Crockett Field Gains Extension

The Ozona (Canyon sand) field gained a one mile west and slightly north extension with completion of Tyra & Tyra, Midland, No. 1-20 Henderson, 20 miles southwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2,050,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 49-903-1. Gravity of the condensate was 65 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 6,399,603 feet, which had been acidized with 30,000 gallons and fractured with 30,000 gallons and 129,000 pounds of sand.

A re-entry operation, it was drilled to 7,200 feet and plugged and abandoned July 5, 1968. Location is 1,320 feet from the south and east lines of 20-ST-TCRR.

Jail Addition Plans Approved By Commission

Architect Jack McDermitt of San Angelo submitted final plans and specifications for the new addition to the ancient Crockett County jail for approval at the regular meeting of the Commissioners Court Monday. The plans were approved and steps were taken by the court to facilitate sale of the bonds and award of construction contract.

Bids for construction are scheduled to be opened January 15. The construction was made possible by approval by voters of a \$150,000 bond issue at a recent election.

The addition of modern jail facilities to be joined to the present jail was made necessary by changing times. The present jail has no facilities for juveniles or female prisoners and with increased population and travel, more and more such prisoners fall into the hands of officers. Local officials had to impose on neighboring counties in the past for care of such prisoners. And, too, several prisoners in recent months had found the ancient rock and mortar construction easy to dislodge and several escapes have been recorded.

The new construction will be masonry walls with stucco tinted to match the present rock walls of the old jail. The addition will contain an office for the jailer, vault for evidence, and valuables, a confinement area for the insane a drunk tank. (Continued On Page 2)

Dr. James Everett submitted his resignation as Medical Director of Crockett County Hospital, effective December 31, to the hospital board last week.

He will move with his family to Temple shortly after the first of the year where he will begin a residency in the field of Urology at Scott & White Hospital.

Dr. Everett came to Ozona in July and opened his medical practice. He also took over as Medical Director at the hospital. He was a director of Medica Diversified, an organization which is presently operating the hospital under a management agreement with the county.

The corporation took over the operation of the hospital under the management agreement the middle of this year and the agreement will be in effect while negotiations are underway toward a permanent lease agreement. Attorneys for the county and Medica Diversified, with the Commissioners Court in conference, have worked out major details of the lease agreement but to now the final form has not been completed.

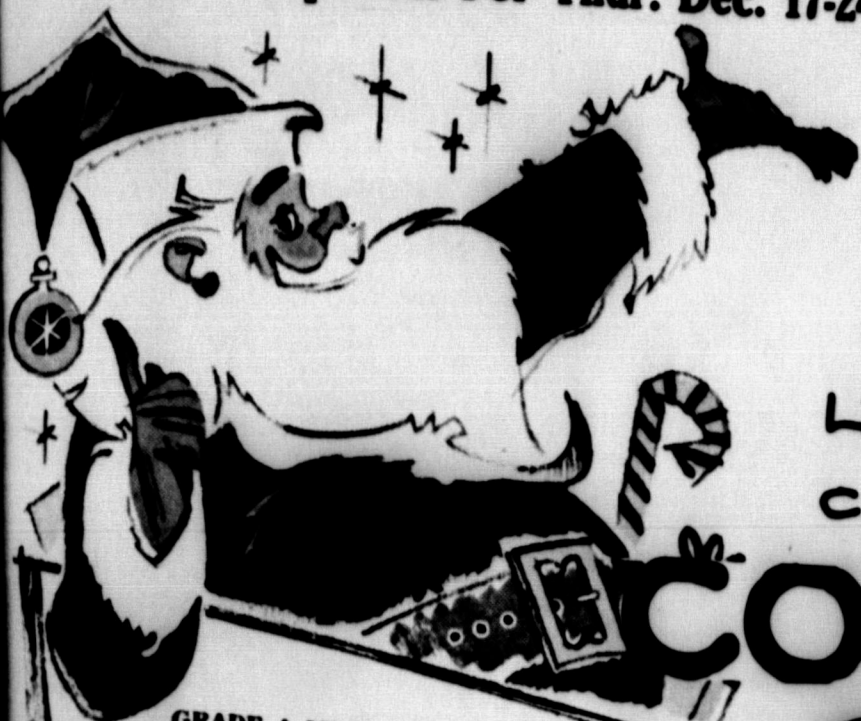

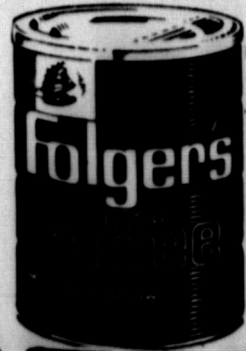

SENSING the NEWS

UNIONS VS. LIBERTIES

While many Americans are aware that unions exercise tremendous power in this country, the ordinary citizen rarely reads union contracts and therefore isn't fully aware of how union power is spelled out.

It would be educational if citizens had an opportunity to read the contract that the United Farm Workers Committee, AFL-CIO, submitted to farmers in California last summer. It is a blueprint for domination of business. Cesar Chavez, head of the union, was recently jailed for refusing to obey a court order in California.

One of the most high-handed features of the contract is the "Recognition" section. Under the agreement, the employer promises that "neither company nor its representatives will take any action to disparage, denigrate or subvert Union, nor will they promote or finance any competing labor organization." That provision assures a permanent union stranglehold on companies that are party to the agreement.

Though the union may act in a tyrannical manner, the company with a contract is virtually forbidden to say or do anything about the union.

In reality, this provision most probably is unconstitutional for it restricts an employer's right to freedom of speech, guaranteed under the First Amendment to the U. S. Constitution. Certainly, this issue should be tested. The U. S. Supreme Court, as presently constituted, may recognize an employer's right to freedom of speech, in year's past, the high court in effect took the position that an employer wasn't entitled to equal justice under the law.

Another section of the contract submitted by Cesar Chavez, boss of the United Farm Worker's Organizing Committee,

stated that "union membership shall be a condition of employment." It would be interesting to know how many Americans have thought through a requirement of that sort.

The requirement means, in effect, that a union owns certain jobs. It means that an employer may not hire a person who is honest, hard-working and fully qualified for the available job -- unless that individual belongs to a particular union and pays dues.

What such a contractual requirement sets up is a system of tribute. A man who wants a job on a farm organized by Cesar Chavez' committee must pay tribute to the union organization in the form of fees.

Such a requirement seems utterly out of place in America. The requirement is in violation of the basic American right to work, to seek and obtain a job without obtaining approval from any third party. A union, of course, is the privileged third party in our country today. A union stands for denial of opportunity, for a union strives to limit the right to work to those who are members and pay dues.

In the case of the contract submitted by the United Farm Worker's Organizing Committee,

special political requirements were imposed on employers and union members. One provision of the contract specified that the "company during the term of the agreement (will) contribute to the Robert F. Kennedy Farm workers Medical Plan ten cents per hour for each hour worked by all workers covered in this agreement." The Robert F. Kennedy Farm workers Medical Plan" has nothing to do with the business of the farm owners. They may well feel that such a plan is not in their own or the public interest or the interest of their employees. No matter, the powerful union requires that the employers pay tribute in support of this plan.

There is no end to union arrogance and power-seeking, as evidenced in the contract submitted. The agreement requires that employers use union labels on their farm products and that the union be supplied with information on the shipping of all products, the name of the shipper, name of broker, name of receiver, and date of shipment and estimated time of arrival.

Such a contract is not only a blueprint for domination of a business. It is a blueprint for a form of totalitarianism, for

a systematic denial of the rights of farm owners. The union becomes a state within a state, a form of authority, with legal means to compel adherence to an agreement. A union also has extra-legal

means such as the boycotts and roughstuff which established the union in California grape-growing areas in the first place. The collective bargaining agreement that was adopted clearly shows how tra-

ditional American liberties are being destroyed by powerful union bosses.

Sometimes life is like that snowman - grand and glittering with all the things we have. Then the hot winds of disaster blow, and their importance vanishes and we are left with emptiness.

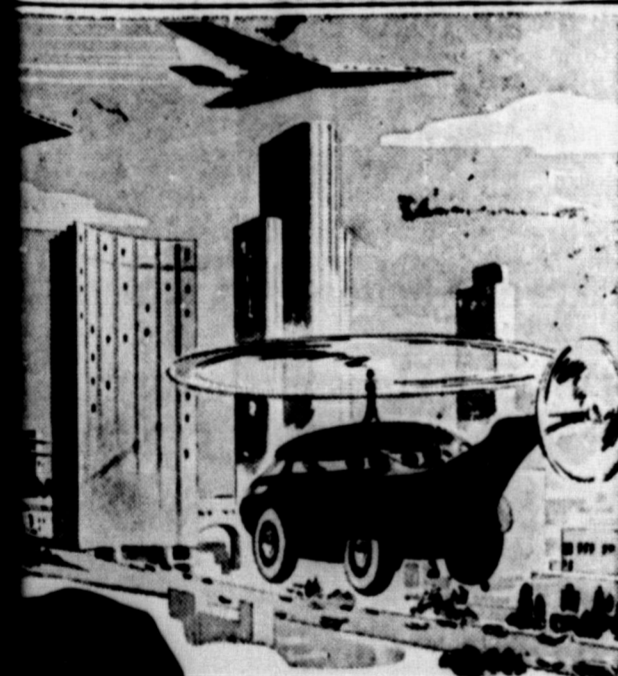

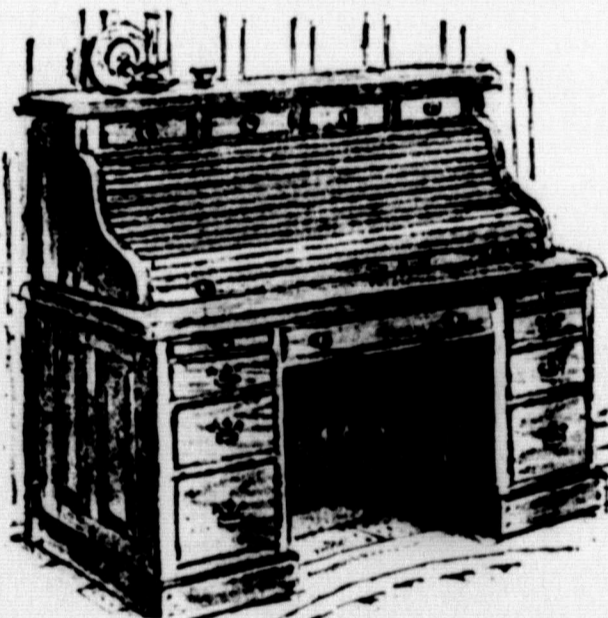

All Aliens In US Required To Register In Jan.

District Director, John W. Holland of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has reminded aliens in the United States that they will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future. All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the following classes of aliens

are excused from this requirement: (1) Accredited Diplomats; and (2) Persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service Office during the month of January. Also, this year the reporting requirement has been broadened to additionally provide for the mailing of completed address reports directly to the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

The cards will still be received at all post offices and Immigration and Naturalization Service offices as in the past.

- 5 lb. chicken (1 sometimes use a large, fat fryer)
- 1 medium sized onion
- 1 small can mushrooms (chopped)
- 1 small package spaghetti
- 1 no. 2 can tomatoes
- 1/2 cup ripe olives (chopped)
- 3 tbs. Worcestershire Sauce
- 1 button garlic
- 1/4 lb. grated sharp cheese

Cook chicken with one button garlic until tender. Cool and bone chicken. Cook spaghetti in plain water. Saute onions, add tomatoes with a pint (2 cups) of broth. Make a paste of 2 tablespoons of flour and cold water and add to onions and tomato mixture and simmer 30 minutes. Add chicken, mushrooms, olives, spaghetti. Sprinkle grated cheese on top of mixture and bake in a large baking dish for 30 minutes in a hot, gas oven (400 degrees) Serves 10 to 12.
