nursing home to be built.

FIRST IN HISTORY —

Prisoner Breaks Out of Venerable Jail; Recaptured

For many years Crockett County's venerable jail has proved impregnable, but the record gave way and so did the jail when a slight young man from Louisiana pushed out a section of the thick rock wall and escaped around 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

But the young man's freedom was short lived. He was captured some three hours later in Junction. He had apparently sneaked over the hill back of the jail and emerged on Highway 290 where he caught a ride. The Junction sheriff called local officers to report that he had the man in custody shortly before 6 o'clock last night.

The escape was discovered when another prisoner caught the attention of Luis Martinez, courthouse employee, and he reported it to Sheriff Billy Mills. There was only a time lapse of about 20 minutes, Martinez estimated.

Lawmen fanned out searching the jail grounds and tanks behind the old structure and conducting a thorough search of the Baptist Church Annex which is adjacent to the jail, but the escapee was nowhere to be found.

THROW OUT THE NON-STUDENT CRIMINALS

There is a message to heed and a lesson to be learned, we believe, in three recent news stories.

Story No. 1: Since November 1, 1967, the Senate Subcommittee on Investigations, Government Operations Committee has been conducting a rather continuous probe of riots, civil and criminal disorders in America. The hearing thus far has amassed nearly 6,000 printed pages of testimony plus hundreds of documents. Relative to the riots and criminal disorders on college campuses, the probe indicates that little more than 2 percent of the nation's 6.5 million graduate and undergraduate students have participated in mob action; and that only a fraction of 1 percent have indulged in criminal behavior. The probe further suggests that much of the leadership for mobocracy comes from a small group of professional non-student on campus whose purpose is not to study or to learn but to lead hate-America radicals.

Story No. 2: This Fall, tens of thousands of students will be told: "Sorry, no room" when they apply for college admission. Over 35 percent of 314 of the nation's largest schools reported that they will be forced to reject qualified applicants, according to two leading educational associations.

Story No. 3: One hundred "campus protesters" occupied a school building at Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Virginia, President T. Marshall Hahn, Jr. (a) ordered the immediate clearing of the building; (b) ordered the immediate arrest and suspension of the students who refused to obey his instruction; and (c) further notified the mob to get their belongings and leave, with the warning that if they came back on campus they would be deemed trespassers.

When, according to the educational authorities themselves, "thousands" of qualified and decent American youth will be turned away this year for want of room does it not make sense that every non-student criminal should be expelled

now, without further ado? Let's make room for those who wish to go to college to study, to learn how to be productive citizens and lead contributive lives. The vast majority of students in our colleges and universities are there for an education. It's time to kick out the non-student criminals. If President Hahn can do so, so can other school authorities. Let's insist they do.

AVOID PEOPLE PICKLE

By way of celebrating "pickle week" — which, in case you hadn't heard, runs from May 21 to 30 — all of the pickle packers are promoting the theme, "Keep our Country Out of a People Pickle", which isn't a bad idea, seeing as how most people get into a pickle every now and then — some more than others. The slogan is to remind us that many of the "pickles" we find ourselves in today are the result of our own making. Air pollution, racial strife, increasing crime, wars, riots, etc., are not necessarily inevitable consequences of men's existence on this planet. Most of these dilemmas (or pickles) can be solved by each individual who has the power to choose just what quality of life he wishes to have.

Hence the pickle packers are calling for a "moratorium on people polemics" during the 10-day period. They are encouraging everyone to "stop practicing the art of controversy and start perfecting the art of cooperation and communication with their fellow men."

As one pickle week spokesman pointed out, the benign little pickle has set an example for the world to follow for some 4,000 years. Pickles are neither inclined to the right or to the left — they usually go right to the middle.

Enough's Enough

It seems inevitable, that eventually the people of the United States will raise more of a clamor than they are presently voicing over the conduct of American foreign affairs.

In fact, it is quite possible that the people will demand an end to any foreign affairs, as the situation becomes more and more ridiculous.

Congressman H. R. Gross of Iowa, perhaps best stated the situation recently. He says "The United Nations never ceases to harp on the subject of minorities and in espousing the theory of "one-man, one-vote." Late last year the UN General Assembly's Trusteeship Committee voted independence for seven little territories, including Pitcairn Island with a population of 90. Antigua, population 61,664, Dominica, 68,581, Grenada 91,967, Nevis Anquilla 39,476, St. Lucia 110,142, and St. Vincent 88,451.

"Each of these," he continues, "including Pitcairn Island with its 90 persons, will have a vote in the UN equal to that of the United States with its more than 200,000,000 population. Through these votes and many others similar to them, U.S. taxpayers will be told how much they must cough up in support of the nefarious United Nations and its agencies, as well as when and how to dance to all its other tunes.

"If the connivers in the U.N," he continued, "really believed in 'one-man, one-vote' they would have long since taken

action to either increase the one vote of the United States or decrease these small countries to a mere fraction of a vote. For far too many years has Uncle Sam been played for a sucker in the United Nations and the American people had better begin to realize it."

So far, the Senate has kept the U.S. from signing some of the treaties proposed by the UN, and thus have delayed the danger involved.

It is not generally known, but under the United States Constitution the provisions of a treaty over-ride any law in this land, Federal, state, or local, even the Core Constitution.

Thus, for example, if a UN Treaty provided for censorship of what news shall be printed, the American guarantee of the free press would go out the window. The Pitcairn Island delegation to the UN would probably vote for such a measure, as undoubtedly there is no newspaper to serve the 90 people on the island.

In addition, the UN can vote measures which would reach even further into the pocket of every American.

It is most interesting that Pitcairn Island figures in all this, as the island was prominent in the Mutiny on the Bounty. Apparently part of this heritage has a lasting impact. They still believe in the bounty part of it, if they can collect that bounty from the American taxpayers.

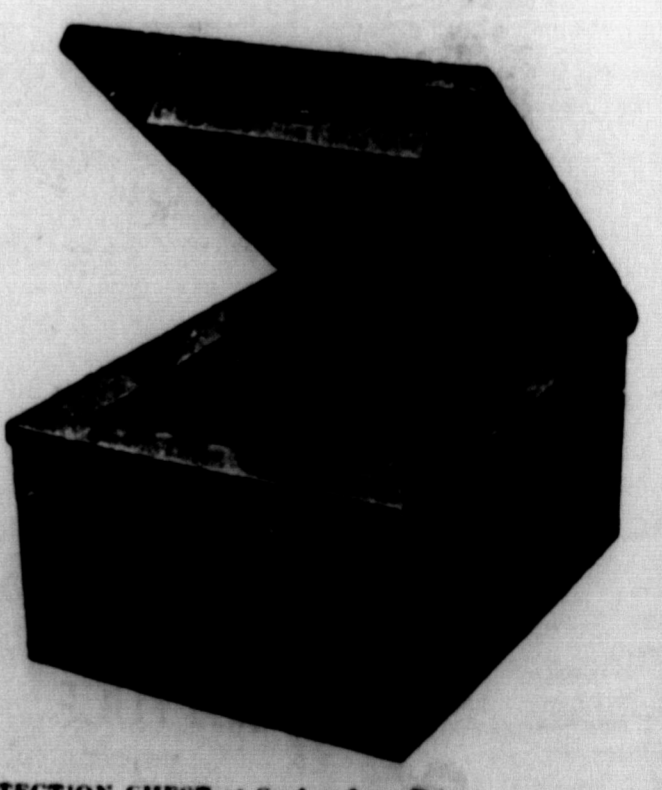

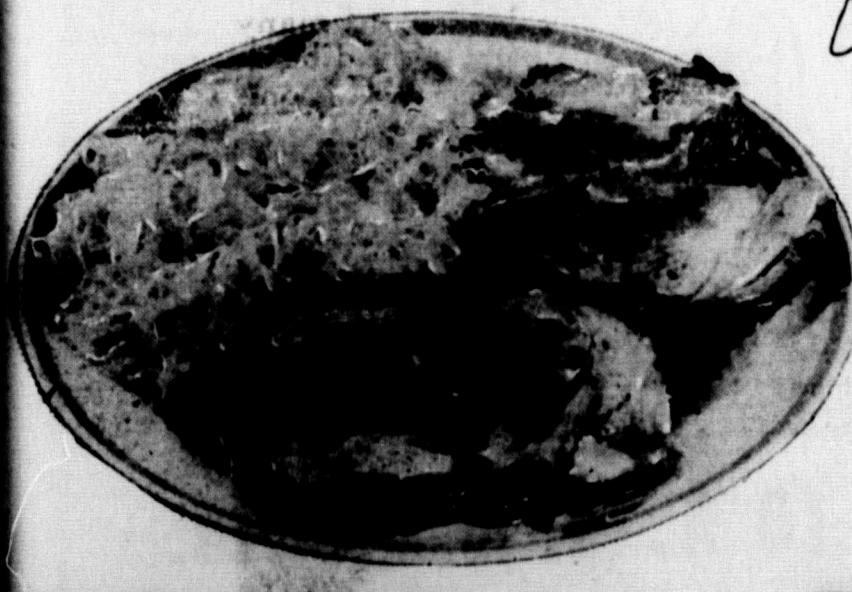

Baby Prairie Dog Born In Exhibit

Austin — A baby prairie dog born two months ago in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's traveling wildlife exhibit apparently is going to survive.

If it does, the phenomenon will be the first ever for the 21-year-old exhibit in spite of numerous prairie dog births.

The furry female, as yet unnamed, is scurrying around the cage it shares with its parents, Tom Abbott, exhibit director, said in the wild the prairie dog pups are born in "nurseries" as much as 14 feet underground. These conditions are difficult to duplicate in cages, where the animals have to make nests with wood shavings.

The black-tailed prairie dog (*Cynomys ludovicianus*) once ranged over most of West Texas and lived in huge "towns" consisting of hundreds of thousands of animals. Now they are reduced in numbers until only a few

major towns exist.

The young prairie dogs weigh only 15 grams at birth and are hardly larger than a thumb. They are hairless and blind and don't emerge from their burrows for at least six weeks.

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Turkey Federation of Bryan Texas proposes a referendum election on July 27, 1970, under provisions of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not turkey producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of two cents per live hundredweight paid, for plus an additional one cent per head on mature birds as defined by U.S.D.A. grade, to be collected at the point of first processing, or sale and to elect members for a fifteen man commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment for purposes of promotion, research, education, and disease and insect control designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of turkeys.

The referendum election will be held by mail ballot furnished to all eligible voters not later than fifteen days prior to election date. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at P. O. Box 3929, Bryan, Texas 77801 before midnight on the election date.

tion date. For purposes of this referendum, a turkey producer is defined as a person, firm, or corporation having actual ownership of turkeys during production. All persons in this category are eligible to vote in the referendum and election, since they would be required to pay the proposed assessment.

Any person qualified to vote in this referendum and election may place his name in nomination for election to the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such application must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote in this referendum who does not receive a ballot prior to July 12, 1970, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office. 11-3tc

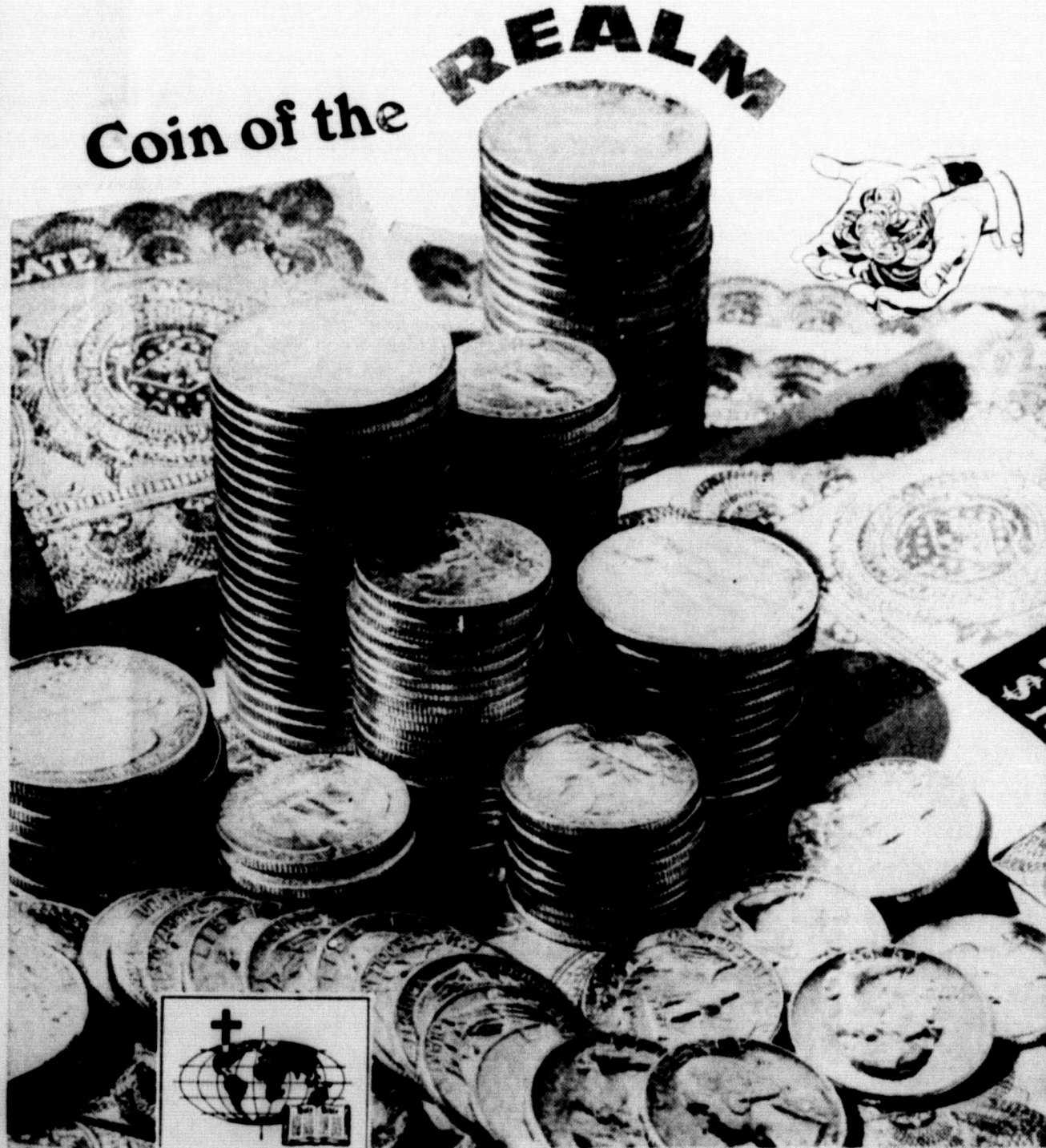

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Lt. Ronnie Houston Participates In Vietnam Operation To Rescue Besieged South Vietnam Forces

With U. S. Combat Air Forces, Vietnam — Close air support was provided for besieged members of an Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN) battalion recently by two F-4 Phantom crews, including U. S. Air Force First Lieutenant Ronnie L. Houston from Ozona, Texas.

Lieutenant Houston, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam W. Houston of Ozona, was navigator on one of the Phantom fighter-bombers used in air strikes which completely stopped enemy fire. The strikes enabled the ARVN

force to regroup, sweep the area and remove their wounded.

The lieutenant and other allied air crew members destroyed five fortifications. In addition 51 enemy soldiers were killed.

Lieutenant Houston serves at Phu Cat Air Base with a tactical fighter unit of the Pacific Air Forces, headquarters for air operations in Southeast Asia, the Far East and the Pacific area.

He completed an assignment with a combat crew training unit at Davis Monthan AFB, Ariz., in December 1969, before he began his Southeast Asia tour of duty.

Lieutenant Houston was commissioned in 1967 upon completion of Officer Training School at Lackland AFB, Tex.

A graduate of Ozona High School, he attended San Angelo College and received a B. B. A. degree in management from Texas Technological University in 1967.

The lieutenant's wife, Penny, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Benton Carlisle, Rt. 3, Kaufman, Texas.

A sum of money is given in the name of the person so honored to be used for the purpose of developing interest and increasing the giving to missions.

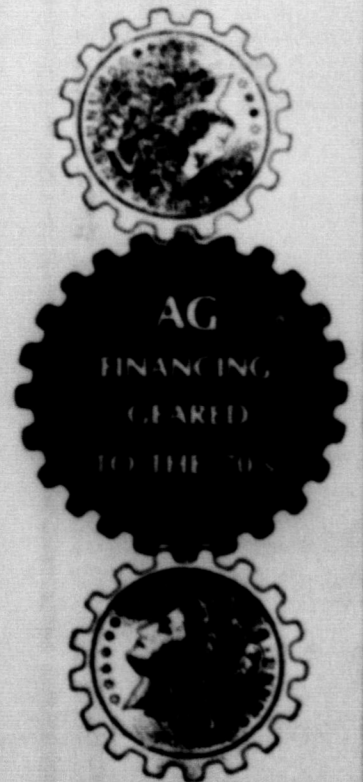

If the lease agreement is finally signed, Medica Diversified will agree to provide the services of at least one doctor by July 20 and possibly a second by mid August.

Medica Diversified leases the Eldorado hospital and nursing home with Dr. J. B. Brame in charge of the operation. The firm has other operations in the state. Dr. Brame has indicated to county officials here that at least two doctors are considering moving to Ozona and the firm is confident that it can carry out the provision of the proposed lease agreement to provide medical service.

County Judge Bernice Jones says that the county can build the nursing home without need for voting a bond issue. Time warrants can be issued and retired with funds which formerly went toward upkeep of the hospital. That there is great need for such a facility there is general agreement on the part of most citizens, a survey has indicated.

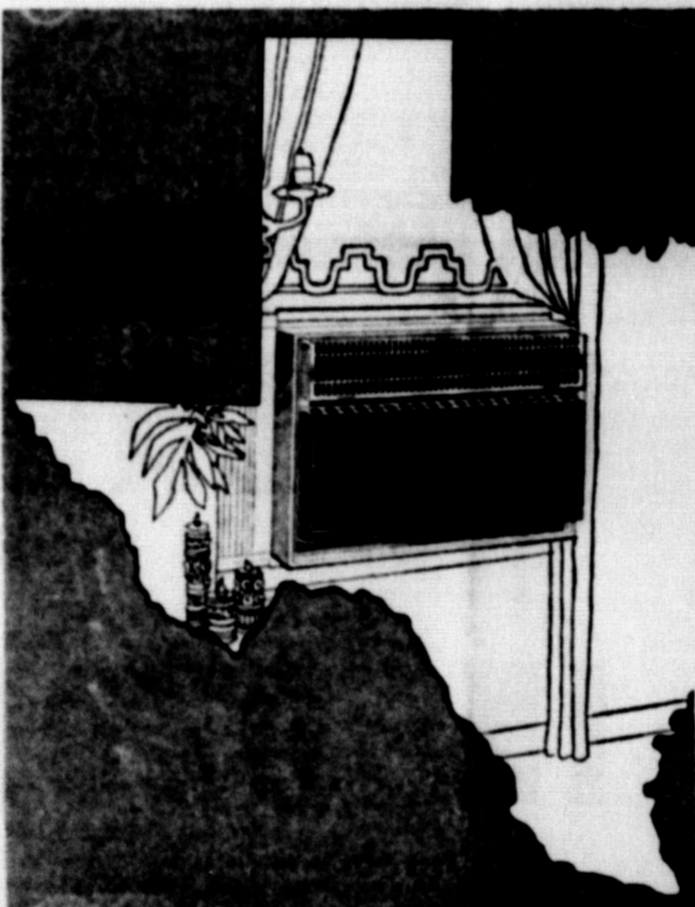

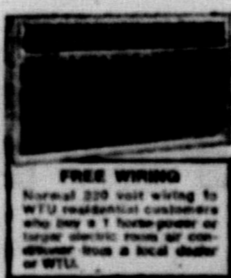
