is rights. Nor must he keep the manucript secret to protect his "comnon law copyright." He may let riends read it. He may submit it o editors for possible sale. By loing so, he no more gives up his wnership than a person gives up wnership of a watch by subnitting it to a jeweler for apraisal


Furthermore, his ownership has o time limit. While an ordinary opyright cannot last more than years, a "common law copyight" may last indefinitely-so ong as the work remains unublished.
