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## Ozonia Legion Post Is Issued State Charter

Austin — A new American Legion Post has been chartered in Ozonia, it was announced today by Henry H. Hill of San Antonio and Kingsland, State Legion Commander.

A temporary charter for the new post has been issued by Legion National Headquarters in Indianapolis and will be presented in the near future, according to Commander Hill.

"The new post has 24 charter members, but is leaving its charter roll open for an indefinite time," he added. "All members who join before the closing date will go on the permanent charter roll," he said.

Commander of the new post is Claude H. Leath and the adjutant is Roy Coates.

"The American Legion, which now has more than 16,000 local posts scattered across the United States and in 28 foreign countries and U. S. territories, is continuing to charter additional new posts, primarily in new residential areas or new communities," Commander Hill said.

Thousands of the returning Vietnam veterans are now joining the Legion, he stated, and in some areas additional posts are being formed to make room for them. The American Legion is now made up of veterans of four wars — World War I and II, the Korean War and the current Vietnam period.

Overall Legion membership has been growing for the past five years and is expected to top 2,700,000 in 1970. The Legion has consistently been the largest veterans' organization in the country since its founding

## Farmer Field Is Extended North

The Farmer (San Andres) field of Crockett County gained a location north extension with completion of Robert M. Wynne, Midland, No. 1-11 University for a daily flowing potential of 192 barrels of 35.4 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 1.042-1.

Production was through an 18-64-inch choke and perforations at 2,161-69 feet, which had been acidized with 4,000 gallons, and fractured with 20,000 gallons and 30,000 pounds of said.

Location is 330 feet from the south and east lines of 11-47-University Lands.

## Ozonia Girl Dies In Headon Collision



DEATH CAR -- This is the tangled mass of metal, all that was left of the Pontiac LeMans car after a grinding head-on collision 8 miles west of Ozonia shortly after noon Sunday which snuffed out the life of 16-year-old Kym Chapman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Chapman. Kym's sister, Karen, 15, is under treatment in a San Angelo hospital for multiple injuries. William Donald Boone III of Ruidoso, N. M., driver of the death car, has been charged with negligent homicide in justice court here. Abel Paredes Jr., of San Antonio, driver of the other car, was not hurt.

A head-on collision during a rain storm shortly after noon Sunday took the life of Kym Chapman, 16, and seriously injured her sister, Karen, 15. Both girls are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. James Chapman.

They had been spending the summer in Ruidoso, N. M. with their parents and had been in Ozonia a few days over the weekend. They were on their way back to Ruidoso when the crash occurred around 8 miles west of Ozonia on Hwy 290.

William Donald Boone III, of Ruidoso, was driving the late model Pontiac LeMans, in which the two girls were riding. He was passing a truck on a curve and in a "no-passing" zone when the car crashed head-on with a late model Ford driven by Abel Paredes, Jr., of San Antonio. Both cars were totally demolished. The driver of the truck did not stop and officers did not know whether he was aware of the collision.

Paredes saw the oncoming car just seconds before the crash and attempted to avoid direct collision, but was unable to do so. Both he and Boone had on seat belts and shoulder harnesses. Officials felt that this saved them from serious injury.

Kym, who was a passenger in the front seat of the Boone car was killed almost instantly. Karen was rushed to a Sonora hospital by a James Funeral home ambulance and later transferred to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo where she underwent bone surgery Monday for a broken leg. More surgery is scheduled for a splintered jaw bone. She suffered numerous cuts and bruises, but her condition was reported satisfactory today.

Funeral services for Kym were held Tuesday morning from the First Baptist Church with Rev. Keith Bailey pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Kym was born March 13, 1954 in San Angelo and had lived in Ozonia all her life and attended Ozonia schools.

Survivors include her parents; two sister, Kelly and Karen Chapman, and a brother, Cole Chapman, all of the home; her paternal grandmother, Mrs. Estelle Chapman of Ozonia and her maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Brewer of Mount Pleasant; her great aunt, Mrs. Eldred Roach of Ozonia, and numerous aunts and uncles.

Palbearers were Mike Haire, Butch Haire, Jeffery Stuart, Danny Maness, Mike Wellman, Mike Womack, Gale Cavanaugh and Reggie Kerby, all of Ozonia.

Boone, was charged with negligent homicide, second degree, and released Monday on a \$2,500 bond. Highway Patrolman John Harris, DFB, investigated the accident.

## Pilot Dies As Helicopter Snags Telephone Wires Over Highway

A helicopter crash shortly after noon here Friday resulted in the death of a Phoenix, Ariz., man. Val A. Sanders, 34, was the pilot and only occupant of the small helicopter which crashed within 20 feet of IS 10 around seven miles east of Ozonia.

Sanders was rushed to Crockett County Hospital

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in a James Funeral Home ambulance where he was pronounced dead on arrival. His body was flown to Phoenix Saturday.

John Spencer, 18, also of Phoenix, said he and Sanders were enroute from Phoenix to Florida where Sanders was going to sell his helicopter and had stopped in Ozonia for lunch. Several Ozonia residents had noticed the light craft above the town before the crash. The crash occurred just as the pair left Ozonia.

Spencer was following Sanders' plane by car. He said they left Ozonia about noon after eating and refueling, and were traveling toward Sonora. He said he noticed that the copter was a good distance behind him, but did not think anything was wrong and continued

## Crockett Field Gets Designation

The Texas Railroad Commission Oil and Gas Division has announced field designation and allowable for a Crockett County field.

It is the World, North (Strawn) field opened April 23 with recompletion of Texas Crude Oil Co., Midland, No. 1-35 University, former Eilenburger opener of the World field 13 miles southwest of Big Lake.

It was finalized for a daily pumping potential of 20 barrels of 44 gravity oil plus 64 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1.000-1. Production was natural through perforations at 8,014-22 feet. Originally drilled to 9,113 feet, it was finished by B. L. McFarland, Inc., Midland, Nov. 11, 1966 to flow 221 barrels of 42.3 gravity oil, no water, through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,050-70 feet.

Location is 2,310 feet from the south and 990 feet from the west lines of 5-7-University.

Daily allowable was set 20 barrels.

driving thinking that Sanders would soon catch up with him.

After traveling for several miles without seeing the helicopter, he turned around and started backtracking. "I arrived upon the scene of the crash about an hour after it happened, according to all indications," Spencer said.

An employee of Northern Natural Gas Co. saw the copter crash and radioed his office in Eldorado and the Eldorado sheriff's department notified local officials, who rushed to the scene with the ambulance.

The craft caught a telephone wire either as it began to crash or catching the wire on one of the smaller props caused the crash. At any rate the tail of the machine was completely wrapped in a tangled mass of wires when rescuers arrived on the scene. Telephone service in that part of the county was out for several hours, and at least one workman was injured about the hand and wrist when a truck ran over the strung-out cable at high speed during repair operations.

Spencer said he doubted that Sanders could have lost control of the machine as he had been flying for many years and was a helicopter flying instructor. He said he felt that the tail of the plane caught on the utility

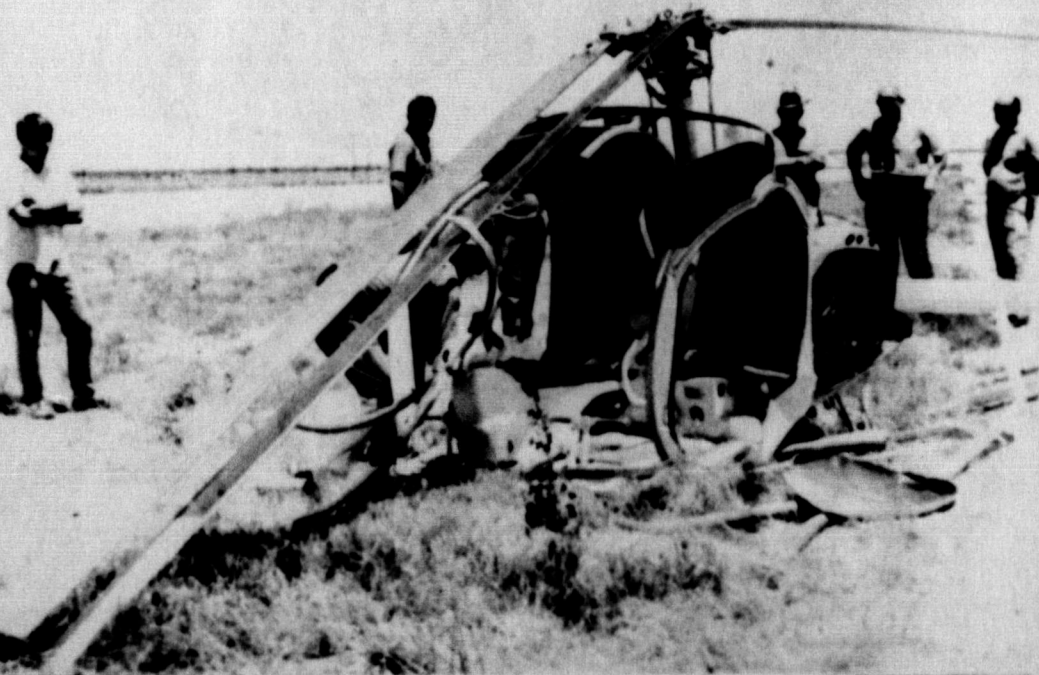
## County Valuations Up \$3 Million

Crockett County Commissioners Court met Friday in the courtroom as the official Board of Equalization for the county. Representatives for several oil concerns were here to go over their valuations with the court.

Pritchard and Abbot, a tax concern responsible for setting oil valuations in Cro-

ckett County, has notified the Commissioners Court that valuations for 1971 will be up an estimated \$3,000,000.

This will increase the tax intake for the county \$12,500 for each million the valuations go up. The county budget is being prepared, but will not be adopted until after August 15, 1970.

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**THE SUPREME COURT—CHANGING FOR THE BETTER?**

There are signs that the Supreme Court is about to make a significant change in judicial direction—and our response is, it's about time.

Today the Supreme Court is composed of Hugo Black, 84, and William O. Douglas, 71, both appointees of President Roosevelt and both with records of decisions highly favorable to the radical left. For example, one survey showed that in a 25 year period, Justice Black had participated in 102 decisions involving the communist conspiracy, and had decided in favor of the communists in every one of the 102 cases, without exception. In another study, it was shown that in 100 cases involving communism, Justice Douglas had voted in favor of the communists 97 times.

Three of the present members of the court were appointed by President Eisenhower: John M. Harlan, 70; William H. Brennan, 64; and Potter Stewart, 65. There is one Kennedy appointee on the court today: Justice Byron White, 52, and one Johnson appointee, Justice Thurgood Marshall, 61. The two newest members are Warren E. Burger, 62, and Justice Harry Blackmun, 61, appointed by President Nixon.

President Nixon is reported to have the aim of appointing "strict constructionists" to the court—i.e., men who consider it their function to interpret the law, and not to make law. Let us hope that this will be the case.

**Tips For Gardeners**

From The Ozona Garden Club  
By Mrs. Bailey Post

With the extended dry spell still holding on, our main chore is the keeping of plants, shrubs and trees properly watered. We should try to water the evergreen trees and shrubs each week or ten days, being sure they are well soaked. Other plants may need water two or three times a week, while others may need a daily spraying.

Grass, if watered sufficiently, should do fine with a weekly watering. June is the month to summer feed your lawn, but it needs to be kept well-watered.

Chrysanthemums need to be mulched and fed every two weeks with liquid fertilizer. Do not let them dry out if you want really fine mums in the fall.

Oleanders are another popular shrub in full bloom now. They stand the hot, dry and windy weather better than some of the other shrubs if kept watered.

A bed of petunias that had been planted in good, new soil, turned yellow, so I added a light feeding of coppers and soaked them deeply. They responded at once with healthy dark green foliage.

Continue spraying for all pests, such as red spider, aphids, black spot on roses and bag worms. A combination spray for insects and mildew is the easiest to use.

If plants are at the stage to become stringy looking, pinch back tips for lower

branching. Some of the plants that need this treatment are Joseph's coat, mums, and coleus.

For the dry places in your garden, one of the showiest plants are succulents, which thrive where other plants wither in the sun and drought. The hardy type which will survive severe winters include the sempervivum (hen and chickens or house leeks), sedums, aloes, scheveria, and others. Many of these are used for potted plants for patios and the house, some putting on spectacular and unusual blooms.

Sedum spectabile is often seen as a mound of pink blooms. A sedum spurium we have enjoyed is winter hardy, a red carpet in the winter and is easy to control. It takes full sun and is the best of any ground cover we have tried, especially among medium rocks.

**WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER**

Among a dozen Civil Rights bills enacted during the '60's was one, dictated largely by the late Martin Luther King, which outlawed virtually any form of literacy or mental tests for voting in a half dozen Southern States, leaving laws in that respect

undisturbed in other states, some of which have literacy tests.

That measure, which observers have likened to laws imposed on the south during Reconstruction days, even allowed the U. S. Attorney General--at his behest--to move in and take over the election machinery, decide for himself who could or could not vote, count the ballots, and decide the winner--even in local elections. He would not have that authority in other states, however.

While watered down some, an enactment last week extends the law which would otherwise expire in August. In the Senate an amendment was added which lowers the voting age to 18, despite the fact that President Nixon and the most eminent constitutional lawyers in the Nation warned such a provision was clearly contrary to the Constitution--which grants to each

State legislature the right to determine the qualification of voters.

If approved by the President, this amendment will have a very serious effect on the sale of local and municipal bonds. A prominent bond attorney states it this way: "It is our opinion that bonds cannot be issued nor taxes levied on the basis of an election in which the vote of persons under 21 years of age has influenced the outcome of the election, until such time as attacks on the constitutionality of the Act of Congress have been resolved in favor of such Act by the U. S. Supreme Court."

At present about \$6-billion of State, municipal, school and other bonds are voted and sold annually. This is to provide funds for streets, school buildings, water and sewer improvements, and a variety of anti-pollution and other municipal projects.

in the view of the President, the enactment of the voting age, if by the President, will probably freeze the sale of such bonds for some time to come.

Many of us feel the voting age can be lowered only by an amendment of the Constitution. It is clear that the Constitution makes it clear that the Congress has no authority to do so. It will be a matter of the Supreme Court to follow the lead of the Constitution.

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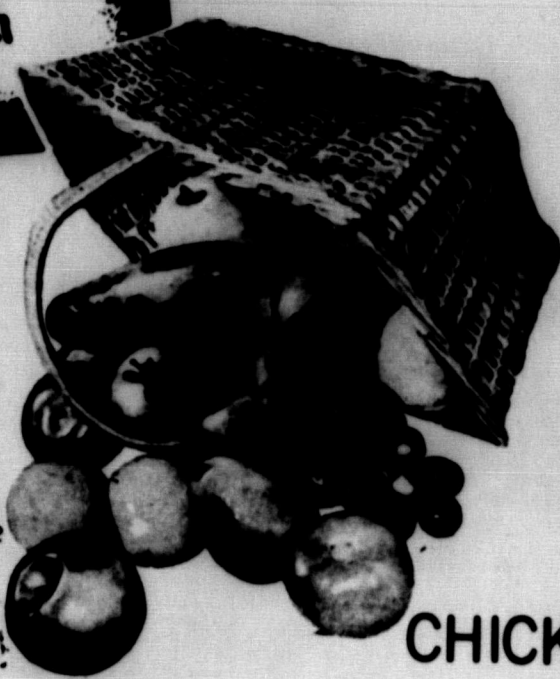

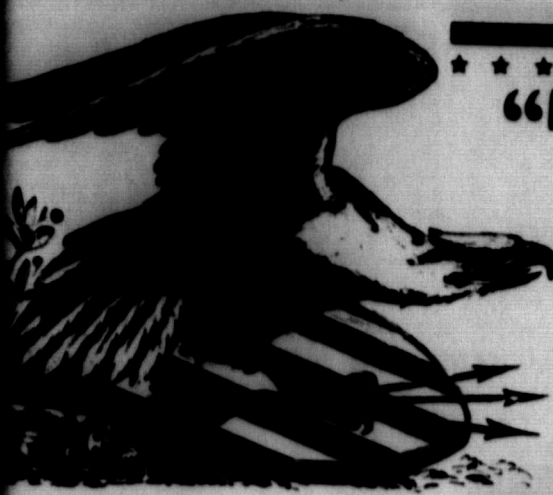

wire or engine failure caused the crash.

Texas Highway Patrolman John Harris, one of the several officers investigating the crash, said that Sanders was pronounced dead due to internal injuries by Dr. Ralph Simon when the ambulance arrived at the hospital.

Spencer said Sanders, a photographer, and he had left Phoenix about 9 a. m. Thursday, traveled to Tucson where they picked up the helicopter and started on the trip to Florida at noon Thursday. They spent Thursday night in El Paso and arrived in Ozona around 11:30 a. m. Friday.

The small two-seater helicopter, ripped and torn by the impact of the crash, was not a total loss, Spencer said. He said many parts could be salvaged from it. The wrecked plane was brought into a local automotive repair shop and officials from the Federal Aviation Administration and one from the National Transportation Safety Bureau were in Ozona later the same day to investigate the crash.

Services for Sanders were held at Mortensen-Kings Funeral Center in Phoenix early this week. James Funeral Home of Ozona handled local arrangements.
