40th Annual Basketball Tourney Opens With 11 Teams Competing

Ozona's 40th Annual Basketball Tournament gets underway today with only eleven teams in contention for the various trophies.

Defending champions, the Big Lake Owls, will be back to try to make it eight years in a row. They have won the Ozona tournament the past seven years, barely squeaking by the Ozona crew last year.

The Lions are a little behind this year and will probably not be favored to win

their own tournament. All the teams entered have two weeks more practice than the Lions, who were still on the football field a little over a week ago. However, with all the starters back from last year the Lions will be expected to make a strong bid for the district title.

Other teams entered include Mertzon, San Angelo JV, Wall, Brady, Mason, Comstock, Eldorado, Iraan, Rankin and Big Lake.

The Tournament gets underway this afternoon at 2:30 with San Angelo JV and Wall playing the first game. Mason will be pitted against Comstock in the second game at 4 o'clock. Ozona will take on Rankin at 6:30 and the first day's play will end at 8 o'clock with Eldorado versus Iraan. Brady drew a bye in the first day of play and Big Lake and Mertzon will play their first game Friday at 6:30.

There will be no morning games Friday. Two games are scheduled for Friday afternoon, beginning at 2:30 and two are scheduled for Friday night. Following the Big Lake-Mertzon game, the winner of the Ozona-Rankin game will play the winner of the Eldorado-Iraan game in the final tilt Friday night.

A full schedule in on tap for Saturday. Play for the consolation trophy will commence at 5:30, followed by the playoff for third place at 7 o'clock and the championship game at 8:30.

Charles Spieker, Lion coach, and Jim Williams, assistant Lion coach, will serve as tournament directors.

The tournament is being held a month early this year, so there will be two 1970 tournaments on record. There were no changes in the existing records during the tournament in January of 1970.

Bobby Cottle of Rocksprings still holds the records for most points for an individual and most field goals with 54 and 23 respectively. The records were set in 1967.

David Gentry of Mertzon still owns the record, set in 1969, for the most free throws with 14, and George Johnson of Sonora still holds the record for the highest total individual score with 126, set in 1957.

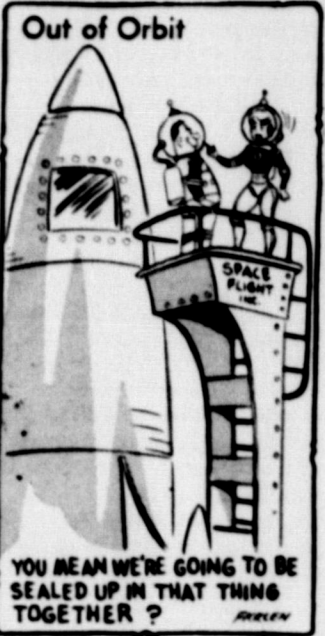

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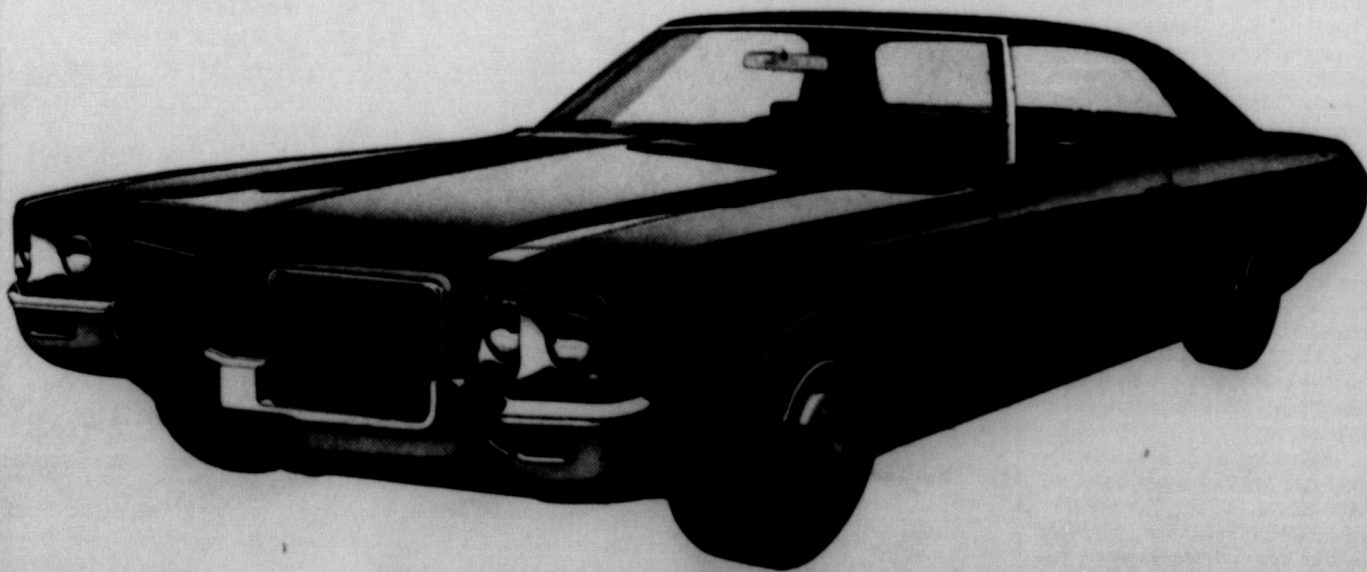
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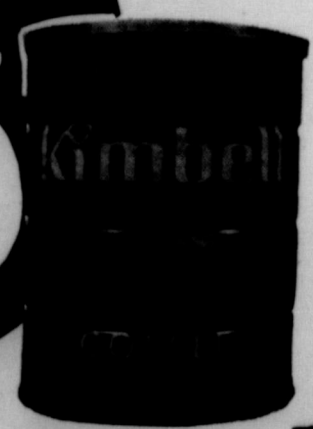

A STORM OF SMUT

New York, N. Y. -- Here in the nation's largest city to address the emergency leadership conference sponsored by The Center of American Living Inc., I had the privilege of sharing the platform with the Rev. Morton A. Hill, S. J., a battler for decency who deserves the thanks of all respectable citizens.

Father Hill is one of the three members of the presidential Commission on Obscenity and Pornography who dissented from the majority findings. The views of Father Hill and his two colleagues, who filed a minority report, should be widely known.

In order to help achieve this important goal, I am devoting this column to excerpts from Father Hill's speech. The following are among his most telling comments to the leadership conference organized by Lady Natalie Douglas-Hamilton, who heads the Center of American Living:

"There's a wild storm of smut buffeting our country today. It's drowning out good media; it's choking our culture; it's corrupting our morals.

"The purveyors of filth are more brazen than ever. Smut peddlers, confident that highly paid legal counsel will see them through anything, are transporting their trash across state lines, are importing it, are sending it through the mails. Commercial films are projecting the anti-hero image to our young people. He's an unloving non-achiever, non-creator; a violent, oversexed or perverted drug user. Underground newspapers -- there are some 200 of them in the country -- are serving up a potpourri of sex, drugs and rebellion.

"And then a presidential Commission on Obscenity and Pornography, after two years and \$2 million of your tax money, comes up and says in effect: 'Leave it there. It's all reved up. Let it take off. Let's repeal all obscenity laws...' This is what's known as the Danish solution and it is what 12 Americans on the Commission voted for.

"Although the President rejected the majority report and

the Senate rejected and censured it, we have not seen the last of the publicity it will get. It is possible that the big brain-wash has not even begun.

"The Commission did not do its job. It was mandated by Congress to make recommendations that would effectively and constitutionally regulate the traffic in obscenity and pornography. Obviously, the Commission did not carry out this mandate.

"The Commission began in slant and bias to prove a preconceived theory, and it never altered or changed course.

"The New York State investigation Commission presented evidence (in a study of its own) that organized crime is involved in the smut industry; it presented overwhelming evidence. It named reputed members of crime families. It concluded, in fact, that the smut industry is infested with racketeers. But the Presidential Commission could find 'no concrete evidence'."

"The address made by Father Hill deserves to be publicized nationwide. Indeed public officials and community leaders need to familiarize themselves with the entire Hill-Link-Keating minority report which makes clear the menace posed by the smut peddlers.

"With the facts developed by Father Hill and other dissenters, there is a foundation for an organized, continuous and reasoned community voice against the traffic in pornography -- a traffic in which syndicate crime plays a key role.

"Father Hill's organization, Morality In Media Inc., 1256 Lexington Ave., New York, N. Y., 10028, can provide concerned citizens with whatever information they need to combat smut peddlers in their communities.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

The 58-day General Motors strike has shocked many people into an awareness of the public involvement in the outcome. There is to be an increase in automobile prices of from 4 to 7%. The settlement set the pattern for other wage increases, which will affect most Americans. And the attraction for foreign-made cars is due to be enhanced.

It was the biggest and costliest strike in more than a decade. All told, losses in sales, wages and taxes totaled \$7-billion.

Although new wage levels in the auto industry are upward bound, exorbitant wage settlements in the construction industry in recent months have been the most severe. Here are a few examples:

In Los Angeles sheet metal workers went on strike for 17 days before obtaining a settlement for an hourly increase from \$5 to \$12.06.

In Hartford, Conn., electricians struck for 28 days and got a 28.2% increase--from \$6.75 to \$12.50 per hour.

In Columbus, Ohio plumbers received a 14.4% jump in pay, from \$8 per hour to 11.77.

Bricklayers in Connecticut upped their pay by 32.1%, marking an increase from \$6.07 to \$10.10.

In Cleveland pipefitters ended a five month strike with a settlement that gave them a \$3.15 hourly wage increase which by 1972 will bring their base pay to \$10.38.

This pattern of increases has been noted in scores of instances through the country. And the public is required to pay the bill.

This trend makes it more imperative than ever that, to protect the public interest, new concepts in labor legislation be undertaken.

One approach which deserves serious consideration is to create a Labor Court, fashioned after the system in Australia, which would allow a fact-finding judicial system to resolve all labor-management disputes and put an end to strikes as a method of settling such issues. I have a bill pending which would do this.

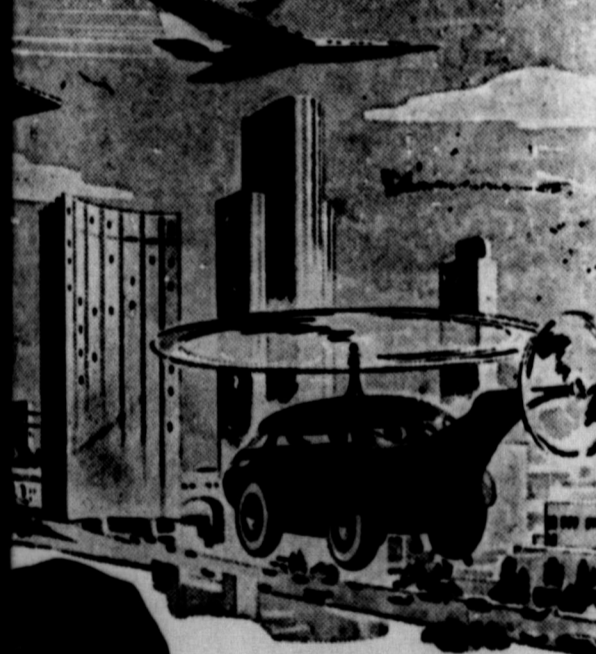

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

Now that the Christmas season is near at hand, you may be planning a way to make Christmas more personal and meaningful to you and your family.

Everyone has a desire to create festive and sparkling decorations throughout the house to give warmth to holiday hospitality. Many things can be done early at your leisure, but the last few days, there are the fresh, spontaneous touches that add so much.

Our Christmas decorations have diversified origins, coming to us from countries and different times. Evergreens, for example, had mystical significance to all the ancient peoples who revered the sun as a source of life, warmth, and light, because evergreens held their leaves unlike deciduous plants. Cuttings of holly, mistletoe, laurel, ivy and rosemary were used in their religious ceremonies and to brighten their homes. Today we use greens and many other materials in swags and wreaths in various ways and places to welcome the holiday and guests to our homes.

Too, the beautiful evergreens from our yards make attractive and durable arrangements for any place you want greenery. For table arrangements evergreens may be used with frosted fruit, ornaments, candles, madonnas and other figurines to create an original centerpiece. There are many ideas and suggestions in the magazines this month.

To keep evergreens and the Christmas tree fresh, use this formula given by the Lone Star Gardener or be sure to harden greens in warm water before using in wreaths, swags and arrangements.

Formula: 1 gallon of hot water, add 4 tablespoons of Micronized Iron (available at florist or garden supply) and mix well, 2 cups light corn syrup and 4 teaspoons chlorinated household bleach. Pound stems for 2 inches and immerse sprays in this mixture. For the tree, make a fresh cut at the base of the trunk and crush the fibers at the end. Place in a bucket filled with the solution and allow to stand for 12 hours at least, or until tree is to be decorated. Also, trees may be decorated. Also, trees may be sprayed with a fine mist of wiltproof or other plastic spray.

To preserve holly - One quart of hot water, 1 cup syrup, 1 teaspoon cloxox. Let stand two days.

To preserve Poinsettia - Cut and sear, use gas flame or match and hold over flame and count to 15. Place in tepid water overnight.

Holiday Season means the using of candles, and you can prevent them from dripping on your table cloth or furniture by soaking a new candle in a salt water solution for several hours.

Natural materials to use for Christmas:

Fresh - Cedar, pine, juniper, holly, Japanese yew, Magnolia, Nandina berries, Pyracantha, apples, Limes, Lemons, oranges, Algerita foliage, Loquat, Photinia, cherry Laurel, cranberries, succulents and Aspidistra.

Dried - Cones (all kinds), magnolia seedpods, sweet gum balls, cotton boll pods, acorns, nuts, peach seeds, poppyseed pods, wheat, maize, sea oats, tattails, bittersweet, yarrow, star flowers, celosia and other

material you may have. Magnolia, holly, loquat and many others may be treated with glycerine. Dried materials may be treated in a variety of ways.

Game Department Conducts Research On Texas Wildlife

Texas landowners have obtained offspring from zoo animals from widespread areas of the world, including eland, oryx, blackbuck antelope, aoudad sheep, zebra, axis deer, sika deer and fallow deer. Their number is estimated to be in excess of 30,000.

Biologists are now trying to determine the impact of these exotics on native wildlife populations, and much of the research is being carried out on the Kerr Area.

Other research concerns the effects of brush-clearing on wildlife and the effect of controlled hunting on an area. Public deer hunts in which 18 to 45 per cent of the total deer herd have been killed have been conducted by the Department with no ill effects to the herd.

Biologists at the area say research will increase in the years to come to yield information for sensible management of all wildlife, vegetation and domestic animals by landowners. They hope this management

will produce habitats where exotics, native wildlife and domestic animals can blend harmoniously and provide benefits for hunters as well as landowners.

Meringue Cookies

1 egg white
1 cup light brown sugar
1 teas. vanilla
2 cups chopped nuts
Beat egg white until stiff. Beat egg white until stiff. Add brown sugar and beat until creamy. Add vanilla and nuts. Drop onto a greased cookie sheet and cook at 250 degrees for 10 minutes. Turn oven to 225 degrees and bake 30 minutes more. Yields 30 cookies. Cool before removing from cookie sheet.

Fruit Cake Cookies

1 1/2 cups brown sugar
1/2 cup butter
4 eggs
3 tbs. sweet milk
2 1/2 teas. soda
1 teas. cinnamon, and nutmeg
1 oz. bourbon
1 lb. pecans
2 cups raisins
1 lb. candied cherries
1 lb. candied pineapple
3 cups flour
Cream sugar and butter, add eggs and 2 cups flour, spices and soda. Sift 1 cup flour over nuts and add to mixture along with fruits. Add bourbon, mix well and drop from teaspoonfuls on greased cookie sheet. Bake in 325-degree oven for about 25 minutes.

Chewy Noels

2 tbs. butter
2 eggs
1 cup brown sugar
5 tbs. flour
1/8 teas. soda
1 cup chopped nuts
1 teas. vanilla
Powdered sugar
Melt butter in 9 inch square pan. Beat eggs and vanilla. Combine remaining ingredients and stir in egg mixture. Pour over melted butter. Do not stir. Bake in 350-degree oven for 30 minutes. Cut in squares while warm and dust with powdered sugar.

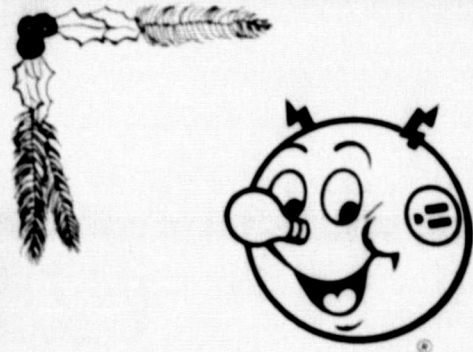

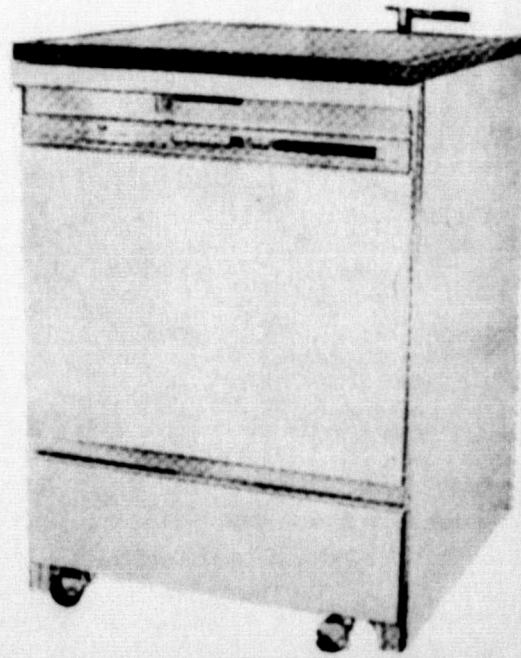
