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WHAT THE DOMINOES ARE SAYING

In reply to skeptics of the so-called "domino theory, President Nixon recently retorted: "They haven't talked to the dominoes." What the "dominoes" (the Southeast Asian Countries) are saying is illustrated in the recent call of President Cheng-Kang of the World Anti-Communist League (WACL) to the 47 affiliated units in the international organization, which includes representatives from all of the South-east Asian countries

Dr. Ku Cheng-Kang said:

"We pay our highest respect to the Americans who have fought for justice in Southeast Asia. We are deeply concerned with the fate of those servicemen who are missing or have been imprisoned by the Communists. Our genuine sympathy goes to the thousands of American prisoner relatives.

The atrocious Communist mistreatments of U.S. prisoners of war in Vietnam are enough to make a man's hair stand on end. Prisoners of war are entitled to a special status under international law because there is no justification for the injury or mistreatment of members of armed forces who have fallen into the hands of the enemy and no longer present any military threat. This is a matter of basic humanity and protections are provided by the Geneva Convention.

But North Vietnam, the Viet Cong and the Pathet Lao have refused to abide by the humanitarian principles of the convention. There have been cases of American POWs who have been deprived of sleep, beaten, put in solitary confinement for weeks, brain--washed, paraded before jeering crowds and had their fingernails: removed. There have been instances of murder.

All these show clearly that the Communists are a group of inhuman terrorists driving savagely at their goals in complete disregard of international justice.

In conclusion, Dr. Ku Cheng Kang said

"We call upon the whole free world, especially the member and observer units of the World Anti-Communist League, to rise as Crockett Strike the Geneva Convention. It is not unusual today to hear good Americans complain: "I love my country BUT there's a lot wrong with it. Our foreign policy is terrible ... Washington is filled with socialists (or opportunists, or reactionaries) . . . our youths are losing all sense gallons. Tubing and casing of responsibility I wouldn't send my son to fight in Vietnam and lose his life if our government doesn't care enough to let him know what he's fighting for and doesn't have a policy to win ...

True, there are things that are "wrong" in America ... but not nearly as many things that were "wrong" 200 years ago, or 300 years ago, or even 50 years ago. This country is still the greatest nation ever known to man; in terms of human, individual freedom, in terms of opportunity; in terms of material wealth, in terms of our spiritual heritage; by any number of yardsticks, America excells. This is still a country where one can dream and make his dreams come true. Dangerous days? Certainly-but no more dangerous than the new frontiers that were faced and overcome by the pioneers. The colonists were few and they were poor but they were brave and they were courageous. They fought for independence when the odds were against them and they won. We haven't changed that much in the past 200 years. Being an American is still the richest privilege to be conferred to anyone. The riches are still here, the goodness is still here. 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



Now is the time to begin planning for the year ahead just what and where you will be planting. If you plant a new flower bed for fall, spade the ground, and soak it thoroughly. Let it dry out so it will break into small particles. You may need to add some sand and peat moss or new dirt to make a good loam. Plant more seed than you would in the spring because of poorer germination at this season. Gaillardia, California poppy, larkspur, snapdragon, pansies, bluebonnet and other hardy annuals and perennials may be planted this and next month.

(continued from page one) ery major war in which the United States has fought, frontier doctors, school teachers, buffalo hunters and ordinary citizens who were in the vanguard of settlers who migrated to Texas in the early 19th century.

The name and location of the markers will appear in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers.

The Hudspeth grave marker contains the following inscription:

"Henry Street Hudspeth 18? -1900). A confederate veteran. Captain, Co. B, 2nd Calvary. Civil War. Born in Mississippi. Came to Texas. 1877. Served as county clerk after moving here, 1888.

"Married Elizabeth A. Roy-One of his five children was U. S. Congressman C. B. Hudspeth

"Recorded -- 1970" A similar plaque to mark the Casbeer grave reads: "Joseph L. Casbeer (1839-1918). A confederate veter-

"Born in Lamar County, In Civil War, was in Co. G. Col. R. T. P. Allen's Texas Infantry, and was discharged in

"On Sept. 5, 1871, married Miss Matilda Peacock, in Lampasas county. They had 2 sons. Moved to Ozona in 1898
