## Texas Crude Oil Spots Wildcat in North Crockett

Texas Crude Oil Co., Inc., will drill the No. 1-A-12 University, 50 feet south and the same distance east of and as a replacement for its No. 1 University, Crockett County 8, 400-foot Ellenburger wildcat, 17 miles north of Ozona, 5/8 mile west-northwest of the one-well Childress, East (Canyon) field, but separated by an 8, 285-foot failure and one location east of the depleted Childress (Ellenburger oil) field.

Location is 610 feet from the south and 2,030 feet from the west lines of 12-39-University.

The No. 1 University, same section, was junked at 2,009 feet.

## Ira Carson Honored For 50 Years As a Baptist Deacon

Ira Carson, Ozona ranchman, was honored for fifty years of service as a deacon of the First Baptist Church of Ozona on the occasion of a dinner for deacons and their wives in the home of the church's pastor, Rev. and Mrs. Keith Bailey.

Mr. and Mrs. Carson were recognized with special gifts on the occasion. A set of cuff links was presented to Mr. Carson, the links engraved with the word "Diakonos", the Greek word for Deacon. The gifts were given by fellow deacons and their wives and the pastor and Mrs. Bailey.

Mr. Carson was ordained a deacon of the First Baptist Church in Ozona in November of 1920, last month marking the fiftieth anniversary of his service to the church and to the Baptist work of Texas.

Pastors and deacons from churches, in Sonora, Eldorado and Big Lake came to take part in the ordination service for Mr. Carson, Rev. Leon Gambell was pastor of the local church at the time of the ordination.

"Ira Carson has served the Baptist work of Texas well during these fifty years as a Deacon," Rev. Bailey said of him. He has served as a Trustee of Howard Payne College, Brownwood, Texas; a member of the Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas; as a trustee of the Mexican Baptist Children's Home in San Antonio; trustee of the Baptist Memorial in San Angelo, and a trustee of the Paisano Baptist Encampment at Alpine.

In December of 1920, Mr. Carson and Miss Wilma West, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. E. West, were married and both have served faithfully in every area of church life here.

Mr. and Mrs. Carson will be honored by their children at a reception Sunday afternoon at the Ozona Country Club. Hosts will be Mr. and Mrs. Bill Carson, Mr. and Mrs. James Childress, and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Clegg.

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CHRISTMAS - 1970

What a wonderful, happy, festive, spicy time of year is Christmas! A time we have been eagerly awaiting for a whole year to happen again. We must confess that some of the days before Christmas can be a bit irksome, and all of the hustling and bustling and buying and bundling and boxing and tinseling has gotten way out of hand; but for millions of children of all ages, it is the only time of the year when we can make dreams come true—and that, my friends, is not to be sneezed at!

We're reminded of those old stories beginning with the words, "Christmas isn't what it used to be...." But maybe it isn't what it used to be—it's more.

First, there's Santa Claus, and he will never let us down. We all have memories of those absolutely fascinating days of being a child with every inch of our bodies tingling over the thought of jolly old Saint Nick climbing down the chimney and leaving all those special things we asked for. Remember writing those letters to Santa, telling him how good you had been all year (and the promises to be better next year)? Sometimes we wonder when and where the innocence of childhood leaves us. We can't remember seeing it go - but we must remember that it is still here, all around us.

FREE KUDIRKA!

The MILWAUKEE SENTINEL editorializes, "Instead of just bemoaning the bungling that deprived a Lithuanian sailor of political asylum, the American Public should be mounting a campaign in the court of world opinion demanding freedom for the defector, Simas Kudirka. This is what happens when celebrated Communists are arrested in the West. Their cases are made into causes celebres and milked for all the propaganda value they are worth. Witness Angela Davis."

There are, of course, some considerable difference to be faced. While the Communists and their collaborators can "protest" to their heart's content in the free world, not even a communist—(much less an anti-communist)—can protest Soviet injustice anywhere behind the iron curtain. While "Red Angie" is given free play in the free press here, nobody in the Soviet empire will hear about Kudirka if the Communists can help it. And while Angie will be given all of the rights and privileges of a presumed-innocent individual, including the right to trial by jury, to select attorneys of her own choice, and to many other rights under American law, Kudirka may already be at the bottom of the sea—sentenced and executed.

Still, the Sentinel has a point in declaring that such a "Free Kudirka" campaign would be useful "to make it clear to the world that it is the Communist system that is repressive. The Communists have tried to make it appear that the Soviet life is beautiful and the American life oppressive. It is high time to set the record straight, and the Kudirka case offers a dramatic way to start to do it."

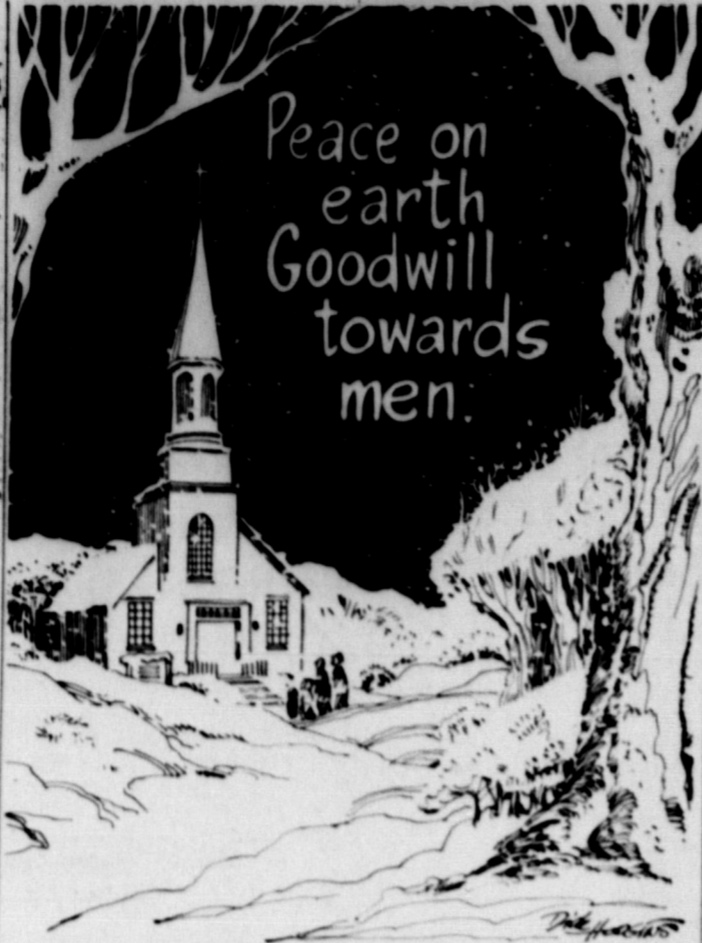

Crisis Nearing For Texas Deer Due To Drouth

Austin--A massive die-off of white-tailed deer in many areas of Texas is a definite possibility as a stubborn drought continues to retard growth of forage and cover.

Quail and turkey populations also are threatened, according to reports from field personnel of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

If the drought continues in areas of high deer concentration through the winter, landowners likely will lose more deer through starvation than hunters will kill during the hunting season, biologists say.

So hunters are advised to go ahead and hunt as much as possible and as soon as possible, because in most cases the hunter harvest will only trim a comparatively small percentage of the population which will be reduced by natural mortality anyway during the winter.

The same applies to quail. There are still good numbers of quail in most areas, but biologists expect a sharp reduction as cover and food sources continue to dry up. So hunters may as well harvest some of the birds before they fall prey to a cold, dry winter.

Already field reports indicate that deer in high concentration areas such as the Edwards Plateau are beginning to lose some of the body fat they accumulated earlier this fall when acorns were on the ground. If

dry weather persists through December, increased mortality among fawns can be expected during January and February. The fawns are first to feel the pinch of forage shortages, as they cannot reach the higher browse utilized by the mature animals. They tend to be crowded out of the way in the competition for food.

### Fair Warning

While a housewife was polishing her dining room table, the telephone rang in the kitchen. Although she was out of the room only a few minutes, her infant son managed to take a drink of the furniture polish. It was poisonous, and the child died.

In due course, the victim's parents filed a damage suit against the manufacturer of the polish. They charged that the label failed to warn how dangerous the polish was.

True, the label did contain the words "May be harmful if swallowed." Nevertheless, the company was indeed held liable for



the tragedy. The words were found to be too mild a warning for so deadly a product. Besides, they were placed in an obscure position on the package.

One of the common issues in product liability cases is whether the manufacturer has given the user "fair warning" of possible danger. Generally speaking, the warning should be as conspicuous

and as urgent as the danger reasonably calls for.  
To judge the adequacy of a particular warning, courts will weigh various factors. Thus:  
A label on paint, listing a dangerous ingredient, was held inadequate because the ingredient was described only by its chemical name, which few users would understand.  
And the warning on a cleaning fluid was held inadequate because it was printed in letters that were too small.  
On the other hand, when the warning is fair, it is not the manufacturer's fault if the user simply fails to pay attention to it. For example:  
An adhesive compound, placed

too close to an open flame, exploded and injured the user. But when he sued for damages, the company pointed out that the label had a plain and positive warning of the danger. Accordingly, the victim's claim was turned down.

Furthermore, many dangers are so obvious that no warning is needed at all. As one judge put it: "A knife will cut and a stove will burn; but no authority holds that manufacturers must warn of such contingencies. No one needs notice of what he already knows."

Draft-Dodger Cassius Clay, who has spent three years trying to escape serving his country, is back in the big money again. He's being accorded box office acclaim as if he were an American hero!

That prompted Lee Stillwell to check the selective service records to see what happened to the man next in line who took Clay's place when the boxer refused to answer the draft call. That man was Isaac T. Price, Jr., also colored, of Louisville.

Price became an army cook, went to Vietnam, volunteered to become a gunner on an Army helicopter, and saw action. He earned the National Defense Service Medal, and Overseas Bar.

Of his duty in Vietnam, writer Stillwell quotes him as saying: "I feel I learned something in the Army. I benefited from it. I done everything right. I went to Vietnam."

"I figure I can say I'm a man. I have done something for my country and that makes me feel good."

Clay's case is now back before the Supreme Court for final action after having been returned to the Houston Court (where he had been ordered to prison for 5 years) to determine if wiretapping was involved.

#### In Argentina

It's a mid-summer Christmas in Argentina, and the traditional feast is generally served outdoors. Rosebuds and jasmine deck the table, which has an edible centerpiece - a whole roast sucking pig.

#### In Brazil

Brazilian lore and legend says that Three King's Day

is a time for poetry contests. Verses accompanied by guitars are featured.

#### In Chile

Unique among Christmas customs in Chile is a grand fiesta that centers around horse racing.

#### In Colombia

People parade in masquerade on Christmas Eve in Colombia. Each masquerader tries to guess the identity of others. When someone guesses correctly, he can claim a small gift from the person who was "unmasked."

#### In Peru

Toro! In Lima, Peru, Christmas day is not exclusively a church holiday, because it also marks the greatest bullfight of the year.

#### In Costa Rica

In the island country of Costa Rica, "portals" are set up in homes. These are elaborate Nativity scenes sometimes filling an entire room.

are "idealists." But idealists don't peddle dope. Moreover, the "street people" aren't seeking true isolation like some hermit sects of the past. The "street people" decline to cooperate with conventional society. They express hatred for the orderly life. At the same time, they also want to extract everything possible from conventional society in the way of financial assistance. They try to obtain welfare payments and free medical care.

The "street people" of the 1970's deserve the label of parasites. They want to live off the host community of employed, responsible citizens. They talk about "love" and "sharing," but they want to take from society and give nothing in return. They aren't utopian, for they have no vision of a better society. They merely want to exploit the society in which they live and take advantage of its generosity and tolerance.

History-minded citizens recall that in times of breakdown in civilizations there is a turn toward nomadism. Bands of ruffians inhabit once proud cities. We are witnessing the same phenomenon in our own time and country. In Atlanta, Ga., for example, hippie "street people" have made some streets unsafe for respectable people. On the West Coast much of the superb Pacific coast is deluged with "street people". Bizarre crimes and disease are the results of this flood of wanderers who refuse to take up any duties in the society in which they live.

Tolerance of the wanderers has been unduly extended. As the "street people" spread their drug culture and infect communities — quite literally — with physical disease, as well as the disease of the spirit, it is becoming imperative that organized society take steps to break up the ruffian bands of wanderers.

Hopefully, the "street people" will learn the error of their ways. Practically speak-

Combine sugar, milk, apricots, butter and salt in a saucepan. Stirring constantly, bring to a boil. Boil, stirring occasionally, until a small amount of the mixture dripped in cold water forms a soft ball (236°F.). Cool to lukewarm. Add vanilla and nuts and beat until stiff enough to knead. Place on a bread board and knead until smooth. Shape into four small rolls about 1 inch in diameter. Place in the refrigerator to chill for several hours. Cut in small slices. Yields about 80 pieces.

Date Loaf  
3 cups sugar  
1 cup milk  
1 tbs. butter  
1 box dates, chopped  
2 tbs. white Karo  
1 cup nuts, chopped

Cook all ingredients except nuts together in a heavy saucepan until firm ball forms when a little is dropped in cold water. Remove from heat and beat until cool. Add nuts and mix well. Pour onto damp cloth and roll up. When cold and firm, cut in slices. Makes large amount.

Old Fashioned Fudge  
3 cups sugar  
4 heaping tbs. cocoa  
2 tbs. white Karo  
1 cup milk  
1 teas. vanilla  
2 tbs. butter  
1 cup chopped nuts

Mix sugar and cocoa, add Karo and milk. Cook in heavy saucepan, large, over high heat until sugar is dissolved. Cook until firm ball is formed when small amount is dropped into cold water. Add butter and cool to lukewarm. Add vanilla and nuts. Beat until Pour into buttered pan and let cool. Cut in squares when firm.

Blonde Fudge  
1 cup sugar  
1 teas. salt  
1 cup light cream  
1 cup milk  
1 cup light corn syrup  
2 tbs. butter  
2 teas. vanilla  
1 cup chopped nuts

Combine first six ingredients in heavy 3-quart saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until sugar dissolves and mixture boils. Continue cooking, stirring occasionally, until a small amount of

the mixture dropped in cold water forms a firm ball (236°F) Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Cool without stirring until temperature reaches lukewarm then beat until fudge begins to thicken and loses its gloss. Fold in nuts and immediately spread into buttered pan.

Cool and cut into squares. Makes about 1 1/2 pounds of candy.





**Wildcat Slated, Four Extenders For Crockett Co.**

A wildcat was scheduled in Crockett County, and a Crockett field gained four extenders. Inxco Oil Co. will attempt to re-open Ellenburger oil production 1/4 mile northeast of the former Ellenburger oil opener and lone producer from that pay, which currently produces gas from the Ellenburger, in the Wyatt multipay field of Crockett County, 14 miles northwest of Ozona. It is the No. 1 Shannon Estate.

Location, on an 80-acre lease, is 1,980 feet from the south and 1,480 feet from the west lines of 36-UV-GC&SF. The field also produces from the San Andres.

The discovery, Lion Oil Co. (now Monsanto Co.) No. 1 Shannon, was finalized July 4, 1952 for 192.5 barrels of 38.4 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 365-1, through an 18-64-inch choke and perforations at 7,380, 413 feet. It was recompleted Dec. 10, 1953, as the second Ellenburger gas producer and a location north extension to that pay, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4,230,000 cubic feet of gas daily, plus 70.5 barrels of 56.3 gravity distillate per day thru perforations at 6,657-7,132 feet.

The Ozona (Canyon sand) field and Crockett County gained four extensions, approximately 34 miles southwest of Ozona.

Monitor Natural Gas Co., Midland, No. 1-34 Zipp Ranch 1 1/2 miles south-southwest, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.3 million cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 29,145-1. Gravity of the condensate was 62 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 6,049-7,137 feet, which had been acidized with 1,750 gallons and fractured with 30,000 gallons and 56,000 pounds of sand.

Location is 2,709 feet from the north and 1,812 feet from the west lines of 34-MM-T&S. Monitor Natural Gas No. 1-84 Clegg, 3/4 mile northwest, was finalized for a calculated,

absolute open flow of 740,000 cubic feet daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 245,284-1. Gravity of the condensate was 62.2 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 5,754-6,951 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons and fractured with 30,000 gallons, 60,000 pounds of sand and 3,500 pounds of salt.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and 1,320 feet from the west lines of 84-Q2-TCRR.

Monitor Natural Gas No. 1-52 Ira Carson, 5/8-mile northeast, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 810,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 47,614-1. Gravity of the condensate was 64 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 5,323-6,854 feet,

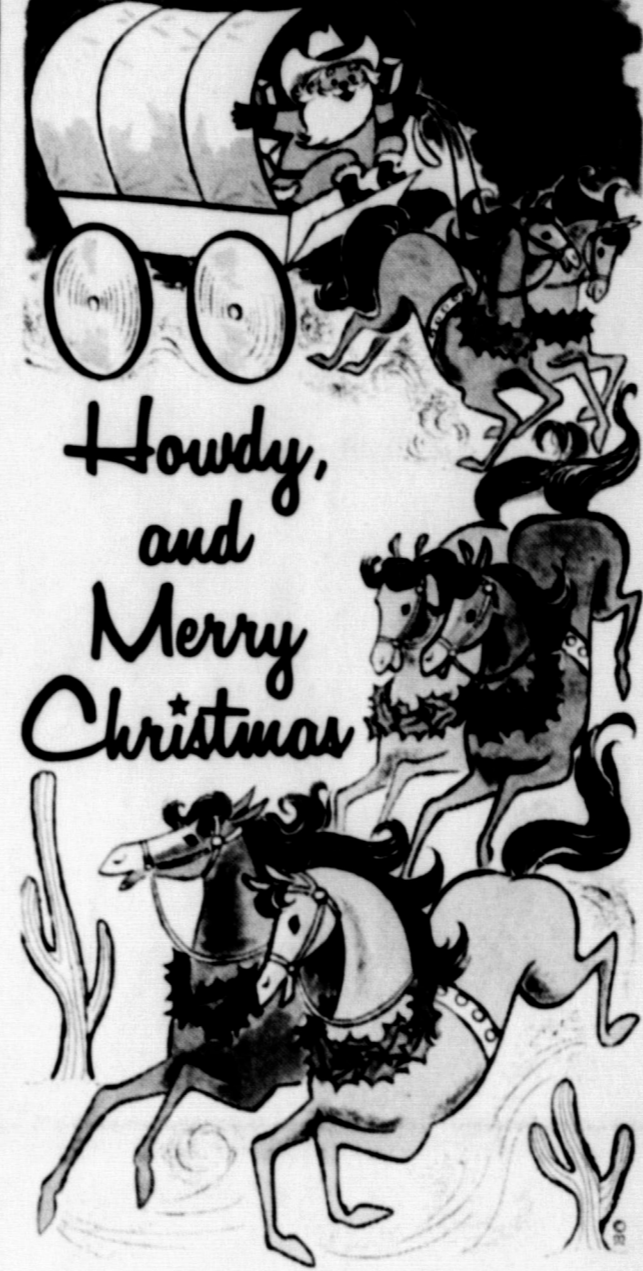
which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons and fractured with 30,000 gallons, 60,000 pounds of sand and 3,500 pounds of salt.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 52-Q2&GN.

Monitor Natural Gas No. 2-84 Clegg, 1/2 mile north, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,610,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 80,122-1. Gravity of the condensate was 61.6 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 5,550-6,938 feet, which had been acidized with 1,500 gallons and fractured with 30,000 gallons, 75,000 pounds of sand, and an 8,800 pound salt plug.

Location is 1,420 feet from the south and 1,320 feet from the east lines of 84-Q2-TCRR.
