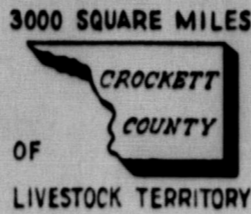

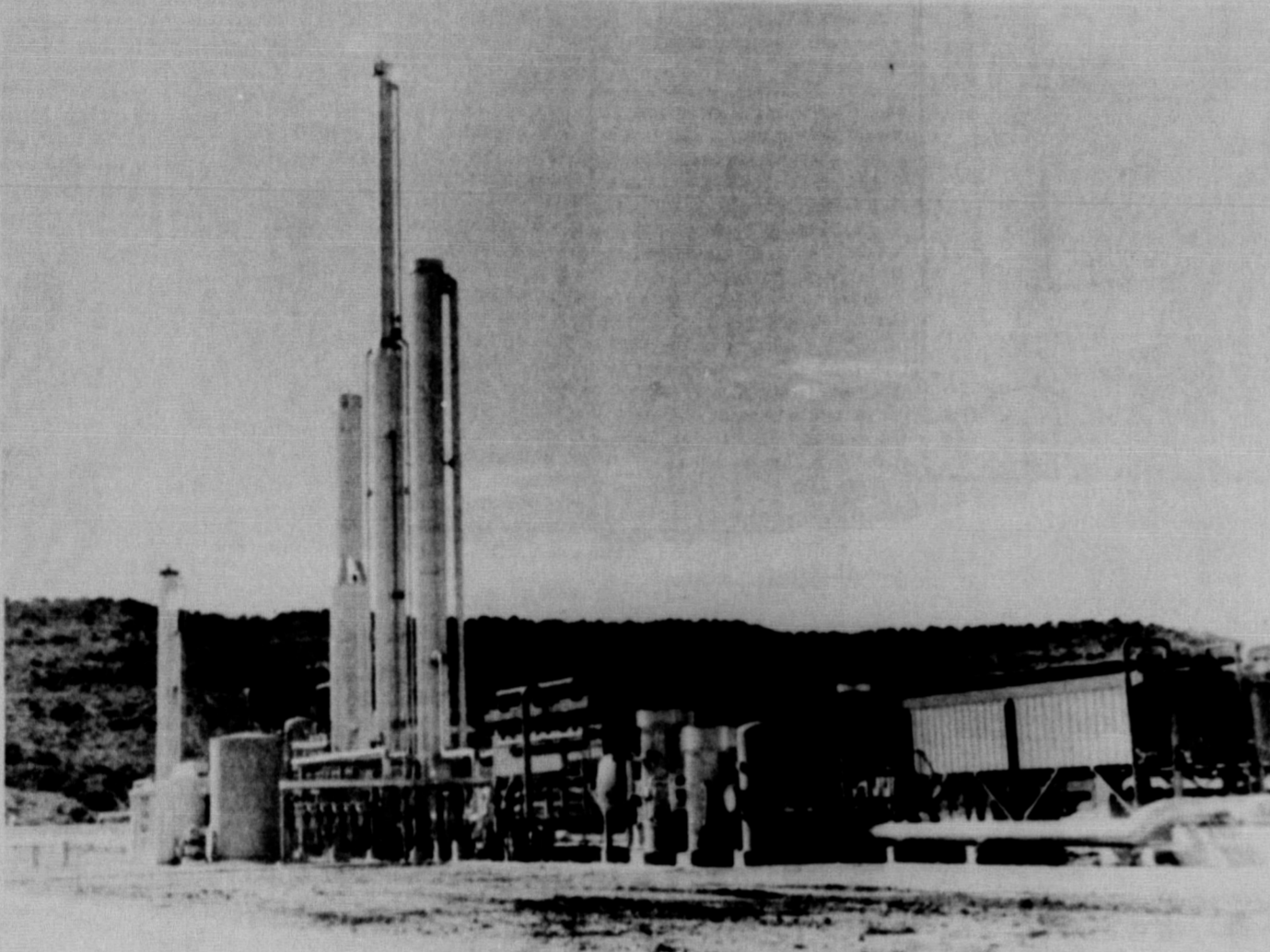

Val Verde Seeks Upgrading Of State 163 From Crockett Line

The Val Verde County Commissioners Court and the Del Rio Chamber of Commerce have been granted a hearing before the State Highway Commission in Austin at 9 a.m. on Thursday, November 19, to discuss proposed upgrading of State Highway 163 from the Crockett County line south in Val Verde County to Comstock.

Announcement of the meeting plan was made this week by Silas Byrd of Del Rio, Val Verde county member of the Amistad Trails Association.

The announcement was particularly gratifying to the Ozona Chamber of Commerce, the County Commissioners Court and interested individuals who have been working for several years toward accomplishment of this project--the straightening and widening of the tortuous route of State Highway 163 in Val Verde county.

The Del Rio group has asked all interested persons to join them in attending the hearing.

3 Accidents In One Day Take Heavy Toll

Highway patrolman John Harris, DPS, reported three automobile accidents over the past week, all occurring Wednesday.

The first accident occurred early Wednesday morning when Jesus Guerra pulled onto Hwy 290 from Ave. G in the path of a 1968 Volkswagen driven by Orlando Valadez. Valadez hit the 1965 Chevrolet Guerra was driving in the side. Damage to the Volkswagen was heavy, but minor to the Chevrolet.

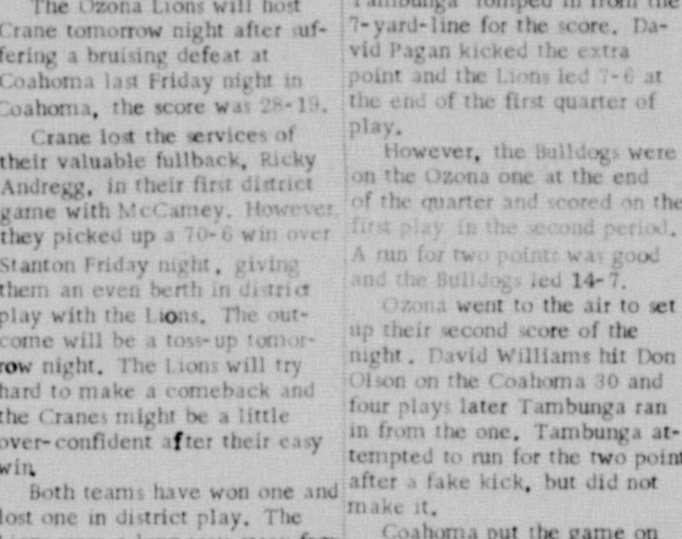
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Mrs. Montgomery Heads Boy Scout Financial Drive

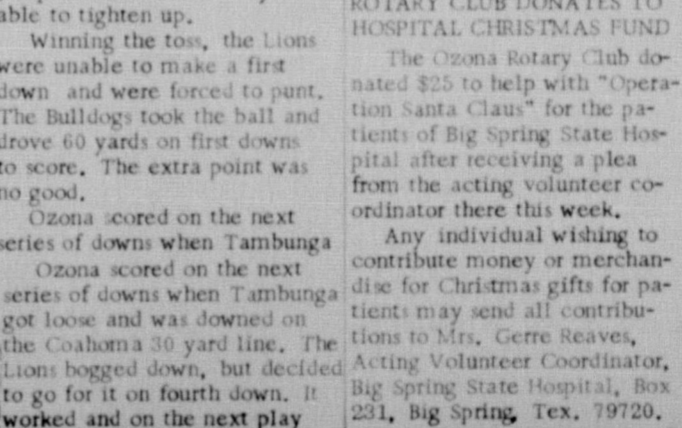

CONFUSION COMPOUNDED

For as long as we can remember, people called "conservatives" have, in general, warned against Federal financing of State and local projects. Reason: Federal funds meant federal control, the growth of federal power. More and more Federal power and control means less and less local independence, so the argument has gone.

For their pains, "conservatives" have been labeled reactionaries, anti-progressive, and the Lord knows what.

It is altogether confusing, therefore, to note that the ultra-left, "liberal" Washington Post syndicated a feature article to the press of the nation, complaining that federal appropriations for education carries the stipulation that universities must cut off federal funds from students who violate the law.

The Washington Post feature article, bylined by D. J. R. Bruckner, complains that the rules "turn university administrators into police agents for the federal government."

"What is important about these laws," continues the Post feature, "is that they tie federal funds to federally defined disciplinary rules."

"It ties federal police power to federal funding with no qualification; there is no foreseeable limit to the application of such a principle," reads the thoroughly conservative argument in the Washington Post.

All of which leads us to wonder where the Post has been all these years, years during which so-called Conservatives warned that federal aid to local schools would be followed by federal manipulation and control? To compound the confusion, the Post has not, to our knowledge, complained when federal administrators from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare followed the federal dollars into the public school system to impose rules of forced racial integration and busing to achieve "racial balance." Nor have we read any complaint by the Post that HEW turned local school boards into policing agents for the federal government.

If the taxpayers, through their elected representatives, appropriate part of their hard-won earnings to students, then the taxpayers, through their representatives, have the right to declare that such funds will not go to students who burn, who kill, or who destroy.

Are we to believe that the Post is in accord with the "taxation without representation" precepts of the Tories and King George III?

SOCK IT TO 'EM, SCHICKEL

Jenkin Lloyd Jones once wrote, with characteristic forthrightness, "Let's quit being bulldozed and bedazzled by self-appointed longhairs. Let's have the guts to say that a book is dirt if that's what we think. Let's blow the whistle on plays that would bring blushes to an American Legion stag party. Let's not be awed by movie characters with barnyard morals. Let's pay more attention in our news columns to the decent people everywhere who are trying to do something for the good of others. In short, gentlemen, let's cover up the cesspool and start planting some flowers."

Since those words were penned, there has been a steady stream of dirty books, plays, and movies, each apparently published or produced with the intent to make each a little dirtier than its predecessor. But among the professional reviewers there seems to have been a strange reluctance to "blow the whistle." So it is news when a movie critic, responsible, authoritative and recognized, describes a current cesspool film in plain language.

The film in question is "Performance" featuring two circus-level performers—which is to say, two individuals with no ability whatsoever in the fine art of acting—James Fox and Mike Jagger. The reviewer, Richard Schickel, for Life magazine.

By way of contrast, Mr. Schickel quotes from a review written by an unidentified "critic": "With its sadism, masochism, decorative decadence and languid omnisexuality, (the film) turns out to be the kind of all-round fun that in the movies oft is tried but rarely so well achieved."—pretty much par for the course.

With refreshing candor, Schickel describes the motion picture as "loathsome," "repellent," and "morally disgusting."

With "perhaps two of its 106 minutes... given over to plot," writes Mr. Schickel, "it is the most disgusting, the most completely worthless film I have seen since I began reviewing."

Bravo, Walter Schickel. Let's hope that enough people read your review to stay away from the box office in droves.

Historical Group Attends Meeting in Fredericksburg

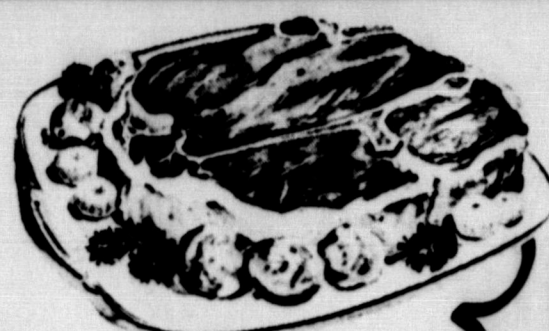

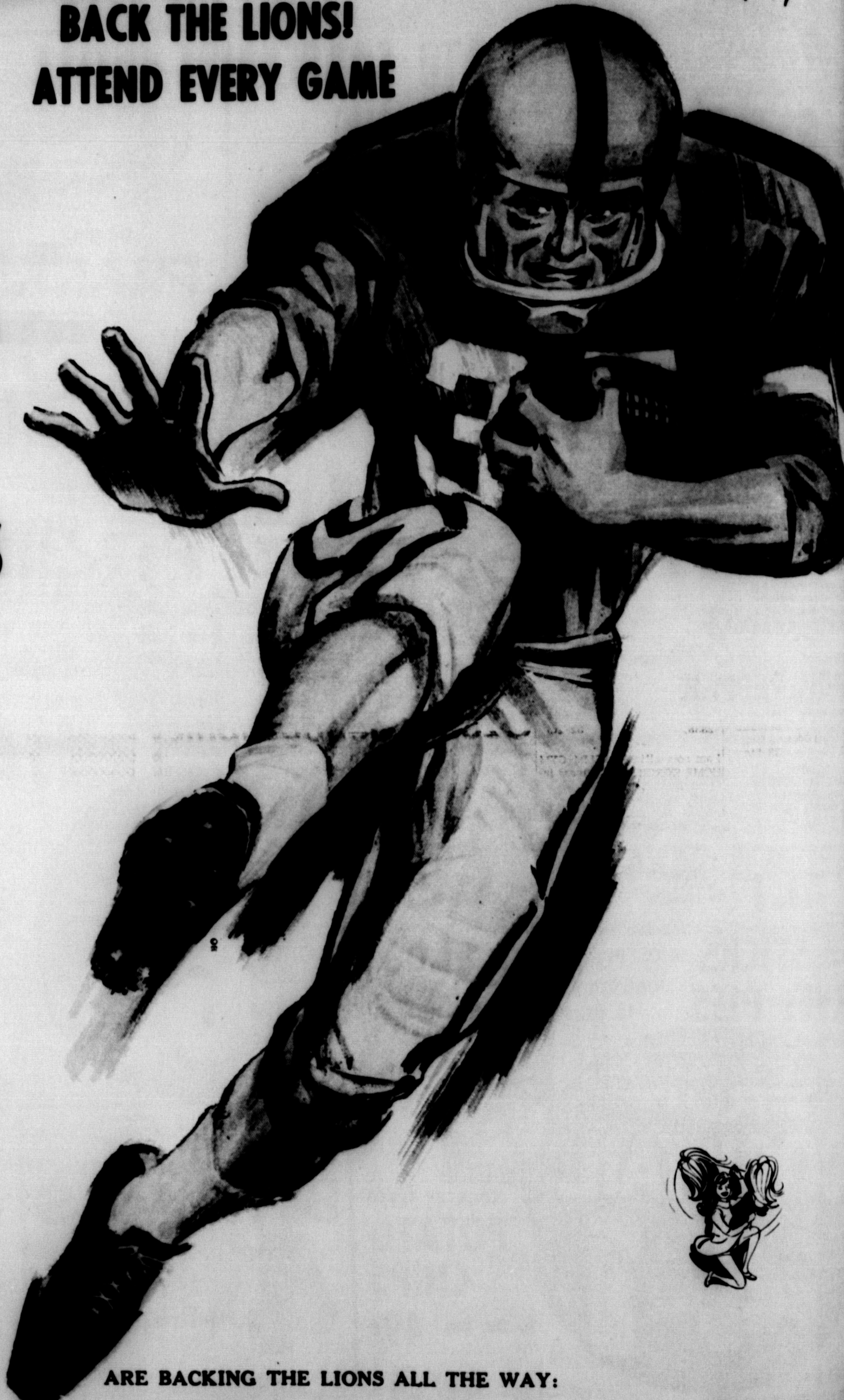

Heir Conditioning

Freddie was delighted to hear, at the reading of Uncle Dan's will, that he was supposed to inherit a large sum of money. But there was a catch. The money would be his only on condition that he give up cigarettes.

In short order, Freddie challenged the validity of this anti-cigarette clause.

"Uncle Dan had no right to try to control my private life in this way," he complained in a court hearing. "My personal habits including smoking, are no one's business but my own."

However, the court ruled that



Freddie would have to either give up his cigarette habit or lose the money. The judge said that since the money belonged to Uncle Dan, he had a right to put strings on his gift if he so desired.

Of course it is natural, for a person making his will, to want to shape the character or conduct of his heirs. Nevertheless, the law does impose limits as to how far he can go. Consider this case:

A man left money to his daughter, on condition that she not only give up cigarettes herself but also make her husband give them up.

This time, a court decided the man had gone too far and held the anti-smoking clause null and void. The court said he had asked his daughter to do something that was not fairly within her power.

Furthermore, in close cases, the courts are inclined to let the heir keep the bequest, even if he has not lived up fully to the expectations expressed in the will.

Thus:

Another man was worried about his son's dissolute friends. He provided in his will that the son should have certain valuable real estate, so long as he did not become a "drunkard and a vagabond."

As things turned out after the man died, his son did indeed become a drunkard. But he never did become a vagabond. Accordingly, not having acquired both of the vices specified in the will, he was held still entitled to the real estate. The court said it was reluctant to take away an inheritance unless the will left no real choice.

The mayfly, of which there are more than 550 species in North America, spends all but a few days of its life under water.

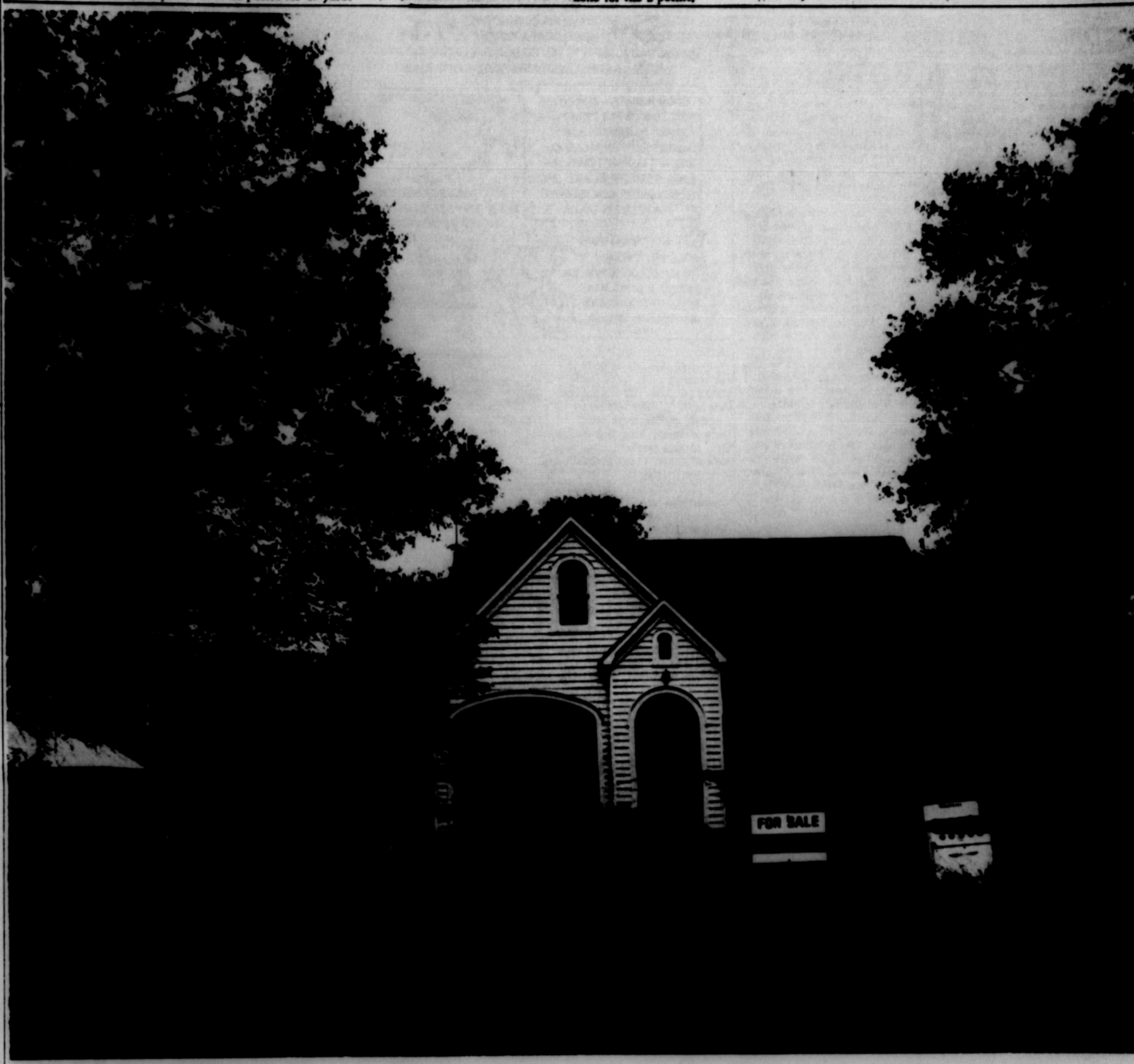

(Continued from Page One) It is the constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops.

Proposal number 2 will allow voters to decide whether to end the 35-year-old constitutional ban on the "open saloon" and let the legislature pass a local option mixed drinks law. This proposal has seen a pitched battle between the wets and the dries.

The other five proposed amendments would:

Broaden the power of the state judicial Qualifications Commission to discipline judges.

Make the state Building Commission appointive, instead of composed of the governor, attorney general and board of control chairman.

Allow counties to increase the amount of road bonds they can issue by majority vote, instead of two-thirds.

Increase the homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

Authorize the legislature to permit cities, counties and other political subdivisions to consolidate services and offices.

FOR THE '70s AND BEYOND

Proposals to change the much criticized Congressional Seniority system under which committee members automatically advance to the top post simply by getting re-elected have been recommended by a House Republican Task Force.

The major thrust of the plan provides that the GOP Committee on Committees recommends at the start of each Congress the Republican member to serve as chairman or ranking GOP member of each House standing committee... thus eliminating the seniority problems.

This supports what I have previously recommended as a criterion for replacing the present outdated seniority system of selecting congressional committee chairmen: **COMPETENCE AND ABILITY.**

O. C. Fisher recently went on record as defending the seniority system which is understandable. Just consider that Mr. Fisher has not been able to get one single military affairs bill he has introduced passed by his only committee in five years — much less passed by the entire Congress. So far this year he has missed one out of every 4 major roll call votes and now has taken a "leave of absence" for the remainder of the congressional year. You can understand why he would be reluctant to accept a criterion for keeping his job other than — as he puts it — his ability to "survive".
