

The Double R (Crinoidal) field of Crockett County gained its second well and a location northwest extension with completion of J. S. Abercrombie Minerals Co. Inc., Hous-ton, No. 3 J. S. Todd, 18 miles east-southeast of Iraan, for daily pumping potential of 117 barrels of 42 gravity oil and five barrels of water, with gas oil ratio of 897-1.


