


ple. Colonel Speir told the group of lawmen and visitors that he had just returned from Washington where he attended a conference called by the President and Attorney General John Mitchell. He was one of 18 law enforcement leaders from over the nation called to the conference on enforcement

When asked by the President to comment on needs for better law enforcement, Colonel Speir said "I put in my quarter's worth, " Referring to a discussion topic on the question of whether or not federal legislation is needed in the matter of the current wave of police slayings, Colonel Speir said that he argued against such legislation, pointing out that local authorities are better equipped to handle their enforcement problems and with the ready availability of the FBI wherever needed, further federal participation would not be advisable.

SOVIET SST LANDS IN PARIS

Just a month after the U.S. Senate voted against an American supersonic transport, the Soviet Union landed its already completed SST in Paris, the TU-144. It made the flight in half the time required by America's fastest commercial airliner, to share honors with the French SST, the Concorde 001, at the Paris Air Show. It is reported the TU-144 meets U.S. standards for noise and that it emitted no smoke.

It has been 17 years since the United States produced a faster commercial plane. That is a long time without any progress. If we were actively working on a faster plane we would still be five years behind the USSR. But we are not even working on it, while Moscow continues forging ahead to make a better one.

What is far more significant, the Soviet Union already has far more nuclear power than the USA, and it continues to outproduce America in nuclear capacity each year. 
NEW YORK IS ALARMED

Steel production began here at the turn of the century Today, the iron used in the process no longer comes from Birmingham's Red Mountain, Instead, the iron ore originates in Canada and Venezuela and is transported to Mobile where it is off-loaded onto barges for trans-shipment to the Birmingham mills. The rich deposits of local coal are still used, however, Steel-making here is a huge enterprise. The giant Fairfield Works of the Inited States Steel Corporation is the largest employer in the State of Alabama, Indeed the huge mills constitute a vital unit in America's steel production.

Our era is referred to as the Atomic Age. It is more accurate to describe it as the Steel Age. Everything a nation does -- from producing consumer goods to building nu clear plants, pipelines and tankers--requires steel. Thus steel is the key index in determining a country's industrial strength.

Not many years ago, America's steel industry dominated the world. Today, the States faces grave problems, It is no exaggeration to say that, in the long-run, the industrial leadership of the United States is threatened. Japan could become the No. 1 steel-making country in the world and, in the process, the No. 1 power in the world.

In order to expand producnew processes. American steel-makers need to increase their earnings. But this isn't happening. Earnings of steel companies average 4.8% of stockholders equity, or less than half the rate of return for all manufacturing corporations in the United States,

The prospect for a healthearnings picture is dimmed by the fact that the current three-year union agreedanger exists that the United Steelworkers of America will call a strike that will cause immense damage to the industry and to the American economy in general.

Wages in the steel industry are among the highest in all U. S. business, Steelworkers' hourly earnings average \$4,25 per hour. The wage structure is the reason that the reason that the American steel industry faces an almost impossible situation with respect to foreign competition, Employment costs for U. S. per hour over the costs of apanese companies. This

gap widened from \$3, 51 in 1965 despite an 85% increase in costs in Japan.

Increased automation isn't the solution for American steel-makers. To offset the hourly employment cost gap versus Japan, man-hours in American companies would have to be reduced two-thirds -- a virtual impossibility.

Under the existing wage structure, Japan sells steel at approximately \$40 a ton less than American seel companies can market their products. Prior to 1959, the United States was a consistent net exporter of steel. By 1968, foreign steel companies sold more than 18 million tons in the American market. This means a severe loss of jobs as well as a decline in corporate income.

The need now is for a quantitative limitation on foreign steel imports. The very suggestion of this arouses those who say the United States should engage in free trade. Unfortunately, free trade doesn't exist these days. Japan's industry, for example, is organized in cartels, Japan's government works hand in glove with its steel industry . Steel products are dumped in the United States at prices lower than those set for the Japanese domestic market. Then there's the related fact that there's no free trade in labor in the United States. The steel industry is compelled to negotiate with the steel workers union.

Very soon, Congress must decide whether this nation wants to have a steel industry in future. If we are to have this capacity -- and it is essential to the nation's economic well-being and technological growth--then foreign imports must be limited and irresponsible wage demands must be restrained. The combination of cut-rate foreign competition and overzealous union demands is threatening the U. S. Steel industry -- the heart of the American industrial system.

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



Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club

Mrs. Bailey Post With June comes some of the gifts from your early garden planning and labor. An armful of flowers, fresh vegetables from your garden, and maybe a little fruit that the freeze and hail didn't get. Off of a small plum tree we harves unsightly scalped appearance. ted our first plum from a total of four that survived. Tomatoes while you are on vacation, reshould be loaded with their fruit soon, and I hear onions are being pulled, dried and hung for later use.

You should hurry with those late plantings of gladiolus, cannas, caladium, tuberoses and dahlias,

Deep watering and proper mowing are the keys to a healthy, lush lawn after grass is established,

When determining how often to water your lawn, consider t | bare roots and shoots can be the type of soil, local rainfall and the kind of grass on your lawn, if grass wilts during the sure that each sprig has at hottest part of the day, it needs least two and preferably 4, watering. In heavy soils or sloping lawns a deep 4 to 6 inches penetration is needed to prevent water loss due to run off. This may require 6 to 8 hours of continous sprinkling during dry periods. If you sprinkle your grass daily, there is danger of causing a shallow root system which suffers during cover entire sprig, let the periods of scant rainfall, Leaf texture of the lawn grass determines how close the grass may be cut. Even though finetextured grasses such as Bermuda and Zoysias are mowed losely, there will be enough

leaf blades left to manufacture food. These should be cut } to 1 inch in height.

St Augustine and centipede grasses suffer if a majority of the leaf surface is removed by close mowing. They are best cut at 1 to 11 inches high. A sudden and extreme reduction in height of grasses upsets the natural balance between leaf and root growth, weakening the lawn as well as giving it an If your grass becomes too tall duce height gradually over a period of several mowings. You should leave as much grass as you cut away. If a + inch height is desired, mow when the grass reaches one inch in height. Grass growing in the shade needs more leaf growth

Sprigs of grass that have used to patch bare spots in your lawn or build a new lawn. Be leaf joints from which new roots can develop. You will be successful in sprigging grasses any time between spring and late summer if you keep them watered. Dig rows 2 to 3 inches deep, a foot apart, Place sprigs in the row 3 to 6 inches apart. Cover with soil but do not growing tip with leaves protrude above soil level. Pack soil, water well and keep watered if there is no rainfall.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

A \$1-billion-a-year emergency employment and manpower bill sailed through the House last week -- authorized to create 150, 000 new federally-financed jobs for the unemployed. It's a WPA type program, and is expected to become bigger each year. It may be vetoed, and probably should be.

The Paris air show, just concluded, this year featured 180 different planes, of all sizes and shapes. The Japs, for example, had four new offerings, mostly of the smaller utility design. U. S. showed a variety of new and improved models, with the giant C-5 transport leading the pack.

But despite all these attractions, it was the Russian and the Anglo-French SST models which grabbed the spotlight as hundreds of thousands pushed against the rope lines that surrounded the two sky giants. parked a few yards apart. The Soviet prototype --

the TU-144 -- which makes 1, 560 mph, has 120 seast. while the Concorde is a bit slower but capable of exceeding 1200 mph.

At their Toulouse factory, the French have four more Concordes on the production line, making a total of 10 in the works. This plane has flown aughter, Georganne, to Gary where she was a cheerleader and more than 450 hours and ap-Loudamy, son of Mr. and Mrs. a member of the student council, pears quite promising, although it will probably be two or three years before the Concorde is used on regular trans-ocean-

ic flights. Now that the U. S. has thrown in the sponge on SSTs, the Anglo-French and the Soviets foresee a lush world market for their supersonic aircraft in the years ahead.

The Russians are obviously sensitive about U. S. plans, spent two days at the show last week, and while there

a colleague of mine, Al Pirnie of New York, and I were admitted aboard the TU-144. We found the inside rather conventional, with much electronic and experimental equipment in evidence. The Russians, including the plane's chief pilot, told us it would be perhaps two years before the plane will fly commercially. They asked us many questions, the first of which was: "How did you vote on the SST?"
