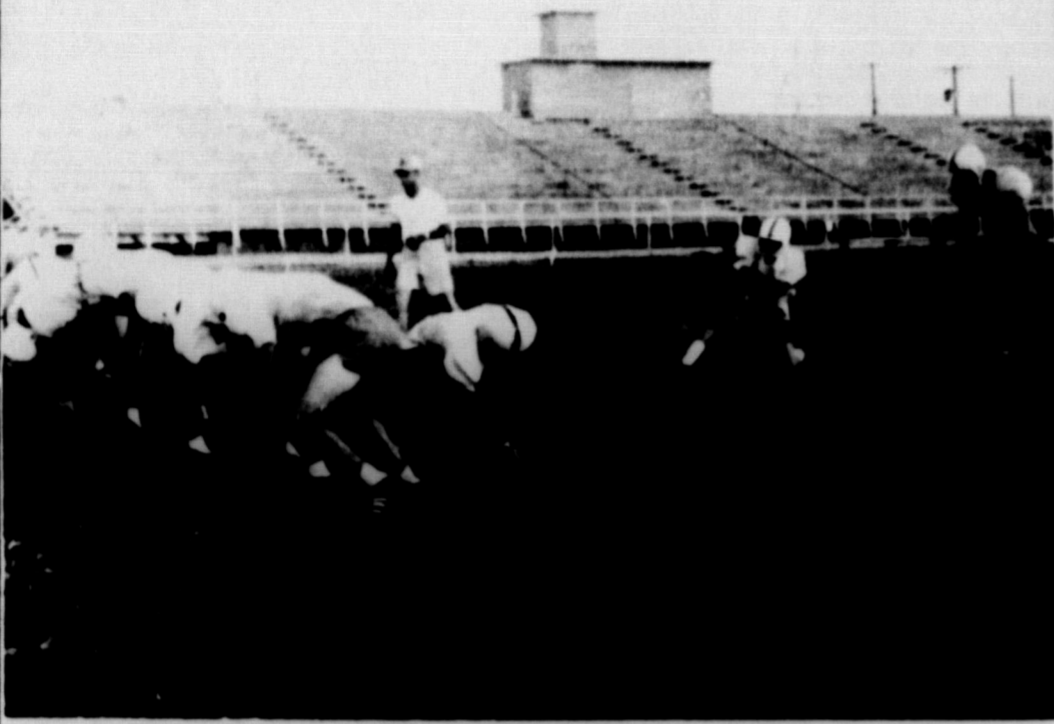

## Barfield Named To Health Study Group

Danny Barfield, vice president and general counsel for Medica Diversified, Inc. currently managing the Crockett County Hospital, has been appointed by House Speaker Gus Mutscher to membership on the Texas Health Care Committee, a statewide committee appointed to study Medicare requirements in an effort to prevent closing of many small hospitals in Texas because of these requirements.

## Officers Brief Ozona Faculty On Drug Problems

A three-hour program on drugs was presented by Grover Ayers of Loffland AFB, Del Rio and Chief of Police Koog of Del Rio at a faculty meeting last week at high school. Samples of marijuana and heroin were shown along with samples of manufactured drugs. Drugs fall into four major categories, the teachers were told, hallucinogens, stimulants, depressants and narcotics. Effects on the mind and body were described in each category. The program was obtained through efforts of Sheriff Billy Mills and his department.

176 small hospitals in Texas would be forced to close unless there is some change in Medicare requirements. "Medicare doesn't say 'We are going to close your hospitals' but rather that 'We will not pay for aged care unless--', the speaker said. "In other words, they are saying that people over 65 can't use the hospital and so, the rest of the people in the small towns can't have a hospital--nor a doctor."

The committee was appointed, Barfield said, to prepare a special report to the legislature, with a view to making an appeal to federal authorities for a change so that small hospitals might qualify for Medicare.

## Widespread Hunt Fails To Locate Missing Horses

A widespread search by law officers, including the DPS helicopter from Midland, failed to turn up a clue to the theft of two horses and two saddles from the Sam Willis ranch Saturday. Officers conducted an extensive search from throughout this area to the Mexican border and along Hwy 90 which parallels the border. They theorize that the horses have been abandoned on some ranch north of Hwy 90. Willis hopes for recovery of the animals before damage to the saddles.

## Laboratory Technician Employed

Employment of a registered laboratory technician with many years of experience was announced this week by Medica Diversified, Inc., currently managing the Crockett County Hospital.

Fred Wallace, recently of Matador, Texas, and boasting more than 20 years experience as a medical technician, will move to Ozona sometime this weekend. He and his wife, Billie, have rented a home in Crockett Heights, where they will reside.

"I feel we are fortunate to be able to secure the services of a laboratory technician of Mr. Wallace's experience," Dr. James C. Everett, Ozona's physician and a director in Medica Diversified, declared.

## Public Meeting Set On Hospital Lease

In a called session of the Commissioner's Court Tuesday, it was decided to hold an open meeting September 14 at 8 p.m. in the district courtroom to consider the leasing of the Crockett County Hospital to Medica Diversified, Inc., based in Eldorado.

After almost reaching the point of closing the hospital doors, the court signed a management agreement with Medica Diversified and the organization has been operating the hospital since the first of June.

Before that time, the hospital was without a doctor and was being serviced by area physicians while the court and the hospital board exhausted every effort to interest a physician in coming to Ozona to practice.

The court and hospital board had been actively seeking another physician for Ozona since Dr. Randle Coker resigned in January of this year, leaving the town with one doctor, Dr. Don Carlisle. When he resigned several months ago, the town became dependent on area doctors and the patient load at the hospital dropped to almost nothing.

Due to this fact, the hospital staff was cut to a skeleton crew and rumor had the doors closing almost daily. Since Medica Diversified took over active management June 1, most of the staff has been called back to work. The organization secured Dr. James Everett, who opened his medical office here July 1.

## Opening Day Of New School Term Finds Enrollment Up

Classes began in all Ozona schools Monday with a total enrollment of 997, up 39 students from last year's 958, but still down from the all-time high enrollment of 1,036 in 1967.

Supt. L. B. T. Sikes said around 20 additional students were usually picked up during the first week of school each year. A total of 254 students were enrolled in Ozona Primary

School at the end of classes Monday. This figure includes 75 children in kindergarten, 93 in first grade and 86 in second grade.

Enrollment in Ozona Intermediate School totaled 327 Monday. Of this total, 75 were in third grade, 84 in fourth grade, 80 in fifth grade and 88 in sixth grade.

Last year the combined totals in the lower grades was 574 to 581 this year.

Enrollment in junior high school was 161, compared with 144 last year. Of this total 83 students are in seventh grade and 78 in eighth grade.

High school enrollment was 255, up 15 students over that of the first day of school last year. Broken down the figures amount to 80 freshmen, 76 sophomores, 42 juniors and 57 seniors.

The first school holiday will be Labor Day, Sept. 7, giving students a three-day weekend.

Other district placings include a third place award for Cyndie Whitehead in Achievement and Kathy Lynn Russell in Clothing. Two second place awards in the J. T. Rutherford Achievement Program went to Alton Everett and Mary Francis Martinez.

In the junior division, the following received first place blue ribbons: Regina Everett, Rebecca Everett, Peter Zapata, Kay Fuantoz, Monica Delgado, Carmen Delgado and Magdalena Galvan. Second place red ribbons went to Paul Zapata and Elsa Delgado. 150 4-H record books were entered in district competition by 4-H members.

## VW Overturns, Lands On Wheels, Child Injured

Mrs. Butch Albers and her two children, Jennifer and Randle, escaped serious injury in a freak accident near here Friday evening.

The accident happened seven miles north of Ozona on Hwy 163 around 7:45 p.m. A gust of wind caught the 1968 model Volkswagen Mrs. Albers was driving and it overturned two times, coming to rest on its wheels. She drove on into Ozona where Jennifer was treated for minor injuries. Neither Mrs. Albers nor her son were injured.

They were coming to visit Mrs. Albers husband's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Larry Albers. Another auto wreck was reported in the county shortly after noon Saturday, nine miles east of Sheffield.

A 1965 Pontiac, driven by George S. Morales of San Antonio and pulling a 1962 Chevrolet, went out of control as it rounded a curve and overturned, leaving the towed car upright. Neither Morales nor a passenger, James Hoffer, were injured. The Pontiac was totally wrecked.

#### HITLER CHAVEZ

After a five year "strike" against the workers and growers of California grapes, one would expect loud rejoicing upon the part of those across the nation who helped the "United Farmworkers" to maintain a grape boycott. Other than the announcement that a large number of the growers had capitulated, however, there has been very little said about the results. It may be that those who were patriots for Cesar Chavez are too embarrassed to reveal the outcome.

By way of background, there never was a "strike" The farm workers were happy with their jobs, their income, and their employers; they did not want to join a union and refused to do so. When Chavez failed to recruit the workers, he turned to the boycott as a means to blackmail the growers into capitulation — which is exactly what happened.

The contract which has now been signed, therefore, is not between the workers and growers; it is between Chavez and the growers. The details of that contract have been quietly hushed up. The only report we have seen was by news columnist James Kilpatrick, who revealed that the key passages in the contract read:

"Union membership shall be a condition of employment. Each worker shall be required to become a member of union immediately following seven (7) days of employment, and to remain a member of union in good standing. Union shall be the sole judge of the good standing of its members.

"Any worker who fails to become a member of union within the time limit set forth herein, or who fails to pay the required initiation fees, periodic dues or regularly authorized assessments as prescribed by union shall be immediately discharged upon written notice from union to company."

So, as reported by Mr. Kilpatrick, the workers sign — or else. They have no other choice. They have no control over the amount of the initiation fee, the dues, or the union assessments — all of this has been pre-determined by Hitler Chavez. If they don't join, they don't work.

Who says there is no fascism in America? Heil, Chavez!

## Vietnam Medals To Gary D. Pagan

Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Pagan were presented two medals awarded posthumously to their son, Gary D. Pagan, by the Republic of Vietnam in a brief ceremony at their home here last Tuesday.

Making the presentation on behalf of the Republic of Vietnam were Col. Stewart of Albuquerque and Sgt. Bernard Frazier of Midland.

Medals presented were the Military Merit Medal and the Gallantry Cross with palm leaf. The citation, signed by the President of South Vietnam read as follows:

This formalizes the posthumous award of the Military Merit Medal to the United States Army servicemen whose names appear below with the following meritorious citation:

"Servicemen of courage and rare self-sacrifice, they displayed at all times the most tactful cooperation while aiding the Armed Forces of

the Republic of Vietnam to repel the Red wave undermining South Vietnam and Southeast Asia.

"With a ready zeal and commendable response, they fought on to the end in every mission and set a brilliant example for their fellow soldiers.

"They died in the performance of duty. Behind them they leave the abiding grief of their former comrades-in-arms, Vietnamese as well as American."

Sgt. Pagan died in action in the Republic of Vietnam November 20, 1968.

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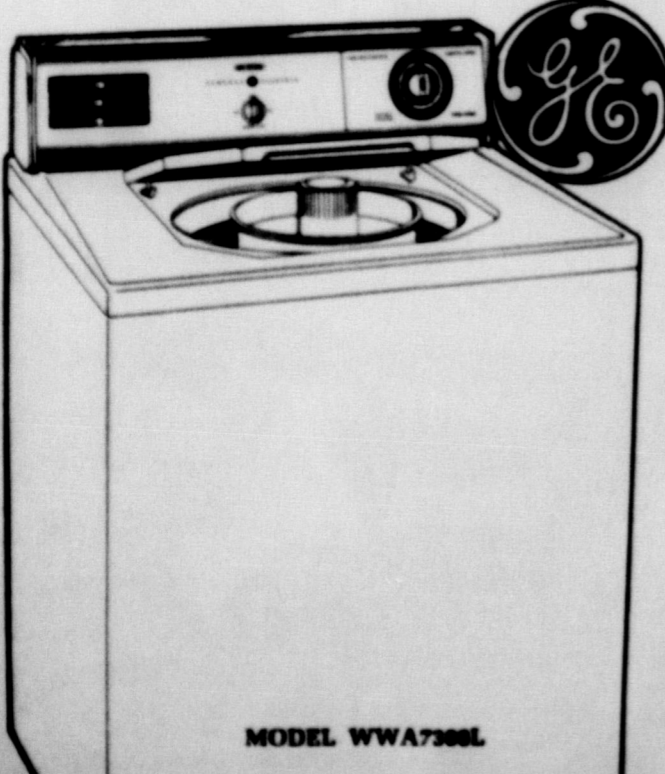

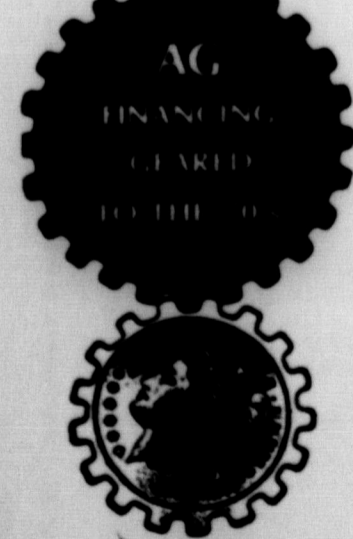
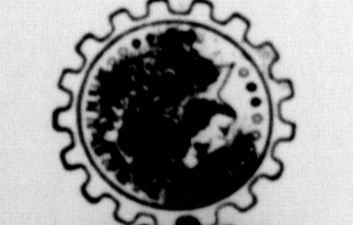

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Beef, Rice and Eggplant

- 1 pound ground round
1 medium eggplant cut in 1-inch cubes (unpeeled)
2 cups cooked rice
1/2 cup minced onion
3 tbs. salad oil
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1 tbs. chopped parsley
1 teas. salt
1 teas. pepper
1 cup bread or cornflake crumbs
2 tbs. grated Parmesan
Cook the eggplant cubes in boiling salted water until tender, about 10 minutes. Drain well and mash. Brown beef in 3 tbs. of the oil, add onion and green pepper and cook over low heat until transparent. Stir together the eggplant, meat mixture, parsley, salt, pepper and rice. Turn into a medium casserole. Stir crumbs into the remaining oil and spread on top of the casserole. Top with cheese and bake in a moderate oven 375 degrees, 20-25 minutes or until brown and bubbly.

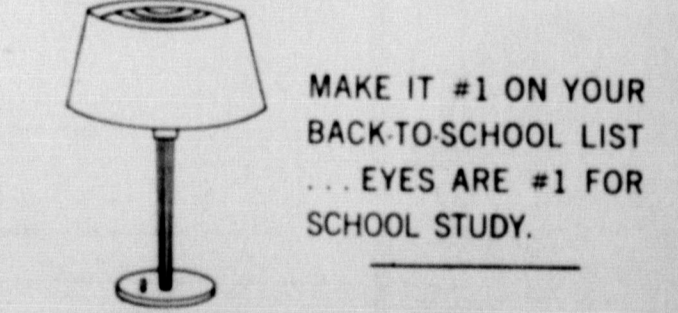
