## Two Outposts Staked On V. I. Pierce Ranch

Monitor Natural Gas Co., Midland, staked two outposts to the Ozona Canyon sand gas area of Crockett County, 35 miles southwest of Ozona. The 7,000-foot tests are

No. 1-43 V. I. Pierce, 1,320 feet from north and west lines of section 43, block A, T.C. survey, 11 miles southeast of Canyon gas production in the VIP multipay area, and No. 1-62 Pierce, 1,320 feet from north and west lines of section 62, block G-2, WC survey 1 1/2 miles southwest of Canyon gas production.

Delta-Suburban No. 13-3 Helbing, section 13, block GR, D&SE survey, A-2007, a Wichita Albany oil discovery in the Ozona Canyon gas area, six miles south of Spraberry sand oil production in the Northwest Ozona multipay area, pumped 99.26 barrels of 37 gravity oil, plus 11 barrels of load water in 24 hours through perforations at 3,321 to 3,338 feet, after treatment with 1,000 gallons of acid. Potential test was slated.

## Ozona Little League All Stars Play Pecos Here Friday Night For Championship Of District

In their second game in the playoffs, the Ozona All-Stars thrashed a weak Big Lake team 12-1 here Friday night. They will host the Pecos Little League All-Stars tomorrow night for the district title.

Pecos beat Crane 5-2 for a shot at the district title. They drew a bye for the second game.

Ozona's first game, versus the Sonora All-Stars last Tuesday night, was by far the most exciting of the two games. The Ozona stars pre-

valled 5-3, but it took nine innings to get the victory. Ronaldo Cervantez went the entire nine innings for Ozona. After a near disastrous first inning, Cervantez settled down and pitched a near perfect game. He struck out 20 Sonora batters and only gave up 2 hits and 2 bases on balls.

Cervantez was throwing as hard and as fast in the ninth inning as he did in the first. He will be the starting pitcher tomorrow night against Pecos.

Ozona got off to a bad start in the first inning. Mike Street led off the batting for Sonora and popped up to first baseman Ronald Shaw for the first out. Will Wallace got on first with an interference call on Ozona's catcher Howard Huereco. Sonora's Cook hit a ground ball to Cervantez and a wild throw to first got him on. Hector Perez hit a line drive to left field and a wild throw to third base allowed all three runs to score. Cervantez struck out the next two batters to retire the side.

Ozona failed to score until the bottom of the third inning. Ronald Shaw got a base hit after one out. After the second out, Orlando DeHoyos got a hit that moved Shaw to third and in scoring position, bringing up Howard Huereco. DeHoyos stole second and Huereco got his fourth hit of the night to score the runner. Huereco stole second and third and scored on a wild pitch to make the final score 5-3.

Friday night against Big Lake, Ronnie Schneider went all the way for Ozona at the pitcher's mound. He struck out 12, walked one and gave up four hits.

Ozona scored five runs in the first inning, three in the second and four in the fifth for an easy win.

Schneider lost his shut-out in the sixth inning when Lee got a double, moved to third on an infield out and scored on a wild pitch. This was Big Lake's lone scoring play.

Five Ozona boys had hits, Orlando DeHoyos, Howard Huereco, Rickey Perry, Ronald Koerth and Rod Allee.

Manager Harold Shaw and Coach Rex Fenton expect a very strong Pecos team, but believe their team has a good chance to win. Ozona has one of the best teams it has had in several years. While not a power team, the boys come up with numerous singles and doubles and have good pitching. If Cervantez gets in trouble tomorrow night fans will see Tony Conner who has yet to see action in district play.

Conner did a good job for Moore Oil during the season and has a no-hitter to his credit.

Otherwise, the line-up will be much the same as in the two previous games. The game starts at 8:30.

## Seven Amendments Up For Vote In Nov.

Texas voters will have seven more proposals to amend the much amended Texas Constitution at the 1970 General Election on November 3. Publications of the text of the seven proposed amendments begins in Texas newspapers this week.

The seven proposals were among the 16 amendments proposed by the 61st Legislature which convened in January, 1969. Nine of the amendments were voted on by the Texas electorate on August 5, 1969. Only four of last year's proposals were approved by the voters.

The seven amendments include one which relates to the removal, retirement or censure of justices, judges and justices of the peace.

No. 2 proposal would authorize the legislature to enact a mixed beverage law regulating sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis. No. 3 would

authorize the legislature to provide for uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest land based on capability of the land to produce.

No. 4 proposes to reconstitute the State Building Commission as a 3-member appointed commission. No. 5 would authorize counties to issue road bonds not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed value of real property.

No. 6 amendment would increase the value of the homestead exemption from forced sale from \$5,000 to \$10,000. The final amendment would authorize the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions of government between political subdivision in any county.

The proposals will appear in abbreviated form on the general election ballot in November.

## 4-H Group Attends Tex. Youth Conference

A group of Crockett County 4-H Club members and their adult leader returned Friday from the Texas 4-H Youth Conference on Natural Resources areas of rangelands, forestry, outdoor recreation, soil and water conservation and wildlife management.

The group of 4-H members was selected by the State 4-H Club Office at Texas A&M University to attend the camp.

Attending from this chapter were Alton Everett, Cyndie Whitehead and Kathy Williams, accompanied by Mrs. Ruben Whitehead, 4-H leader.

Selection was based on interest and 4-H experiences in natural resources. All the members attending are former Gold Star winners and each has excelled in 4-H range and plant judging work.

The Crockett county group joined eleven other such 4-H groups from the twelve Extension Service Districts in the state. All those attending the conference received in-depth training in natural resources areas of rangelands, forestry, outdoor recreation, soil and water conservation and wildlife management.

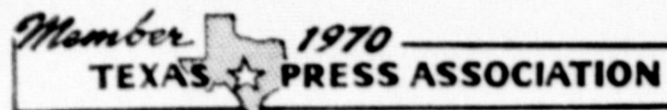

#### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)  
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation, what-so-ever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company. "(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of the State, or any district not or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon, who are qualified electors of such dis-

#### Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

During the summer months is a good time to ~~water~~ on plants, shrubs and trees and make notes of the ones that look healthy, take less water, and survive the heat with the least care.

Do you ever envy the lovely garden of a friend or neighbor and make up your mind to start right away to have your own garden just as beautiful? If so, you may rush to the nearest garden store, buy a box of commercial fertilizer and begin. You put more than the directions call for like my husband, who says, "If a little bit does a little good, a large dose will do a lot of good." As you are picturing the profusion of blooms that will fill your garden in a few days, what happens? Soon the plants begin to turn yellow, they wilt and die. You find out that plants are living things and do need water and require food, but they must have a well-balanced diet, given when needed and by directions.

If you are growing Amaryllis, they should have a dense dressing of well-rotted manure this month to help the bulbs grow large and plump. The

growth the bulb makes in the summer determines the quality and number of flowers for the next year. Then too, a well-grown bulb will produce more off-sets, so keep well watered these dry months.

I have especially enjoyed a number of bulbs that I grew from hybridized seed grown in California. It usually takes three years for seedlings to bloom, but it is worth the time spent to have so many nice bulbs for the cost of the seed. I planted the seed in September in flats of good soil and I think every seed germinated. They should be kept inside the first winter to keep from freezing.

Another plant that seems to thrive in our area and is almost immune to disease and insects is the day lily. They have a long period of bloom when most gardens need color. A herbaceous perennial, it dies down to the ground, but resumes growth in the spring. There are some that are evergreen in some sections. They take very little care and need not be separated for several years. Except for the very latest bloomers, late September and October is the best time to plant, or they may be separated when finished blooming.

A good formula I use for iris and daylilies is one tablespoon vinegar, one cup superphosphate and one cup bone meal per square foot of bed. Keep well watered after planting and provide a light mulch the first winter.

Spuria iris should be planted extensively here because they withstand droughts, heat and our weather changes better than most perennials. September is thought to be the best month for planting or transplanting the rhizomes, but the period may be extended until December 1. The

clumps may be left for many years without dividing. The blooms are shaped like Dutch iris, but are larger in size. They bloom in May and are sometimes called the "Cathedral iris" because of their ex-

tensive use in church decorations. This is a good time to start cuttings. Use a slip four inches long, remove all leaves except those at the top. Plant in sand and keep moist.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 29)  
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions as comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

#### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 27)  
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

#### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR 26)  
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a home, or as a place to reside the calling or business of the head of a family; also, that any temporary change of the homestead shall change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the purposes of a home, or as a place to reside the calling or business of the head of a family; also, that any temporary change of the homestead shall change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired."

#### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 24)  
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two years, one for four years, and one member biennially. The Governor shall designate one member as chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission"

#### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30)  
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsections (1), (2), (3), (4), (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (10), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members. "(6) A Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section I, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature. "(8) Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired or removed shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary." "(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed. "(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal. "(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

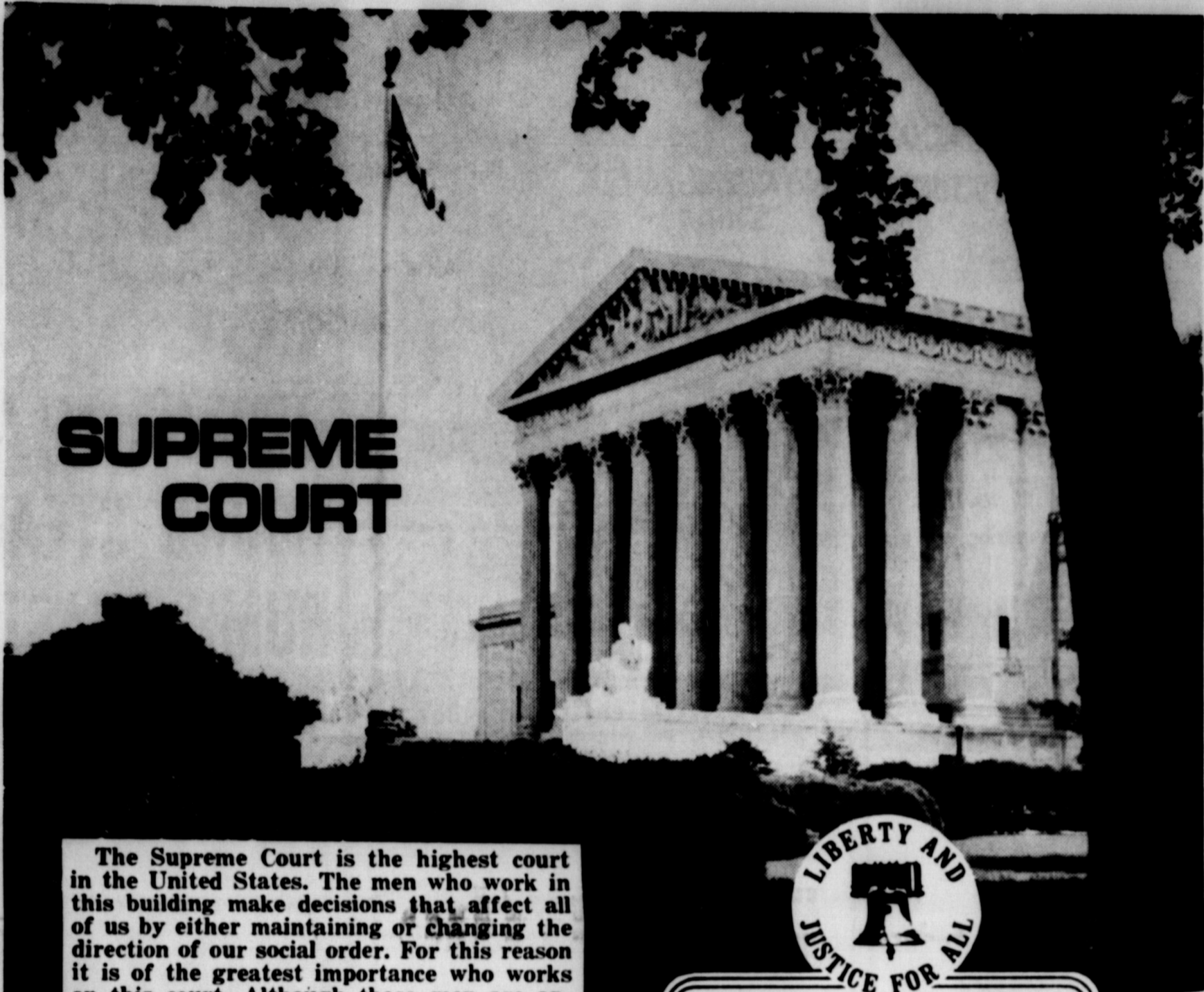

# SUPREME COURT

The Supreme Court is the highest court in the United States. The men who work in this building make decisions that affect all of us by either maintaining or changing the direction of our social order. For this reason it is of the greatest importance who works on this court. Although these men are appointed by the President of the United States, the appointment must be confirmed by the Senate. This is a safeguard to insure the highest degree of competency on the court.

Most of us, at one time or another, will disagree with a decision which this court has made. Whenever this is the case, let us remember that all the members of this court have sworn to uphold the Constitution of the United States. As citizens, we have the right to make our disagreements known through writing to the Justices of the Court, the President and the Congress. If enough pressure is brought through these channels the laws may be amended, but to attempt to take matters into one's own hands rather than abide by the decisions of this court undermines the basic principle of democracy and the law and order that holds it together.



Our priceless heritage embodied in the flag of the United States, is as alive today as it was when written for the ages in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution. It stands for all the world to see and for all Americans to cherish. And in the tradition of Washington, Jefferson, and Hamilton, we, too, have a privilege, a right, and a duty. While we may disagree as to the methods, we should not disagree as to the goal—that of preserving the greatest democratic society the world has ever known. Our flag is a symbol, not of sentiment, but of history, the history of men and women willing to live and die for it. Surely this willingness is with us still, because daily we experience more of the blessings that are ours—ours because we are Americans.

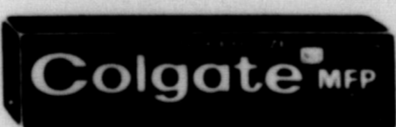

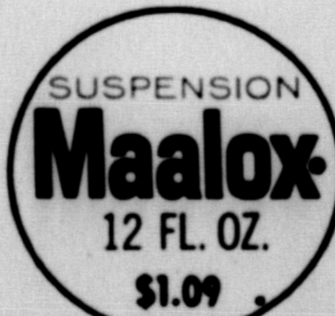
