Bids for construction are cheduled to be opened January 15. The construction was made possible by approval by voters of a \$150,000 bond issue at a ecent election.

Mason Cops 40th Annual Ozona Tournament; Lions Win Third

Mason beat Brady Saturday night in the championship final of the 40th Annual Ozona Basketball Tournament to take the championship trophy. The Mason squad got off to a slow start but overcame a big Brady lead to take the win in a double overtime.

Brady led at the end of every period with the exception of the fourth quarter. When the

game ended the two teams were tied 47 all. Mason got the ball in the first overtime and managed to stall the entire three minutes, taking a shot in the final seconds only to miss. However, their strategy paid off in the second overtime and with 10 seconds to go they swished the nets for two points

and the win. A small crowd was on hand

for the final game. Attendance was off during the entire tournament and there were fewer teams entered this year since The Lions took a 47-36 win

over Big Lake to win the thirdplace trophy. The Lions were not in good form during their two games Saturday. An overly long football season has cut into their practice time and football injuries are still keeping them from peak performance.

The Lions beat Rankin in the first round of the tournament 60-40 to go the win bracket, Mickey McBroom led the Lion attack with 15 points, while Mike Jenkins chipped in with 13 and Will Collet hit for 11.

In second-round play Friday the Lions probably played their best game of the tournament, beating a good Iraan team by 57-44. David Pagan, the Lions' ace player, saw his first action during this game and hit for 12 points to lead the team. He has been side-lined with a football injury, Jim Montgomery and David Sewell were the only other Lions in double figures with 10 points each.

Saturday's loss to Mason saw the Lions unable to hit. A Lion field goal in the final seconds of the game would have tied the score 40-40, but they lost the ball and Mason took the win 42-38. Pagan hit for 18 points before fouling out in the fourth period. This was probably the difference for the Lions, as their final game with the Owls saw them obviously let down and Pagan was the only Lion in double figures with 14.


