Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club

Perhaps you are one of a group they say they can't grow roses, but can't quit trying. The rose is still the favorite blossoms of most everyone in the world, so continues to reign as the queen of flowers.

Growing garden roses: Plants - Select or order No. 1, two year old roses with three strong canes and good roots,

Location - roses need at least six hours of sun, preferably in the morning - not too close to trees or hedges.

Time of planting - the best time to plant is Nov. or Dec., or if you prefer spring, Feb. and March are the most desirable months, For a new rose bed, prepare in Sept, so that the soil may settle before plants arrive. Roses need a neutral or on the acid side soil. Dig space to a depth of 18 to 24 inches deep and wide for a single row, allowing 36 inches for Hybrid Tea and Grandiflora roses. Keep the good top soil and sub so soil separate. If drainage is needed, put four inches of gravel in bottom of bed and over this put four inches well rotted manure. Mix with top soil or new soil, one-third sand and two-thirds soil, one-fourth cup soil-sulpher and onehalf cup superphosphate per rose. plants should be soaked in water overnight or until ready to plant. 2. Dig planting hole, in

the prepared bed, 12 to 15 inches deep and 18 inches wide to allow for plenty of root space. 3. Mix a spade of peat

moss with soil from the hole. 4. Remove plant from water and cut off any broken or damaged roots and branches.

5, in the bottom of the hole, make a cone- shaped mound of the soil-peat mous mixture high enough that the graft bud will be about even with the top of the hole. Place toots over the mound, spreading out and down so not to crowd them. 6, Fill the hole about

3/4 full, gently tamping soll with hands to another the spring, remove soil mound. Rose food may be added at this time. Newly planted roses need no fertilizer. Established roses should be fed now to produce beautiful fall roses, also keep watered once a week or every ten days. Favorites that do well
